In view of current policies, it shouldn't be in the least difficult to select a suitable slogan.

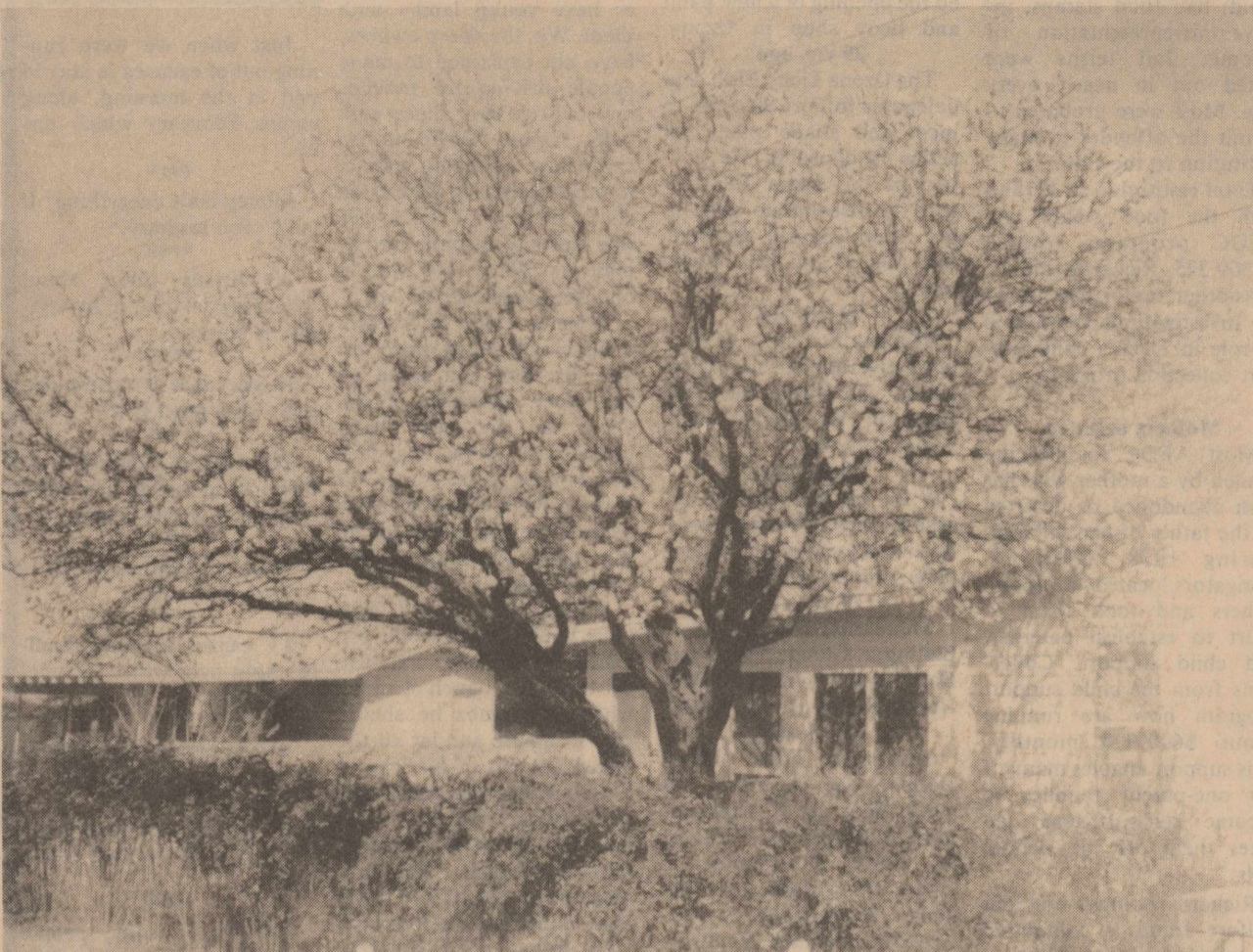

Diabetes & blood pressure clinic set

A free diabetic and blood pressure clinic will be in Ozona, Thursday, March 8, 3:00 to 7:00 p.m. at the Ozona Community Center. Both adults and children will be checked.

Diabetes affects 4 to 5% of the population. One-half of the people with diabetes do not know that they have this disorder. Diabetes is a condition in which the body does not have enough of the hormone insulin produced by the pancreas. Most of the time diabetes is controlled with the diet.

Some symptoms for diabetes are overweight, thirst, increased appetite, frequent urination, general weakness and decreased resistance to infection. These are only a few of the symptoms. People can also have diabetes without any symptoms.

