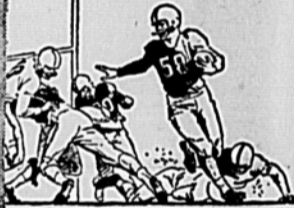

**SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS**



Now is the time to plant winter legumes for best results.

Many cooperators with the Central Colorado, Lower and Middle Clear Fork Soil Conservation Districts have made definite plans to plant a legume on a part of their land this fall. A cover crop on the land will afford soil improvement and protection against wind and water erosion. Cover crops enable the soil to take in and hold more moisture, increase production of succeeding crops, furnish grazing for livestock and can be used as a cash crop by harvesting seed.

Adapted winter legumes are hairy vetch and Austrian Winter Peas or Dixie Wonder Peas. Hairy vetch drilled with small grain has given good results and has prevented the soil from blowing on our sandy land. Austrian Winter Peas or Dixie Wonder Peas have been used successfully on heavier land. Winter peas should be planted in regular width rows or double rowed.

All legumes should be inoculated before planting. This is a special culture of bacteria which enables the plant to take nitrogen from the air and fix it in the soil.

Early seeding allows enough growth to be made to give good protection to the soil. These early plants are large enough to withstand the cold weather much better and in turn are

more vigorous so as to begin their main growth earlier in the spring.

Land that is now seeded in peanuts, cotton or late planted grain sorghums probably cannot be seeded early but successful plantings have been made through December 15 in this section. If a legume cannot be used, any of the small grains make cover to protect the land.

Most soils throughout this section that have been tested have been found low in phosphorus and frequently low in nitrogen. For this reason fertilizer should be used at the time of planting. Many farmers are getting good results by using 100 pounds of 13-39-0 fertilizer or its equivalent per acre.

Cost-sharing for the seeding of winter cover crops is offered through the Callahan County ASC in Baird. If further information is needed, contact personnel of your local Soil Conservation Service or the ASC office who are assisting with this program.

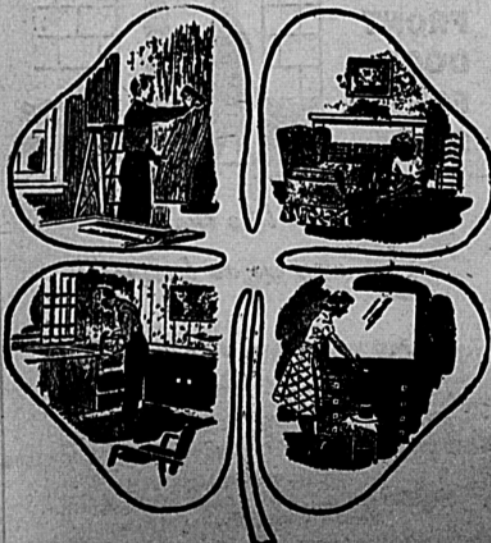

ents too) are just mighty proud of having a fine teacher like Mrs. Ivey on their staff.

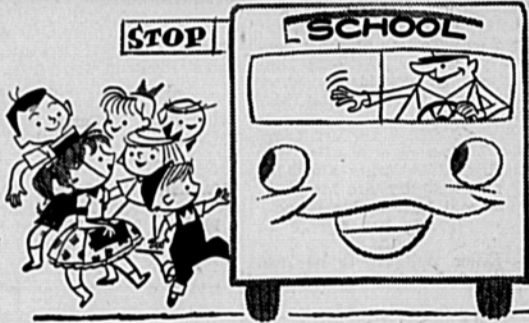
