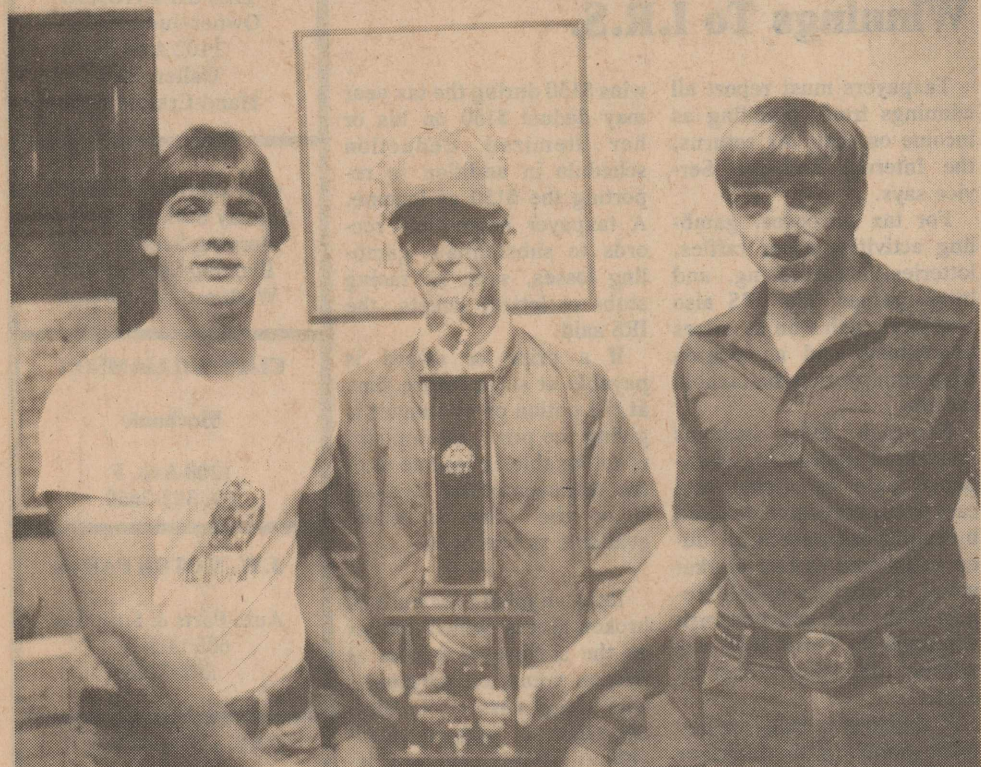

## Feb. Cold Weather To Blame For High Local WTU Bills

February, 1978, has proved once again that cold weather and high electric bills go hand-in-hand, according to a spokesman at West Texas Utilities Co. After analyzing February weather data, Ray Hartt, a WTU space engineer, said, "Both in degree days and in

average temperature, we experienced one heck of a cold month." Bills currently being issued by WTU are mostly for electricity used during the extreme cold weather, and are producing a flurry of inquiries to WTU local offices.

Hartt said electric usage probably would have been higher if heavy winds had accompanied the cold fronts during the month and if many customers were not practicing conservation.

Fuel costs for February were slightly lower than in January, which also helped take some sting out of the bills.

The degree day figures, which are an accepted measure of energy requirements, indicated that West Texans needed 85 per cent more energy this February than last February just to keep their homes warm.

The "heating degree day" is the net difference between the average outside temperature over a 24-hour period and a base temperature of 65 degrees. This past February there were 729 degrees in Abilene, compared to 393 in February, 1977.

Hartt said this is about average for WTU's entire service area, which stretches from Shamrock on the north to Presidio on the south with Abilene about in the center.

## Lion Tracksters Take 2nd Place Trophy At McCamey

Ozona Lion Tracksters, in their first out of the season, won the second place trophy at the McCamey Track Meet Saturday. Marfa came in first with 123 points while Ozona was second with 93 points. Crane took third place with 70 points, Alpine fourth with 62 points and Sonora fifth with 51 points.

