The proposal to extend the time limit for consideration of the Equal Rights Amendment is an ill-advised attempt to tamper with a fundamental constitutional procedure.

None of us need to be reminded of the enormous amount of emotion generated by the ERA issue.

But we must take great care not to allow those emotions to obscure the far-reaching effects of the extension proposal; because the methods by which we consider changes in the Constitution are ultimately of far greater significance than the specific changes themselves.

Central to the amendatory process is the requirement that the people reach an overwhelming consensus on proposed amendments to the Constitution. Article V requires that two-thirds of both Houses of Congress propose the amendment, and that three-quarters of the state legislatures or conventions must ratify it. No distinction is drawn between procedure and substance — both are interrelated steps in a single effort to demonstrate the necessity of the proposed change

When the 92nd Congress submitted the ERA to the states, it did so in the form of a resolution which conditioned ratification upon the consent of three-quarters of the states "within seven years." The setting of a reasonable time limit in which to demonstrate the consensus required for ratification can hardly be considered a minor procedural detail, as advocates of extension have argued. The choice of seven years was not an arbitrary one, but has been the length of time deemed reasonable for consideration of every proposed amendment since 1917 Extension advocates now propose that we retroactively change the rules. They maintain that such a change can be affected by a simple majority vote rather than the two-thirds majority required by the Constitution in the proposing of amendments, disregarding the fact that the time limit is an essential component of the amendatory process. The crowning assertion is the insistence that those states which have approved the amendment under the terms originally proposed by Congress must be content to have the life of their approvals artificially preserved, while only those states which have failed to ratify remain eligible to consider the amendment during the extension. The astonishing unfairness of extending consideration only to states willing to vote "yes" is a particularly ironic proposal, coming as it does from those who represent themselves to be such strong supporters of equal rights.

Tips For Gardeners From the **Ozona Garden Club** by Mrs. Bailey Post

Though vacation time and summer relaxation is almost over, another two months of more or less dry, hot weather may be in store for us, unless the usual pattern changes.

Repeating a reminder, watering will likely be your most critical task until it rains.

Now is the time to take stock of how your garden grew this summer. If you were not satisfied, first take look at your soil. Probably the greatest number of failures come from poor soil preparation. Hard baked soil indicates a lack of humus and fertility. The abuse of our soil is avoidable. Too often we add no humus and the soil becomes lifeless, hard to work, poorly drained and generally non productive. In such instances, it might be wise to avoid a fall crop, and concentrate on a rebuilding program.

Where garden space is limited, and every inch must count, the small-scale miniature daffodils can bring that much wanted touch of early color. And they don't present the problems of dishevelled foliage remaining too promidaffodils of ordinary size. The foliage of most of the and quickly disappears. 




