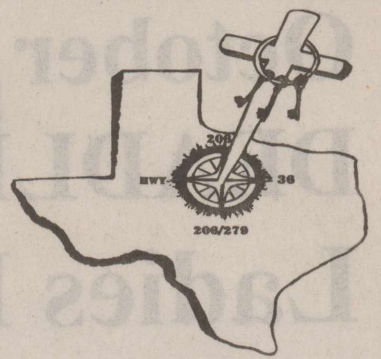

"Lapsit for Babies" Program Registration October 21st

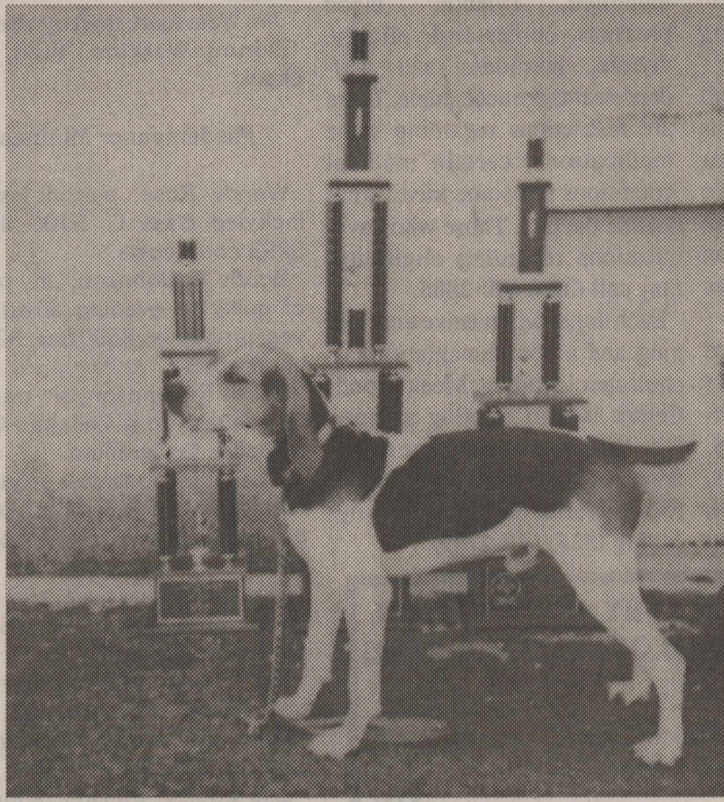
Beginning Tuesday, October 21, from 10:00 a.m. till 11:00 a.m. will be the first meeting to start the new program for babies ages birth to 3 years.

World Champion Coonhound Hails from Cottonwood

Slamming Sam I Am has made his mark on the coon hunting competitions of Texas and the World. Owners, Ray Dodd and Dan McClain, are proud of their coonhound.

Dodd, who resides in Cottonwood, reported that Sam learned to hunt following a \$50 Blue Tick male that his wife, Ava, presented him as a gift. Emmitt must have been a great teacher according to Sam's recent accomplishments.

McClain has been instrumental in Sam's success, as he has taken him to many of the competitions. Sam won 3rd Place in the American Heritage Hunt in Paris, Texas and this qualified him for the UKC Quarter Finals. He was named the Male Texas State Champion of UKC Coonhounds at Fairfield, Texas.

In the Quarter Finals at Conway, Arkansas he was one of 20 dogs picked from the five state area that included Texas.

This qualified him for the UKC World Hunt.

Slamming Sam I Am qualified for the UKC World Hunt; PKC World Hunt in Aurora, Kentucky set for October 20-25; and AKC World Hunt in North Carolina scheduled for November 9. Dodd remarked, "Sam is the only dog I know that has qualified for all three World Hunts."

Dodd noted that Slamming Sam I Am was a gift from Warnie Kanady of Nimrod Community. Warnie raises coonhounds and Sam was one of three surviving pups out of a litter of 16. Kanady is proud of Sam's accomplishments, too.