Leading the attack for the Lions were Steve Pagan and Blake Moody, who scored 49 of the 93 points scored by the Lions.

Due to construction at the track field and lack of facilities, the Annual Ozona Relays for 1978 were officially cancelled this week. Coaches and school officials felt it would be impossible to hold the event under the circumstances.

Pagan won first place in the 120 high hurdles with a time of 15.9 and first in the 330 intermediate hurdles with a 41.7. Moody got a first in the pole vault with a mark of 12'6". Moody won a second in the long jump with a leap of 21'2".

Dan Sewell came in second in the pole vault with 12'6" and Jesse Garza got a second for the Lions in the mile run with a time of 5:04.7. The mile relay team of Paul Zapata, Randy Allen, Moody and Pagan won second with a time of 3:46.6.

Fred Garza won third in the 120 high hurdles with a time of 16.4. Randy Allen

placed fourth in the 220-yd. dash with 24.7 and the 440-yd. relay team placed fourth with a 47.5. Team members are Ray Ramos, Allen, Sewell and Moody.

Finishing fifth in the intermediate hurdles was Fred Garza with a time of 43.8. Sixth place winners for the Lions were Gene Galindo in the 880-yd. dash with 2:17.7; Blake Moody in the 100-yd.

dash with 10.8, and Paul Zapata in the 440 with a time of 56.9.

The Lions will be in Iraan Saturday for the Cactus Relays.

## Pre-Trial Hearing In Sanderson

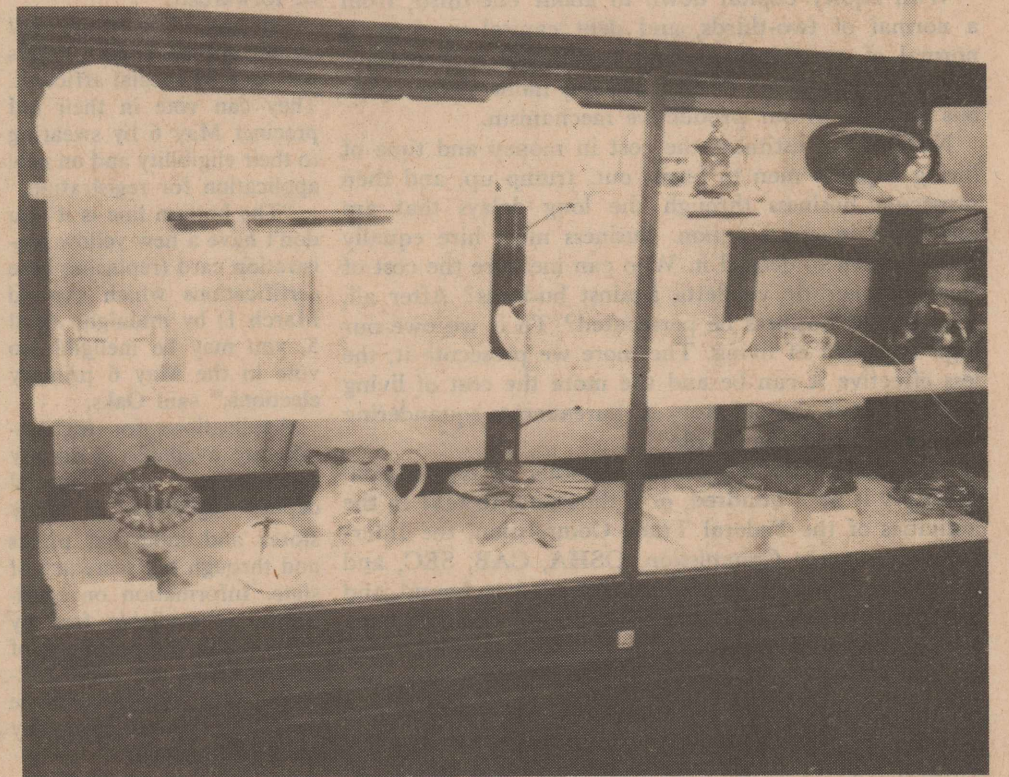

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**-Government's Strangle-Hold-**

You want to know where your tax dollars go? A lot of them go to 420 lawyers and their elaborate equipment and personnel in the Justice Department's Antitrust Division under John Shenefield.

