The thing about "coach" which impressed me most, of course, was from my own experience with my son. We discovered Jim had a bone disease when he was in second grade. He was on a brace with a built up shoe for two years and this severely hampered his running ability. When he made the Little League team he had to hit a double in order to get to first base safe.

Well, to make a long story short, when he was in junior high school, he won several medals in the 100-yard dash and came in second in the

Over 120 persons were on hand Thursday night at the Civic Center for the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet and to hear former Ozonan Gary Sutton speak. Sutton, speaking without notes, entertained the crowd immensely with his witticisms on bringing a losing football team into the winning column and reminiscing about his own school days and football playing in Ozona.

The former Lion football standout was as effective behind the podium as he was on the football field and the audience responded in kind. Many Ozona football fans were moved when Sutton gave a glowing tribute to his ex-track coach and junior high football coach, Chick Womack, now junior high school principal. Sutton spoke the better part of an hour and received a standing ovation. He was presented with an Ozona History Book by chamber officials.

A Valentine theme was

used in decorations which were done by chamber director Beth Boyd and manager Maxine Brown. The white and red arrangement of carnations on the speaker's table was donated by Maxine's Flowers. The roast beef dinner with trimmings was catered by the Circle Bar restaurant staff.

Outgoing president John Parks started the after-dinner activities with the drawing for the hunting knife. Hunters registered during the season in Ozona businesses and the drawing is always held during the annual banquet. Winner this year was David L. Harmon of Spring. Pam Young assisted Parks in the drawing for three door prizes donated by the chamber. Winners were Orvil Maney, Earline Jones and Kitty Montgomery.

Bob Sikes services in Brownwood

To separate sheriff and tax office

Election Called By Court Monday

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday in regular monthly meeting with a full agenda. The meeting was highlighted by a decision to hold an election to separate the offices of Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector.

Sheriff Billy Mills and Chief Deputy Tax Assessor-Collector Tommy Stokes appeared before the court to make the request to separate the two and create another elected office for the tax assessor. Sheriff Mills said that most counties had already made the change. It was also mentioned that new state laws were going to require certification for all tax assessor-collectors in the future and Sheriff Mills did not feel he could take time from the law enforcement department to attend schools and put in the required hours for certification.

County Judge Johnny Jones said he had been in touch with the Secretary of State and had found that the correct procedure to separate the two offices was the holding of an election, and if approved by the voters, the court would appoint a tax assessor to serve until the general election in 1980. The court approved an election on the matter for April 7, subject to approval from the Secretary of State. After the motion was made and seconded, some discussion was held on the legality of holding two elections on the same day. The school board election has already been set for that date.

Following this discussion, Stokes asked that his office deputies receive salary raises to equal or compare with salaries or salary paid to other office help in the county offices. This brought requests from other department heads to raise salaries for their help and Dick Kirby, county auditor, and Leta Powell, county clerk, requested another employee in their respective offices.

A lengthy discussion was held on salaries for office help. All salaries were raised 6% January 1, 1979, including salaries of elected officials and department heads.

Most members of the court seemed reluctant to give raises again this month, but finally decided to equalize salaries for office help. After discussing merit raises, longevity raises and annual cost of living raises, they came up with a six month scale, followed by a larger salary for those on the job for two years or more and then raises would be left up to department heads. The action amounted to substantial raises for all county office employees.

The court did not approve another deputy for the clerk's office at this time, explaining that a new deputy had been hired only last month and had not yet gone to work full time in the clerk's office. They chose to wait and see how much help would be needed in the future. Neither did they approve a new employee for County Auditor Kirby, although he said District Judge Troy Williams, under whose supervision the office operates, had indicated his approval.

Judge Jones read a resolution commending Miss Leta Powell for fifty years service in the county clerk's office and announced that county officials would host an open house at the clerk's office Friday in Miss

Powell's honor. The public is invited to attend.

Judge Al Fields asked the court for equipment to improve communications between the JP car radio and other law enforcement autos. This was approved by the court. Fields also informed the court the county now has three highway patrolmen and his work load has increased, creating a need for more personnel in his office. He said he expected it would be necessary to hire more help before the increased work the summer months would bring, and asked the court to take the matter into consideration.