"If he hadn't been sponsored by local businesses, and local people allowing Sam to hunt on their property, he wouldn't have had the opportunity to be a World Champion," Dodd remarked. He is very appreciative of the support he and his dog have received. Watch for updates on how Sam competes in the upcoming hunts.

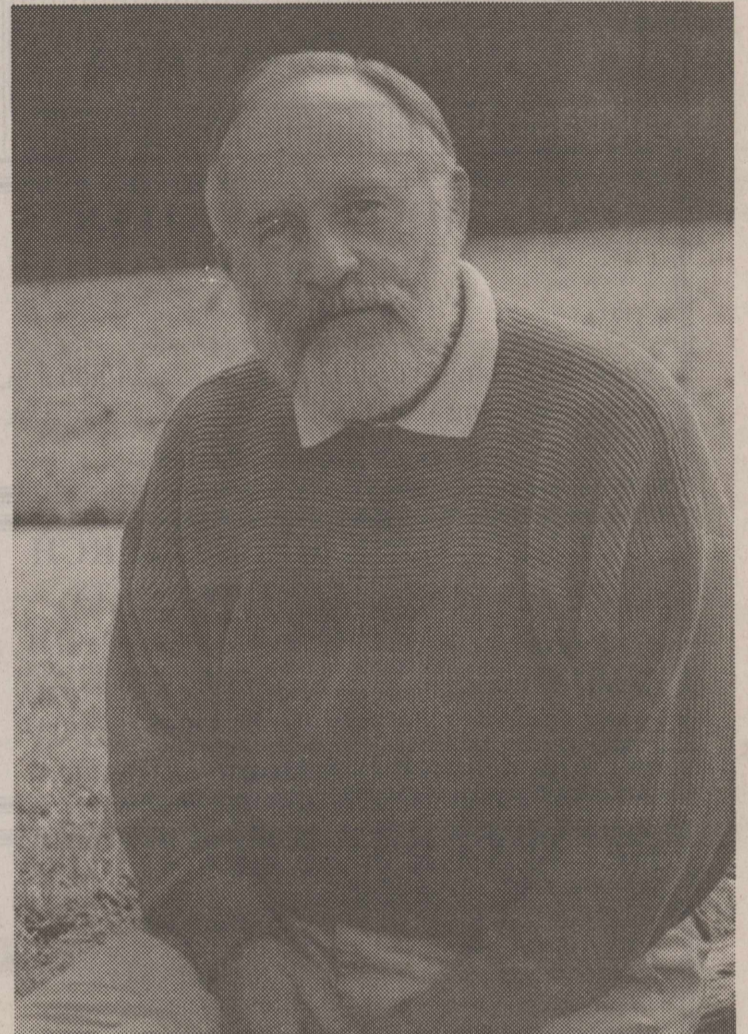

"Meet the Author" Tuesday, October 14

The Friends of the Cross Plains Library are thrilled to announce they will feature Carlton Stowers at their upcoming Meet the Author evening. On Tuesday, October 14, at 7:00 p.m. at the Cross Plains Community Center, Mr. Stowers will discuss the writing of his latest book *Scream at the Sky: Five Texas Murders and One Man's Crusade for Justice*. This is the story of the brutal rape and murder of five young women in Wichita Falls in 1984 and '85. The cases remained unsolved for over 15 years until district attorney's investigator John Little came across a crucial clue in an old report. This breakthrough put him on the trail of one Faryion Wardrip, who confessed to one of the murders, was convicted, and served 11 years of a 35-year sentence. Upon being paroled, he married and became active in a local church. A review by *Publishers Weekly* comments, "The book becomes increasingly suspenseful as Little quietly builds his case against the sanctimonious Wardrip, whose composure crumbles when he's finally confronted on his old misdeeds. Stowers demonstrates sensitivity toward the many survivors of Wardrip's crimes, yet at heart this is a gory, effective meditation on the evil sometimes committed by 'ordinary' men and the great efforts necessary for justice."

