

## Royals sock Sonora

The Ozona Royals socked the Sonora Red Sox, taking both games of a double header here Sunday afternoon. The Royals won the first game 6-4, and the second 6-3. The team set a record in the first game for double plays with four, breaking their record of three against Big Spring last season. Two double plays were executed by the infield of Sanchez, DeHoyos, Tambunga and Willie Fierro and two by the outfield of R. DeHoyos, Ortiz, and Ernie Borrego. Ben Badillo was the winning pitcher in the first game with relief from Rudy Martinez in the fourth inning. Martinez started in the second game and went the distance for his first victory of the season. Ernie Borrego had a total of 7 stolen bases, the most by any Royal player in any one game. Ricky DeHoyos was outstanding in left field. The Royals will be in Eldorado Sunday for a doubleheader. First game starts at 1:30.

## 2 teams tied for Little League lead

The Ozona Little League season got under way last week and at the end of the week after three double-headers, last year's champions Crawford Garage, and Ozona Electric were tied with 2 wins each and no losses. The season got underway Monday, May 12, with Crawford Garage downing Ozona National by a score of 10-5. David Lovell was the winning pitcher and Valdo Galindo was the loser. The highlight of the game came in the second inning when Edward Borrego hit the first home run of the season. In the second game Ozona Electric downed Crockett Automotive 6-4. Winning pitcher was Steve Sanchez and losing pitcher was Charles Barker. The following night Crockett Automotive smashed Moore Oil by the lopsided

score of 17-0. This time Charles Barker got the win and Will Seahorn took the loss. The second game saw Ozona National down Ozona Oil 15-9. Abel Lara was the winning pitcher in the high-scoring game. Thursday night Crawford Garage just squeaked by Ozona Oil 4-3. Gayle Underwood was the winning pitcher and Harvey Fierro took the loss. Ed Borrego hit his second home run of the season for Crawford and Auturo Gonzales collected his first homer for Ozona Oil. In the second game, Ozona Electric beat Moore Oil 6-1. Jeff Sanchez was the winning pitcher and Jody Everett the loser. When the smoke cleared for the week the teams' standings were as follows: Crockett Automotive 1-1,

Ozona National 1-1, Crawford 2-0, Ozona Oil 0-2, Ozona Electric 2-0 and Moore Oil 0-2.

## Vandals strike signs in Crockett County

Vandals continue to strike in Crockett County. Recently vandals have stolen one electric arrow board sign and on May 7 damaged another one erected by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT). The signs are west of Ozona at Bachler Hill where the Interstate Highway ends and traffic must return to U.S. 290. These particular signs are to warn the motorist of a major change in traffic. "When the signs are inoperative there is a serious possibility of a tragic accident," said James R. Evans, District Maintenance Engineer for the DHT in San Angelo. These electric sequential blinking arrow signs cost \$4,000 each. On April 10 one sign was stolen and later recovered with over \$2,000 damage having been done to the sign. ## Hwy 163 improvements discussed in meeting

Hope was revived last week for improvements to Highway 163 south of Ozona in the Baker's Crossing area, when Mr. Nino Gutierrez District Engineer, and Mr. Harold Collins, Maintenance Foreman, both of Del Rio and with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, met with a group at the Chamber of Commerce Thursday to discuss plans for construction. The project has been in the mill, more or less, for the past ten years. The Department notified Oscar Kost, who was president of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce at that time, August 5, 1969, that plans had been completed for construction of a low-water crossing and approaches at the Devils River 21 miles north of Comstock and was scheduled to be let for construction in January of 1970. However, this project bogged down when squabbles over the right-of-way arose. Through the years, various chamber presidents and managers have attempted to revive the project, but not until last year when several members of a local family were drowned in the area, was the project revived seriously. State Representative Susan McBee of Del Rio, was contacted and immediately began work on the project. According to Mr. Gutierrez,

Mrs. McBee was responsible for the meeting Thursday. Mr. Gutierrez showed plans for the proposed construction, and told the group he had run into problems in obtaining easements from land-owners. One landowner objected because as laid out a valuable group of trees would have to be destroyed to gain right-of-way. However, Mr. Gutierrez showed an alternate plan he felt would satisfy the landowner, and said he expected to have an answer within a week. He also mentioned that for extensive improvements the traffic on the road would have to warrant it and said he met only two vehicles on his way to Ozona on the road in question. Mr. Gutierrez also assured the group his department was not in the business to destroy trees or vegetation. However, he said safety

must be a factor in all construction. He agreed money for the bridge including 1,500 feet of new road had been appropriated years ago, but felt the cost would have tripled with inflation. Concerning safety on the road, Mr. Collins explained a solar powered flood warning system which is going to be installed at low water crossings on the highway. The system will be constructed to find the water level by push-button in Del Rio or Comstock, and allow department employees to close the road before conditions become critical. The road would, at the same time, be closed by employees here to traffic traveling south, on instructions from the system operator by radio or telephone. Gutierrez was very optimistic about the flood-warning system, but it was the general consensus of the group the road should not be traveled in inclement weather. The meeting ended on the hopeful note that construction could begin as soon as easements could be obtained. Chamber members attending were Beth Boyd, manager; Jerry Lay, and Al Fields.

