

Suspicious Fires Hit Firemen

Firemen spent Monday afternoon and all Monday night fighting fires "of a suspicious nature," in and around Ozona. All fires were started by the roadside.

The first fire north of the cemetery on Hwy. 163 was reported at 12:25 p.m. It was extinguished after burning approximately 8 acres. A rekindle at 1:25 was quickly handled by the department.

At 7:30 alarms went off again. The first fire was at the roadside park just west of Ozona on Hwy. 290. At 9 p.m. there was a grass fire along the road leading to the dump grounds east of Ozona. At 3:50 a.m. Tuesday morning firemen extinguished a grass fire three miles north of Ozona on the Big Lake road. Again at 4:15 firemen were called for a fire at the side of the road 3 miles south of Ozona on 163. The final call came in at 4:30 and was located a mile west of Ozona on Hwy 290 again along the

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

FIRST OF THE SEASON **STRAWBERRIES**

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

Now that the frost season should be over, many chores should be started and finished soon. If you don't have garden space for a large number of strawberry plants, maybe you have a small space or garden where they could be used as a ground cover. If properly cared for, each plant along with its runners should yield 1 to 11/2 everything ready to get a qts. of berries. Plant strawberries in full sun or at least morning sun and fertile, well-drained soil high in organic matter. Locate the bed on a slope if possible, to promote good drainage. Position the plants so that the top of the root ball is level with the surrounding soil. Planting either too shallow or too deep will result in a disappointing crop. Mulching the plants will help to control weeds, conserve moisture, and keep fruit off the ground. During the first year, remove flower clusters as they appear. This is important to the plants growth and productivity. Also be sure to buy certified disease-free plants from a reputable source, water plants thoroughly every 3 or 4 rainless days. Size and quality of fruit depend heavily on a constant supply of water. In late June, top dress the bed with cattle or poultry manure, or 8-8-8 fertilizer at the rate of ½ cup per square yard of bed. Make a second application of fertilizer in early September. Plants will begin to bear regularly in Herrera second spring. As house plants enter a

new growing season, they may need repotting. When their roots become restricted and matted on the outside of the soil ball this should be done. Some flowering plants, such as African Violets, geraniums, and begonias, grow best when they are slightly pot-bound, but these are the exceptions. To repot select a container at least 2 inches larger in diameter than the one the plant was growing in. Add enough potting soil so that the top of the root ball is 1 inch below the rim of the pot. 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



Bobcat Pelt Exports May Be Legal Again

Bobcat pelt exports from Texas, perfectly legal until they were prohibited by federal bureaucratic decree a few months ago, will probably be allowed again soon.

The state Parks and Wildlife Department has proposed a set of regulations they feel will satisfy Washington, and they should be formally adopted by mid-April. Parks and Wildlife officials stress that the rules, which include tagging, harvest limits and requirements, recording were not their idea; it's another of those cases where Washington has no author-

ity to pass a particular law, but possesses the raw unbridled power to force individual states to do it for

The outfit doing the forcing is the federal Endangered Species Scientific Authority. In fairness, it must be said that ESSA claims it in turn is forced to do the forcing because of an international agreement made by an even higher authority.

Among the restrictions ESSA has made Texas impose upon itself is an export limit of 10,000 bobcat pelts for this year. The state had asked for a 15,000 pelt results could severely disauthorization.

As a rancher and as a consumer of food and fiber products. I am concerned about imported beef and its effect on the beef market as a whole.

In the fiscal year 1975-76. the U.S. imported more than 700 000 tons of beef and yeal. At that same time ranchers! were practically giving their stock away at prices well below the cost of production. This only adds to my questioning the sensibility of government regu-

When I started ranching in Medina County, there were five commercial packing plants in the area Now there is only one and it is barely hanging on. What happened? Government regulations and the people who enforce them - the bureaucrats make it almost impossible for an independent packer to

My point is, if USDA regulations are designed to protect the consumer, how can they be justified when so much of the meat on the market is not prepared under their coverage and is not marked as imported at the meat

counter? Government regulations threaten not only the farmer and rancher, they lessen our agricultural exports and thereby weaken our nation's economy by worsening our balance of trade

In addition to the aforementioned foreign beef imports, other non-agricultural imports - such as oil - have resulted in a negative trade balance every year but two since 1971.

If agriculture is that important to the U.S. international trade position, why are farmers facing their worst year since the depression?


