

Judge grants anti-toll road

group new hearing AUSTIN-The "Keep Texas Moving" advertising campaign funded by the Texas Department of Transportation continues to be challenged by Texans Uniting for Reform and Freedom (TURF).

Travis County State District Judge Orlinda Naranjo on Oct. 18 granted TURF's request for continuance and a new hearing in 90 days.

For months, the group has sought to stop TxDOT from spending state funds to promote the TransTexas Corridor, a multibillion dollar, multidecade privately funded tollroad plan.

"TxDOT is waging a onesided political ad campaign designed to sway public opinion in favor of the policy that puts money in TxDOT's own coffers." said TURF founder and executive director Terri Hall

A Texas law prohibits state agencies from using public funding for political advocacy, Hall said.

But Kristina Silcocks, a transportation attorney with the Office of the Attorney General who is representing TxDOT, said the "Keep Texas Moving" campaign is permitted under another state law that allows marketing of toll projects.

Extra check may come for some

The Teacher Retirement System board of trustees will meet Nov. 9 to decide whether to give eligible annuitants an extra check in January.

The independent actuary for the TRS said a supplemental 13th check can be paid to those who are eligible without hiking the active member contribution rate.

The check amount would be equal to a normal monthly pension payment, up to a maximum of \$2,400.

The supplement was made possible by SB 1846 sponsored by Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, and Rep. Vicki Truitt, R-Keller, in the 80th Texas Legislature.

using soap and water, or hand sanitizer, is essential in facilities where people work, live and play close together."

identity thieves are actually thousands of miles away, often in other countries and out of reach of U.S. law enforcement. Under this scheme, criminals simply go through the phone book hoping that sooner or later someone will provide the sensitive information they need to steal an identity.

October sales tax receipts reported

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reports the state took in \$1.62 billion dollars in sales tax in September, a 7 percent increase over September 2006.

Combs sent \$443.7 million in monthly sales tax payments to Texas cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, up 6.8 percent compared to last October. So far in 2007, local sales tax allocations are 6.9 percent higher than last year.

"Growth in September sales tax collections slowed slightly, but continue to increase at a rate," Combs healthy said. "Receipts from the mining, manufacturing and retail sectors continue to demonstrate the current strength of the Texas economy."

Combs sent sales tax allocations of \$300.8 million to Texas cities, 6.4 percent more than October 2006. Calendar year-to-date, city sales tax allocations are up 7 percent. Texas counties received October sales tax payments of \$27.8 million, up 9.6 percent compared to a year ago. Calendar year-todate, county sales tax allocations are 8.4 percent higher than last year.

The 122 special purpose taxing districts throughout Texas received \$14.7 million in sales tax, up 20.2 percent compared to last October. So far this year, sales tax allocations to special purpose districts are up 17.9 percent compared to 2006.

Ten local transit systems received \$100.2 million in October sales tax allocations, up 5.4 percent compared to a year ago. Year-to-date, transit sales tax revenues are up 4.9 percent.

September state sales tax collections and October allocations of local tax revenue represent sales that occurred in August and were reported to the Comptroller in September.

The Comptroller's next local sales tax allocation will be made Fri., Nov. 9.

This ploy is particularly effective because it causes victims to react immediately out of fear, rather than taking the time to reflect about the information being requested. While citizens could face legal consequences for failing to respond to a valid jury summons, legitimate court officers would never leave threatening messages on someone's voicemail to demand personal information and immediate payment of a fine.

Consumers who receive such a call can verify whether they must appear for jury duty by calling their local courthouse or district court. Consumers should never hand over personal information in response to an unsolicited telephone call or email. no matter how legitimate it might appear.







Grant to provide funds for area Vets cemetery

According to D.E. Livengood, Veterans County Service Officer for Haskell County, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) announced Sept. 6, the award of an \$8 million grant to establish a state veterans' cemetery in Abilene.

"This new cemetery will provide a final resting place that pays tribute to veterans' service", said the Secretary of Veterans Affairs Jim Nicholsom.

Nearly 30,000 veterans and their families live within the service area of the future Texas State Veterans Cemetery.

Construction is scheduled to being this fall. The grant will fund construction of 2,300 full-casket burial sites, 600 in-ground burial cremation sites, 624 columbarium niches, a memorial walkway, administration and maintenance buildings, a committal service shelter, a storage building, utilities, landscaping and irrigation. Interments are expected to begin in spring 2009.