Janie Parker of San Angelo appeared before the court on behalf of the Child Welfare Board and presented the new contract between the county and state, which was signed by the judge and four commissioners. According to law, the county is responsible for abused, neglected and abandoned children, although most of the financial burden falls on the state. The action created the necessity to appoint a county Child Welfare Board. Ms. Parker suggested appointment of nine citizens as board members. After an organizational meeting, there will be meetings of the board only when necessity dictates.

John Justice and George Ybarra met with the court on behalf of the many baseball teams to urge that grass be planted and work be done on practice fields. Some discussion was held on grass for the baseball field. Commissioner B.W. Stuart was appointed to look into the matter during the January meeting. He said he had discussed the work to be done with county employees, but weather had not permitted work on improvements to get underway. He reported everything had been set up to begin the work when the weather allows. Some discussion was held on how to grow grass on the field during the cold winter months and during the season when the field is used almost nightly. The problem was not solved, but Stuart assured the men the field would be ready when they were ready to play ball.

to make up the grievance committee. The committee, which investigates complaints about salaries from elected officials, is made up of five citizens, the county judge, sheriff, clerk, treasurer and the district attorney. Names drawn from the jury list were Clyde Bailey, Pete Ybarra, H.L. Mears, Bernice Phillips and Tommy Sessom. The judge will contact these people and ask them to serve.

Judge Jones read a letter from the administrator of the hospital in Sonora asking for financial assistance for indigent maternity cases from Crockett County, explaining since maternity cases were not cared for at Crockett County Hospital, the Sutton County facility was bearing the responsibility. No action was taken.

Robert West of Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. went over the proposed 1979 hunting regulations. About the only change was the ruling out of electronic devices to attract game in all regulatory counties. He said the final proposals will be brought to the court after hearings in March.

Bids were opened for three cars for the sheriff's department, a motor grader, a flat-wheel roller and a pick-up. Bids were accepted on the vehicles, but after lengthy discussion, the court delayed decision on the other equipment and decided to meet Friday at 1:00 p.m. to make a final decision.

Bids for the pickup included \$6,340 from L-B Motors, and \$6,365 for a Dodge along with \$6,475 for a GMC from Carlisle Motors. The low bid from L-B Motors was accepted by unanimous vote.

Carlisle Motors bid \$5,300 each for two Plymouth police specials and L-B Motors bid \$5,575 on Chevrolet police specials. Again the low bid was accepted. For the sheriff's car, Carlisle's bid was \$6,400 for a Chrysler Newport police special and \$6,350 for a Chrysler Newport. The L-B bid was \$5,675 for a Chevrolet Impala. Some discussion followed about the sheriff's car. The Carlisle bid for the police special was accepted by majority vote. Commissioners Stuart, DeHoyos and Castro voted to purchase the Chrysler and Commissioner Williams and Judge Jones went on record as voting for the low bid.

Stuart, who was the Chrysler dealer here for many years, asked the Stockman reporter to make it clear he no longer had any connection with the dealership.

Lengthy discussion was held on the road department equipment and bids were compared. In view of the fact that the two pieces of equipment, a flat wheel roller and a motor grader, will cost well over \$70,000, Commissioner Stuart asked the court to delay the final decision until some investigation could be made on which pieces of equipment bid would serve the county best, regardless of the prices submitted in the bids. The court agreed to delay the decision until Friday afternoon.

Dick Kirby gave the auditor's annual report and the Ozona National Bank was approved as the county and school depository before the meeting was adjourned.

Q: I'm afraid my daughter and son-in-law will try to donate my body to science when I die, but I want to be buried in the traditional way. Can they do this over my objections? How do I make sure my wishes will be carried out?

A: No, but you can protect yourself by always asking for a written estimate showing the cost of both labor and parts necessary to fix your car. You should also ask that no repair work be done which is not included in the estimate unless first you authorize it. This agreement should be written on the estimate and a copy retained by you. Car repair complaints can be made to the Consumer Division of the Attorney General's office, P.O. Box 12548, Austin, 78711.

Q: My 14 year old son was taken into custody for a crime... will his offense be a part of his permanent record for the rest of his life?

A: The records of a juvenile are confidential. They are only open to inspection by law enforcement officers and other persons directly involved in the proceedings. Your son may ask the court to seal his record two years after a final disposition has been made. If the juvenile court is assured that your son has had no further referrals or arrests and has complied with compulsory school attendance laws, the request to seal the records may be granted. Once a juvenile court record is sealed, no public record exists.