Mr. Stowers is a *New York Times* best-selling master of true crime, and his *To the Last Breath and Careless Whispers* were both awarded the Mystery Writers of America's Edgar Allan Poe Award as the Best Fact Crime Book of the Year. His *Innocence Lost* was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize. *Careless Whispers* inspired the CBS Movie of the Week,

Sworn to Vengeance, and *Open Secrets* was the basis for the ABC mini-series *Telling Secrets*. A former *Dallas Morning News* reporter, Mr. Stowers is now a staff writer for the *Dallas Observer*. His *Partners in Blue*, a 100-year history of the Dallas Police Department received a citation from the Dallas Police Association. His work has appeared in publications such as *Sports Illustrated*, *Time*, *People* and *Good Housekeeping*, and his books have been selections of the Literary Guild, Mystery Guild, Doubleday Book Club, Guideposts Book Club and others.

Though he now resides in Cedar Hill, Texas, Mr. Stowers has ties to this area, having attended high school in Abilene and worked for the *Abilene Reporter-News* for a few years.

After Mr. Stowers' presentation, light refreshments will be served. Mr. Stowers' book will be available for purchase, and he'll be happy to autograph them and visit with you. Cross Plains I.S.D. Earns State's Highest Fiscal Accountability Rating Recently

Cross Plains I.S.D. officials announced that the district received a rating of "Superior Achievement" under Texas' new Schools FIRST financial accountability rating system. The Superior Achievement rating is the state's highest, demonstrating the quality of the Cross Plains I.S.D.'s financial management and reporting system.

This is the first year of Schools FIRST (Financial Accountability Rating Systems of Texas), a financial accountability system for Texas school districts developed by the Texas Education Agency in response to Senate Bill 875 of the 75th Texas Legislature in 1999. The primary goal of Schools FIRST is to achieve quality performance in the management of school districts' financial resources, a goal made more significant due to the complexity of accounting associated with Texas' school finance system.

"We are pleased with Cross Plains I.S.D.'s School FIRST rating," said Cross Plains I.S.D.

Superintendent Jackie Tennon, "as it shows that our district is making the most of our taxpayer's dollars. This rating shows that Cross Plains' schools are accountable not only for student learning, but also for achieving these results cost-effectively and efficiently."

The Schools FIRST accountability ratings to Texas school districts, with the highest being "Superior Achievement", followed by "Above-Standard Achievement" and "Substandard Achievement". Districts with serious data quality problems may receive the additional rating of "Suspended-Data Quality". Districts that receive the "Substandard Achievement" or "Suspended-Data Quality" ratings under Schools FIRST must file a corrective action plan with the Texas Education Agency. The only indicator that Cross Plains I.S.D. did not meet to assess its financial management system was percent of total tax collections meeting or exceeding 96 percent collection.

BLOOD DRIVE Scheduled in Cross Plains for Tuesday, October 21st

The First Baptist Church in Cross Plains will sponsor a Blood Drive on Tuesday, October 21. The Meek Blood Center Bloodmobile will be parked next to the Family Life Center from 1:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m. The building will be open and tables and chairs will be set up where donors can have refreshments following their donation.

The blood that is donated will be credited to either Cross Plains Blood Fund or the Rising Star Blood Fund, which can be designated by the donor. Those who gave blood at the drive on August 4 are eligible to give blood again.

Those who are in need of blood or blood products include cancer patients, surgical patients, premature babies, new mothers following childbirth, burn patients, persons with bleeding disorders, individuals with chronic anemia,

and accident or trauma victims.

Donors must be at least 17 years old, weight at least 110 pounds, in good health and free of infection or illness. There is no upper age limit. All donors must have a picture I.D. Aspirin and most medications, including ibuprofen, Tylenol, blood pressure, cholesterol, allergy, thyroid, hormones and antidepressants are acceptable. There are restrictions regarding some medications, certain medical conditions and some travel areas outside the U.S. Those who have questions regarding eligibility may call (325) 670-2805.

