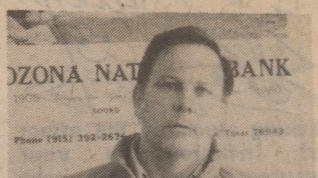

Second championship of season—

Lions win Ozona Relays Saturday

The Ozona Lions roared to their second track championship of the young season here Saturday when they captured their own top spot trophy. The Lions racked up 186 points for the first place. Sonora was second with 136 points, and Coahoma placed third with 88 points.

At the bottom of the meet were Crane with 55 points, the Ozona junior varsity with 17, and Brackettville with 3 points.

Ozona had 17 team members score points. They were led by Fred Garza, who scored 38 points, winning a first place in the high jump and intermediate hurdles, second in the high hurdles, running a leg on the second-place relay team and a third in the long jump.

Kay Thompson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Thompson, was chosen 1980 track queen. Juan Cedillo, son of Mrs. Maria Cedillo, was chosen track beau by the girls team.

The first Clifford Crawford Memorial 800 meter run award went to Enrique Sanchez of Sonora. He won the event with a time of 2:01.37. His name will be placed on a permanent plaque at Ozona High School. There will be name plates engraved for each year's winner in the event. The class of '77 presented the plaque to the school in memory of Crawford. Crawford, a member of the class of '77, was outstanding in the 800 meter run.

Coach Rip Sewell was pleased with the results and pointed up the importance of depth. He said that while only four Lions had first places for 40 points, 146 points came from second to sixth places.

The Lions will be in Sonora Saturday to challenge for their third win in a row. Coach Sewell said last Saturday's effort has caused many sore muscles which will hinder the team this week, but he expects the team to put all their effort toward winning the championship in Sonora. Sewell expressed a special thanks to

all those who helped make the '80 Lion Relays a success.

In the 1600 Run Terry Crawford was third with 5:04.3.

The 1600 Relay team placed second with 3:35.1-Randy Ramos, Fred Garza, and Rudy Martinez.

In the Pole Vault Varlyn Aldridge came in first with 11'0", and there was a tie for second place with David Badillo placing for Ozona. Harvey Huereca was fourth with 9'6".

Everett assured voters that he would continue to be a working school board member and asked for their vote and support in the election.

