Ozona pet owners are informed this week it is time to re-register dogs and new dog tags may be purchased in the tax assessor-collector's office for \$1.

Regulations are the same now as they were when the new law went into effect in October of 1976. Proof of rabies shot must be presented before tags are purchased.

Dog owners having pets running loose must purchase tags or run the risk of having their pet picked up and put in the dog pound at the Ozona Veterinary Clinic.

All dogs running loose in the daytime must have tags fastened to collars or halters. Dogs running loose at night must have tags and a muzzle securely fastened in order to avoid being picked up.

Tips For Gardeners From the **Ozona Garden Club** by Mrs. Bailey Post

With so many new flowers in the world, things can't be all bad as so many say or think.

So as a gardener, you must take advantage of fair warm days, which means being ready to work when they come. January can be as we are having now, both damp and cold. February often brings the coldest temperature and maybe lots of rain, while March is almost always a mixture.

Southwest soils need all the help they can get, for the long growing season depletes the humus and the soil becomes lifeless unless more humus is added. Cover crops compost and manures should be used constantly to replenish the rapidly dwindling humas.

January is also an excellent time to prune fruit trees and summer flowering shrubs. Follow fruit pruning with a dormant spray on peaches, plums, apricots, roses and grapes. Use an oil spray on apples and pears. This month, manure all permanent perennials such as Shasta daisies, mums, and vegetables, asparagus, rhubarb and strawberries.

This and next week I will give you a list of some of the new flowers, shurbs, roses and vegetables. You may want to add a few of these All-American selections and other new varieties to your favorite plantings to see how they do for you here in Ozona. Don't rely completely on new varieties because it may not perform as well in your garden as an old favorite that you have grown for vears.
