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

# Sales tax holiday

Comptroller Susan Combs announced that the date for the annual sales tax holiday has changed from the first weekend of August to the third weekend of August. Combs also said backpacks, a standard item on many kids' school supply lists, can now be purchased tax free during the sales tax holiday.

"From now on, the sales tax holiday will occur on the third Friday, Saturday and Sunday of August," Combs said. "This year, the date is Aug. 17-19."

Since many school districts are now starting their school year later, the 80th Legislature changed the date of the sales tax holiday to move it closer to the first day of school.

During the sales tax holiday, children's and adults' clothing and shoes priced less than \$100—and now backpacks that cost less than \$100—are exempt from state and local sales taxes.

"The Legislature responded to parents' requests to add backpacks to the list of tax-exempt items," Combs said. "Backpacks can be

expensive, especially for parents who have to buy them for several children. A tax break helps."

Combs also announced that, starting in May 2008, energyefficient appliances will be exempt from sales tax during the three-day Memorial Day weekend. Certain appliances with a federal Energy Star rating will be tax-free, including washing machines, dishwashers, ceiling dehumidifiers, programmable thermostats and incandescent fluorescent light bulbs. Air conditioners priced at \$6,000 or less and refrigerators priced at \$2,000 or less can also be purchased tax free.

"Texas consumers will save about \$8 for every \$100 they spend on qualifying appliances," Combs said.

The Comptroller predicts families will save about \$52.1 million in sales taxes during the August sales tax holiday.

#### Lady Bird Johnson is laid to rest

AUSTIN-Lady Bird Johnson, 94, died of natural causes July 11 at her home in West Lake Hills with her daughters Lynda Johnson Robb and Luci Baines Johnson and her grandchildren at her side.

On July 12, Gov. Rick Perry ordered flags to half-staff in Mrs. Johnson's honor.

Mrs. Johnson's body lay in repose July 13 to 14 at the LBJ Library and Museum on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin. More than 11,000 people filed past her casket in the library's great hall.

About 1,800 people attended a private memorial service at Riverbend Church on July 14.

Among the many dignitaries in attendance at the memorial service were First Lady Laura Bush, President Bill Clinton and Sen. Hillary Clinton, President and Mrs. George H.W. Bush, Nancy Reagan, President and Mrs. Jimmy Carter, Gov. and Mrs. Perry, Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, Susan Ford Bales. Caroline Kennedy Schlossberg and Maria Shriver.

On July 15, crowds of people lined Congress Avenue between the Capitol and Town Lake to pay last respects as the funeral motorcade proceeded south, then west, enroute to Johnson City.

In the early afternoon of the 15th, Mrs. Johnson was buried alongside her husband in the Johnson family cemetery in Stonewall, about 70 miles west of Austin. The cemetery is part of the LBJ National Historical Park.

Born Claudia Alta Taylor in Karnack, a small town in East Texas in 1912, Mrs. Johnson is remembered as the trusted adviser and devoted wife of the 36th president of the United States. Lyndon Baines Johnson.

President Johnson died at age 64 on Jan. 22, 1973, four years after leaving office. Mrs. Johnson outlived her husband by more than 34 years.

#### Former chief justice Hill dies

Another native of East Texas, Kilgore-born John L. Hill Jr., died July 9. He was 83.

Gov. Perry ordered flags to half staff in Hill's honor.

Hill was the only Texan to have served in all of these state offices: as secretary of state, attorney general and chief justice of the supreme court.

After graduating from the University of Texas law school in 1947. Hill became a masterful lawyer, winning high-profile cases. He worked in Harris County on John Connally's 1964 gubernatorial campaign.

Hill served as secretary of state from 1966-68 under Gov. Connally.

He was elected attorney general in 1972 and served in that role until 1979.

Hill ran unsuccessfully for governor in 1978, losing to Bill Clements.

Hill was elected chief justice of the Texas Supreme Court in 1984 and resigned in 1988.