On September 20, 2007, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos" or "the Company"), filed a Statement of Intent with each city within Atmos' service territory to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders applicable to all customers within all incorporated cities served by the Mid-Tex Division. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is October 25, 2007. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,428,700 residential, 122,600 commercial, and 960 industrial & transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues for the incorporated areas of its Mid-Tex Division by \$\$50,946,000 or 3.5%, including gas costs, or 13.49% excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. In addition, the Company seeks to recover all of its rate case expenses and all city rate case expenses as allowed by law. The exact amount will not be known until the case is completed.

Based on the proposed rate design, the system-wide average monthly bill for each customer class within the incorporated areas of the Mid-Tex Division will increase by the amount and percent shown in the table below:

In addition to the rate revisions in Rate Schedules R, C, I, and T, other proposed tariff changes include changes to Rider GCR, Rider WNA and proposed Riders for a rate review mechanism and conservation & energy efficiency program. The Company proposes to revise its weather normalization adjustment ("WNA") mechanism to exclude non-weather sensitive commercial customers and to modify the WNA mechanism to calculate the WNA adjustment based on weather stations at a regional level rather than under the current practice of associating all towns with a single weather location for purposes of determining the WNA adjustment. The Company proposes a change to its Rider GCR to allow the recovery of the gas cost component of uncollectible expense through the Rider GCR instead of through base rates and to update the Upstream Allocation (Factor D) to reflect the factors as proposed in the Company's Class Cost of Service Study. In addition, the Company proposes a new Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM"), Rate Schedule RRM, to provide for an annual review by the cities of the Company's expenses, revenues and rate base investment and a corresponding adjustment to the Company's rates to reflect annual changes (increases or decreases) in these categories. The Company proposes a gas conservation & energy efficiency program and tariff to authorize the program. Finally, the Company is asking for authority to make future filings with the regulatory authority on an electronic basis, rather than by paper copy.

His 18 month old sister, Rose Ann, was unable to pronounce brother so she called him Bubber, hence Bub, and he was familiarly know by that name.

Kreitz worked on the farm in Rhineland as a young boy and it was said that he could pick a bale of cotton a day (500 lbs.). He enjoyed running around with Philip "Sonny" Bruggeman Jr., his cousin, meeting him on Sunday's to pitch washers for entertainment. He also enjoyed fishing and tinkering with cars.

After employment at an air craft factory in San Diego, California, he entered the Army on March 28, 1944, and did his basic training at Camp Hood, Texas. Kreitz was deployed overseas Sept. 13, 1944, onboard the USS Martina and later landed in France on Omaha Beach. He was later assigned to the 26th Infantry "Yankee" Division. 328th Infantry Regiment, Company "K.' It is said his unit had advanced to a point near Wuisse, France, Nov. 16, 1944, and were resting for the night when he and five other soldiers were selected to return to the rear for supplies. A German sniper machine gunned their truck. No one survived. Germany surrendered 5 1/2 months later. Killed in action, at age 22, he was buried in France until 1947, when his body was returned for burial in Rhineland. In the 70's his body was exhumed and reburied in Bastrop, alongside his parents, and sister, Rose Ann Welch.



Forgotten funds reported

Comptroller Susan Combs wants to give away money-to its rightful owners. Texas newspapers on Sun., Oct. 21, published the annual Comptroller's Unclaimed Property List, containing names of 152,000 people who have at least \$250 waiting to be claimed.

"If you find your name on the Unclaimed Property List, we are holding a significant amount of your money, and we want to give it back," Combs said

Even if your name is not on the list, you might still have money waiting to be claimed.

"You can easily find out how much, where it came from, and how to get it back by checking our unclaimed property Web site," Combs said. "You can even print out a claim form and send it in immediately, so you will get your money back as quickly as possible."

The list in Sunday's newspaper contained only names that were reported to the state within the last year. The Comptroller's online, searchable database also includes unclaimed property owners from previous

years who still have not claimed their missing money.

"This money doesn't belong in Austin," Combs said. "It belongs to families and businesses in Dallas, Del Rio, Childress, Corpus Christi and every town in between. We're making it simpler and faster for unclaimed property owners to get back what is rightfully theirs."

To reunite owners with their unclaimed assets more quickly, Combs has streamlined claim procedures, making more claims eligible for automated processing. "Claims by original property

owners for up to \$5,000 can now be electronically processed within 24 hours," Combs said. "The computer compares information on claim forms with information in our database. If everything matches, the computer authorizes payment. Automating more claims frees our staff to work on more complex claims." Unclaimed property might

include a dormant bank account, a forgotten utility deposit, an old uncashed check, unclaimed investment income, securities,

family heirlooms from an abandoned safe deposit box or other valuable assets the original owners have forgotten.