About one in ten of all adults have high blood pressure. High blood pressure causes heart attacks and strokes. You can have it and not know it. You can feel healthy, look terrific, and have it, because it hits relaxed people and tense people.

Treatment reduces the danger. In most people, high blood pressure can be lowered and kept under control with continuing treatment.

Services for Ms. Garza

Funeral services for Maria Aguilar Garza, 78, were held Wednesday afternoon at 4:00 p.m. in Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church, with burial in Lima Cemetery under the direction of Sheppard Funeral Home.

Mrs. Garza died at 4:25 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 21, in Crockett County Hospital.

She was born Jan. 19, 1901 in Mexico. She was married to Guadalupe Garza, September 28, 1921, in Ozona.

Survivors include her husband; six daughters, Estella Riveria of Colorado City; Adelfa Duran, Bertha Garza, and Casiana Fierro, all of Ozona; Eudulia Vargas of Dallas; Rosa Ramirez of Tampa; two sons Fermin Garza and Guadalupe Garza, Jr. both of Ozona, 43 grandchildren and 34 great grandchildren.

Garcia sentenced in Callazo murder

John Chappa Garcia of San Antonio, pleaded guilty in 112th District Court here last week and was assessed a term of life in prison by Judge Marvin Blackburn of Junction. Garcia was charged in connection with the kidnap-slaying of Abel Tijerina Callazo, also of San Antonio, early in January of this year.

Garcia waived a jury trial and entered the guilty plea before the judge, after making a statement. He will be transported to Huntsville to begin serving his prison term.

Callazo, 25, was abducted January 14, when he returned to his car after making a purchase at a convenience store in San Antonio. Three men took Callazo, along with his car and drove to a point near Lancaster Hill in Crockett County. Callazo was apparently killed early Monday morning and his body thrown over the stone

ledge at the top of the hill.

Garcia and the other two suspects were surprised by police in Odessa, as they were attempting to burglarize a discount store. Garcia was taken into custody but the other two suspects escaped. One is still at large, and the other, Guadalupe Castro, is being held on a murder charge in San Antonio. Castro, 21, formerly of the Job Corps in San Marcos,

has been charged here with capital murder in the Callazo case, according to Assistant District Attorney Bill Mason. Mason says he will ask for the death penalty. A trail date will be set as soon as Castro is turned over to Crockett County authorities by San Antonio officials.

Garcia made a statement to Odessa authorities which led to discovery of the body.

ECA class scheduled

Another series of Emergency Care Attendant classes has been scheduled for Ozona. Classes will start April 2, and will be held Monday and Tuesday evenings from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. Classes will run through April 30, which will also be the test date.

Testing will be conducted by Texas Department of Health representatives. Those passing the test will be state registered ECAs.

Teaching instructors will be Brian Henry and Dub O' Bryant with lectures by Dr. R.N. Owensby and Dr. Don Carlisle.

The classes, which will be held at the hospital will cover emergency childbirth, bandaging and splinting, traction splinting, vital signs and CPR. Classes will be limited to 20 students.

Deadline for signing up for the class is March 31. For information call 392-3578

All interested persons are urged to attend this very important meeting. Without more participation, the roping club could become inactive.

