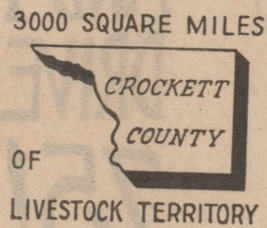

## Primary polls open Saturday

Presidential race where George Bush and Ronald Reagan square off for the nomination. The Democratic Primary will be held in the various precincts. Precinct one voters will cast ballots at the courthouse where Edna Tambunga is presiding judge. The only locally contested race is that for commissioner. The four candidates are Felipe F. Castro, Frank (Pancho) McMullan, Jr., Sostenes De Hoyos and Joe E. Everett.

Precinct 2 voters will find their polling place at Ozona Junior High with Lib Applewhite presiding judge. Precinct 3 voters will cast ballots at the Civic Center where Frank Reavis is election judge. Precinct 4 will vote at the Primary School with Concha Zapata the presiding judge. WTU power plant box #36 will be presided over by Bill Couch.

Most state and district races on the Democratic ballot have several opponents with very few unopposed. Susan Gurley McBee, incumbent state representative for the 70th District, has drawn Del Rio attorney Mike Gonzalez as an opponent. In the race for District Attorney, 112th District, the post is hotly contested by three attorneys, Bill Mason, presently assistant D.A. of Ozona; Jack Schulze, Reagan County Attorney, and J. Franklin Urias, Fort Stockton, attorney.

## Health fair set next week

The Annual Health Fair will be held Thursday, May 8, at the Civic Center between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.

Both adults and children will be checked free of charge for anemia, diabetes, and blood pressure. The event is sponsored by the Crockett County Family Living Committee and the Texas Department of Health.

Persons who are blood relatives of diabetics, parents of large babies, or overweight are especially encouraged to take the screening test.

About one in ten of all adults have high blood pressure. You can have high blood pressure and not know it. High blood pressure can cause heart attacks and strokes. Once detected, this disease can usually be effectively controlled. Adults between the ages of 30-45 are encouraged to be screened for high blood pressure.

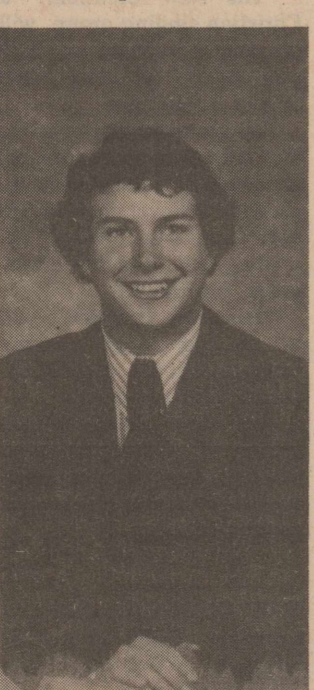
If further follow-up screening is needed, the individual will be referred to his private physician.

Lectures on health are scheduled throughout the day and the public is invited. Clayton Robinson will speak on "Over the counter medicine and medication compliance," from 10:00 a.m. until 11:00. Dr. Patrick Dwyer, local physician, will speak on health from 11:00 a.m. till noon. Dr. Gary Vannoy, local veterinarian, will speak on rabies and changes in vaccination, from 1:00 p.m. to 2:00. Dr. Don Carlisle will talk on emergency medicine from 2:00 until 3:00 p.m. Ozona medical technicians will explain some emergency measures to take in the case of choking or closed air passages, from 3:00 until 4:00 p.m.

Displays and information will be available from the Extension Service, the Cancer Society, American Heart Association, EMT's, Social Security, venereal disease, nursing homes the Environmental Health Agency and the Texas Department of Human Resources.