Q: What happens to my children if my wife and I do not have a will and we die at the same time?

A: The court will appoint a guardian to take care of each child that is under 18 years of age and to administer all of their property. The Texas law sets out a list of specific relatives from which the court will appoint a guardian, depending upon which relatives are alive and able to serve. If there are no relatives, the court will use its discretion in choosing a guardian.

Q: Am I entitled to receive a written estimate on repairs when I take my car to a garage?

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STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—In the first-ever "State of the Judiciary" address, Chief Justice Joe R. Greenhill of the Texas Supreme Court pointed to the poultry sum Texans spend on their courts and called on the Legislature to grease the skids of the judicial system.

Greenhill reminded legislators that only one-third of one percent of the state's total budget is spent on the judicial system. He predicted that by 1980 the nine-judge Court of Criminal Appeals would face a caseload of 6,000 with each case taking from a year to 18 months to rule on.

To kick the administration of justice into high gear, Greenhill proposed intermediate courts to handle cases now brought directly to the Court of Criminal Appeals. And, to prevent a judicial traffic-jam, the chief justice asked that judges be allowed to speed up the jury selection in criminal matters as they do now in civil cases.

Greenhill's suggestion that civil appellate courts with light dockets be allowed to handle criminal cases did not sit well with Court of Criminal Appeals Presiding Judge John Union — Greenhill's counterpart on Texas' top criminal court.

Union agreed the criminal appeals system faced an enormous strain but thought intermediate courts would offer the most effective relief.

Interestingly enough, the first bill signed by Gov. Bill Clements since taking office Jan. 16 approved expansion of civil appeals courts in Dallas and Houston.

Primary Pushed
The governor answered: "I'm not much of a referee." when asked about skirmishes that might occur over a new presidential primary law for Texas. "I'm more of a participant," Clements explained.

Sticking to his word, the governor said he would veto legislation moving the date of the election primary from May to late summer or early fall (reducing campaign time), but Clements said he was pleased to hear Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Speaker of the House Bill Clayton were moving toward passage of a primary bill. "The people of Texas want a presidential primary. That's what's important," said Clements.

The first rattling of swords over the state budget came this week when Sen. Grant Jones of Abilene insisted the governor quit demanding a \$1 billion slash in taxes without specifying what state services he would eliminate. Clements said his budget (to come soon) would be less than the spending draft of the Legislative Budget Board. The LBB document would increase state spending by 22 percent. Clements called that amount "excessive."

In other activities, the governor created the Mayors Advisory Committee by executive order and said again he is opposed to state funding of a proposed superport off the coast of Texas. Clements does support the use of state money to get the project started.

Finally, Clements wanted no "misunderstandings" about his backing of the use of wiretaps in narcotics cases. "I'm for it," he said, with safeguards. "The people of Texas want a strenuous effort with respect to this drug problem."

Now that we have had a wonderful rain to refresh all the trees and plants, our area should come alive with many early plants and bulbs beginning to show growth.

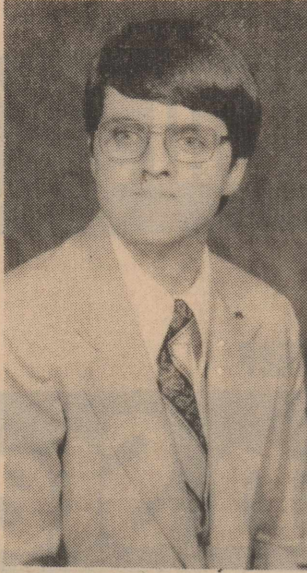
Especially you should be rewarded if you planted daffodils last fall, or old one's that provide dependable year after year color in the early spring. Wherever you use daffodils in your landscape they should be a sure success. They are hardy, dependable, tolerant of most of our soils, and capable of surviving with a surprising degree of neglect. Plant them along shrub borders, among trees, in ground cover beds, or flower beds along with pansies and other hardy bedding plants. From the semiwild types to the most elaborate hybrids, such as King Alfred, daffodils share the same simple qualities that make them the South's most popular spring-flowering bulb. Some of these are: King Alfred, the best known variety and has unusually large flowers. Carlton, with nodding yellow trumpets, is one of the early bloomers. Duke of Windsor is a choice hybrid-Little Beauty daffodils looks best in a naturalized planting or border. And there are many more varieties, so do watch for the many different places they can be used in the next few weeks. It will help with your fall planting.

