Approve raises, name board members, set holidays-

Commissioners Court in first meeting

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday in the first meeting of the new year and approved a big fifteen-percent salary increase across the board for all county employees, including elected officials and appointed officials, with the exception of the four county commissioners, who declined the raise. They also set holidays for 1980, and appointed or re-appointed members to the various county boards, along with the grievance committee.

Reports were received from the heads of the various county departments, with Von Parker bringing the road department report as the first order of business. The court approved the purchase of paving rock at \$6 per yard from Portable Aggregate. They also voted to replace the stop light at Santa Rosa and Monterrey with 4-way stop signs.

Dudley McCary reported work on the FFA and 4-H barns completed and suggested there be no more

circuses or carnivals at the rodeo grounds, as the area was now too small to accommodate them.

The court approved the transporting of prisoners in the county jail to the hospital when medical care is necessary.

An air compressor for the fire station was discussed. The court voted that all purchases by the fire department over the amount of \$200 must be approved by the court.

Edwin Kirklen appeared to give the hospital report. He

reported the hospital board did not meet this month. He discussed the possibilities of delivering babies and surgery at the hospital. After a meeting with staff physicians he said he would report what equipment would be necessary.

Kirklen brought up proposals for computerizing the hospital, a new telephone system and new communication system for the ambulances, plus raises for hospital employee's.

The court disapproved raises, but asked Kirklen to

present his other proposals to the hospital board before bringing them to the court.

The 1980 salary schedule was presented by County Auditor Dick Kirby and approved by the court, effective for the January pay period.

The 1980 holidays were scheduled as follows: Easter, April 7; Memorial Day, May 30; July 4; Labor Day, Sept. 1; Veterans Day, Nov. 7; Thanksgiving, Nov. 27-28; Christmas, Dec. 24-26; New Year's Day, Jan. 1-2.

Re-appointed to the hospi-

tal board were Blas Vargas and Gene Lilly. Charles Huffman was appointed to replace Gary Vannoy. Remaining members are Dennis Clark, Chester Wilson and Bekie Diaz.