## Tribute to Sterling

## Hospital hires administrator

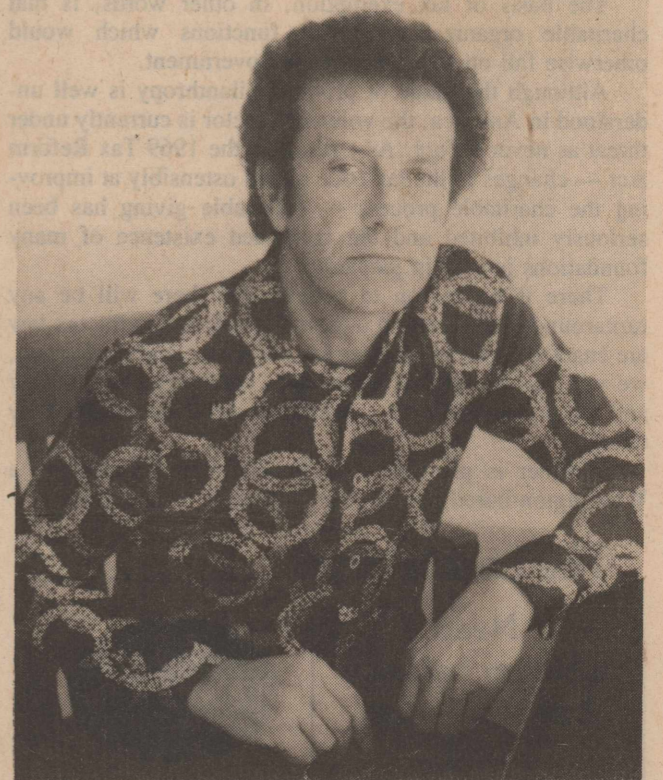
The new administrator at Crockett County Hospital is Glen Rumley, former administrator of the Knox County Hospital in Knox City. Rumley was picked by the hospital board from a host of applicants. During his tenure at Knox City the hospital was in the red when it had no physicians.

Rumley assumed his duties here Saturday. His wife, Dell, and three children Steve, Shelly and Sharon, are still in Knox City and will not move to Ozona until fall when Steve starts to school at Angelo State University. Mrs. Rumley is a registered

nurse and is employed by the West Texas Health Agency.

Rumley said he felt the hospital here has a great deal of potential and it will just take time to update the facilities. He plans several changes and plans first to give his full attention to revising the accounting procedures and get the hospital running on a business-like basis.

With three physicians and a registered nurse for every shift, the hospital is in better compliance with state and federal regulations than most small hospitals in the area. Rumley foresees a top-notch medical facility for Ozona in the very near future.

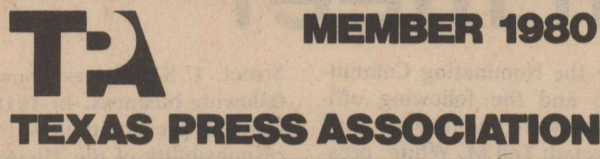

**THE NOOSE AROUND CHARITY'S NECK**

A variety of little-noticed "reforms" enacted by Congress during the past decade could bring private charity to its knees — eliminating one of the few remaining checks on the growth of unlimited government power.

The game's not over yet. But if private philanthropy is to survive in America, remedial action had better be taken quickly.

As Alexis de Tocqueville observed during his travels through America, the private support of social services is a deeply rooted element of the American way of life.

In the colonial period, it was quite common for leading citizens to promote the private funding of civic projects. Benjamin Franklin, for example, assisted in the foundation of a volunteer fire company, developed plans for lighting and paving the streets of Philadelphia, and was responsible for raising funds to found both the Pennsylvania Hospital and the academy which ultimately became the University of Pennsylvania. As one social historian has noted, during the Revolutionary era: "Groups were formed for every imaginable purpose — to assist widows and orphans, immigrants and Negroes, debtors and prisoners, aged females and young prostitutes; to supply the poor with food, fuel, medicine, and employment; to promote morality, temperance, thrift, and industrious habits; to educate poor children in free schools; to reform gamblers, drunkards, and juvenile delinquents."

This belief in private philanthropy is as strong today as it was in the early days of the Republic. A Sindlinger Poll conducted in February-March 1980 shows that approximately 70 percent of the population oppose the trend towards the use of taxpayer's money to finance activities previously funded by the voluntary sector. The same proportion feels that private organizations have a better track record than government in providing charitable services.