In 1997, then-Gov. George W. Bush appointed Hill to a post on the Texas Lottery Commission.

### **2007 DCP** sign-up deadline

Department Agriculture Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Teresa Lasseter has announced that farmers and other landowners with base acres and yields have until Aug. 3, 2007, to enroll in the 2007 Direct and Counter-cyclical Payment Program (DCP).

The deadline to enroll in the 2007 Direct and Counter-cyclical Payment Program is rapidly approaching," said Lasseter. "I encourage all eligible producers to enroll in DCP before the Aug. 3 deadline to avoid paying the late

In March 2007, FSA extended the DCP sign-up deadline to Aug. 3, 2007.

The original DCP enrollment deadline was June 1, 2007. Producers failing to sign up by Aug. 3, 2007, but before Sept. 30, 2007, will pay a late-file fee of \$100. The final date to enroll in the 2007 DCP is Sept. 30, 2007.

Enrollment in DCP for the 2007 contract period began Oct. 1, 2006.

DCP provides payments to eligible producers on farms enrolled for the 2002 through 2007 crop years. There are two types of DCP payments-direct payments and counter-cyclical payments. USDA computes payments using the base acres and payment yields established for the farm. The Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (2002 Farm Bill) authorized DCP.

I encourage all producers to get involved by nominating eligible candidates to serve on county committees."

FSA county committees assist local farmers through their decisions on commodity price support loans, conservation programs and disaster programs, and by working closely with county executive directors.

To hold office as a county committee member, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area in which the person is a candidate. A complete list of eligibility requirements and additional information are posted online at http://www.fsa.usda.gov; click on

News & Events, then County Committee Elections.

Individuals may nominate themselves or others as candidates. Also, organizations representing minorities and women are encouraged to nominate candidates.

All nominees must sign nomination form FSA-669A, which includes a statement that the nominee agrees to serve if elected. Form FSA-669A is available at USDA Service Centers and online at the Web site listed above. All nomination forms for the 2007 election must

be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 1.

The county committee nomination period began June 15. Voting takes place in the fall. Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters by Nov. 2. The final day to return voted ballots to the local USDA Service Center is Dec. 3. Newly elected county committee members take office Jan. 1, 2008.

Agriculture has announced that it will not issue final 2006-crop counter-cyclical payments to farmers enrolled in the Direct and Counter-cyclical Payment Program (DCP) with respect to wheat, barley and oats because prices for these commodities have averaged well above levels that counter-cyclical payments.

USDA makes final countercyclical payments at the end of an eligible crop's 12-month marketing year. The 2002 Farm Bill provides for the availability of two partial counter-cyclical payments. USDA did not issue a first or second partial payment for the 2006 crop of wheat, barley or oats due to strong markets.

The counter-cyclical payment rate is the amount by which the "target price" of each commodity, specified by the 2002 Farm Bill, exceeds its effective price. The effective price equals the direct payment rate plus the higher of either: (1) the national average market price received by

The U.S. Department of producers during the marketing year; or (2) the national average loan rate for the commodity.

> The final marketing year prices per bushel are \$4.26 for wheat, \$2.59 for barley, and \$1.87 for oats. The final countercyclical payment rates for wheat, barley or oats are zero because their effective prices exceed target prices. For each commodity, the counter-cyclical payment for each crop year equals 85 percent of the farm's base acreage times the farm's counter-cyclical payment yield times the countercyclical payment rate.

#### THE WHO, WHEN, AND HOW OF BUSINESS SUCCESSION PLANNING

Succession planning is very important for a family-owned business. Before you sit down with your tax and legal advisors to draw up a succession plan, you should think through three key issues: who do you want to succeed you, when do you want the transition to take place, and how do you want to structure the

The question of who will succeed you in the business can be the toughest of all, largely because there is so much emotion involved. Most owners want to pass the business on to the family. But are your children willing to take on the business, and if so, are they capable of running it? Will it cause a family squabble if one or two children want to run the business, but others are not interested? Resolving these issues my take a lot of honest, open discussion with family members to discover their true feelings. If there is not an obvious family successor, other alternatives include selling the business to an outsider, promoting an existing employee to head the business while you retain ownership, or even selling the business to the employees.