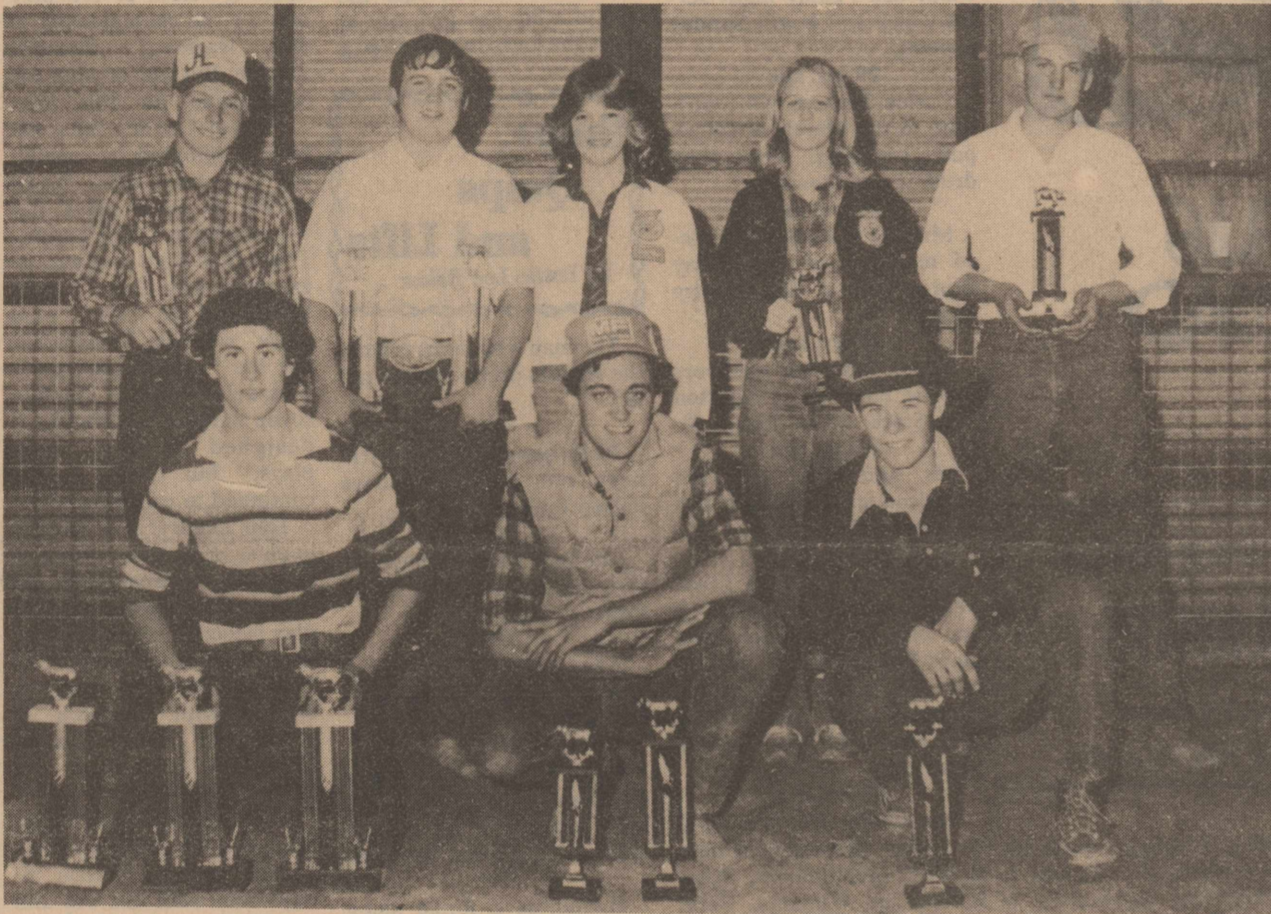
The court voted to re-appoint all members of other county boards.

The grievance committee for the year was appointed. Judge Johnny Jones heads up the committee with Sheriff Billy Mills. Other members include Tom Stokes, David Weant and Dixon Mahon. Citizen members ap-

pointed were Jane Black, Julie Watson, Earl Acton and Antonia Sanchez.

Before adjourning the commissioners discussed areas of the jail which need correcting and the new IBM copier which is being installed in the clerk's office this week.

School board sets election

In a meeting of the Crockett County School Board last week, the board called an election for three places on the school board of trustees. The election will be held Saturday, April 5, and all voters will cast ballots at the courthouse. Steve Kenley will be the presiding officer.

Board members whose terms expire are Sonny Henderson, Gene Perry and R.J. Everett. The deadline for filing for a place on the ballot is March 5, and all must file with County Judge Johnny Jones.

In other business, the board voted to purchase new band uniforms for the Ozona High School Band. The purchase will include uniforms for drum major and twirlers as well. The uniforms will be delivered in early August in time for the fall football season.

The board also approved payment for December to J.W. Cooper Construction Co. of Odessa, for work on the new primary school. In the progress report on construction a finish date of August 1, was projected.

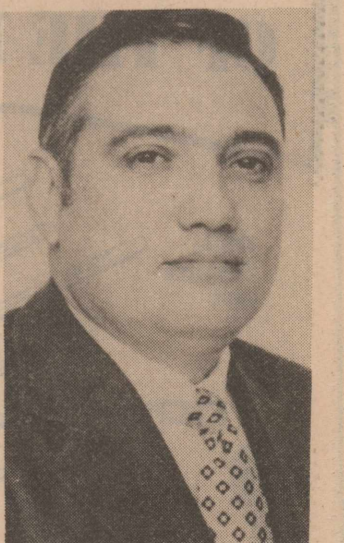

AFGHANISTAN INVASION: THE WAKING OF A PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The President's statement was mind-boggling: "My opinion of the Russians has changed most drastically in the last week..." With 40,000 Soviet troops taking over Afghanistan, Jimmy Carter proved once again that his concept of a foreign policy is just what we feared: misguided, and worse yet, naive.

