What does this picture mean to the Uuited States? Actually, there is a boom today in certain in stocks of 1929. Employment is high. Savings are above normal. Wages may rise another \$15 billion, from \$165 billion this year to about \$180 billion next. After increased taxes, this could mean about an \$8 billion increase in people's earning, and should further increase savings. The cost-of-living, however, has reached present highs because most people are doing as little work as possible for their current nigh wages.

We are experiencing a "wageworkers' prosperity;" but some day this wage bubble will burst as have the stock market bubbles of the past. Americans should realize this and begin to save for the rainy day. The wage earner ought to plan to buy a little life insurance, then purchase a home, and build up savings accounts. There never was a better time for the graduate of any school or college to get started on a job. Business and government desperately need men who can think, who have learned how to get along with people, and who have such character traits as faith, integrity, self-reliance, initiative, drive, and good health. But young people must do much better work than they are now doing in order to hold their jobs when business again declines. However, as I said above, I am feeling more optimistic now because there is a chance that the political pendulum may be swinging toward common sense, away from nonsense!

"Twenty-five percent of the nighway fatalities in which a violation figured," Morris said, 'can be traced directly to excess ive speed. Driving on the wrong side of the road and driving under the influence of alcohol were the next two biggest contributing factors in fatal accidents, and the frustrating part of all this, especially to those entrusted with the job of safety education and enforcement, is that every one of these deaths were unnecessary; they would not have happened if one of the drivers involved in each case hadn't judged himself either too smart, too skillfull, or too lucky to be involved in an accident."

The Texas Safety Association also warned motorists to drive defensively. Always expect the unexpected and do not assume that, because you are driving courteously, everyone else is 'Per mile of highway, we have more discourteous drivers than telephone poles," Morris said. The chief difference is that the poles won't swerve into the wrong lane."





State Geologists and U. S. Geologists, they being the recognized authorities to establish such boundaries. They determine these boundaries by the study of formations and from other evidence presented to them at a public hearing, as required by our water

I, as director of the Hi-Plains Underground Water Conservation District, wish to go on record that I do not agree with the decision of any judge who would render a verdict that the State Water Board, State and U. S. Geologists did not have sufficient evidence in designating Martin County's water District.

My opinion is not infallible, nor do I present it as infallible, but I hope that I am not in error in believing in the paramount rights of the individual; of his right to own property and to enjoy the fruits thereof. My thinking makes me wonder if many of our men who are in leading positions have not lost the vision of true Americans.

I know that the five directors of the Hi-Plains Water District believe in the democratic principles upon which these United States were built. They believe in the sovereign rights of the property owner; of his priority to enjoy the ownership therof-such as water, oil and other minerals. They be lieve in our water law and believe that in time with lots of patience it will envolve into an efficient and democratic con-

trol of our water problems. This law has very little precedent. There is no pattern to follow so the directors must go slow law up. They must find solutions as problems arise and they hope that all who are in this district will assist by presenting to the

Your cooperation is earnestly asked in solving all problems. Take the matter of spacing wells, if they are placed too near another well it certainly costs both parties. 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