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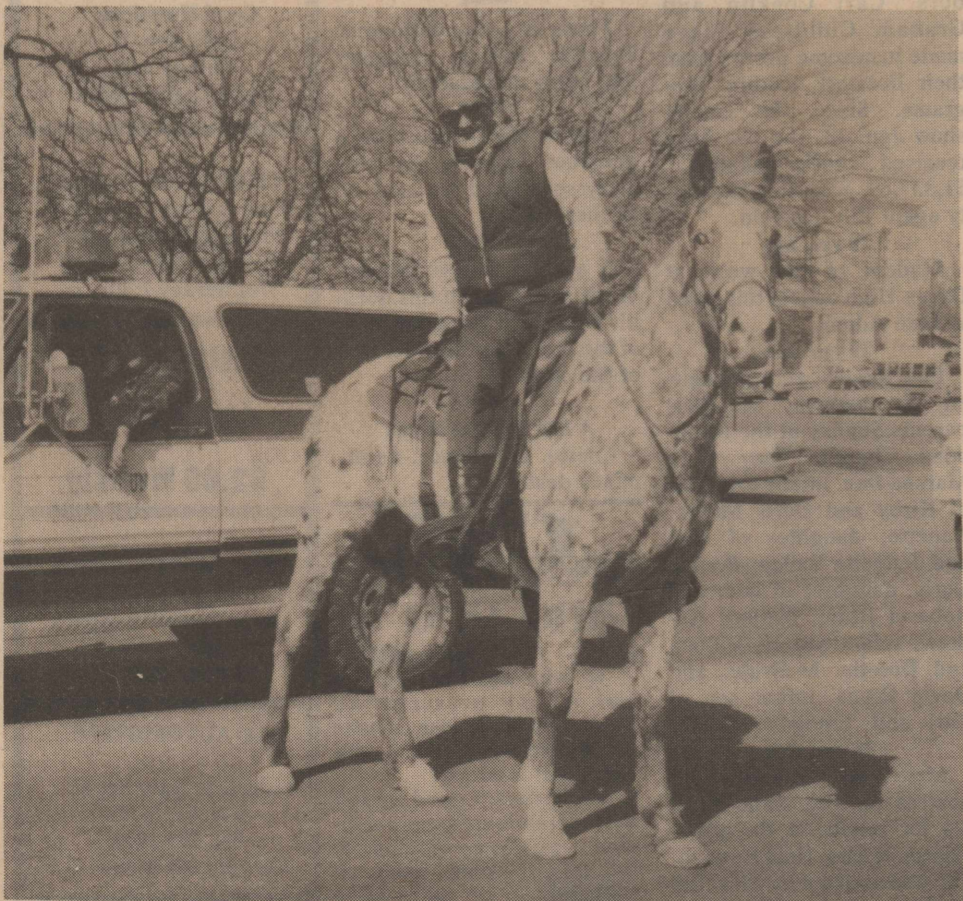
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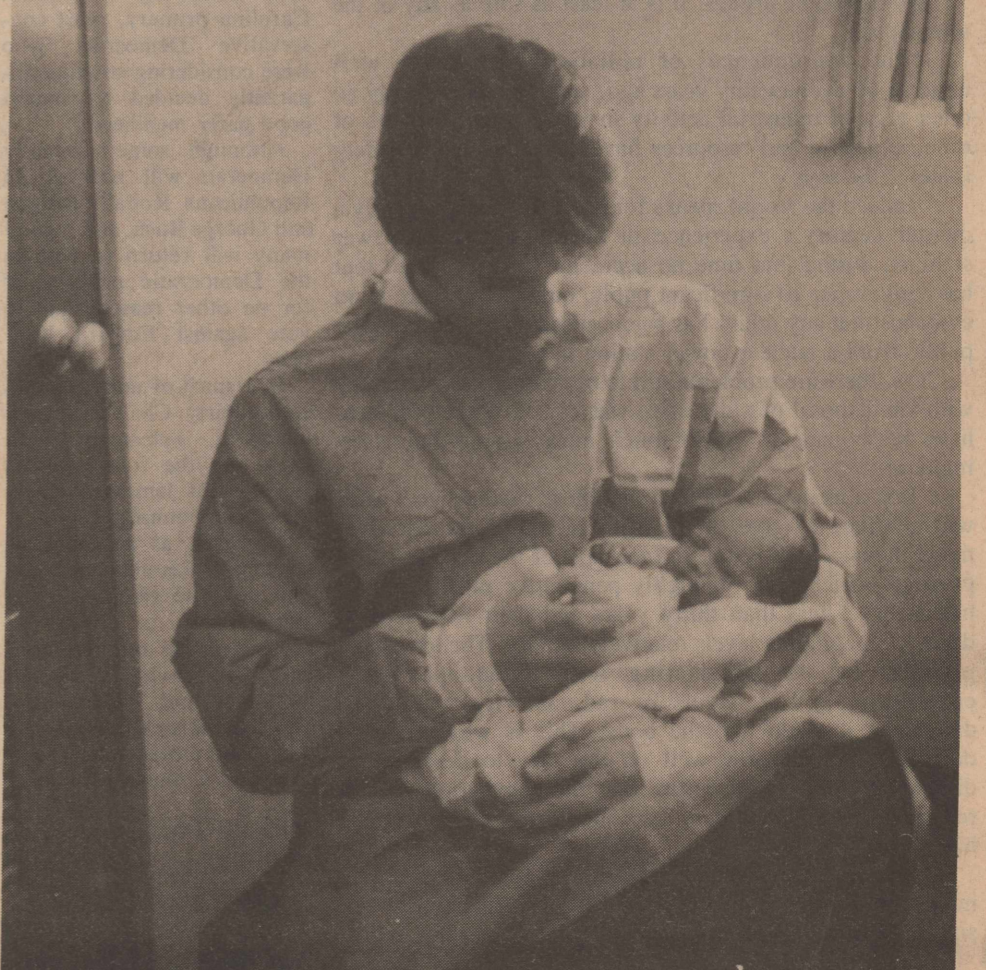

WHY GREAT BRITAIN IS GOING NUCLEAR

Bright yellow signs already are popping up on lamp posts and store fronts all over Washington touting the planned May 24 blockade and occupation of the Seabrook, New Hampshire, nuclear power project.

The signs are the work of an organization calling itself the "Coalition for Direct Action at Seabrook," which like a thousand other such coalitions that have cropped up in recent years has no listed phone number or known mailing address.