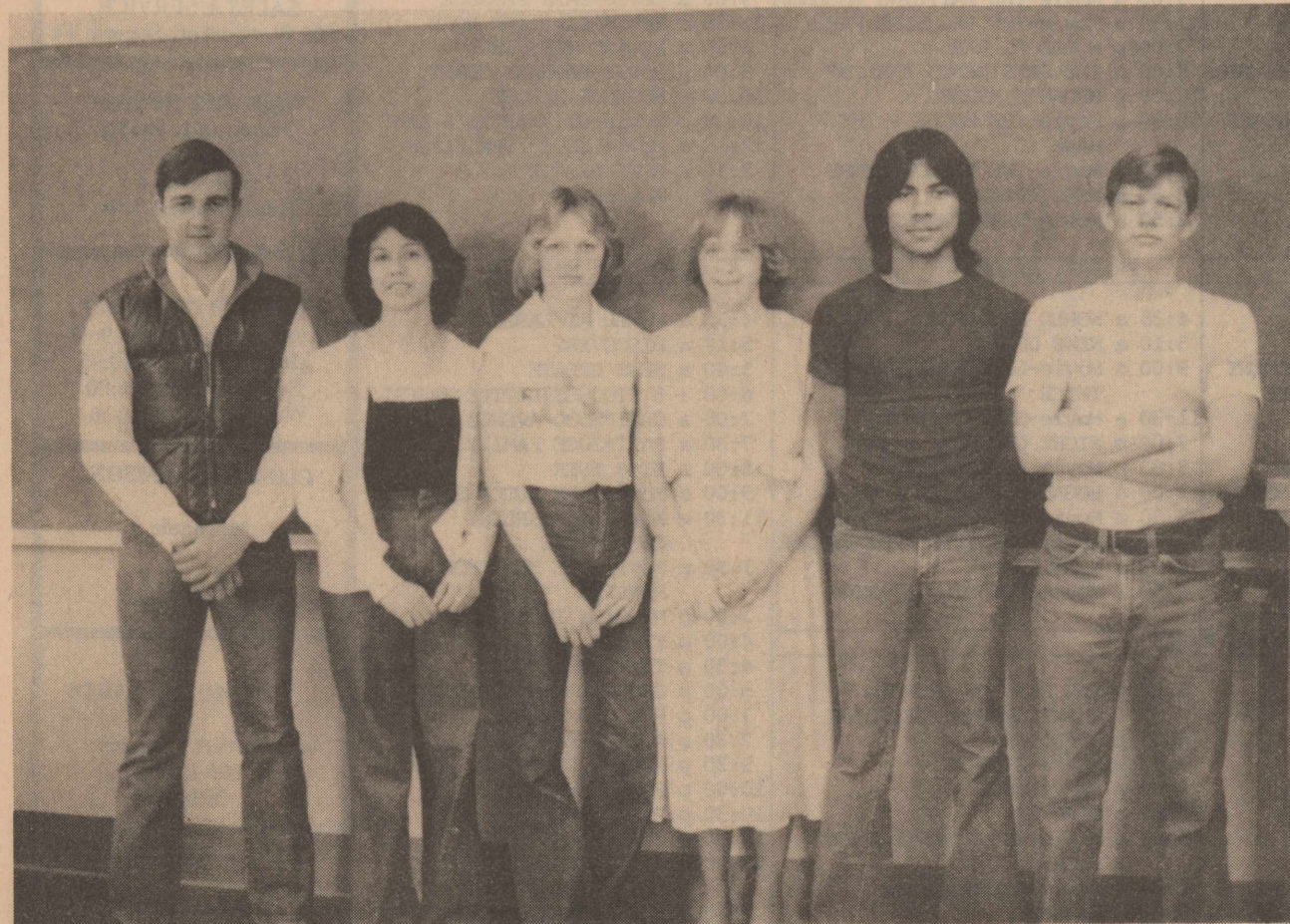
Methodists schedule meetings

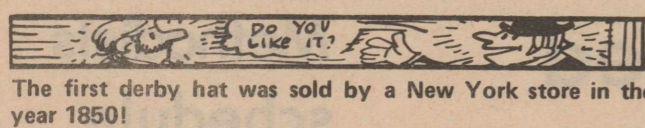
Q: If an emergency vehicle approaches a railroad crossing that is blocked by a slow-moving freight train, must the vehicle wait until the train passes or is there a law requiring the train to be broken to allow the emergency vehicle to proceed?

A: There is no statutory law in this state requiring trains to yield right-of-way to emergency vehicles. Ordinary vehicles and street cars are required to yield, but due to the impracticality and sometimes impossibility of trains to stop and/or decouple, neither state or local authorities have required them to do so.

Q: Recently I sold a TV set I had at a garage sale. It was operating perfectly when I sold it. Three days later the person who bought it from me brought it back claiming it wouldn't work and wanted his money back. Am I obligated to take the set back and return his money?

A: No, assuming that he can prove no fraud or misrepresentation on your part. If you did not expressly warrant or guarantee the performance of the set, no warranty will be implied.

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Welfare cheaters Finding easy street Can be rocky road

Nearly 2,000 Texans who tried to cheat their way into the state's food stamp program in 1978 found themselves talking to a district attorney instead, courtesy of the Investigations Division of the Texas Department of Human Resources (DHR).

In a year-end report to DHR Commissioner Jerome Chapman, the director of the DHR Investigations Division, Ed Richards, said his 130 investigators presented 1,973 food stamp fraud cases in 1978 to local prosecutors. About 95 percent of the cases prosecuted resulted in convictions.

Richards said the amount of money involved in cases presented for prosecution in the food stamp program in 1978 totaled \$728,379. Working with prosecutors and judges, DHR investigators arranged for \$459,434 to be returned to the state as restitution from those illegally attempting to participate in the program.

Income falsified Most widely attempted ruse for falsely obtaining food stamps is failure to report true income. Next most common attempt is to falsify the number of persons in a household.

Sentences ranged from 30 days to seven years confinement. Most of the terms were probated to permit the offenders to make restitution to the program.

Richards said most would-be cheaters are tripped up in the eligibility process by suspicions of DHR eligibility workers or by caseworkers who routinely recertify the eligibility of a household. The workers notify the Investigations Division of their suspicions, and the case is investigated.