When you make the transition depends on a number of factors, such as your age, health, retirement goals, and the readiness of a successor. Consider whether you want to maintain some involvement with the business or make a clean break. Remember, though, you should always have a contingency succession plan in case of sudden death or disability.

How you structure the transition depends partly on the answers to the earlier questions and partly on financial considerations. Think through issues such as whether you need retirement income from the business or whether you primarily want to minimize estate taxes. 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

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs has announced that the state collected \$1.63 billion in sales tax revenue in June, up 9.3 percent compared to June 2006.

Combs sent July sales tax allocations of \$304 million to Texas cities, up 9.5 percent compared to July 2006. So far this calendar year, city sales tax allocations are up 7.3 percent compared to the same time period last year. Texas counties received sales tax payments of \$27.4 million, up 7.4 percent compared to last July. So far this year, sales tax allocations to counties are up 8.1 percent compared to 2006.

Haskell County had a 1.81 percent decrease for July 2007 of \$28,777.55 in comparison to \$29,309.45 for July 2006. 2007 payments to date of \$236,695.73 reflect a 8.77 percent increase over 2006 payments to date of \$217,602.75.

The City of Haskell had a 1.03 ercent decrease for July 2007 of \$27,081.87 in comparison to \$27,366.19 for July 2006. 2007 payments to date of \$206,587.62 reflect a 3.22 percent increase over 2006 payments to date of \$200,140.69.

The City of O'Brien had a

72.91 percent increase for July 2007 of \$34.34 in comparison to \$19.86 for July 2006. 2007 payments to date of \$774.74 reflect a 57.31 percent increase over 2006 payments to date of \$492.48.





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### Weather Whys

Q:What's the most amount of rainfall in the United States in one

A: Those who remember Tropical Storm Claudette that hit the Texas coast in 1979 will likely know the answer to this question, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University.

"Tropical Storm Claudette produced the greatest amount of rain in a 24-hour period in U.S. history," he says.

"From July 25-26, an amazing 43 inches of rain fell at Alvin and other parts around Houston. The winds were not that bad, clocking in at just over 50 mile per hour, but its heavy flooding produced losses at more than \$1 billion in today's dollars. Claudette was one of three bad storms during the 1979 hurricane season."

Q: What about other rainy

A: Usually the island of Kauai in Hawaii boasts some of the wettest places on Earth, McRoberts

says.
"Last month, the rains in Kauai set some all-time records," he adds. "In the month of March, a staggering 92 inches of rain-that's 7.5 feet-were recorded at Mount Waialeale, which usually has the most rainfall on the planet. That broke the previous monthly record of 90 inches set in April, 1971, according to the National Weather Service."

### Heat related illness

The human body typically functions best within a temperature range of 97.7-99.5° F. The body is equipped with mechanisms which help keep the temperature within this 'normal' range. For example, when the environment is cold, shivering generates heat to keep temperature from dropping. On the other hand, when it is hot, perspiration helps to cool the body so that the body temperature does not rise to dangerous levels.

In extreme conditions or with certain physical problems, the body may be unable to maintain its normal body temperature. When this happens, body temperature can rise or fall to the point that serious medical problems occur.

### Risk factors

•Age: The elderly are at high risk because their temperature regulation mechanisms are not as effective.

•Disease processes: People with heart or lung problems are at higher risk because of increased oxygen needs.

 Medications: Some medications interfere with the process of perspiration and other mechanisms that the body uses to cool

•Environment: Heat combined with high humidity is dangerous because perspiration does not evaporate well and cooling is not as efficient.