It's almost by magic the way these anti-union name it organizations spring up, organize rallies, print (I can only guess at this) tens of thousands of posters and leaflets, and then quietly disappear, to re-emerge on another day, under another assumed name, and with the financial wherewithal to print thousands more posters and leaflets and picket signs.

My reason for bringing up the Seabrook "occupation" is that I first noticed one of the yellow signs just a few weeks ago, while I was on my way to a private dinner for Norman Lamont, a member of Parliament, and the minister responsible for Great Britain's nuclear energy program.

Some brief facts: during the past decade Great Britain hasn't built a single new nuclear power plant. During this same period of time, there has been the discovery of major offshore oil and gas deposits in the North Sea. The first significant discoveries in the United Kingdom Continental Shelf were made in 1971, and production began just four years later. Sometime later this year the British expect to become oil self-sufficient — and remain so for the "next decade or so," according to Lamont.

Still, with all this going for it, the United Kingdom has decided to move boldly ahead with nuclear power development, with the licensing of two new plants every three years from 1980 onward (the first, at least, to be built by America's Westinghouse Company).

According to Lamont, nuclear power is one of the few remaining "great hopes" of mankind. It is "the sword into the ploughshare," he says.

Moreover, he argues, it is at least as safe as any of the alternatives.

"The consequences of radiation were fairly well understood even twenty years ago, and there is probably no other area of industrial activity in which such a wealth of time, expertise and resources have been devoted to safety issues," he says.

"Indeed the record speaks for itself. Britain has nearly a quarter century's experience in operating nuclear power stations; during that time no accidents have occurred that have given rise to significant public hazard and there is no evidence that any injury has been caused by radiation to the public from a nuclear power station in the UK."

Yes, there are problems still to be worked out — mostly with the disposal of radioactive wastes. But these problems have been made to sound much more serious than they really are.

"It is a mistake to believe that these radioactive wastes will continue to give off highly penetrative radiation for many thousands of years. In fact most of the nuclear waste products which give off highly penetrative radiation have half lives of less than thirty years and their radioactivity decays to negligible levels relatively rapidly. The long-term problem is one of dealing with substances with comparatively low levels of radioactivity which are dangerous if taken into the body. This is why we must develop, and are now well on the way to developing, disposal techniques to ensure that these materials cannot reach man's environment in concentrations which are hazardous."

There are many sound reasons for going ahead with nuclear power development. The best, it seems to me, is the simple fact that it is safer than the alternative and we need it.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Texas Democrats who are registered voters will be able to pick their party's choice for president on May 3—a privilege secured from a small victory by conservatives and moderates over their liberal counterparts on the State Democratic Executive Committee in Austin last week.

In a turn of events that surprised everyone, the SDEC voted to hold a non-binding primary election; now Democrats will be able to vote their preference for Jimmy Carter, Edward Kennedy or Jerry Brown, but the party convention this summer will name the actual delegate winner in Texas.

One might call it a stalemate, for the time being, between party conservatives and liberals.

The liberals, it is widely theorized, voted earlier this fall to prevent a binding Democratic primary, even though the Republicans agreed to hold a binding vote.

Their ploy would temporarily shrink the Democratic base, because conservative voters would be drawn into the Republican primary—but the liberals participating in the Democratic primary would nominate a slate of candidates mostly from their fold.

Would the conservative Democrats who voted Republican in May return to the fold and vote Democratic in November? That is a million dollar question that the party won't have to resolve now, and probably to its advantage.

Connally Bows Out
When former Gov. John Connally, a Democrat turned Republican, ended his candidacy following the South Carolina primary, most conservative Democrats who were considering straying apparently decided to remain good party members.

Although some Connally Democrats will now go to Republicans Ronald Reagan and George Bush, and a good many will return to vote in the Democratic primary, if for no other reason than to vote against Edward Kennedy.

In a spirit of unity, Democratic Party Chairman Billy Goldberg welcomed them back into the fold, even as Republicans lamented losing them and Connally.

However, as an extra attraction, Republicans are now going to give GOP primary voters a chance to voice opinions on two legislative issues: wiretapping and initiative and referendum.

The State Republican Executive Committee acted positively to a request for such balloting from Gov. Bill Clements.

Rural Law Funds Cut
If the Capitol Press corps likes the ever-visible, ever-talkative Clements, Attorney General Mark White probably does not.