Each donor will receive a coffee mug and a complimentary total cholesterol reading. Meek Blood Center is also offering a West Nile Virus test at no charge to the donor. Results may be obtained two days after the blood drive by calling (325) 670-2799.

Theological Seminary.

He served as pastor of churches in Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas. Subsequently he became President of Criswell Center for Biblical Studies, which grew from an unaccredited Bible Institute with a dozen students to almost 500 students with an accredited college offering baccalaureate and graduate degree programs.

In 1992, Dr. Patterson was inaugurated as President of Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary and under his leadership enrollment grew from 600 students to over 2,000. In addition, Dr. Patterson has rendered service to Southern Baptists on associational, state and national levels, including his most recent assignment as president of the sixteen million member Southern Baptist Convention (1998-2000).

Gary Ward is pastor at Rocky Point Baptist Church and the church is located on FM 205, 3 1/2 miles east of Stephenville.

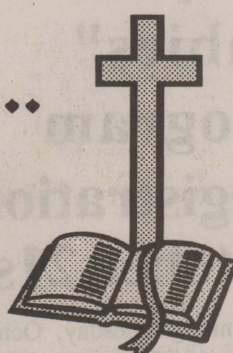

It was on I-20, westbound near the exit for Lipan and Santo that I saw it—about mile marker 381. You couldn't miss it if you were looking off to the right at all. You might object to it being attached to the tree the way it was—probably nailed to it. The red sign was only about one foot wide and perhaps two feet high. But there it was, in bold black letters: "HELL IS HOT!"

People don't really like to hear that—don't like to hear anything about "hell." We like to hear that "God is love," which He is—but we don't want to hear about the wrathful side of God. But read Romans 1:18-32 if you haven't lately! And if you think that His wrath only pertains to atheists and practicing homosexuals and lesbians, then re-read verses 29-32 and read Revelation 21:8.

I am very glad that "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son," John 3:16a, but Romans 11:22a admonishes us to "consider the goodness and severity of God" (emphasis mine, bp). So remember, heaven is sweet—but as the sign read, "HELL IS HOT!"

QUIPS, CLIPS & COMMENTS

Note: Be sure to keep the ground or soil moist all winter everywhere you have bulbs planted. It helps nourish them through the winter, and watering them just before a freeze will help keep them from freezing so badly.

"Home Decor and Christmases Past"

In this the second segment of our Planning, Planting and Pleasing series on preparing for the holiday; it is our opinion that the best way is to keep it simple. Yes, simple but elegant, is the best way to go with the decorations. One large beautiful object on a table will show up better than six little objects clustered together.

Halloween pretty much speaks for itself. Large bowls of candy and other treats such as bubble gum, small soft plastic toys, fruit, cookies, etc. Two or more carved pumpkins for lighted candles provide glorious centerpieces, and for the front walk several laminarias. While living in New Mexico, we learned to create delightful but simple items for decorating outdoors. To make a luminary, take a plain brown paper bag, fill the bottom with sand, place a candle inside the sack, and anchor the candle into the sand by pressing it down very firmly. Place these up and down your walks, then light the candles after dark. They are an inexpensive but intriguing method of decorating for Halloween, as well as Christmas.

For a Thanksgiving centerpiece for the dinner table or for a coffee or sofa table, take a large coffee can and fill with potting soil, and pour it into the can to about 6 inches from the top. Open a package of black licorice sticks and using your hot glue gun, glue each licorice stick perpendicular around the outside of the coffee

can until it is fully covered.

After it has completely dried, you can plant a live plant inside or plant a small portion of a tree branch with small twigs jutting from it. Then on each small twig stick a candy orange slice. This is a cute as can be. Or you can plant a small living plant and then position artificial blooms amid the live greenery. These are all simple and inexpensive to create. Sometimes you may wish to assemble dried oats on long stems as a decoration to push into the soil around the living greenery; much as you do with the flowers you position around in the plant. Very avant garde for fall and Thanksgiving as well. It showcases the earth's bounty...(oats)

Thanksgiving will pretty much take care of itself. Start with an arrangement of fruit and a horn of plenty. A bouquet of stems of wheat, oats, etc. plus some dried grasses can make a lovely dried arrangement. You may also wish to gather dried wildflowers and save them all year for this bouquet.