Neighbors or relatives frequently volunteer information about persons attempting welfare fraud, Richards said.

Persons go to great lengths to attempt to cheat the system, according to Richards. DHR investigators made a case against a Houston woman who was maintaining two nonexistent families, each with 14 children. She claimed she was serving as authorized representative for these two families, after giving caseworkers bogus names, addresses, and telephone numbers.

The Texas Legislature has traditionally allowed municipalities wide discretion in making and enforcing parking regulations, but has said that cars should not be parked on the roadside if practical to park off the road. Local police officers have authority to remove any vehicles violating either the state or local laws.

Two years and fine A Dallas man who owned a large home, a Cadillac, and two late-model Oldsmobiles fraudulently obtained food stamps for himself and his family. He drew a two-year probated term, a fine, and was ordered to repay the amount of the stamps he had obtained.

Another program in which a substantial amount of fraud is attempted is Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC). This is DHR's only cash grant pro-

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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor: A few words to the oil and gas producers of Crockett County from the sheep raisers in the county.

We find all oil and gas men that drive pickup, cars or any kind of truck on the ranches in Crockett County really want to cooperate with the owner of the land and the stock. They, of course, know nothing about driving thru sheep. During the months of Jan., Feb., March and April all sheep are either lambing or have young lambs with them.

We, the sheep owners, have not explained to many people driving on ranches how to drive thru sheep with baby lambs. Sheep unlike cattle have a flocking instinct in other words, to follow the sheep in front of them. For this reason you could herd as many as 1200 to 1500 head in one flock with one herder.

When a vehicle drives thru a bunch of sheep they run one direction and some go the other direction. If the sheep do not have baby lambs with them, this does not do very much harm, but if the drivers will stop just a second the sheep will all go the same direction in the same bunch.

Driving thru sheep with baby lambs is where our big loss is. If a driver of a vehicle drives up to a bunch of sheep with baby lambs he should stop a minute and let all the sheep get out of his way in the same direction, then each ewe will take her lamb with her. But if the driver goes thru the bunch, they run, some ewes run off and leave their lamb and he follows a ewe, going in a different direction from the way his mother went. His mother will follow the sheep ahead of her and not come back. Should the ewe come back to hunt her lamb as some do, the baby lamb has probably followed a sheep off in a different direction. The lamb then of course will die. A driver will be surprised how quickly ewes can find their lambs and get together and out of his way if he will just stop one minute when he drives up to a bunch of sheep grazing along the ranch road.

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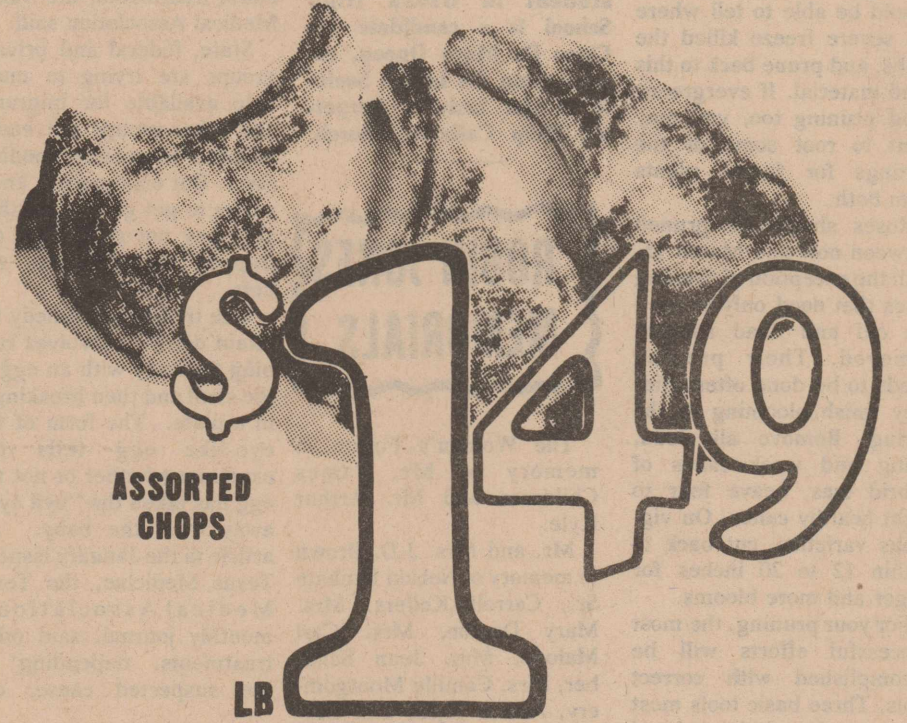
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Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Though the past weeks have been dreary and unpleasant most of the time, in anticipation of spring, we should all be planning increased gardening activity.