Private philanthropy is widely seen as a vital alternative to government provision of services based on compulsory "donations" (i.e., taxation). That is why charitable organizations are granted tax exemptions and why gifts to such organizations are tax-deductible.

As the House Ways and Means Committee stated in its report on the 1938 Revenue Act: "The exemption from taxation of money or property devoted to charitable and other purposes is based upon the theory that the government is compensated for the loss of revenue by its relief from financial burden which would otherwise have to be met by appropriations from public funds, and by the benefits resulting from the promotion of the general welfare."

The basis of tax exemption, in other words, is that charitable organizations fulfill functions which would otherwise fall on the shoulders of government.

Although the value of private philanthropy is well understood in America, the voluntary sector is currently under threat as never before. As a result of the 1969 Tax Reform Act — changes in the tax code aimed ostensibly at improving the charitable process — charitable giving has been seriously inhibited and the continued existence of many foundations is now in jeopardy.

There is no reason to believe that there will be any turnaround in this pattern until major reforms in the tax law are enacted. If these changes are not made, and made soon, we will see the decline of private, voluntary philanthropy and its replacement by government services financed by taxation.

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**Q: What is the Freedom of Information Act and where may I obtain a copy of the document?**

**A:** The Freedom of Information Act which includes the Open Meetings Law and the Open Records Law allows the public access to certain information in the records of government agencies. These laws are contained in a booklet, *ACCESS TO INFORMATION*, published by the State Bar of Texas. To obtain the pamphlet, write the State Bar of Texas, Communications Dept., P.O. **Q: My husband receives two pension checks and I receive one myself. All these funds go into our joint checking account. A portion is transferred into a joint savings account which contains \$8,000 I had before we married. We have wills leaving everything to the other. How would the right of survivorship be affected should one of us die?**

**A:** The money you had before marriage appears to have been commingled with community income. Therefore, on either death, the joint accounts would be presumed to be community property. Since Texas has no joint tenancy with right of survivorship between spouses, at either death, one-half of each account would remain the property of the surviving spouse. The decedent's half would pass under the wills you have made.

**Q: I had a will prepared leaving everything to my wife. She died last year. Now I want to leave my estate to someone else. Do I need to have another will drawn up or can I alter my present will to include the change?**

**A:** You may make a codicil to your present will disposing of your estate to the persons you select, or you may make an entirely new will. Your attorney should be consulted to discuss which course is advisable. Certain changes in the tax laws may make it necessary to write a new will.

**Q: According to Texas law, how long can property be held in trust for a person's spouse, children, and grandchildren? Is the law different here in Texas than in other states?**

**A:** In Texas, as in the majority of states in the U.S., property can be held in trust for the lifetimes of all living persons named or referred to in the will or trust agreement plus twenty-one years. This rule which prevents tying up of property indefinitely is called the Rule against Perpetuities and was adopted from the English common law at the time Texas became a state.

**Q: My husband and I made**

our wills about 10 years ago at which time the only property we owned was not in this state. In case of death of one or the other, we both left all belongings and property to the living spouse. We have since sold this out-of-state property and have bought in this area. Would these previous wills be honored for this property we now own or should we make new wills?

**A:** If your will left all to the spouse without specifying what property you owned, it should serve no matter where the land is located. If, however, the will made reference specifically to property in other states and none in Texas, your attorney will want to draft a codicil or new will for you. Also, you may be able to enjoy significant tax savings by making new wills under recently enacted tax legislation.

## Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

As usual many more horticulture specimens came in for our flower show last week than we expected after the late freeze, the drought and deer helping themselves in many yards.

We are grateful for all the non-members who brought their best specimens and won blue ribbons on them.

It should be safe to put tender plants and those in pots outside now.

The marigold is proving to be a favorite annual although the zinnia might be considered as first choice. Mildew is a serious problem with them especially if you use a sprinkling system. Their color range is unquestionably the most spectacular of annuals.

