Muleshoe officer attacked during DWI investigation

Muleshoe Police Officer Rodney Stevens was attacked during a DWI investigation at 3 a.m. last Wednesday.

Muleshoe Police Chief Don Carter said Stevens was investigating a reported driving while intoxicated when Stevens spotted the reported vehicle, a late model suburban, with several people standing around it at 301 east sixth. Stevens looked in the window of the suburban and saw an individual appearing to be passed out in the front seat.

He began questioning Juan Gonzales of Pecos, Texas. Stevens realized that Gonzales was intoxicated. Stevens decided to place him under arrest. Gonzales began to run. When Gonzales was caught, Stevens was jumped from behind by three other people including two juveniles ages 15 and 16.

Stevens was knocked to the ground and kicked in the head and face. He managed to get up and defend himself until officer Steve Clifton arrived to back him up. Stevens had called for backup when he arrived on the scene.

Shortly more backup units arrived including two from the Bailey County Sheriff's Department.

Gonzales and the two juveniles, all from Pecos, were arrested and charged with aggravated assault on a police officer. Police are still looking for the fourth man involved in the attack on Stevens. Gonzales is wanted in Pecos for an attack on an 81-year-old man. The man has since died and Pecos issued a murder warrant for Gonzales who remains in the Bailey County jail under a \$100,000 bail.

Stevens was taken to the hospital and treated for a level two concussion and loose teeth. He was released and is on paid leave while he recovers from his injuries.

Bailey County submits application for assistance

Bailey County Agent Curtis Preston met with the Commissioner's Court and requested they approve County Judge Marilyn Cox sending a letter to Texas Governor Rick Perry asking to have Bailey County declared a drought disaster county. This would allow county livestock producers and dairymen to qualify for the Federal Livestock Compen-

sation Program. The Court approved and the Judge mailed the letter Tuesday October 1.

Preston told the Journal Tuesday he had been in contact with Bailey County Farm Services Director Kim Hanlin and the agency had not heard on the declaration from the Governor's office. Curtis said Hanlin was expecting to receive notification at any time.

According to a news release from the US

Department of Agriculture the payment rates per head would be as follows:

Producers would have to certify the number of eligible animals owned as of June 1, 2002.

Commissioners meet

The Bailey County Commissioner's Court met in special session Monday, Sept. 23, the first meeting for new commissioner Ginger Damron who was appointed to fill out the term of her late husband.

Appointed by County Judge Marilyn Cox, Damron joins her brother, Joey Kindle, on the Court. A bond for the new commissioner was approved.

The Commissioners approved a resolution that would help attract state funds to pay for legal fees for indigents accused of crimes in Bailey County. Cox said the County might receive as much as \$20,000 from the State of Texas for the "Defense Grant Program."

Cox was authorized by the Commissioners to advertise for bids regarding the purchase of a new motor grader in Precinct 1. The new grader will replace a Caterpillar 140-

G, which will be sold. Cox will advertise the sale of the used grader.

Commissioner Jack Dunham said that the grader should have been replaced last year because the County has spent more than \$15,000 in repairs in the past year.

The Court authorized destruction of salvage county property which received no bid in an auction conducted Sept. 9-11.

The Court also approved the expense of \$10,000 to purchase vacant lots south of the Courthouse on the corner of South Second and Ave. D.

Also approved were a corrected version of budget Amendment No. 13, which was approved at the previous meeting and Budget Amendment No. 14, which was approved to cover expenses for the remainder of the fiscal year, which ended September 30.

The next regular meeting of the Commissioner's Court is scheduled for October 30.

The animals must have been owned for 90 days or more before and /or after June 1. According to the news release "payments should be available shortly after a producer signs up".

The livestock producers will be subject to a \$2.5 million gross income limit. The payments would be limited to \$40,000 per person.