The importance for dormant pruning is now before new growth begins. You should be able to tell where the severe freeze killed the limbs, and prune back to this dead material. If evergreens need pruning too, you may want to root some of the cuttings for future plants from both.

Roses should be pruned between now and March 15, with the exception of running roses that need only to have the old and dead runners removed. Their pruning needs to be done often after they finish blooming in the spring. Remove all dead, dying and weak canes of hybrid teas. Leave four to eight healthy canes. On vigorous varieties, cut back to within 12 to 20 inches for larger and more blooms.

For your pruning, the most successful efforts will be accomplished with correct tools. Three basic tools most often used include a hand clipper, a lopper, and a pruning saw.

For pruning small twigs and branches, use the hand clippers. For pruning branches and stems one to two inches in diameter, use a lopper. For still larger plant material, a pruning saw is the most efficient cutting tool. Hedge clipping shears are not included here, since shearing to shape a hedge is not considered pruning.

The Japanese Yew, a plant of many uses is one that offers so much, but used very little in our area. It is relatively drought tolerant and is bothered by few garden pests. Another bonus is its slow growth rate, so a hedge of Japanese Yew seldom requires pruning. This can be done by using it for cut plant material for green arrangements any time of the year. It will prove to be a favorite if you try it. It does well in sun or partial shade.

Plant in early spring, allowing time for good root system development before winter.

Ghosts, trains, glasses terrorize some mothers

In an environment where bad sanitation, over-crowded housing and poor nutrition threaten their babies' health, some Mexican-American mothers worry more about loud trains, people with glasses and ghosts may be a primary cause of some illnesses.

Belief in folk medicine usually is not a sign of stupidity. People often turn to folk medicine because of tradition, lack of knowledge about treatments, the Texas Medical Association said. State, federal and private groups are trying to make help available for migrants and other groups not easily exposed to modern medical care. But once people know where to get good care, they still may not go if they are trapped by traditional beliefs.

One traditional remedy for infant diarrhea involves rubbing the baby with an egg in the shell and then breaking it in a plate. The form of the eye-like egg tells the examiner whether or not the egg has taken the "evil eye" away from the baby. An article in the January issue of Texas Medicine, the Texas Medical Association's monthly journal, said other treatments, depending on the suspected cause, can

include pulling a baby's hair or giving cinnamon tea.

None of these treatments may be especially harmful but they can delay proper medical help, said Carmen Acosta Johnson, Ph. D., the article's author. Language and cultural barriers also can keep well-meaning mothers away from physicians and clinics, so mothers rely on traditional folk remedies, said Johnson, an assistant professor at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

The article, which dealt with attitudes about infant diarrhea, said Mexican folk medicine labelled four major causes for the disease. One is "susto," a magical fright or shock that scares the baby's soul out of its body. Ghosts or loud trains are in this category. One remedy involves prayers, blowing rain water on the baby to cleanse it, slapping the baby hard (to re-enact the original shock) and calling three times (a magical number) for the soul to come back.

A baby may get diarrhea from "mal de ojo," the evil eye, when a stranger, enemy, someone with glasses or a bad eye, or someone with "very strong blood" looks at the baby.

Another cause involves suspected imbalance in the body's hot and cold mechanisms can be balanced by giving "hot" foods such as milk or cinnamon tea in many cases.

Hair-pulling or pressing on the baby's palate is the cure for the fourth cause, which occurs supposedly when the soft part of the baby's skull presses down, according to folk medicine beliefs.

Of course none of these causes or cures are reliable. But Johnson urged physicians to keep the ideas in mind while helping mothers accept better treatment method.

Proper treatment is very important because diarrhea can rob a baby's body of vital fluids if it continues too long. A physician can suggest treatment to replace fluids and control diarrhea.

Store oily rags in airtight metal cans--discard when finished with them.

Debra Says

Teenagers need plenty of nutritious food to meet the needs caused by their body's large growth spurt.

The teenage boy needs more calories than a girl, so he can eat considerably more food than she at this age.

Because a girl needs fewer calories, she must choose food more carefully to meet nutrient needs.

Many teenagers have other problems meeting nutritional needs. Some parents are unaware of the food habits of their teenagers.

The development of healthy attitudes toward food is an important responsibility of parents. Don't underestimate the influence of fathers', as well as mothers', examples.

Poorly chosen snacks and those that interfere with mealtime appetites present a problem.

This is a particular problem for the teenage girl since she needs to choose nutrients wisely to avoid too many calories.

