a special election. The new lines were drawn as before and the tax office worked months notifying the people who had been moved back to another precinct. This was especially difficult as there is no mail delivery route in Ozona and most people have only a post office box number in place of a residence address. However, this was done, and in a meeting with Kay Butler, a representative from the U.S. Justice Department, all candidates approved the voting list. Agreeing, in effect, that the candidate polling the most votes would be the

winner of the election. Marley won the run-off election by 32 votes. The ballots were impounded after the Jan. 7 run-off election, and the suit contesting the election was filed Monday, Jan. 30. The first amendment was filed Monday, Feb. 6. and nobody knows at this point how many more amendments will be filed.

Marley was the only one involved to talk to the press. He said he had retained Charles Sherrill of Sonora and Lucious Bunton of Odessa to defend him in the suit. He has been required to post bond of approximately \$35,000 within ten days. He

Most Incumbents For County Office To Run Unopposed

Filing deadline for statewide and county posts to be Judge, 112th District. filled in the general election in November ended at 6 p.m. Monday. Several county posts come up this year, but the only candidates to file besides the incumbents were for commissioner, Precinct 2, where incumbent commissioner Bill Black has two opponents, Bill T. Williams and Byron Stuart.

In Crockett County most interest will be focused on the Democratic Primary May 6, since all candidates have filed with the Democratic Party chairman, and there is no opposition in the November election. However, there is a full slate of candidates for state and national offices for the November election.

Locally, county offices to be filled include county judge, county treasurer, county clerk, county commissioners, Precincts 2 and 4, and Justice of the Peace, Justice Precinct 1.

Incumbents filing include Johnny Jones for county judge. He was appointed to the post Sept. 1, by the Crockett County Commissioners Court when Troy Williams resigned to accept the district judgeship, and will be asking for his first

According to former District Judge Charles Sherrill and Attorney Lucious Bunton, Marley's defense lawyers, the fund is non-political and contributions are not limited in amount.

Contributions to this fund will be accepted at the Ozona National Bank and all donors names will be kept con-

The full results of the filings for statewide and national offices were not known at noon Tuesday because mailed filing fees postmarked before 6 p.m. Monday will be accepted by both the Republican and Democratic State chairmen.

There is a host of hopefuls for Governor opposing Gov. Briscoe in his bid for a third term. They include Democrats Ray Allen Mayo, Preston Smith, John Hill and Donald Beagle, plus Republicans Williams Clements, Ray Hutchison and Clarence Thompson. Filing with the secretary of state to run as independents in the November election for Governor include Lawrence A. Sims, John Solon, C. Leon Pickett and Richard A. Peterson. So, voters will have a wide

State of Texas.

The race for the 21st Congressional District seat being vacated by U.S. Rep. Bob Krueger will also field many candidates. So far nine have filed for the position. They include Nelson Wolff of San Antonio, who was in the run-off election with Kruger when he first won the post, who filed as a Democrat. Wallace Larson, Republican; Neil Calnan, Republican; Woodrow Glasscock, Jr., Democrat; Bobby Locke, Republican; Tom Loeffler, Republican; Paul Dahlgren, Democrat; Joe Sullivan, Democrat; Steve Clark, Dem-

U.S. Senator John Tower will not have a Republican opponent in his bid for reelection to the Senate, but will face either Joe Christi or Bob Krueger, Democrats in the general election.

It now appears evident that the Panama Canal treaties will not be approved unless they are modified.

The key to the continuing controversy is the conflicting interpretations of America's right to protect the canal after it is turned over to Panama.

Senate Minority Leader Howard Baker, Jr. (R-Tennessee), who may have the single most important vote in the Senate on the treaties, recently returned from a factfinding trip to Panama and said that he told Panamanian dictator General Omar Torrijos, that he saw "no chance" that the treaties could win the required two-thirds Senate

approval in their present form. Senator Baker's remarks and the uneasiness of many Senators over the language of the treaties reflect the feelings of the majority of Americans. As an in-depth analysis of the treaties by a Heritage Foundation policy analyst concluded, "At the fundamental level no convincing case has been presented that the new treaties can protect America's vital mailed to the voter. 
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

Tips For Gardeners From the Ozona Garden Club

February may be a great time because we get those first breaths of spring that mean gardening is really about to start. Quince, pussy willow, January jasmine, winter honeysuckle bloom and crocus, snowdrops and early narcissus abound. You can pick and choose the jobs that mean the most to you in preparation for gardening activity.