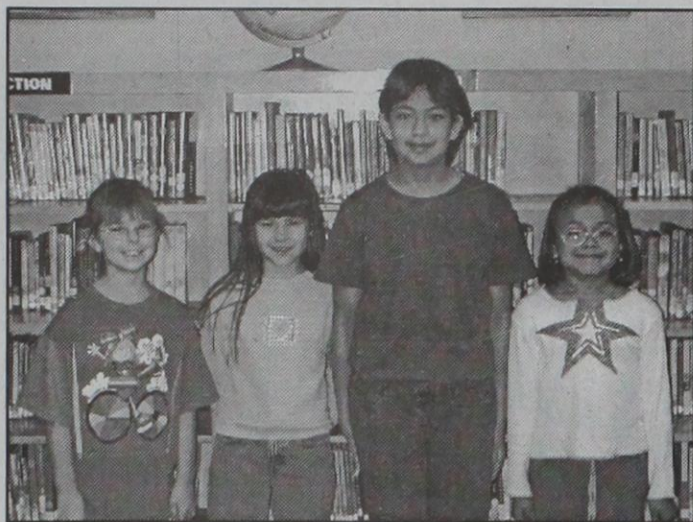

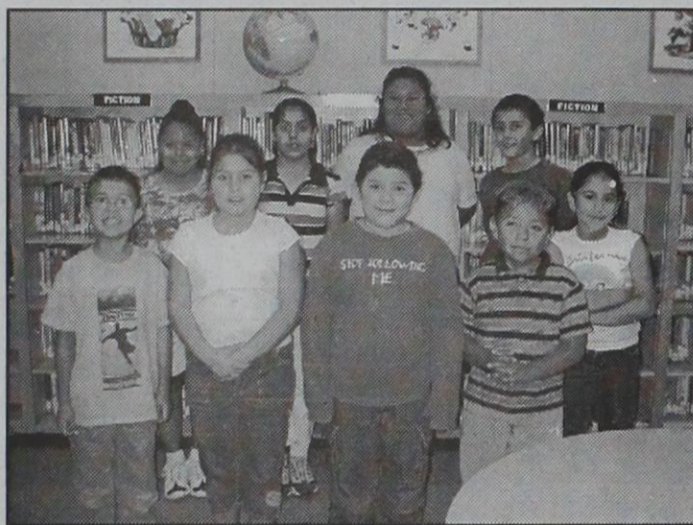

7th grade Mules tame the Mustangs

The first meeting between the seventh grade Mules and the Shallowater Mustangs was a scrimmage that began the season for the two teams. Thursday night was a game and the Mules scored in each of the first two quarters and twice more in the fourth to pound the Mustangs 24-0.

The Mustangs moved the ball almost at will on their opening drive of the game. Shallowater marched from their 24 to the Mule 36 before Colton Heinrich and Jordan Marlow threw them back for a one-yard loss on first down.

Robert Clark penetrated the offensive line and grabbed a handful of Mustang jersey and hung on until help could arrive for a three-yard Mustang loss. Richard Rojas chased a Mustang ball carrier across the field to only allow a four-yard gain.

The entire Mule defensive line seemed to plug the middle and the Mustangs could gain no yardage on a fourth-and-ten on

the Mule 35.

A motion penalty set the Mules back five yards on their first offensive play. Garrett Riley pitched wide right to Rojas and he rumbled 70 yards down the Mule sideline to put the Mules on top 6-0 with over a minute left in the first period.

The Mules forced Shallowater to go three and out with Riley returning the punt to the Mustang 49. Riley kept the ball on the quarterback option from the shotgun formation on back-to-back plays to move the Mules to the Mustang 30.

Rojas broke through the left side of the line and cut to the Mule sideline for his second TD of the night on a 25-yard dash to put the Mules up 12-0 at intermission.

A short Mustang kick to begin the third period was covered by Patrick Precure on the Mule 40.

Neither team could sustain a drive in the third period but the Mules had pushed the Mustangs back to their own 21 on the punt

exchanges. Clark and Creston Standard pushed the Mustangs back another yard before Shallowater had to attempt a punt.

A high snap from center drove the Shallowater punter back to the Mustang six where Heinrich nailed him to the turf. Smelling the goal line, the Mule offensive line bulldozed the Mustang defense as Rojas powered up the middle for his third TD of the night.

The Mule defense again refused to allow the Mustangs a first down.

The Mules took over near midfield. They quickly marched to the Mustang 26 on a Rojas carry and Riley completed an eight-yard toss to Dusty Clayton.

With just over a minute remaining in the game Rojas picked his way to the sideline and rambled 26-yards for the Mules final tally of the night.

The Mules open district Thursday night when the Littlefield Wildcats visit Benny Douglas Stadium.

USDA begins issuing CRP payments

The USDA began issuing payments of nearly \$1.6 billion to eligible producers under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), and Texas leads the way in rental payments and the amount of land enrolled.

Under the CRP, which was reauthorized in the 2002 Farm Bill, producers

voluntarily retire environmentally sensitive cropland for 10 to 15 years.

