Inspectors told to focus on metal bridge component AUSTIN-Last summer, the Interstate 35 West Mississippi River bridge collapse in Minneapolis woke people up.

Inspection crews fanned out across each state and assessed the condition of bridges under their care.

The Texas Department of Transportation ran bridge safety inspections and declared Texas bridges safe.

Now, U.S. Secretary of Transportation Mary E. Peters has told Texas and the other states to address how changes in bridge weight, capacity and bridge conditions might affect "gusset plates." Gusset plates and girders hold up certain bridges. They work like a hub and spokes. Peters' directive suggests inspectors should take a closer look at gusset plates when calculating load capacity on the nation's 13,000 steel truss bridges. Texas has more than 300 of them.

According to TxDOT, there are only six bridges in Texas like the one that collapsed in Minnesota and all of them have either been inspected within the last year or are scheduled for replacement.

This year's categories for nominees are leadership, historic preservation, health, physical fitness, education and performing arts.

An independent panel of judges will review the nominations and the governor will induct the women the panel recommends into the 2008 Hall of Fame at an awards ceremony in the fall.

Nominees must be native or current Texas residents, their noted achievement must have significant ties to Texas, and they must have been involved in the noted achievement during the past 12 months.

AG withdraws benefits opinions

Attorney General Greg Abbott withdrew two letter opinions released in 2006, disqualifying certain veterans from receiving college tuition exemptions available under the Hazlewood

The San Antonio-based Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund filed a federal lawsuit on behalf of six Gulf War veterans who are now U.S. citizens.

The veterans were denied the Hazlewood exemption because they were legal residents but not U.S. citizens at the time they entered the military.

After Abbott vacated the opinions, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopted temporary rules to provide that qualified veterans are eligible for the Hazlewood exemption whether they were U.S. citizens or legal resident immigrants at the time they entered the military.

Student testing is rescheduled

Education Commissioner Robert Scott moved back the state testing calendar so Texas school students will not take the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills exams on the March 4 statewide primary election day.

"By moving testing dates, we can preserve schools as polling places and maintain a calm, quiet, secure testing environment for our students," Scott said.

Tests scheduled for March 4-6 will be given one day later than originally scheduled.

About 2.6 million students will be affected.



Cotton Market Weekly

Cotton futures on the New York Board of Trade vaulted to their highest finish in four years on Tuesday due to a steady barrage of investment fund buying amid fears that cotton plantings in the United States will be sharply down this season.

The number of acres planted to cotton in the U.S. have dropped sharply in the past three seasons. The culprit has been a rush into the biofuel sector and the resulting increase in demand for grains, like corn, to be diverted into the production of ethanol.

Cotton industry observers have said Texas, which planted 4.93 million acres to cotton in 2007 and probably will plant the same amount this year, will account for more than half of the total acres planted to cotton in the United States.

"With Texas carrying so much weight if we had a bad vear here the situation could tighten numbers down considerably," a Texas-based analyst said. "Bad weather in the Lone Star state could easily chop two million bales off the U.S. cotton crop.'

Analysts have said recently that December cotton prices would need to rise to 85 cents per pound and stay above that level in order to convince American farmers considering a switch to grains or soybeans to plant cotton once again. U.S. plantings were forecast in a recent survey of analysts to fall between 9.3 million and 9.4 million acres in 2008, down sharply from the 10.8 million planted in 2007. The market continued to close on the high side Thursday as investors piled into the market due to widespread belief that fiber contracts are undervalued.

"It's pure fund buying," a cotton market watcher explained. "Funds feel fiber prices are undervalued, and they also point to the fact that U.S. cotton acreage in 2008 probably will switch to other crops like soybeans and wheat which have multi-year rallied to highs. Thursday's export sales report added some additional support," he said.

Net export sales of U.S. cotton for the week ended Jan. 10 totaled 505,400 bales. The figure was higher than the previous week and more than five-times the four-week average. The primary buyer was Mexico, with lesser amounts to China, Turkey, Pakistan and Indonesia.

Export shipments of 165,600 bales were up two percent from the previous week and nine cent from the four-week average. Major destinations included Turkey, Indonesia, China and Mexico.

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

Matthew Bowers of Haskell was listed on the Honor Roll for the Fall 2007 semester at Howard Payne University in Brownwood