Not only will the top grow into a fine mint Demonstration patch, but the underground stems will grow through the moss on the bottom and sides and produce an interesting, as well as practical, basket. Apple mint makes a beautiful plant.

Complete bare-root planting and transplanting this month. Continue planting balled-and-burlapped and container grown plants throughout the spring. Fertilize plants, including woody ground covers, as soon as new growth becomes appar-



All persons, including babies, need calcium for bones and other body tissue--whether from milk or other sources. Recommended Dietary Allowances calcium needed each day for different age groups are: 360 to 540 milligrams for infants, 800 milligrams for children, 1,200 milligrams for teens, 800 milligrams for adults, and 1,200 milligrams for pregnant and lactating women.

Milk--or calcium equivilent amounts of milk products--recommended daily for adults is a minimum of two cups, three or more cups for pregnant women, four or more for nursing mothers, four or more for teens, three or more for children nine to





Limits On Telephone **Solicitations**

Recommendations to help protect personal privacy are now under study--with automated dialing devices getting special attention, Ms. Kerbel says.

Each device is capable of calling more than 1,000 telephone numbers per day--on either a random or preselected basis.

Some machines play a recorded message up to six minutes in length.

'Business organizations using these machines reach thousands of consumers--directly and inexpensively," the specialist continues.

Recommendations to limit telephone solicitations were submitted by the Office of Consumer Affairs (OCA) and they are now under study by the Federal Communications Commission.

Specifically, OCA recommended that FCC study the feasibility of adopting seven measures relating to automated dialing devices and other telephone soliciters.

These measures would: Require that telephone subscribers have an opportunity--at least annually--to place their names on lists of persons who would be protected from solicitation, require that firms which employ this form of advertising bear the costs for compiling and maintaining these lists. Also Establish penalties for violators--with fines for repeated violators, require solicitations that use automated dialing devices and recorded messages to begin with the statement, "This is a recorded mes-

Limit taped messages to one minute in areas where placing the telephone receiver on the cradle does not disconnect an incoming call, establish limits on the hours during which telephone solicitations would be permitted, determine the effect that telephone solicitations have on the telephone system--so that fees paid by soliciters reflect actual cost.

Tax Savings May Be Available CAFETERIA MENU Hospital News To Texas Farmers & Ranchers

Income tax savings may be available to Texas farmers and ranchers who suffered losses due to summer heat and drought.

That information comes from Dr. Richard Trimble, economist in management with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

'Normally, the sale or trade of livestock, if held primarily for sale, produces ordinary farm income that should be reported in the year it is received. However, a rancher may be able to elect to defer reporting income from the sale of certain livestock because of drought conditions which occurred during 1977," points out Trimble.

To qualify for this election, the rancher must use the cash method of accounting and the livestock must be held primarily for sale. Another condition is that the area or county must be designated as eligible for assistance by the federal government due to the drought

'This special treatment is limited to income from livestock which is sold or exchanged in excess of the usual sales each year. The income can be deferred for only one year," explains the economist.

Trimble cites an example. Rancher Smith normally sells 50 head of feeder cattle each year. In 1977, because of the drought, he sold 70 head of the feeder cattle sold (\$4,000) and report it on his 1978 income tax return. Smith must use the cash method of accounting, live in an eligible area, and depend on farming or ranching as his principal occupation.

Special provisions also apply to drought-forced sales of breeding livestock, notes the economist. When livestock held for draft, breeding or dairy purposes are sold or exchanged solely because of drought, their disposition is considered an involuntary conversion. Only livestock sold in excess of the number invited to attend

business practices in the absence of drought will be considered involuntarily converted. The gain on livestock involuntarily converted into money will not be taxed in the year of the sale if the converted property is replaced within two years.

How are farmers affected? "Farmers may be able to elect to defer for one year the reporting of crop insurance payments from the tax year the crops were destroyed or damaged by drought," says Trimble. "A farmer can defer reporting such income if he can establish that under normal practice, the crop destroyed would have been sold in the following tax year. This provision should help provide a normal income flow for the individual farmer who

qualifies." There may be some drought related losses that are not deductible, points out Trimble. The loss of growing crops for a farmer using the cash method of accounting is not a deductible income tax loss. This is because the costs of the productive inputs such as seed, fertilizer and insecticide are deducted as farm expenses. The same rule applies to the loss of raised livestock where the cost of raising has been deducted as farm expense.