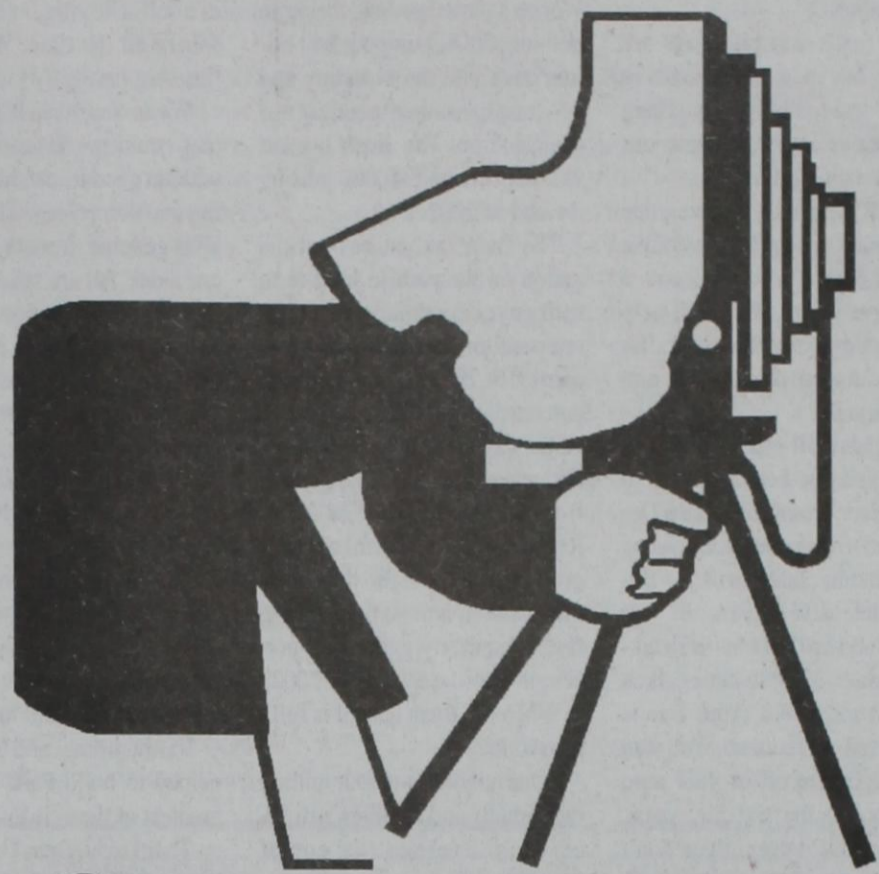
In return, USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) makes annual rental payments to producers, and shares 50 percent of the cost of establishing

approved conservation practices.

The land to be enrolled

must be highly erodible, contribute to a serious water quality problem, provide important wildlife habitat, or provide substantial environmental benefit if devoted to certain specific conservation uses.

Texas is scheduled to receive \$142 million, with more than four million acres enrolled in the program.

Those introduced were Jan Thompson, Chamber of Commerce manager; David Brunson, Muleshoe City manager; Janet Claborn, head of the Economic Development committee; and

She also recognized James St. Clair (a relative of the local St. Clairs) who is county judge of Cochran County and Janie Headrick of Austin who heads the Heritage Trails Program for the state.

The first order of business was a report on the grant application progress. There are 52 counties that comprise this region. It was disclosed that 39 of these have turned in the required resolution supporting the Texas Plains Trail signed by the county judge and the required inventory or inventories (more than one can be turned in) listing historic and cultural resources and attractions in the region.

From the inventories turned in, a baseline for comparing visitation patterns can be divided for special tours (such as a Birding Trail, Historical Courthouses, Santa Fe Trail, Cemeteries Trail, Old Schools Trail, etc.) All of this information will be used in the application sent to state requesting that this region be designated as a Historical Site by the Texas Historical Commission.

There will be no meeting in December, but the group will meet Monday, January 6, 2003, at 1:30 p.m. in Lubbock. The location will be designated at the Post meeting.

As representatives from the various counties took tours of the Muleshoe Heritage Center, they expressed amazement at all that has been accomplished in this small community. They took special notice of and complimented the beauty of the Center as well as the well done renovation of each historic building.

Eighth grade Mules whip Mustangs

The eighth grade Mules contained the Shallowater Mustang sweep and dominated the Mustangs 24-6 in their final tune up before district.

Tony Guzman scored all three of the Mule TDs from 58, two and 13 yards.

The game was never really in question as the Mules forced the Mustangs to go three and out on their first series. The Mules allowed the Mustang punt to roll dead on the Mule 47.

A motion penalty set the Mules back five yards before Guzman took a pitch from D.J. Robertson 58 yards for the Mules' first TD. Guzman carried in the two-point conversion to give the Mules an 8-0 lead early.

After the Mules kicked-

off, Shallowater was able to gain just one first down.

The Mules force a fourth and 14 on the Mustang 46 and the Mustangs faked a punt. Eric Washington and Dustin Barker were not fooled and downed the Mustangs for a two-yard loss.

Guzman broke through a hole opened by the left side of the Mule line for a 40-yard gain and scored from two yards out on the next play. Robertson connected with Barker on a slant over the middle for the two-point conversion and a 16-0 advantage.

