## Morrison Motor Lubbock Agrees Towns Of Area Pledge Support To Water Parley In Controversy Over Water Rights

A mass meeting for the purpose of acquainting all the people with the Plains water situation is being planned for the first week in June, to be held in the high school auditorium. Details will be announced later.

If the program that is being considered is carried out, the mass meeting will be the place for learning the true facts about water, about Bailey County's side of the controversy now going on, about Lubbock's viewpoint, as well. A speaker will explain Bailey County's views and a Lubbock man will tell what Lubbock has in mind in acquiring options to Plains underground water rights

The "Committee of Ten", composed of representatives of the Bailey County Farm Bureau, directors for Bailey County in the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, and of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, is considering the meeting and will sponsor it. They have invited one of the outstanding underground water authorities of the country, Bill Broadhurst, U.S. Geologist, to be one of the

Mr. Broadhurst in the past has discussed the nature and source, probable longevity, etc., of the underground water supply of the Plains before numerous groups in the various towns. If he can fill the engagement here, it is certain he will present facts from an impartial point of view, and anyone who has ever heard him speak will say that his talks constitute as education in themselves on the subject of water and the geology of the Plains.

The committee of ten are postponing their mass meeting until the matter has been thoroughly gone over between them and representatives of the city of Lubbock. Tomorrow (Friday) morning at 10:30, Mayor Tripp of Lubbock and three or four others of Lubbock will be in Muleshoe to discuss details of a joint meeting of representatives of the two towns, to be held in Lubbock, presumably next week. Such a meeting was requested by Al Hall of the Muleshoe

Chamber of Commerce in a letter to the mayor last week. Mayor Tripp and his group will confer here with the representatives of the three groups and decide on the meeeing day and the matters which shall come before the Lubbock meeting. After that, it is expected that the Muleshoe group will call the mass meeting and will notify the people as to the date and other details.

A spokesman for the local committee said every means of arriving at an amicable settlement of the issue are being considered, in order to avoid any possible friction between the people of the two towns and their territories.

Meantime, CofC officials here are reporting encouraging response to their solicitation of support from ther Plains towns. A group visited Levelland Wednesday and learned from the board of directors of the CofC there that Bailey County can certainly count on the full cooperation of all of the people there in the controversy. Levelland and Hockley County people are as much concerned with the outlook as are local people and feel that the withdrawal of large quantities of water from the water basin by the cities would, without doubt, serve to lower the water table in the irrigation section of the Plains.

Encouraging replies have been received from several of the Plains towns. Mr. Hall said the CofC will continue to solicit the support of allthepeople in the territory from Hereford to Levelland and from Littlefield to Portales

The city of Lubbock recently announced it had acquired an option to water rights to more than 50,000 acres of land near Muleshoe, on the Wasson and Birdwell ranches, south -west of town. It is reported that several test wells have been drilled on this land. Lubbock proposes to lay a pipe line from the well sites to the city, the whole development being estimated to cost some \$14 million.

The AAA official pointed out that, while automobles will not provide "safe" shelter, they are better than no shelter at all. He passed on the following instrucions to Texas motorists from the Civil Defense authorities:

"If there is a warning and you should be in a congested section like a downtown area, the car should be quickly parked at the side of the street. Leave the vehicle and hurry to the nearest designated shelter, or take refuge in the tallest building nearby. If the car is a considerable distance from shelter, occupants should roll down the windows to minimize danger from flying glass and should crouch down as low as possible.