Last week Clements cut

White's budget for a team of lawyers who travel to aid rural county prosecutors with criminal cases. Coincidentally, the Governor's action came one week after White publicly criticized him during an AFL-CIO convention key-noted by Vice President Walter Mondale.

White responded to the budget cuts by calling Clements "callous" toward rural communities. Clements simply explained that the Attorney General does not have criminal prosecution authority and ought to go to the Legislature to ask for it.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Signs of our belated spring are finally appearing again in a few late blooming trees that missed the freeze. If we can miss another, we should have a very colorful city for Easter.

Now that the frost season should be over, many chores can be started and finished soon. Good Friday (March 21) will be here this week and is an excellent day for planting flowers and some vegetable seeds. Too, it is usually safe to set out new plants, but provide protection if needed.

Move house plants from stronger sunshine if they prefer subdued lighting. Most plants that do not bloom are in this class, along with African Violets. Keep plants turned to avoid all foliage facing one side. Begin grooming plants for the flower show next month.

If you have a garden that is too shaded for many sun-loving plants, a garden of ferns, either alone or in combination with wild flowers, is a good choice. Early spring is the best time to transplant ferns, when new growth is very young or has not yet begun. Try to retain soil around roots when digging crowns. Look for native species in the woods, especially along creeks or river banks or maybe friends have some to share. There are several summer blooming bulbs that do well with ferns.

Remove all shoots originating below the graft union on fruit trees. The graft union is the small bulge in the trunk, a few inches above soil level. After removing suckers at their point of origin, cut out any dead or diseased wood on the plant. Replenish the mulch, and fertilize the trees at the rate of 1 pound of fertilizer per inch of trunk diameter. Use 5-10-10 or a similar low-nitrogen complete fertilizer.

Now that tender plants have new growth, be on the lookout for aphids. Spray with Malathion as soon as noticed, following label directions when applying.

Debra Says

Wish you could do your own minor home repairs? Maybe you can--many homemakers are reporting success in learning these skills.

They're also saving money and time, along with cutting down on the frustrations of trying to hire repairmen. Even novices can do many household improvement, maintenance and repair jobs.

Before trying to tackle a project, consider these factors?

Do you have time to do the job?

Do you have the necessary tools and supplies on hand?

Can you rent, improvise or buy the needed tools, parts and supplies?

Are you physically able to do the work? (Usually you won't need great strength, just stamina.)

Do you have the interest and patience to study a problem and devise a workable solution?

Also, compare costs of a do-it-yourself job versus hiring a professional.

Professional fees usually include a basic service-call charge, an hourly labor charge, and a parts and supplies charge.

In some cases it's wise to ask for an estimate.

If you decide to go ahead yourself, pay special attention to tools.

In buying tools, start with basic tools.

Buy tools of good quality--"premium" tools are not necessary, but make sure they are good-quality.

Very cheap tools often are unsatisfactory, especially edged tools, such as saws and chisels, because the edges dull rapidly or chip and break.

In selecting basic tools and

supplies, be sure to insist on adequate quality for your needs.

You can always rent costly tools that you'll use only occasionally.

Then keep your tools in good condition so they are ready to use.

For example, the teeth of a crosscut saw should be nearly as sharp as a needle, chisels and plane irons should be nearly razor sharp.

If you lack the know-how or the equipment to sharpen tools, have a skilled craftsman do it for you.

In addition, well-planned storage space protects your tools and supplies and makes them easy-to-find, grasp and remove.

Store tools safely, both to avoid damaging the tool and to avoid injuring yourself. Read the instruction booklets and information labels that come with tools and supplies.

File them for future reference.

Plan a definite storage space for all warranties, service contracts, specification sheets, replacement part lists and special instructions