Last week I mentioned the flowering quince (Chaenomeles) that signals spring for the south. They will be in bloom soon here in Ozona, and will appear as patches of color floating in space almost two weeks before the foliage pops out.

Place quince in the landscape where you can get the maximum possible effect of its spring show. It will be most effective displayed against an existing planting or architectural feature.

There are two species prevalent in the south, each with a different growth habit. Japanese quince is a large (6 to 8 feet tall) upright, rounded plant. It can be used in a narrow border garden with only a ground cover as a companion plant. It should not be sheared for this destroys the attractive branching. As a single specimen it seems most at home with a picket fence or simple wood siding. The lesser flowering quince (Chaenomeles japonica) can be planted closer together (3 to 4 ft. tall) for it displays a prostrate growth habit and informal character. It makes a fine deciduous ground cover in front of an evergreen hedge, screen planting, for small courtyards, allow to drape over a railroad tie or stacked stone wall.

Quince does best in average soil in full sun or partial shade, however, flower production is more profuse in a sunny location.

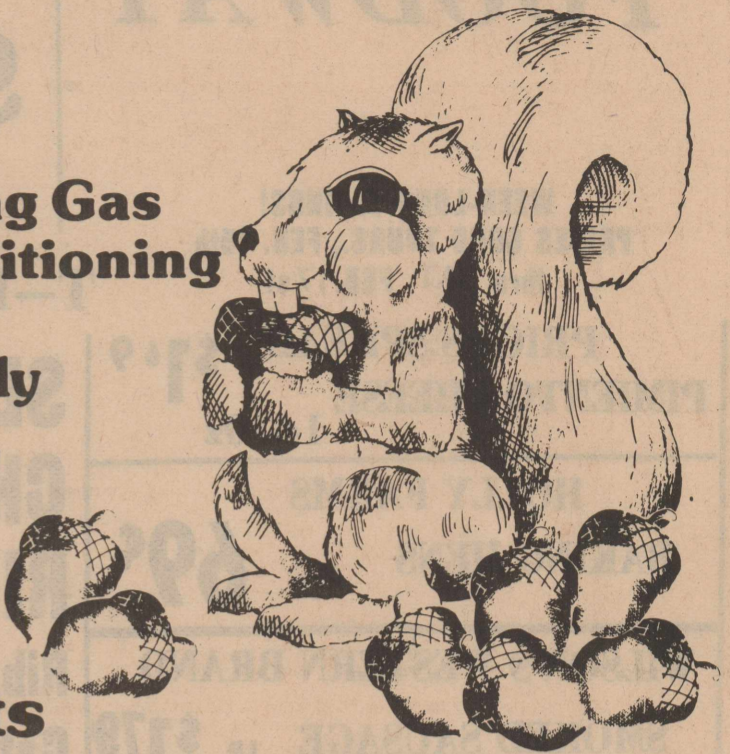

Ranchers urged continue Lionettes Operation Dead Lamb win over McCamey

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association has asked for your continued help with "Operation Dead Lamb" according to Billy Reager, Crockett County Agent. To date this year, on lamb has been turned in to the Ranch Feed and Supply. The dead lamb or kid you find in your pastures may well hold the answer to the eagle depredation controversy that is now going on, according to Norman Rousselet, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association. We recognize that the lack of information as to the actual depredating habits of the golden eagle is certainly hurting the sheep and goat producers at this time. The only way this information can be obtained is for an authority to have the opportunity to post mortem these baby animals and actually determine what caused their death.

The TS&GRA is proposing that all sheep and goat producers in the State of Texas who have suspected eagle kills to put these animals in plastic bags and be taken to San Angelo Research and Extension Center for Dr. O'Gara to post to determine cause of death. Dr. O'Gara of the University of Montana is a recognized authority on eagle depredation.

Bill Black, chairman of the Livestock and Range

Committee of the Crockett County Program Building committee is taking the lead in Crockett County. Ranchmen finding lambs, and/or kids suspected killed by eagles, are asked to put them in plastic trash bags and leave at the Ozona Wool and Mohair Company or the Ranch Feed and Supply. The Livestock and Range Committee will pick them up and see that they get to the San Angelo Center for identification.