Parents can help teenagers recognize the difference between nutritious and "empty calorie" snacks and help them develop sound snack-consuming habits to improve their diets.

The kinds, time of day and amounts of food they consume as snacks can be critical to teenagers.

Skipping breakfast can create problems in meeting the teenager's need for food. Families who eat breakfast together more likely to maintain breakfast habits.

Exercise is important for teenagers in maintaining healthy appetites and using excess calories.

Time is a problem for many teenagers who are active in school affairs or who may have jobs.

These demands make it hard to eat with the family

and can lead to informal snacking rather than eating a nutritious meal.

Low income of many families is also a problem for many teenagers.

Peer pressure influences teenagers' eating habits and their physical growth.

The concern for personal appearance often provides the teenage boy the motivation needed for eating the large amounts of food adequate for growth and filling out his form.

However, teenage girls want to fit the expected figure pattern of slenderness to be beautiful.

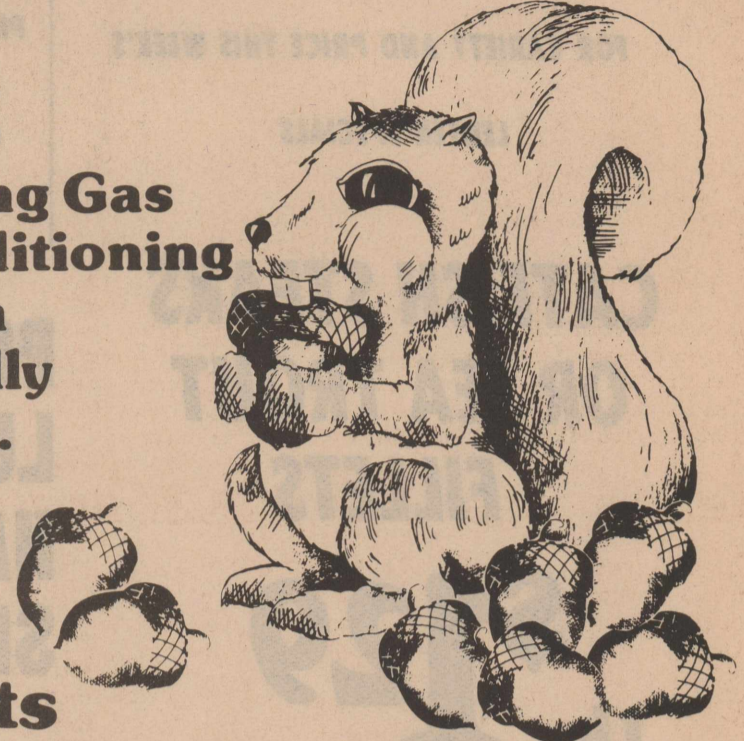
Many feel they must severely limit caloric intake, which can also keep them from eating adequate amounts of food.