These men are working hard to find new ways of attacking American business. They are trying to stretch the Sherman Antitrust Act to the limit. Businessmen who need all their time to think of ways to make better merchandise, more of it, and at less cost, are being badgered, hounded, and persecuted by these government lawyers. They have to spend their valuable time—so much needed for the proper operation of their businesses—defending themselves against the machinations of these government bureaucrats.

Businessmen have to meet payrolls. Their opponents in court do not. They are faced with constantly mounting taxes and staggering quantities of regulations, requiring high-powered accountants and executives with computers and calculating machines, trying to keep up with the snow storm of reports government requires of them.

Shenefield and his 420 assistants are attacking what they call economic concentration. They are trying to break up big business units and substitute a multitude of smaller units. They talk about high profits, but actually, four to five percent is about the average profit that American industry is earning in these times. They are trying to stop industry from its alleged conspiracy "to raise their prices." With wages, taxes, operating expenses, and raw materials steadily rising, how can it be expected that our business establishments will not

find it necessary also to raise prices? With profits down to the low figure noted above, surely they can't be squeezed any further.

With equity capital down to about one-third, from a normal of two-thirds, and debt capital up from a normal of one-third to about two-thirds, it is obvious that industry cannot be crowded any more without serious damage to our productive mechanism.

No one can estimate the cost in money and time of hiring capable men to ferret out, trump up, and then prosecute business through the long delays that are inevitable in court action. Business must hire equally capable men to defend it. Who can measure the cost of this bureaucratic vendetta against business? After all, why should business be persecuted? To it we owe our high standard of living. The more we prosecute it, the less effective it can be and the more the cost of living will rise. It is the old story of bureaucrats squandering the substance of the people.

And this is only one tiny little corner of Washington. Multiply it by a hundred, or a thousand, to take in the activities of the Federal Trade Commission, the Interstate Commerce Commission, OSHA, CAB, SEC, and all the myriads of regulatory bodies that hound and persecute American business and roll up enormous costs for the taxpayer to meet. This will give you some idea of the strangling bureaucracy that is destroying our freedom, bankrupting our people and our country, and leading us nearer and nearer to the dictator who is waiting for our democracy to destroy itself so he can take over.

**Soviet Priorities**

"It is shocking indeed, to note that as much as 95 percent of all Soviet military vehicles are produced in plants originally designed by the Americans in the 1930's."—Allan C. Brownfeld in the *St. Croix Review*, December, 1977.

The bureaucracy may claim U.S. wheat does not go to Vietnam or Cuba, but it avoids the crucial point that export of our wheat to the Soviets releases Soviet wheat for export to Hanoi. Further, no economist will deny that our economic assistance releases Soviet domestic resources for armament production.

Regarding trade with Germany prior to World War II, the State and Commerce Departments at that time issued the following statement, "The committee is unanimously of the opinion that the major force for war represented in a motor vehicle industry is its availability as a major machine-shop aggregation . . . which can be turned, by conversion, to production of an extremely wide variety of military products." Why was this true in the case of Germany but not true in regard to the USSR? Dr. Michael Checinski, a former Communist intelligence officer, has said: "Every machine, device, or instrument imported from the West is sent to a special analytic group. Their job is not only to copy technical solutions, but to adapt them to the specifications of Soviet military production."

**AUSTIN**—More than a million Texans have been purged from voter registration rolls this year, and many of them might not find out about it until they try to vote.

An estimated 38 per cent of those eligible to vote are unregistered, according to Secretary of State Steve Oaks who is spearheading a massive statewide voter registration drive.

More than 3.3 million Texans of voting age are still not signed up. Actually, more than 8.7 million Texans are voter age, and about 62 per cent or 5.4 million have registered.

Voters were wiped off the rolls when new certificates were mailed to them under 1977 amendments to the registration laws and returned unclaimed due mainly to changes in address. The certificates were not forwardable. But tax assessor collectors are following up in many counties with new registration applications that can be forwarded.