For marigolds, the French dwarf are preferred over the taller, large flowered American varieties. They're earlier blooming, have a wider color range and they stay neat and compact. A new group recently created from a cross between the French and American are called triplant hybrids. They combine the best qualities of each parent and are called nugget and seven star series. New groups appear nearly every year, so inquire when buying plants or seeds.

Petunias of course are a great favorite for bedding plants and baskets. The multifloras create a greater density of color and have better weather tolerance than the

large flowered grandifloras. Impatiens (Sultana) is another favorite plant for bedding, borders, pots and hanging baskets. They do best in partial shade and a moisture retaining soil.

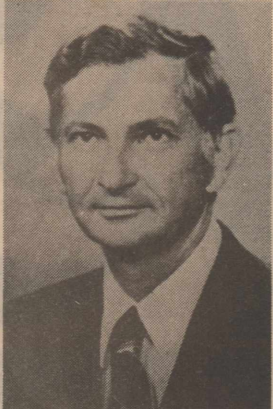

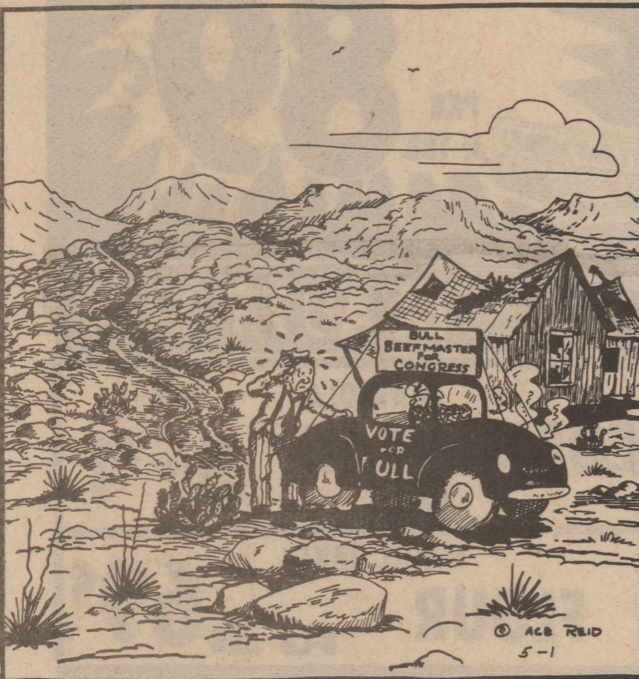

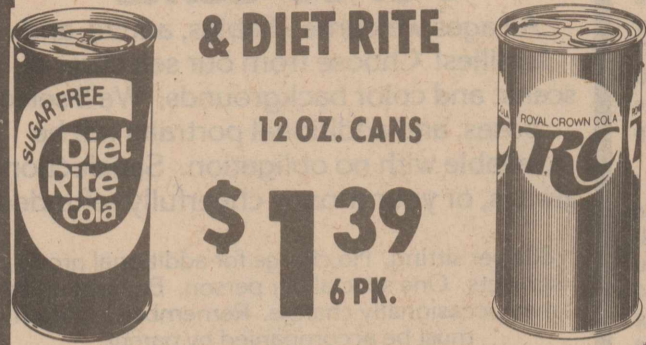

### Pecan tree grafting

In-lay grafting will be demonstrated on May 1, at 4:30 p.m. at Raymond Adcocks on 116 Mesquite Drive. Agent Billy Reagor will demonstrate in-lay grafting.

Pecan grafting is a rewarding pastime for many Texas gardeners. Many home gardeners like to change the variety of their existing pecan trees, and grafting is a ready tool for this purpose, points out Agent Billy Reagor.

There are two methods of grafting pecans--the Texas in-lay bark graft, and patch budding.

The in-lay bark graft is done on larger trees in April and May as the trees begin to grow. The grafts are of proper varieties which were selected in February and March while the trees were still dormant.

Patch budding is usually done in late summer or early autumn as sap moves from

the top of the tree to the root system. During this time the bark slips readily from the wood of the tree. A patch of bark containing a bud is collected from an improved variety and transferred to a properly prepared patch area on the rootstock. As the patch bud begins to grow, the terminal growth of the rootstock is removed, forcing growth into the new variety.