Publication No. 225, Farmer's Tax Guide," 1978 Edition, is a good source of information and may be obtained from any county Extension agent or the Internal Revenue Service, adds the economist.



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

Wise Family Spending **Decisions**

Wise spending decisions in families depend on both husband and wife, says Claudia Kerbel, consumer information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Since both partners make a significant number of decisions together, it is important for both to practice effective decision-making skills, she adds.

Decision-making involves value clarification, goal setting, examining alternative uses of resources, choosing wisely and evaluating the outcome of a decision, the specialist continues.

Below are the findings of a recent study to determine who--husbands or wives--had major responsibility for decisions about housing, transportation and food.

Findings showed that transportation decisions related to age and length of marriage. In younger couples and those who had been married a short time, both spouses made the major transportation decisions. Among older couples and those married longer, husbands made more decisions.

Decision making for food choices was related to the wife's contribution to the income. The greater her financial contribution, the fewer food-buying decisions she

Up For 1978 Benefit Periods

surance deductible will be and have given its people \$144 for benefit periods beginning in 1978, Franklin H. Upp, social security manager in San Angelo, said today. This represents an increase of \$20 over the \$124 deductible effective during

The deductible is the amount people pay towards the cost of services covered by Medicare hospital insurance during the first 60 days of hospital care provided during a benefit period. The increase will not affect people whose benefit periods began in 1977, Mr. Upp added, but will apply to people who start a benefit period in 1978.

A benefit period is the way of measuring a person's use of services under Medicare hospital insurance. A person's first benefit period starts when he or she enters a hospital after hospital insurance begins. It ends when the person has been out of the hospital or other facility primarily providing skilled nursing or rehabilitation services for 60 days in a row. There is no limit to the number of benefit periods a person can have.

The increase in the deductible will also cause increases in the other coinsurance amounts people are responsible for under Medi-

Food Buying Habits Focus On Nutrition

Consumer food buying habits focus on using nutrition and buying principals when shopping, says Mary K. Sweeten, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Some 66 percent of those surveyed always checked food labels for ingredients listed before buying it. Nutritional information was utilized by 59 percent.

Food shopping habits in 1977 compared to the 1976 shopping habits showed that 31 percent almost always shopped more than one store for the best prices and 23 percent sometimes did this, Mrs. Sweeten continues.



For a bare-root tree, make the hole large enough to allow the root system to spread out naturally. It should be deep enough for the plant to set no deeper than its original soil level-slightly higher (1-2 inches) is even better. Next, trim broken or damaged roots, and then form a mound in the bottom of the planting hole, letting the roots flow down the mound. Do not allow

roots to dry out. For a balled-and-burlapped tree, dig the hole about one-and-a-half times the diameter of the ball. Plant it so that the top of the soil ball is at or slightly above the existing soil surface.

Finally, prune the tops of Ozona Boy transplanted trees to compensate for loss of roots. As a general rule, prune about one-third of the top growth. Then fill the hole with a good soil mixture such as peat moss and topsoil and water thoroughly.

As your newly planted tree begins to grow, you can feel proud of improving your landscape and environment, adds Reagor.

Contributions that qualify for deductions or credits include cash paid directly to a candidate or political committee and tickets to various political parties and dinners. Taxpayers buying tickets can deduct or take credit based on the full cost of tickets purchased for this purpose.

continue to make their home An event must be primarily political in nature, with the major portion of time devoted to political speeches or discussion in order for fees to be fully deductible for tax purposes. The event must also be in support of an announced political candi-

> If the event is only partially political and its main purpose is to confer benefits to individuals attending, the taxpayer attending may take a deduction or credit for the total cost minus the fair market value of any benefits gained, such as dinner or entertainment.

Raffle tickets purchased in connection with political fund-raisers do not qualify for the deduction or credit, according to the IRS.

Taxpayers should keep good records, such as written receipts and cancelled checks to substantiate the tax deduction or credit for a political contribution.