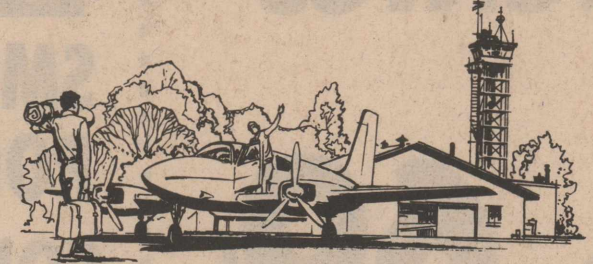

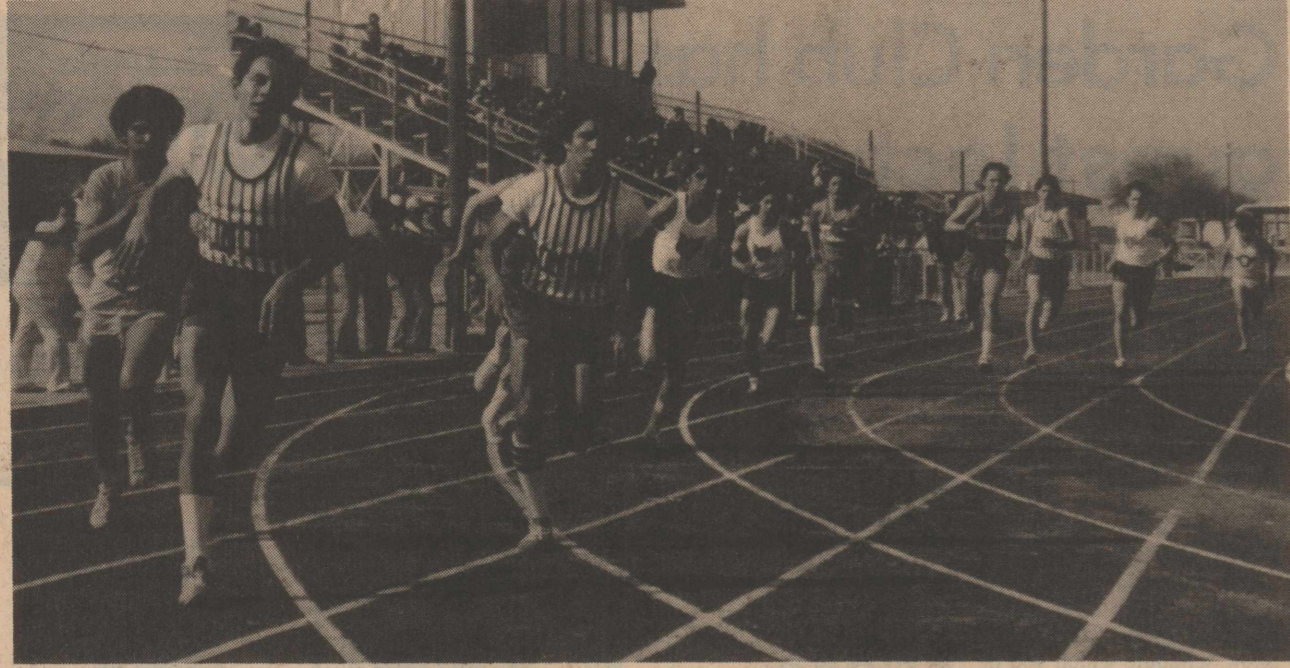

SCS asking public for views on study

USDA's Soil Conservation Service (SCS) is currently making a study of alternative ways in which a National Plant Materials Centers Program can be conducted that responds to resource conservation needs. C.H. Sinclair, SCS district conservationist, says his agency is asking the public for their views on alternatives under consideration and for other proposals. Sinclair says SCS, in cooperation with other Federal and State agencies and through other arrangements, presently operates and maintains 22 plant materials centers in the United States. Each center develops new plants for conservation purposes in the geographic area it serves that are released jointly with the State's agricultural experiment station and other State and Federal agencies to commercial growers for production.

An initial increase of seed or plants is made to provide enough plants materials for advanced testing for a specific conservation problem. "The range of alternatives being studied for conducting a National Plant Materials Centers Program vary from continuation of the program as is to transferring complete operations and management of the centers over to non-federal entities," Sinclair said. Crockett fields draw confirmers

Three confirmers were scheduled in Crockett County and a prospect continued to test.

Dameron Petroleum Corp., Midland, will drill two outposts to the eight-well Canyon gas area of the American multipay field of Crockett County, approximately 34 miles southwest of Ozona.

Both projects, in 13-1-1 &GN, are scheduled to 8,000 feet.

The No. 1A A.P. Hoover-Sec. 13, Blk. 1, 2 3/4 miles southwest, is 467 feet from the south and 9,879 feet from the east lines. Ground elevation is 1,974 feet.

The No. 2A A.P. Hoover-Sec. 13, Blk. 1, two miles southwest, is 467 feet from the south and 4,025 feet from the east lines. Ground elevation is 1,997 feet.

