County milk production increasing

Milk production in the Muleshoe are continues to increase, according to Janet Claborn, director of economic development.

At Friday's grand opening of the South Plains College center in Muleshoe, Claborn spoke of dairies in the Muleshoe area, noting that Bailey County currently ranks seventh in the state for milk production.

However, Claborn noted that if all of the dairies in Muleshoe's trade area. which includes portions of Parmer and Lamb Counties, were included the numbers would be increased to a more realistic fourth place.

"This is going to be great for us," Claborn said, noting this will bring dairy suppliers and related industry to the area as well.

Recent milk production totals for Bailey County are about 22,268,708 pounds, while the trade area production reaches almost 33,469,000 pounds.





The Texas Legislature...

In some of the quickest legal action we've seen of late, the Texas Legislature has sent a bill to Gov. Perry that will prohibit municipalities and other government entities from using eminent domain as an economic development tool.

If you don't remember, back in June, a 5-4 ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court allowed a government entity to seize property owned by one individual and give it to another private citizen or business if the government entity felt the action would generate greater tax revenue.

Needless to say, this absurd ruling struck at the very basis of property rights here in the Lone Star State and across the nation.

While we have yet to read the bill in question, we are initial classes being taught date. greatly pleased the legislature was able to take such swift action. Too bad our kids and the school districts haven't fared as well.

We're still new to Texas government, but we've dealt with other state governments and school funding issues for a number of years. Superintendent Gene Sheets' remarks about the disproportional spending among school districts in this year's stalled school funding legislation should have raised the hackles on the necks of all educators and parents.

Unfortunately, while the legislators weren't able to agree on funding issues, they reportedly didn't have as much trouble agreeing on several unfunded mandates that have been passed along to the school districts.

What this means is that even if the school districts won't have a funding decrease - since last year's funding formulas will remain in place - the school districts will still have fewer dollars available.

According to Sheets, it's all over except for the finger pointing. While speaking to him on Thursday, Sheets said may legislators are blaming Texas superintendents for the funding bill's failure to pass; however, from what we can tell... instead of placing blame, it appears to be a case of giving credit where credit is due.

But during Thursday's meeting it seemed as the majority in attendance — on both sides of the board table —gave a collective sigh and took a step back from the edge, and for that we're truly thankful.

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
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
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

A Lesson from History and Party Politics

It was the summer of 1945. the war had begun, thanked Prime Minister Winston S. Churchill by voting him out of office. I've wondered why. It

seems so ungrateful and wrong. The British people loved Churchill. They knew that though many millions, to use Churchill's phrase, had given "blood, sweat, and tears" to win World War II, if one man

had to be named who was singly most responsible for winning the war and saving England and the world from Nazi tyranny, that man was Winston without doubt Churchill. But, still, in the June election of 1945, they

turned him out of office. Why? Though I still think it was ungrateful and shabby behavior, I think I know why. They knew that Churchill was exactly the right man to lead England in wartime when "business as usual" Labour and Conservative party politics were suspended and a National Government was formed to save the nation. But he was not a man to be content, or very effective, when the crisis was over and party politics once again would hold sway. He was first and foremost for England and never less suited for a return to party politics than when England had just been

saved.

Just as Churchill had been one Nazi Germany had just been of the few who before the war defeated, and the British peo- recognized the danger posed by ple, in their first election since Hitler and Nazi Germany, just after Hitler was dead and the Nazis were defeated, he was one of the few to see clearly the emerging danger posed by Stalin's Soviet Union and Communism's Iron Curtain. As post-war Europe was being divided between victors who fought because they loved freedom and those who fought only to enlarge their boundaries and the numbers of their slaves, Churchill, was reduced to electioneering. It was a trial to him. As he writes, "The incongruity of party excitement and clatter with the sombre background which filled my mind was in itself an affront to reality and proportion. I was glad indeed when polling day at last arrived."

It is a high tribute to Churchill that he is not remembered as the leader of a political party; he is remembered as the great leader of a great nation who blessed the world.

Christians can learn something from this. It is probably unrealistic to think that in this fallen world the denominational lines that divide Christians will ever be completely undrawn. But it is just as true, I think, that those who are great in God's Kingdom are those who know and act on the knowledge that their first allegiance is to Christ, the fully human, fully divine, Son of God and Lord. Anything less is "an affront to reality and proportion."

As long as your first allegiance is where it belongs, which "party" you belong to matters proportionally about as much as upon which side you choose to part your hair.



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

Boll weevil assessment notices to arrive

Boll weevil eradication assessment notices were recently mailed to cotton producers in the High Plains eradication zones, and also to cotton producers in eradication zones in the Rolling Plains.

The assessments are based on information cotton producers provide the Farm Service Agency when they certify their crops.

If growers find an error in the information on their billing, they will need to correct the information at their local FSA office and forward the corrected Jesko honored information Foundation.

Payment is due Sept. 30, available to growers who pay the full assessment by Sept.

are eligible to receive a credit on those acres completely destroyed prior to the final certification date.

Qualifying acres must remain free of all hostable cotton until a killing freeze to receive the credit. To aid area growers who have been affected by adverse weather conditions, the TBWEF is offering payment extension agreements for producers whose accounts are current.

"For those having difficulty paying their assessment, help is available by contacting the assessments department and arranging an extension agreement," said Tina Ballard, chief financial officer.

Producers entering into an extension agreement must make a 10 percent down payment, and they will be charged a late fee of one percent per month until their accounts are paid.

This late fee begins on the date the signed agreement and down payment are received by Assessments Department.

Producers who are delinquent in payment and who do not have an extension agreement are subject to a late fee of 1.5 percent per month.