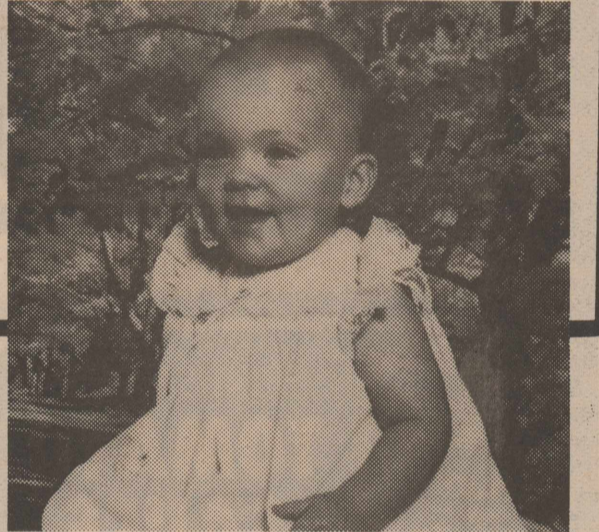

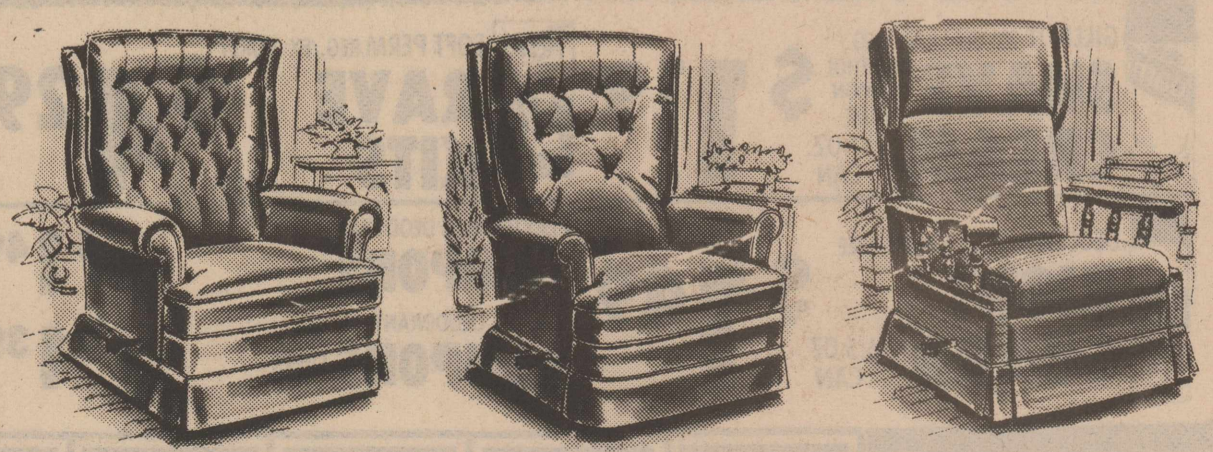

# Crockett County gas & oil news—

J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, will drill the No. 1 University 1-25, a 9,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, 1 3/8 miles east and slightly north of the Strawn gas opener and current lone producer in the Ozona, West field, 1/2-mile southwest of a depleted undesignated Strawn gas discovery, 3/4-mile northeast of a scheduled wildcat and nine miles west-northwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of 25-31-University Lands. Ground elevation is 2,614 feet.

Southland Royalty Co. No. 1-A University, drilled to 8,900 feet in the Ellenburger, was finalized Oct. 17, 1961, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 5.4 million cubic feet of gas daily, through perforations at 8,241-267 feet.

The undesignated gas opener was originally drilled by Continenta' Oil Co. and abandoned in 1953. It later was re-entered by Southland Royalty and completed as a 7900 gas producer, which became depleted in 1971. No other information was available. It was re-entered by B&C Operators, Odessa, as the No. 1 University 31-36, and abandoned at 2,700 feet April 13, 1979.