The field also produces oil from two Spraberry zones and gas from the Strawn and Clearfork.

Marshall R. Young Oil Co., Fort Worth, will drill the No. 1 University 14-33 as a 3/4-mile east outpost to the current three-well Devonian area of the Perner Ranch (Devonian, Simpson and Canyon gas) field, 20 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,832 feet from the north and 830 feet from the west lines of 14-33-University Lands. Contract depth is 10,000 feet; ground elevation, 2,525 feet.

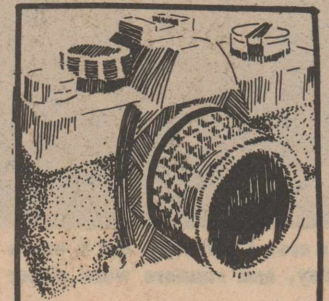

Mr. Keene attended Ozona schools as a boy in the late 1920s, when the family resided here.

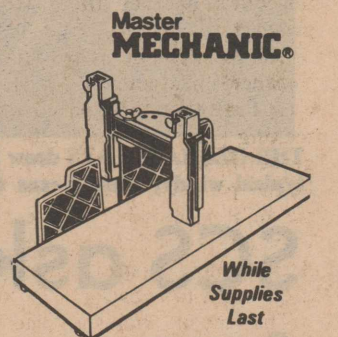


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Statement Of Intent To Change Rates

The proposed changes in rates will affect all customer classes and are designed to increase the Company's gross annual revenue derived from local service by 37%.

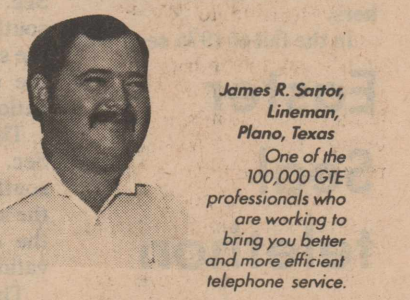
A complete set of revised rate schedules has been filed with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and is available for public inspection in each of the Company's Business Offices in the State of Texas. A summary of the Company's rate filing has also been sent to the Mayor's Office of each affected municipality.

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It's one thing to know the government boys are giving you the run-around—it's often quite another thing to prove it.

The livestock industry, for instance, has known for a long time that the decision-making process wasn't altogether kosher when it came to the predator control program. People in high places were forever acting like they didn't know what we knew they ought to know.

That meant that someone wasn't dealing off the top of the deck—information was either getting waylaid on its trip through channels, or being altered so thoroughly that its original gist was entirely unrecognizable when it got where it was going.

But how to prove it—that was the puzzle. Unless you can get your hands on the information before it goes into the mill, then pick up the altered version when it comes back out, you can hardly back up your gut feeling that the former reads differently from the latter.

That, however, is exactly what we've been able to do. Through channels even we are unaware of, we found ourselves with a copy of a report on toxic collar research.

The report, compiled by Denver Wildlife Research Center Biologist Don Balsler, was requested by Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus after he discovered during a January meeting in Austin that there was a lot he didn't know about Compound 1080 predacide. He's not long before banned further research into 1080, you see, and it was somewhat embarrassing for him to have to reveal in a public meeting that his decision was made without benefit of considerable evidence in favor of the toxicant.

Balsler's report was a hurry-up affair dated Jan. 31 and forwarded to Washington. As far as we can tell, it didn't get to Andrus' office for at least a month, maybe longer. In the interim, it was being "edited." We recently received a copy of the "edited" version to go with the one we'd had much earlier of the original version.

Sure enough, there are differences. Most of the differences are minor, but a few are glaring departures from

Balsler's original text. Major or minor, the changes all have the effect of diluting the scientific evidence in favor of 1080. In a couple of notable cases, Balsler's statements are totally reversed and made to read like an indictment of 1080.

The first major change is found under item two in the "results" portion of the report. Balsler describes a study in which magpies were fed the carcass of a poisoned coyote to determine whether 1080 may be dangerous to scavengers that eat its victims. The magpies refused to die. This, says Balsler's original report, "should not be surprising" because there never was any evidence to indicate they would.

Interior brass, however, have spent a lot of time maintaining that such secondary poisoning hazards do exist, and Andrus' cherished ban on 1080 research has this claim as its only "solid" support. Consequently, this paragraph was completely removed from the "edited" version of Balsler's report. In its place is a totally fabricated paragraph that attempts, somewhat lamely, to explain away the undeniable gap between the facts and the agency's contradictory policy.