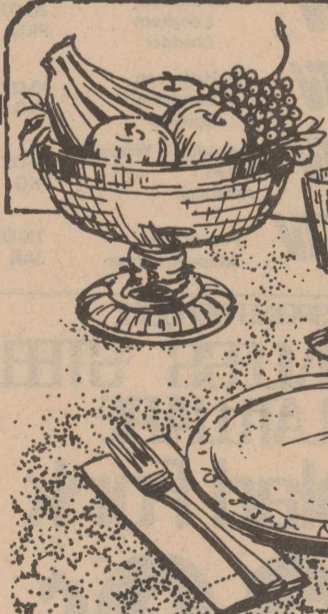

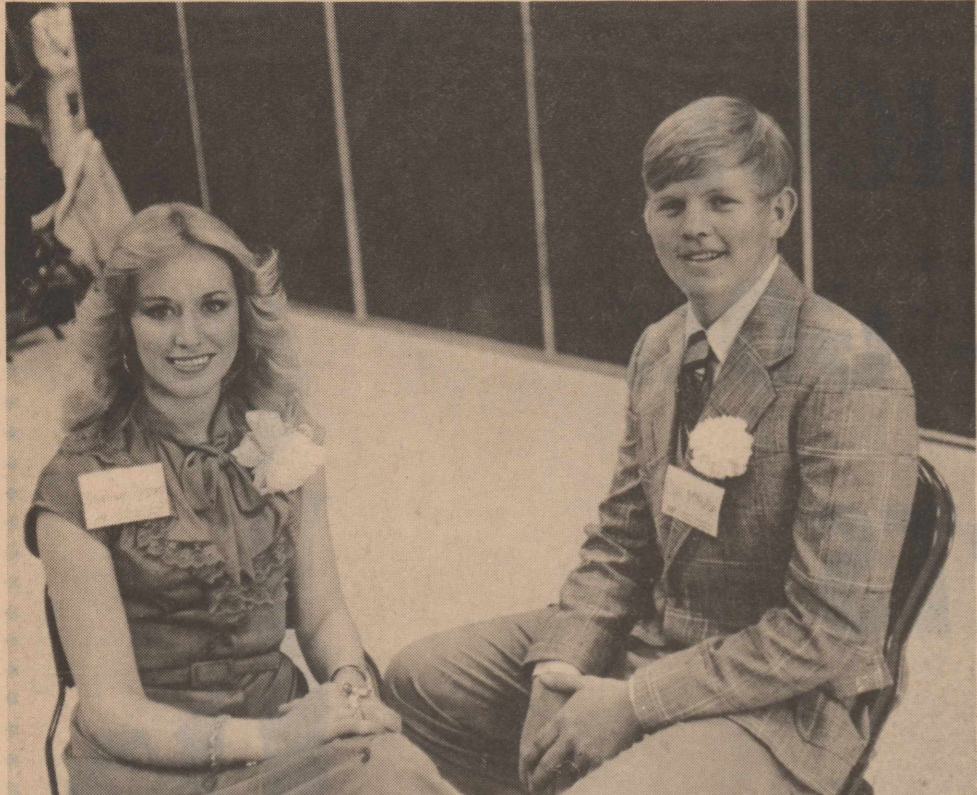

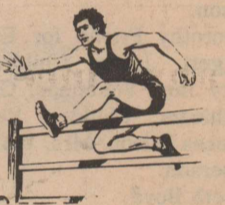

Plan home business center

Plan a home business center as the first step towards a better family records system.

The most important part of such a center is a specific place of convenient access, a family resource management specialist, Lillian Chenoweth, says.

In other words, boxes in the attic or garage really do not qualify.

Having a specific spot helps to insure that receipts, cancelled checks, forms or bills will find their way to the appropriate place, the specialist points out.

Elaborate equipment is really unnecessary in establishing a home business center, she continues.

Of first importance is a filing cabinet.

Its function is even more important than a desk or lamp or calculator--add these items later.

In order for the filing cabinet to help, a usable filing system is essential.

Avoid filing everything under the heading of "money" or "documents" or "miscellaneous," the specialist recommends.

Also, avoid the other extreme of separating categories for every item--such as one for Social Security, one for employment records, and one for gas bills.

Try to develop more workable categories. For example, some categories may contain tax-deductible items--such as health expenses, contributions, or interest payments.

Other categories may include non-deductible items such as food, housing expenses, clothing and transportation costs.

Work at developing some filing system with meaningful categories appropriate for individual needs, Mrs. Chenoweth advises.

Time invested toward effective financial records is well spent.

NOTICE TO RESIDENTS OF CROCKETT HEIGHTS

The Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1 has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied in the Crockett Heights area by the system exceeds the maximum constituent level for Fluoride established by the Department's "Drinking Water Standards" which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (U.S.).

The limit for this area has been set at 1.6 milligrams of Fluoride per liter of water. The samples of water from the system in the Crockett Heights area contained 2.1 milligrams of Fluoride per liter. There is no immediate health hazard for drinking water containing Fluoride at this level.

The excessive Fluoride content of the water may cause mottling of the teeth in children under 14 years of age.

All dentists in this area are aware of the Fluoride level.

The Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1 has applied to the Texas Department of Health for either a variance or exemption from the Fluoride requirement while they search for alternate sources of supply and investigate available treatment techniques to lower the Fluoride to allowable levels. 50-3tc

Veterans use fewer VA loans

Veterans used fewer Veterans Administration housing loans during 1978 than during 1977, but during the past three years housing valued at \$38 billion has been bought by veterans under the loan guaranty program, Ted W. Myatt, Director at the VA Regional Office in Houston, reported today.

Since 1965, housing bought by Vietnam veterans under the VA program has totalled about \$47 billion, Myatt said. This younger group of veterans has bought 1.8 million houses.

Housing guaranteed by VA during the past three years exceeds by nearly \$10 billion the assistance provided veterans during the entire decade of the 1960s. According to Myatt data the VA has received indicates nationwide housing starts rose slightly during the third quarter to an annual rate of 2.07 million units. VA housing starts have shown the same general pattern as nationwide data.

On a seasonally adjusted annual basis, VA starts reached 135,000 in October.

This was the largest annual rate recorded since April. This means that the total VA housing starts for 1978 should be only slightly lower than 1977, which was the highest total in 21 years. Veterans interested in home buying through the VA loan guaranty program should contact their nearest VA regional office, veterans service organization or veterans assistance center, Myatt said.