The committee realizes that some ranchmen have reservations about turning in the dead lambs and kids, but your sheep and goat raisers association is supporting the program in order to protect the sheep and goat producers.

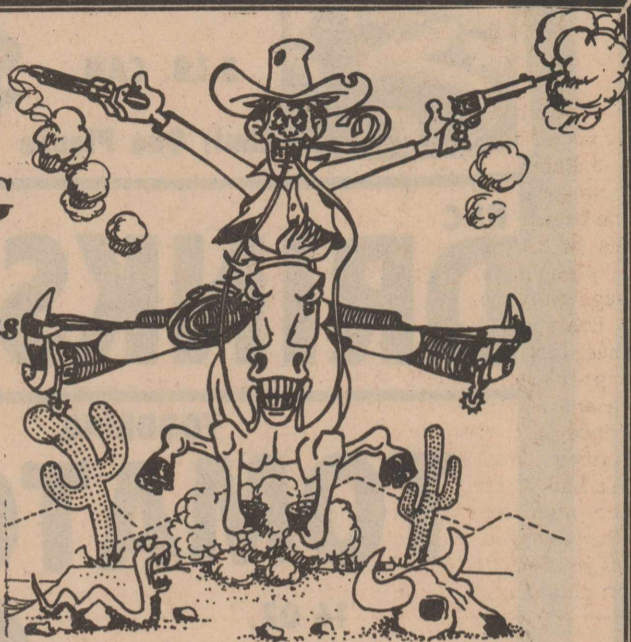

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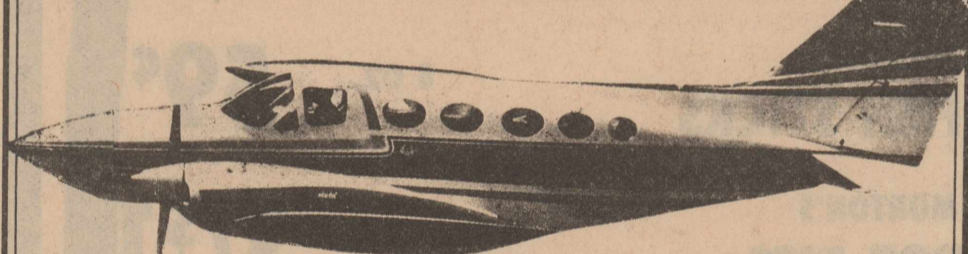

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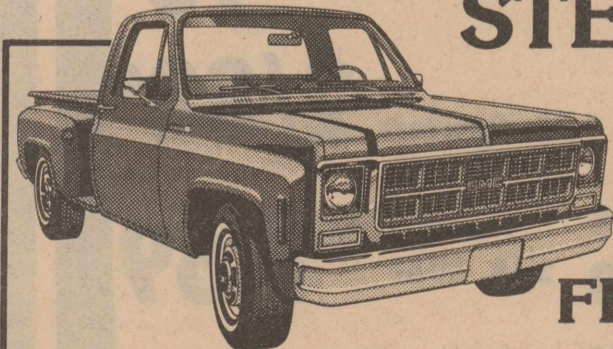

NOTICE TO RESIDENTS OF CROCKETT HEIGHTS

The Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1 has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied in the Crockett Heights area by the system exceeds the maximum constituent level for Fluoride established by the Department's "Drinking Water Standards" which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (U.S.). The limit for this area has been set at 1.6 milligrams of Fluoride per liter of water. The samples of water from the system in the Crockett Heights area contained 2.1 milligrams of Fluoride per liter. There is no immediate health hazard for drinking water containing Fluoride at this level.

The excessive Fluoride content of the water may cause mottling of the teeth in children under 14 years of age.

All dentists in this area are aware of the Fluoride level.

The Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1 has applied to the Texas Department of Health for either a variance or exemption from the Fluoride requirement while they search for alternate sources of supply and investigate available treatment techniques to lower the Fluoride to allowable levels. 50-3tc

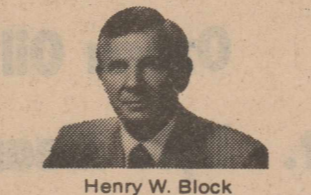

Dick Webster, who served as vice president last year, took over the duties of president. Elected by vote of the membership to vice president was Bill Clegg, who will automatically serve as president next year.