Some you might wish to check out for dying are mullen, primroses, thistles (watch your fingers), sunflowers, different grains such as oats, barley, wheat, corn standing cypress for that lovely red color and many others.

Christmas is a very busy time for almost everyone and it comes around year after year. A good suggestion for Christmas decor this year, I think would be a diversification. Been going for red and green? Then this year you might want to go with a blue and silver or blue and white Christmas and other lovely combinations of colors would be burgundy and silver or burgundy and pink or gold.

GARDEN TIP OF THE MONTH

"The Attention Young Trees Need in the Fall"

For some years now retail nurseries promoted that fall is the time for planting trees and shrubs, especially those grown in containers. It is also a great to correct mistakes that were made at planting time, whether it was earlier in the year or several years ago.

Follow up care is needed for trees that were staked, tied up, wrapped, blinded and mulched. Taking care of this in the fall, you can rescue these plants from further problems.

Assuming that it needed staking from the wind or people, a year should be plenty of time for a good root system to grow that will keep their position in the wind. When you unwrap and unbind these plants, it will enable them to develop trunk girth faster.

If there is more than four inches of mulch, pull some away. Two inches is plenty.

Fertilizer stakes in late summer or early fall will help prepare them for the winter.

If the tree is at least two years old, three for pecans, trim up to the first main fork.

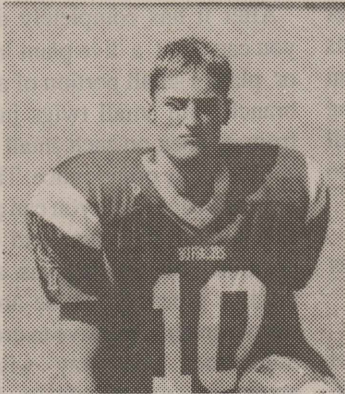

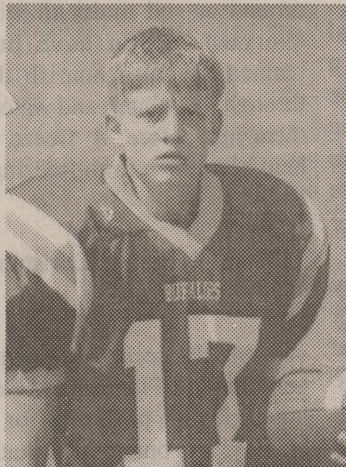

The J.V. Buffaloes were able to pull out their first victory of the season last Thursday at home. The Buffaloes beat Baird 24-6.

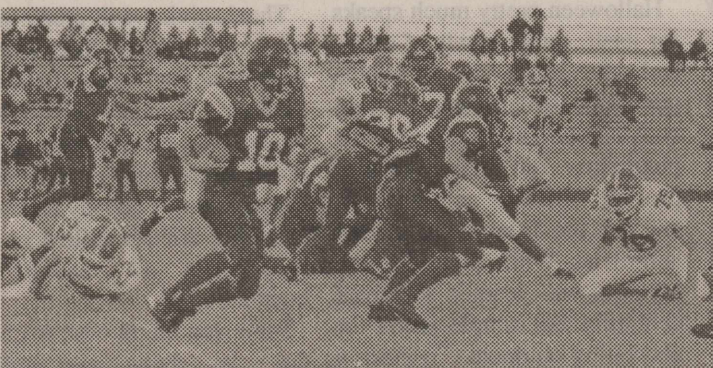
The Buffaloes dominated the game for the most part and did not allow Baird to score until late in the game.