The scheduled wildcat, Thompson's No. 1 University 1-26, in 26-31-University Lands, scheduled 9,000-foot wildcat, is still a location.

C.F. Lawrence & Associates Inc., Midland, will drill the No. 1 Half 62 as an

approximate 1,500-foot west stepout to his No. 2 Half 62, opener and lone producer of the Haflaw (Queen oil) field of Crockett County, six miles southeast of Iraan.

Location is 467 feet from the north and 6,000 feet from the east lines of 62-1-I&GN. Contract depth is 1,700 feet.

The discovery, the firm's, No. 2 Half 62, was finalized Sept. 18, 1979, to pump 12 barrels of 33 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 200-1, through perforations at 1,618-698 feet.

Harrison Interests, Ltd., Houston, will drill the No. 8 John W. Henderson, III as a Canyon test and as a one-mile northeast outpost to the seven-well Strawn gas area of the Ozona, Southwest multipay field of Crockett County, 1 3/4 mile north and slightly west of Canyon production in the Ozona multipay field and 18 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of 5-

SL-T&StL. Contract depth is 10,500 feet.

The firm filed the project as a Canyon sand gas test in the Ozona, Southwest field, however all Canyon sand gas production in that field has been assigned to the Ozona field.

Strawn production was extended 1/2-mile east in a southwest extension area in the Ozona, Northeast multipay field of Crockett County with completion of J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, No. 2 J.W. Childress "A", nine miles east of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,220,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 66,206-1. Gravity of the condensate was 70.4 degrees.

Production was from open hole at 8,762 feet, where 4 1/2-inch casing was set, and 8,807 feet, total depth, which had been fractured with 41,000 gallons and 107,000 pounds of sand.

A re-entry operation, it originally was drilled by Thompson to 8,700 feet and abandoned March 16, 1979.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and west lines of 29-GH-GC&SF.

Crockett County schools pay \$1,000 above the state minimum to teachers in all categories.

All teachers were rehired for the fall term and the board approved health insurance plans for all school employees.

The Ozona Royals split a double header with the Sonora Red Sox, Sunday. The Royals lost the first game a close 3 to 1.

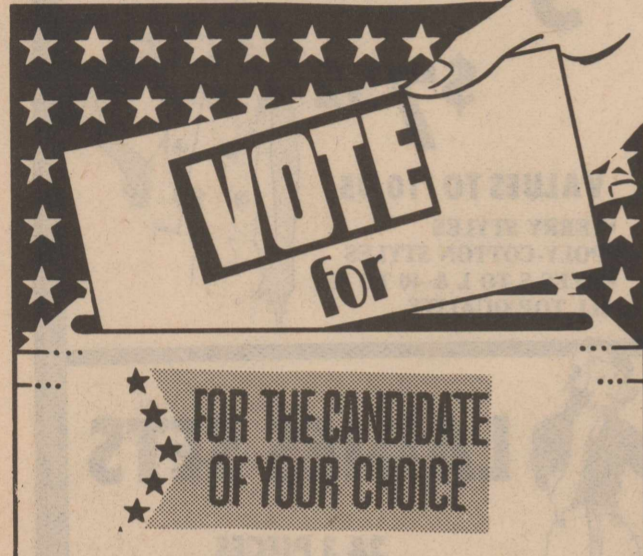

### Census coming along

Janet Faulkner, manager of the area's 1980 census office, reports that the census is nearing completion here, that in about another week the census takers should be able to enumerate the remaining households on their lists.

Census takers, with their large portfolios and their red, white, and blue official identification badges have become familiar sights in neighborhoods as they made their rounds. On March 31 they began calling at homes to pick up the filled-out questionnaires distributed March 28 by the Postal Service.

At some households census takers ask additional questions about each person and about the house. In places of more than 2500 population one household in six is in this sample. In places of less than 2500 population it is one household in every two.

The manager asks householders to welcome these census takers when they call and to give them full cooperation in supplying the required census information. The census taker has sworn to an oath to keep confidential all census information given. Any census employee who breaks this oath faces a fine or imprisonment or both, but the Bureau's record on this is spotless, the manager said.