Further, 15 to 10 per cent of the million purged voters will vote by special affidavit. They can vote in their old precinct May 6 by swearing to their eligibility and on new application for registration.

"The bottom line is if you don't have a new yellow registration card (replacing blue certifications which expired March 1) by midnight April 5, you may be ineligible to vote in the May 6 primary elections," said Oaks.

Applications for registration are available at county courthouses, from special deputy registrars, at many stores and industrial plants and through the secretary of state. Information on registration is available free by telephoning the secretary of state's office at 1-800-252-9333. NO charge will be made for the call from any point in the state.

**Guard Prepares**  
Texas State Guard Units over the state will hold 28 special disaster preparedness training exercises this spring. The program was designed to provide Guard personnel with practical experience in performing military support missions during local emergencies.

The Guard is an all-volunteer state force which assists local governments and reinforces National Guard units in periods of serious crisis or emergency.

Exercises begin March 4 in Kingsville and Coleman and continue through May 7 in Nacogdoches, Palestine and Pasadena.

Other exercises will be held in Waxahachie, New Braunfels, Kilgore, Mineral Wells, Dallas, Texarkana, Breckenridge, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Lubbock, Austin, El Campo, Odessa, Denton, Brenham, Wichita Falls, Cameron, El Paso, Borger, Port Neches, Mercedes, Tyler and Marlin.

**Gamblers Must Report Winnings To I.R.S.**  
Taxpayers must report all winnings from gambling as income on their tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service says.

For tax purposes, gambling activities cover raffles, lotteries, horse racing, and bingo games. The IRS also considers cash won as prizes in contests and as awards from employers to be taxable income.

Non-cash items such as household appliances, all-expense paid vacations, and cars won as prizes or donated by employers must be included in income at fair market value. Taxpayers should report both cash and non-cash winnings on Form 1040 under the category of "other income."

If a taxpayer loses money while gambling, the taxpayer may deduct his or her gambling losses on Schedule A of Form 1040 to the extent of winnings. For example, a taxpayer who loses \$200 and

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### Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Usually in Texas, March is neither too hot nor too cold. This year it was in the forecast to come in with a new front and perhaps rain, which certainly has been needed for sometime. State-wide, it's still planting time for trees, shrubs, woody vines, early vegetables, small fruits, nut trees, and summer flowering bulbs, such as cannas and amaryllis. These two make colorful beds that return year after year without too much care and insect trouble.

Since the dormant season is about to end, finish making any landscape changes that will involve planting or transplanting woody ornamentals. Have the soil in all planting beds prepared before you select plants. That way, you can complete planting without delay, ensuring the plants the healthiest possible start.

As weather continues to warm, nurseries will begin to offer bedding plants in flats to be transplanted directly to flower borders and beds. Some of the earliest ones offered include pansies, calendula, candy tuft, and dianthus. It is a good rule to group plants by color to get the best display.

Chinese hibiscus is a plant that will grow in every part of Texas, and is listed as a commendable ornamental for several reasons. It is a good container plant; the flowers are massive, as much as 10 inches across; and its loose, bushy growth habit makes it an interesting plant. Hibiscus hybridizes easily, and varieties are available in a large range of colors, from scarlets, oranges, yellows and pinks to white. Flowers may be single or double, depending on variety. Locate them in full sun or partial light shade, and plant in loamy well-drained soil. Also, the dependable relative, shrub althea (*Hibiscus syriacus*) or rose of Sharon does well in Ozona and generally blooms from late June throughout the remainder of the summer. The planting season for these is nearly over, so if you want to plant either species, obtain plants from the nursery soon.

Some of the plants that can be set out soon are alyssum, daisy, bobelia, phlox, verbena, carefree geranium, aster, petunia, chrysanthemum, and snapdragons.

### Accidents Caused By Misuse Of Product By Consumer

Many accidents involving consumer products are not caused by poor product design, but rather by the misuse of otherwise safe products, says Claudia Kerbel, a consumer information specialist.

Among common types of product misuse are improper mixing, overuse, undue haste, lack of maintenance and improper storage.