Two Mule fumbles in the second period set up the Mustangs only tally of the night. The Mules' second fumble came after a Mustang punt had rolled dead on the Mule seven-yard line.

It took the Mustangs

three plays to push across the Mule goal line. The two-point conversion failed and the Mules owned a 16-6 advantage at intermission.

The Mules began their final scoring drive half way through the third period. They methodically moved from their 27 to paydirt on 11 plays and erased almost eight minutes from the clock.

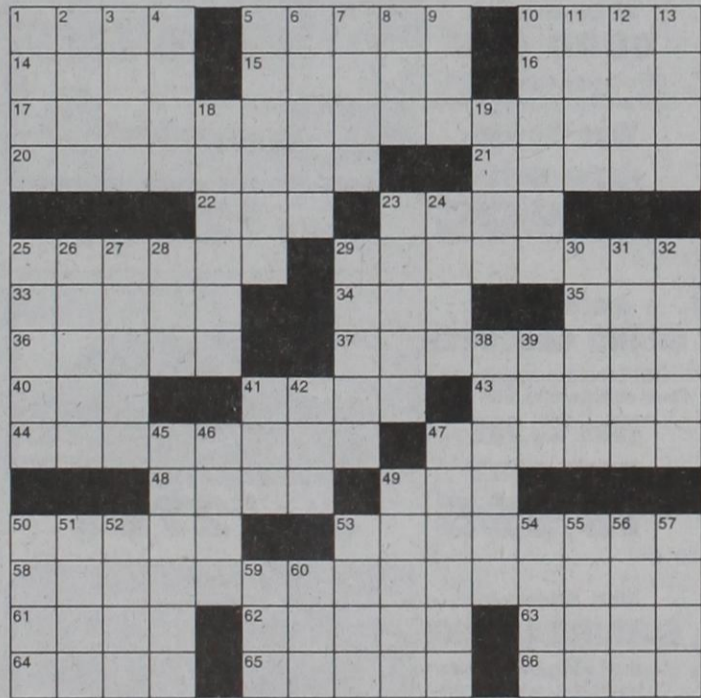

DOWN THE STREET

Down the street this week, I'm remembering that old political joke—vote early and vote often. Actually don't vote often, we really don't need the scandal, but Joyeline Costen does want you to consider voting early.

Costen stopped by Belly Acres (the Bell family farm north of town) to pick some tomatoes a couple of weeks ago, and we ended up talking about politics for a short time.

Costen is a Democrat, but feels that whatever political party you back, it's important to vote.

First of all, Berta Combs gave me some voting statistics from last year that you'll find interesting.

Only 1.62 percent of registered voters age 18 voted in last year's election, and 20.43 percent of registered voters age 19-29 cast a ballot.

Other percentages by age group in last year's election are as follows: 15.30% of 30-39 year olds; 17.91% of 40-49 year olds; 15.35% of 50-59 year olds; 6.04% of 60-64 year olds; 22.91% of 65 and older; and 0.43% of those who didn't fill in their age voted.

Costen asked me to give Journal readers some information about early voting.

Bailey County voters of any precinct can participate in early voting by personal appearance in the County Clerk's office at the Bailey County Courthouse Oct. 21 through Nov. 1. Election day is Nov. 5.

Any person 65 or older can mail in their ballots if they have a signed application to do so, available from County Clerk Sherri Harrison upstairs in the courthouse. More than

50 seniors have already requested this service as of last week. Call Harrison at 272-3044 for more information.

Early voters who have problems physically getting into the courthouse can make arrangements to have ballots brought to their vehicles, and those who can get inside the courthouse, but can't make it up the stairs to vote will be allowed to vote downstairs in the Commissioner's conference room.

Precinct voting locations are as follows: Precinct 1, Bailey County Courthouse; Precinct 2, Bailey County Coliseum; Precinct 3, Box 3, Three Way School, Box 4, Church of the Nazarene; Precinct 4, Box 5, Enochs Baptist Church, Box 6, Needmore Community Center, Box 7, City Hall.

Harrison reminds those of you voting in Precinct 3 or 4 to check your registration cards for your box number when voting.

"Precincts 3 and 4 have more than one voting location. That's what makes voting so confusing in those precincts. Where you vote in Precinct 3 and 4 depends on your box number," said Harrison. "So, please check your registration card carefully before voting."

Sherri Harrison had a somewhat harrowing experience last week involving her beloved cat, Maci.

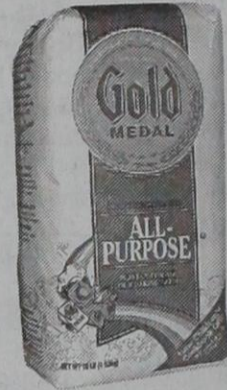