A couple of paragraphs later, Balsler discusses the idea of allowing ranchers to use 1080 collars themselves, noting that the collar principle "should provide superior placement, timing and reduced environmental exposure" compared to other bait applications. He adds that bait research suggests 1080 could be used safely in other applications as well.

Not one word of this survived "editing." To borrow Balsler's words, this "should not be surprising", because the very notion of using 1080 for any purpose related to predator control flies in the face of Interior's official position.

Most of the other changes were relatively minor, though, again, they serve the purpose of "supporting" the official policy line where Balsler's scientific observations would have done the opposite.

For instance, Balsler notes at one point that there is still no proven antidote for 1080, but says this should not be a

"primary requirement" for EPA registration as a predacide because several other animal damage control toxicants also lack antidotes. The edited version says, instead, that the lack of an antidote "will prove to be a difficult hurdle in registration..."

This is the precise opposite of what Balsler was saying, but it goes well with Andrus' statement that 1080 research is a "rathole" that will not lead to the compound's use in predator control.

Then there's a point in the report's introduction where Balsler says 1080 was selected as "the best potential compound" for use in the toxic collar. That undoubtedly sounded too supportive of 1080 to suit the bureaucrats, so they rewrote the sentence to read, "a potential test compound."

There are more examples, but we've made our point. What worries us is not that such manipulation goes on—we've always known that—but that we don't know exactly who is being manipulated. Nor do we know who is ordering it done.

What we do know is that this report still carries the original date and Balsler's name, as if someone wanted us to believe the final product actually reflects his scientific judgement. Unless he's changed his mind since he wrote the original, it doesn't.

Andrus has stuck to his decision to ban further 1080 research, even though we're told he now has access to all the research work favoring its use. Does he really? Or is this bleached-out report typical of the "information" he's been given? Is the editing being done because someone knows what Andrus wants to see and is taking pains not to confront him with anything to the contrary? Or is it being done to guarantee that Andrus sees only what someone wants him to see?

The applicant proposes to add a mobile home park to the existing complex which includes a service center for trucks and automobiles, a motel, a restaurant and a recreational vehicle park. The effluent will be disposed of by evaporation from a 2.5 acre evaporation pond and also can be disposed of by irrigation when necessary.

The plant is located approximately 6.5 miles east of the City of Ozona at the intersection of IH-10 and Taylor Box Road in Crockett County, Texas.

The irrigated tract is located in the drainage area of Taylor Box Draw which drains into Granger Draw and thence into the Devils River in the Rio Grande Basin. No discharge to the surface waters in the State is proposed.

LEGAL AUTHORITY: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and Chapter 25 of the Rules of the Texas Department of Water Resources.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who

has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address, and phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the waste discharge permit decision, or that a public hearing would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 45 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.

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Beware of microwave popcorn

Be careful with microwave popcorn--there's a slight danger of damage, and the popcorn may be dried out, a family resource management specialist cautions.

If you're popping corn in your microwave, you could damage the oven itself—even if you have a special popper for the oven, Lillian Chenoweth says.

There are so many variables involved that at least one major microwave manufacturer recommends against

the practice. Another manufacturer can recommend only their brand of popper for use—only in their oven with strict adherence to the precise times.

If you still want to try microwave popcorn, first check the cookbook that came with your oven. Although many food-product packages offer information and directions, these may not apply to your oven.