### Montgomery Restaurant Flooded

Bryan Montgomery was forced to close his restaurant, Beecher's Cafe, in Malibu recently when heavy rains flooded that area of California. There were six inches of water in the establishment when he was able to get to it.

He suffered a loss of several thousand dollars in food, ruined when the electricity went off, repairs and lost revenue due to the shut down. He expected to be able to open again today.

Some products are hazardous if mixed together, the specialist cautions.

For example, chlorine bleach mixed with ammonia, toilet bowl cleaners or drain cleaners may release hazardous or lethal vapors.

Although chlorine bleach must be labeled clearly with a warning not to mix it with ammonia or toilet bowl cleaners, some people do not read the label or disregard it.

Some consumers think that if a small amount is good, then a large amount must be better, Ms. Kerbel explains.

That kind of logic can lead to hazardous situations. For example, too much acid-type drain cleaner can eat away pipes. And, taking more than the recommended dose of medication can lead to fatal results.

Always follow directions for use and never use more than the recommended amount, she stresses.

Attempting to race through preliminary steps in order to use a product and get the job done may result in serious injury, the specialist continues.

Serious injury may result from overlooking part of a piece of machinery or climbing on a stepladder without leveling it.

Take time to prepare for a task, she adds.

Failure to repair broken products and lack of maintenance are frequent contributors to serious injuries, Ms. Kerbel points out.

Tighten loose stair rails, replace broken electrical plugs and discard broken ladders.

Have complex machines, gas appliances and electrical appliances repaired by experts.

Highly flammable liquids may produce heavier-than-air vapors which can travel invisibly along the floor, the specialist warns.

A distant pilot light in a gas furnace or gas water heater or a discarded cigarette can cause ignition.

Therefore, store flammable liquids away from any ignition source.

Store poisons, drugs and other hazardous products in high, locked cabinets to keep them out of children's reach.

Also, keep these products in their original containers and clearly label them to prevent mistaking them for food or beverage, she suggests.

### DEBRA SAYS

When buying children's shoes, look for ones that fit shoes that fit correctly are comfortable from the start and don't need breaking in. Also, shop sales-sales on children's shoes during this month offer savings of 30 to 50 percent.

Check for these shoe-fit check-points:

Allow one-half to three-fourths inch of space between the longest toe and end of the shoe when the child is standing.

The toe cap should be deep enough to give ample room for the toes.

The shoe's heel should fit the foot's heel snugly-but not tightly-and should not cut into the back of the ankle.

Look for firm, well-molded counter to hold the heel straight.

Check the instep-it should allow enough room to permit freedom of movement.

Check the widest part of the shoe-it should coincide with and flex at the widest part of the foot.

Check the sides of the shoe-they should not rub or cut into the foot or ankle bone.

Also, have both of the child's feet measured each time. If the child's feet differ in size, let the larger one determine the shoe size. Remember: fit, not durability, is the most important consideration when buying children's shoes. Because young feet grow so quickly, children under twelve years often out-grow their shoes before they wear them out. So, to save money, try to fit a child under twelve years in one of the less expensive models.

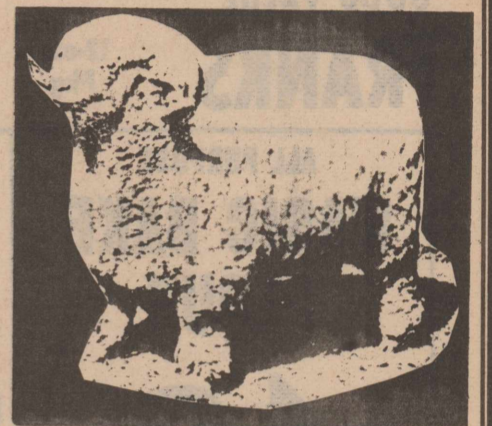

# Proof That Golden Eagle Is Not Innocent Exists

First the photos, now the postings. Things are not going so well for the golden eagle, nor for those who continue to insist on his pristine innocence.