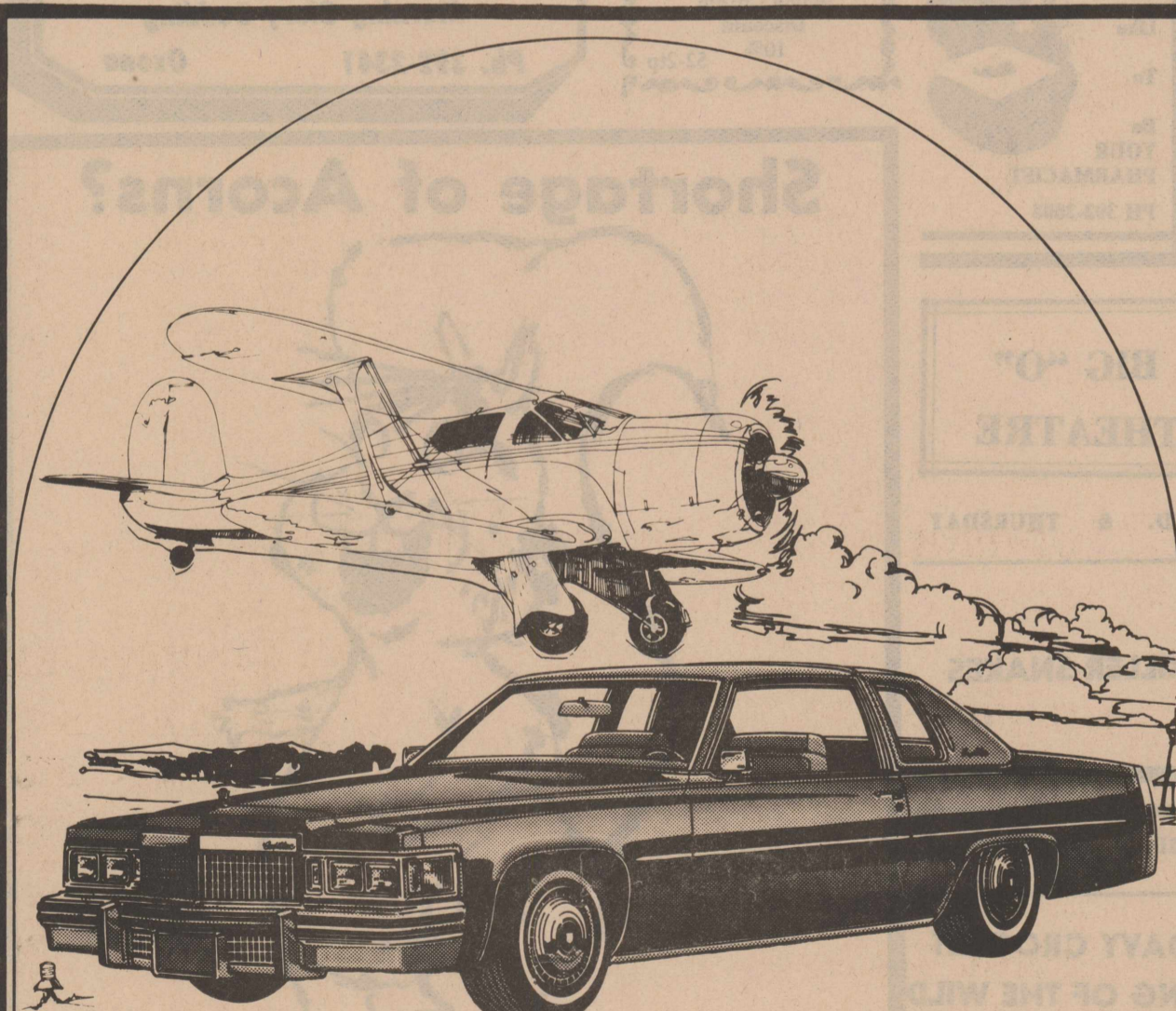

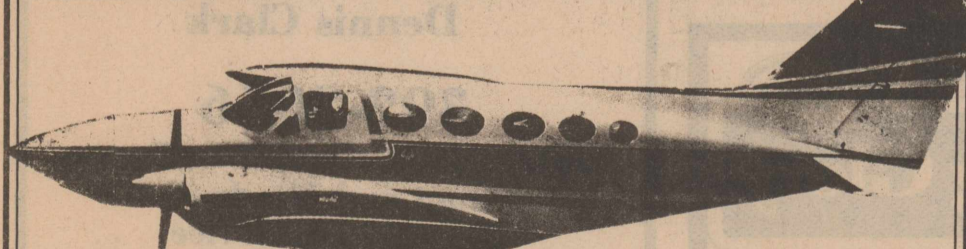