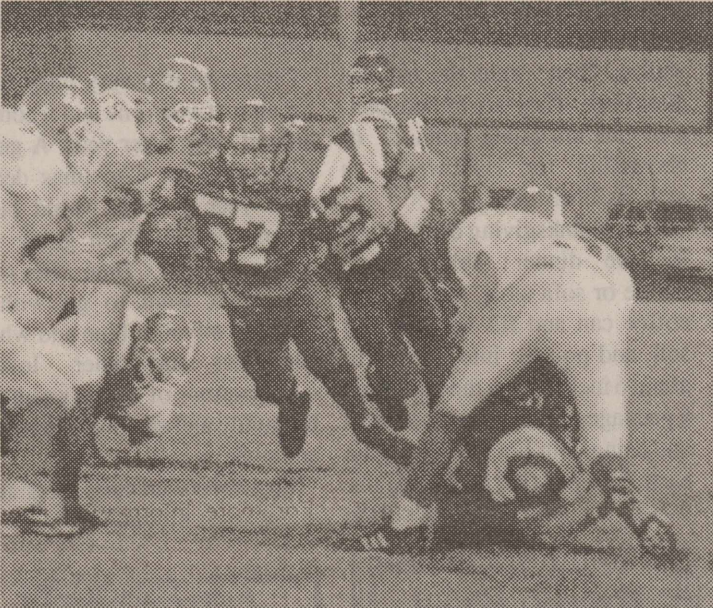
The defense did a good job limiting Baird's offense.

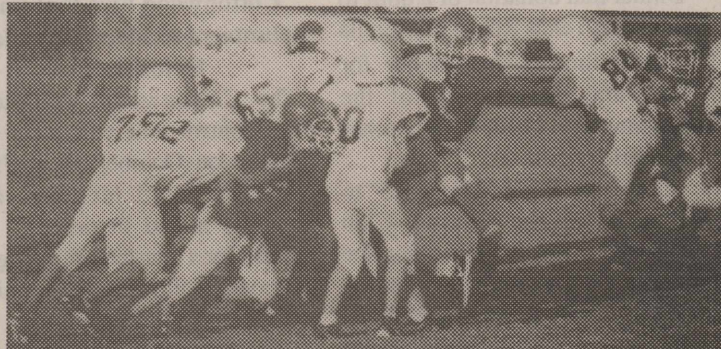
QUARTERBACK KEEPER—Cross Plains senior quarterback Dusty Dickson, #10 in black, tries the right side of the Baird

New driver responsibility law assigns point system

The Driver Responsibility law (in House Bill 3588) establishes a system that assigns points to moving violations classified as Class C misdemeanors and applies surcharges to offenders, based on the type of offense and the time period in which the citation was received. For each conviction, the Department of Public Safety (DPS) will assign points to a person's license as follows:

- Two points for a moving violation conviction in Texas or that of another state.

- Points will not be assigned for speeding less than 10 percent over the posted limit or seat belt convictions.

- Three points for a moving violation conviction in Texas or another state that resulted in a vehicle crash.

Points remain on the driver's record for a period of three years. Additionally, a conviction that becomes final before September 1, 2003, will not apply to the assessment of points under the program. This program does not replace other administrative suspension, revocations or cancellation actions that result from these same convictions.

Surcharges

- DPS will assess a surcharge when the driver accumulates a total of six points or more on their record during a three-year period. The driver must pay a \$100 surcharge for the first six points and \$25 for each additional point.

- Drivers who receive a conviction for DWI or a DWI-related offense, failure to maintain financial responsibility or driving while license invalid will pay an annual surcharge for a period of three years. No points are placed on driver records for these offenses because the fine is automatic on the first offense. A first-time DWI results in a \$1,000 surcharge, paid annually for three years. A second-time DWI

results in a \$1,500 surcharge, paid annually for three years. The charges are cumulative. For example a driver could pay \$1,000 as a result of their first DWI and an additional \$1,500 for their second DWI, paying a total of \$2,500 annually.

- A conviction for driving while license is invalid or failure to maintain financial responsibility results in a surcharge of \$250, paid annually for three years. A driver who is convicted of driving without a valid charge for three years.