The statement was quite a concession for a president who took office condemning Americans' "inordinate fear of Communism." I, along with a handful of my conservative colleagues, have long considered such an arms-length policy toward the Soviets to be prudent. Mr. Carter, meanwhile, cancelled reconnaissance flights over Cuba and cut the defense budget by \$7 billion. The flights were resumed when the extent of Soviet influence in El Salvador, Nicaragua, and Grenada became known, and the now-infamous Soviet combat brigade in Cuba was the eventual public outcome. The defense budget, in turn, was recently boosted by 5%, out of fear for SALT II's passage.

not our friends. With typically cold logic, they have written off the ill-fated SALT II treaty, and have taken advantage of the United States' involvement in Iran to carry their drive for a warm-water port one step further. Our capacity for anticipating and preventing actions such as those in Afghanistan has been deliberately downgraded for three years, just as the warnings by

conservatives of the Soviet buildup have been rejected out of hand. Afghanistan and its predecessors—trouble spots like Angola, Ethiopia, and Nicaragua—all serve as stark reminders that the USSR is not, despite Mr. Carter's wishes, a peaceful country.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Gasohol, once considered an "exotic fuel," at least in Governor Bill Clements' words, is fast becoming all the rage at the State Capital.

Texas family farmers fought all last year to initiate gasohol production in the state and up until now have enjoyed limited success. Their hopes were boosted during the last Legislature when Reps. Dan Kubiak and Bill Keese successfully pushed through the legislation legalizing alcohol fuel production in Texas, but the necessary funding has not come through.

All that is changing. Following President Carter's partial embargo of grain sales to the Soviet Union, gasohol's destiny has taken an upswing. Carter intends the federal government to buy the 17 million metric tons of grain and use much of it in the rapid production of gasohol. The benefits are two-fold: America can become more self-sufficient in terms of energy, and farmers can enjoy a solid domestic market for grain.

Amid all the bustling, Texas farmers leveled a strong blast at Governor Clements, charging him with breaking a promise to their group by stifling gasohol production. They see Clements ties to the oil industry (he is the founder of SEDCO, Inc., a Dallas-based oil well drilling firm) as the reason for his inaction.

AG Okays Gasohol
Attorney General Mark White ruled last week that a Kansas corporation, Midwest Solvents, Inc., can produce gasohol in Texas but cannot manufacture 190-proof alcohol at the same plant.

The ruling was sought following controversy over whether beverage alcohol could also be produced at the targeted Santa Rosa plant. The company was planning to ship the beverage alcohol out of state for sale.

Football history will record that in 1979 the Dallas Cowboys-America's team—lost to the Los Angeles Rams in the opening round of the playoffs for the championship of the National Football League. But who or what was responsible for this loss?

Several Cowboy fans who have attempted to explain the loss have been highly critical of some plays that were called by Coach Landry. These fans were puzzled, for example, why Coach Landry continued to call "pass plays" when the Rams would use the "prevent defense".

This defense which employs seven defensive halfbacks is designed to stop "pass plays," but Coach Landry continued to call pass plays.

Tom Landry is a football genius. His won and lost record is a testimonial to this truth. But apparently his play selection eliminated his team from the playoffs. The Cowboys have a complex offense with hundreds of plays, but Coach Landry stubbornly refused to call other plays. Why?

Human nature has fought change, innovation and alternative, saying: "It has always been done this way and it will always be done this way." Evidence of this destructive attitude is seen in business, families, and churches.

Too many members of the church demand to hear only "first principle" sermons, seeking to recreate the "good old days." Any change in the traditional worship procedure is considered heresy. These brethren resist any change in the customs and traditions of the church even if it stagnates the church.