Autopsies are nothing new there's even a successful TV series based on the amazing evidence that autopsies reveal. What's new, at least for Texas sheep and goat producers, is that the procedure is now helping them prove their case against the depredating golden eagle.

University of Montana researcher Dr. Bart O'Gara recently completed the first in hopefully a series of postings under the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association's Operation Dead Lamb. The autopsies were performed on 55 lambs and kids whose deaths were suspected of being caused by golden eagles.

Dr. O'Gara, a noted authority on predation and, more precisely, golden eagle predation, found that 15 of

the 55 deaths were definitely attributable to eagles. An additional 21 specimens were probably eagle kills, and three more were eaten by eagles but most likely killed by something else.

Dr. O'Gara was assisted by Drs. Charles Livingston and Dale Wade, veterinarian and predator specialist, respectively, at the San Angelo Research and Extension Center. They are expected to conduct future postings under the Dead Lamb program.

Various items of evidence combined to identify the eagle kills. Probably the most damning of all the indicators was the presence of capillary bleeding around talon punctures. Such bleeding or hemorrhaging cannot occur after the victim's heart ceases pumping. It is, consequently, positive evidence that the victim was alive when the punctures were made.

Talon punctures, themselves, says O'Gara, are

probably adequate evidence that the victim was alive when the eagle encountered it. In his experience with both wild and captive eagles he has learned that the birds seldom if ever stab a dead meal. Deep talon punctures are used to kill, not hold, he explains. Indeed, he has seen eagles eat such helpless prey as chickens alive, without bothering to stab them first; even eagle fanciers admit that the bird, like most predators, is inherently lazy, so why should it bother stabbing helpless prey, much less prey that is already dead?

O'Gara's determinations, however, were not based on the evidence of talon punctures alone. He conducted his investigation, he says, "conservatively", giving the eagle the benefit of the doubt in all cases where conclusive evidence was not apparent. He chose to consider circumstantial cases as "probably" or "possibly not", rather than make assumptions that would surely be challenged after the fact.

Still, the challenges are coming, at least the groundwork is being laid. In fact, the groundwork was being laid before the postings ever began. One eagle fancier suggested, in a letter received only hours after the postings were completed, that O'Gara take bone marrow samplings to determine whether the victims were healthy at the time of death. The fact that no such samples were taken leaves the study open to charges that the lambs and kids were unhealthy and therefore easier prey or destined to die anyway, a favorite theme of protectionists.

Realistic students of nature agree that such claims are based on the most obvious of fallacies—that predators only attack the weak or sick. This belief is based on observations that, for instance, wolves attack the weakest deer, buffalo, cow or whatever. In such cases, the predator is the smaller of the two, and needs the advantage. In the case of the eagle and the lamb, no such advantage is needed. After all, says O'Gara, a bird that can catch a fleet jackrabbit or bring down a mature mule deer can almost sleep his way through killing the healthiest of sheep or goats.

## Girl Scouts Hold Mini-Olympics

District IV of the El Camino Girl Scout Council held a Junior Olympics Saturday, March 4 hosted by Ozona Girl Scouts at the Civic Center. Close to 100 Junior, Cadette, and Senior Scouts and adults attended. Mrs. Terry Adams, Ozona Neighborhood Chairman, was Event Coordinator.

Junior Troop 50, Troop 49, and Troop 252 from Ozona had girls entered in the Olympics. Two troops from Sonora, and one troop each from Big Lake and Eldorado also entered in the events.

The events were patterned after the Olympics, but geared down to fun competition between the girls: the winner of the Javelin Throw had to throw a toothpick the farthest, the Mile Run entailed adding up figures totaling 5,280 ft., etc.

Sixteen Cadettes and Seniors from Ozona took charge of the events, cooked lunch, and presented gold, silver, and bronze medals to the winners. Filiberto Sanchez, husband of Armenta Sanchez, assistant leader of Senior Troop 130, made the wooden medals. Radio Station owner Rick Whitworth broadcast live from the Olympics, playing a march for the Parade of Champions and announcing the winners of each event.

The Ozona Volunteer Fire Department reported a total of 11 fire calls during the month of February, bringing to 16 the number for the year.