The surcharge assessed for this program is in addition to other reinstatement fees required for other administrative actions.

DPS will notify the offending driver of the assessment of a surcharge on their license, via first-class mail. The notice will state the surcharge must be paid. Drivers who do not pay their surcharge within 30 days after the notice is sent will have their driving privileges revoked. The license will remain revoked until the person pays all surcharges and related costs, such as service/collection fees.

Each surcharge collected by the department under this law will be remitted to the Comptroller, on a monthly basis. Trauma centers and county and regional emergency medical services will receive 49.5 percent of the collected money and the Texas Mobility fund will receive 49.5 percent of the collected money. The money that goes to trauma centers will be handled by the Texas Department of Health, while the Texas Department of Transportation will handle money going to the Mobility fund, which funds highway projects, including the Trans Texas Corridor. The remaining one percent of the collected money will go to DPS for operation of the Driver Responsibility program.

CTO Held Open House at their New Location in Coleman

It was on July 7, 2001 that Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. staff members watched in horror as their offices went up in fire. Very little could be salvaged but one thing that was not taken away was the indomitable spirit of every worker. From the Saturday it burned until this past Tuesday when they opened "their building" located on South Commercial, not one member had ever lost faith. It was recently the CTO moved from their temporary location in the Coleman County State Bank Building to their new "home" which at one time housed Century 21.

A very tearful and happy CTO Executive Director Merrilee McClatchy welcomed over 200 visitors who came to "celebrate" the happy occasion. While greeting them, McClatchy said, "This is not just the time to celebrate an Open House and a new building though this is wonderful. This is the time to celebrate an end to a journey that started on July 7, 2001 when our building burned to the ground. We would like to thank the staff and those in the community who have and continue to support us in many ways. Please celebrate with us in our "new home." This is the first time we have had a "home" of our own and we thank so many along with our Board of Directors."

CTO Board member Rev. Kermit Sorrells also welcomed the group and thanked each one present. Rev. Sorrells said, "We, the board members gave the staff all the support we could. This building will help Coleman, the many people and the counties the CTO serves. We also wish to thank our great God above who has blessed us." 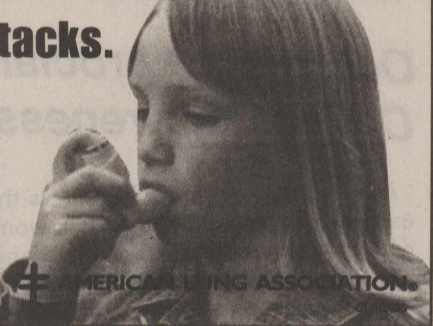

October 10 proclaimed Breast Cancer Awareness Day

Approximately 10,500 new cases of female invasive breast cancer was reported in 2003, and about 2,400 women will die of the disease. Nationally, breast cancer is the most common form of cancer in women.

Research shows that breast cancer mortality could be reduced by at least 30 percent if women followed recommended breast cancer screening guidelines.

All women have a chance of developing breast cancer. Women 50 or older are the most likely to develop breast cancer. African American women are the most likely to die of breast cancer than any other group of women. Getting a mammogram and breast exam only once is not enough.

The American Cancer Society recommends a breast health program of annual mammograms starting at age 40, routine clinical breast examinations yearly by a health professional starting at age 20, and a monthly self-examination

is the most important action a woman can take to detect breast cancer at its earliest stage.

Further, Medicare helps pay the cost of a yearly mammogram for women 40 or older with Medicare Part B.

In recognition of the important lifesaving early detection practices available for breast cancer, I Roger Corn, County Judge of Callahan County and the County Commissioners of Callahan County, do hereby proclaim October 2003 as Breast Cancer Awareness Month and October 10th Callahan County Breast Cancer Awareness Day. I urge all Callahan County women to become aware that they are at risk and to discuss a screening program with their health care providers. I urge all other Callahan County citizens to encourage a woman they love to do so.