Truth-the gospel-never changes! It is eternal. But methods of presentation must change because times change. God bound truth and it must not be loosed, but He did not bind methods of presentation of truth; therefore, it is sinful to bind what God has not bound.

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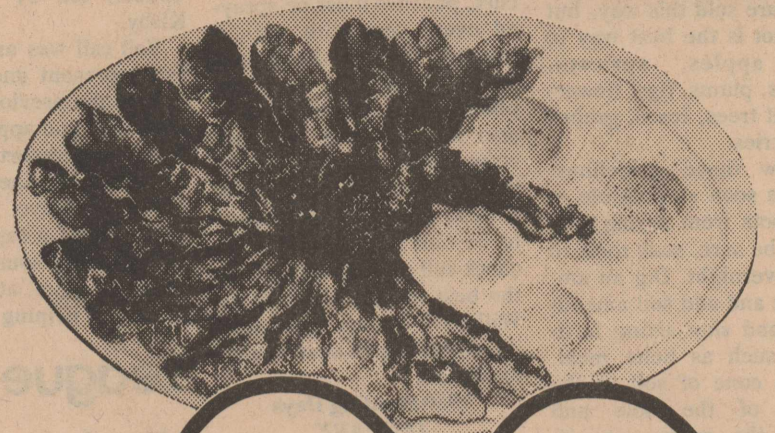

Bare root planting is this month's big opportunity because bare root plants become better established than those planted from a nursery can. Only certain kinds of plants are sold this way, but bare root is the best way to plant apples, apricots, peaches, plums, figs, flowering fruit trees, roses, grapes and berries.

Follow these guidelines: Plant as soon as possible to keep roots from drying out. Just to be sure, soak roots in water overnight. Dig an ample hole and add soil amendments and slow-acting fertilizers, such as bone meal. Form a cone of soil in the bottom of the hole and spread the roots over it, making sure the plant ends up at right depth. Fill the hole and tamp the soil down to compress any air pockets. Fruit trees need pruning prior to planting to reduce the top growth and compensate for the amount of roots lost when the plant was dug up.

Pruning is winter's next most important garden job. Any leafless plant can be pruned now and some must be. The exceptions to this rule are fruit trees grown only for their flowers. These are best pruned while they are in bloom. Deciduous fruit trees grown for their fruit, such as apricots and peaches, must be pruned or they will eventually cease producing fruit. Since each kind requires a different pruning method it is best to seek advice.

Dormant spraying follows planting and pruning in order of importance. Dormant sprays are light oils that smother rather than poison

pests. Safe and effective, they can be used only on leafless plants, but they almost guarantee fewer pest problems the following season. To control peach leaf curl, peaches must be sprayed every year with such a mixture or with Bardeaux. Many vegetables can be planted this month and is also a good time to plant strawberries, often available bare root at a savings now. Rose growers hardly need to be told but nurseries are chock-full of bare root roses, the best way to plant them. Will have names and planting directions in next week's Stockman.

Debra Says

Do you have a weight problem? Have you ever tried to diet, and then V-Room! gained back most of the weight you lost? Worrying about weight is a popular diversion for Americans, and frankly, many people should be concerned about their weight.

The problem is what and how much to eat. Certain foods have more calories than other foods, so you should eat smaller or fewer portions of high-calorie foods. The calories in a pie aren't any more fattening than the calories in an apple- there are just more of them in the pie.

You should choose your calories for the "nutritional company" they keep--that is, pick foods which in addition to calories provide some of the vitamins, minerals, and protein you need. The Guide can help you to do this. Use it when selecting foods-keeping a cautious eye on the fifth group--Fats-Sweets-Alcohol-whose main contribution is calories.