Since other popcorn methods take about as little time



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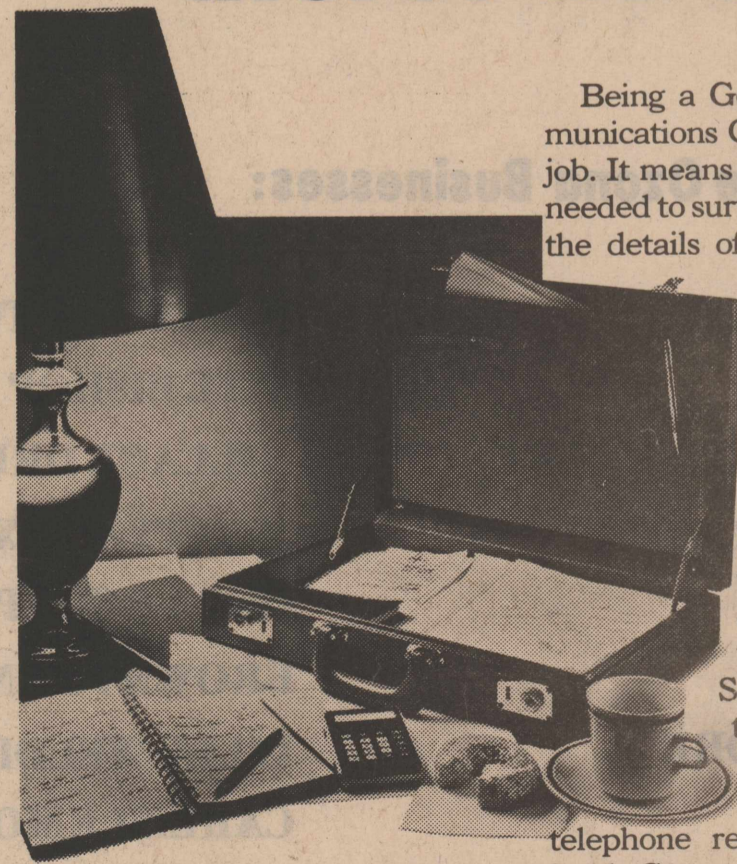
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OSONA HIGH SCHOOL TRACK—GOLF—TENNIS 1980 SCHEDULE



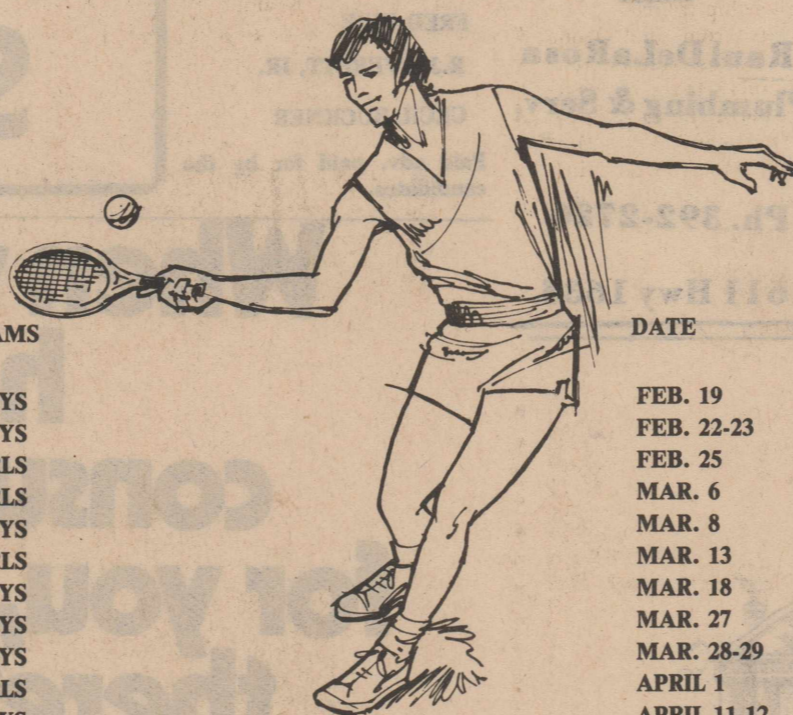

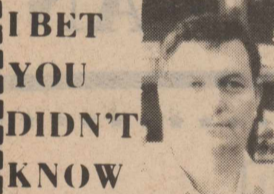

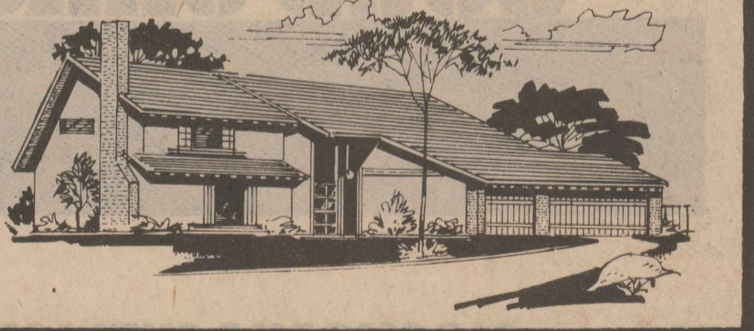