If you are trying to control your weight, follow these guidelines:

1. Cut down on high-fat foods such as margarine, butter, highly marbled or fatty meats, and fried foods. Salad dressings, cream sauces, gravies, and many whipped dessert toppings are also high in fat.
2. Cut down on sugary foods such as candies; soft drinks and other sugar-sweetened beverages such as ades and punches; jelly, jam, sirups, honey; fruit canned in heavy sirup; pies, cakes, and pastries.
3. Cut down on or eliminate alcoholic drinks.
4. Cut down on portion sizes. Portions of some

foods, such as meats, are hard to estimate. For example, a 3-ounce serving of cooked lean meat without bone is equivalent to a 3-by 5/8-inch hamburger patty. What is your usual portion size?

5. Use whole milk or whole-milk products (most cheeses and ice cream) sparingly. Lowfat and skim-milk products, such as ice milk and skim-milk cheeses, provide fewer calories than their whole-milk counterparts.

6. Select cooking methods to help cut calories. Cook foods with little or no added fat and avoid deep-fat fried foods, which are high in calories because of the fat absorbed during cooking. For meat and poultry, trim off visible fat; either broil or roast on a rack. If braised or stewed, drain meat to remove fat. For fish, broil or bake. For vegetables, steam, bake, or boil; for an occasional change, stir-fry in a small amount of vegetable oil.

7. Be sure to count the nibbles and drinks enjoyed during social events and throughout the day as part of your day's calorie allotment.

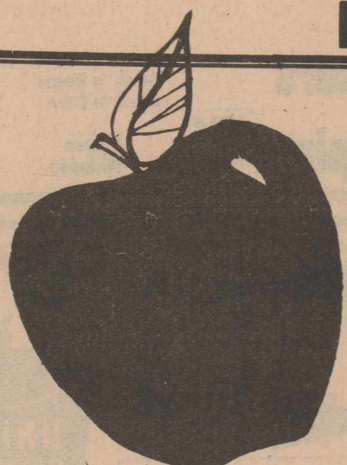

Summary of fires for 1979

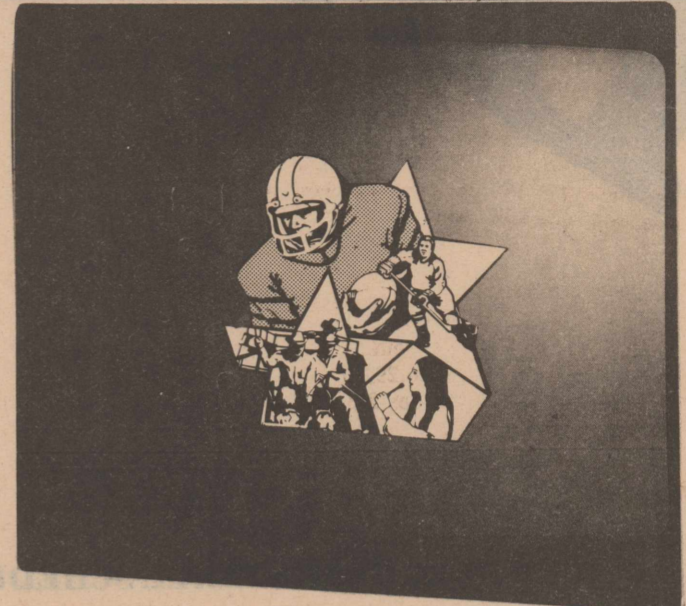
During the year 1979, the Ozona Fire Department answered 122 calls. This figure was down only one call from the 123 calls answered during 1978. Only three false alarms were recorded, a sharp drop from 1978. Fires involving structures were up only slightly from last year, with 22 being reported in 1979. Car and truck fires totaled 36 for the year up by four calls from the previous year. The number of grass fires reported were off also.

Out of the 36 grass fire calls answered, there were no major grass or brush fires in the county. The department was called out of the county on mutual aid calls to other departments on 8 occasions and received aid from outside the county on 5 occasions.

The largest jump in calls was recorded in oil field related fires and rescues. From the 3 rescue calls made by the department in 1978, 6 were recorded during 1979.