## Gonzales seeks legal aid

Belia Gonzales, 35, of Ozona, is in a Ciudad Acuna, Mexico, hospital where she was taken after a car wreck south of that city over a week ago. Ms. Gonzales, a county employee, is covered by hospitalization, but she is being held under guard by Mexican authorities, due to the fact seven persons were killed in the head-on car accident. Mexican law is considerably different from U.S. law, and apparently everyone involved is held accountable in cases of this sort. Reports received here indicate Ms. Gonzales was not at fault in the car accident. A Mexican attorney has been consulted and according to her family here, he can get Ms. Gonzales transferred back to the States. A fund raising campaign for legal fees has been started in Ozona. Donations may be made at the bank by anyone interested in this case.

## More rain for Ozona last week

Another Thursday and Friday of rainfall gave Ozona .79 of an inch of moisture to add to an already wet month. Only a sprinkle fell Sunday night when the area was under a tornado watch and severe thunderstorm warning. Most of the bad weather was south of Ozona where a twister was reported about 7 p.m. moving to the east. Rainfall of up to two inches was reported south of Ozona Sunday night, but lightning and thunder was all that passed overhead. Residents had two uneasy hours, however, as the wind shifted, became ominously still, then came back from another direction as thunder rumbled and lightning lit up the skies to the south and east.

## Official observes drought

Mr. Stephen J. Pringle, State Executive Director of the Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and conservation Service (ASCS) Office in College Station, visited the Crockett County ASCS Office in Ozona Wednesday, May 14. Mr. Pringle, who is a native of Marlin, Texas, was appointed State Executive Director in 1979. He was on a tour to observe effects of the drought in this area of the state, and was accompanied to Ozona by Mr. Thomas Egan of San Angelo, District Director of ASCS District 15, and Mr. Charles A. Henson of Del Rio, County Executive Director of Val Verde-Kinney Counties. The tour party was welcomed in the local office by County ASC Committeemen Sam Perner and Earl Acton, Crockett-Sutton County Executive Director E.J. Hierholzer, and Anita McPherson, Program Assistant.

**Revitalizing America**

In order to survive this decade with something resembling our current standard of living, America desperately needs a revitalization of its industrial base. Every consumer can relate to such a program.

It would have six major elements that are really long-range goals for national policies and priorities. They include: controlling government spending within income; making money available for investment in business; increasing American productivity; developing effective policies for resource management; increasing American competitiveness abroad; and making sure federal regulations serve a useful purpose at a reasonable cost.

Bringing government spending within bounds means that our elected officials must apply some common sense to the complex issues that confront them. Especially in an election year, it is all too easy to say "okay" to anything that seems popular. Unfortunately, America cannot afford to do everything that it might like to do. We must choose only items that are essential to the national welfare. Pork barreling must stop and it must stop now. Every person who paid income taxes on April 15 and every person who sees inflation eroding hard-earned purchasing power should be in favor of this policy.

Specifically, government spending should be limited to a fixed percentage of the national economy. When times are good, money will be available for secondary programs. When times are not so good, the government will have to make choices.

In short, we are asking our elected officials to apply the same commonsense kind of money management that each of us uses at home. When times are good, our families make optional purchases; when times are not so good, we stick to the essentials.

Making money available for investment in business is partially a matter of controlling government spending since the government has priority in terms of borrowing. But "capital formation," as it is called, depends also on a tax climate that encourages productive investments. This means that the money needed to build a utility plant or to modernize a factory or even to start a small business in your community is more likely to be available and to be available at a more reasonable rate of interest. As things now stand, a would-be home purchaser faces outrageous interest rates brought on in part by excessive government spending and regulation. So, too, does the investor in business and industry.

To make money available again, America needs a change in the tax law to encourage the availability of money for modernizing plant and equipment, to make America more competitive and more productive.

Working smarter and harder will also enhance productivity. But productivity is not just a matter of how we work; productivity also has to do with the quality of equipment and technology available to us. This becomes clear when you think in terms of an ordinary home lawn mower. Improve the equipment by giving it an electric or gasoline driven motor and you increase your ability to do productive work, in this case, to mow the grass.

When regulation serves its purpose, it ensures that the earth, air, and water we all own in common are protected from the excesses of the few. However, as it now stands, the regulatory process is burdensome at the very least. In 1979 alone, \$103 billion was siphoned from the American economy into the regulatory process.

In this regard, America needs "sunset" legislation for agencies. This means that those agencies not reauthorized by Congress will be terminated. America needs "sunrise" legislation that would require a statement of specific goals and objectives for all major new forms of regulation. Again, this is just common sense.

Moving forward on effective energy and resource policies will help control inflation and increase productivity. America must use its coal resources in the production of electricity and must look to modernizing its rail systems so that the coal can be transported. The country will have to look to its environmental regulations to ensure that the coal be burned and that scrubbers and other environmental protection equipment are not a net energy drain that also increases pollution.

Controlling government spending, making capital available for investment, increasing productivity, evaluating federal regulations to make sure that they serve an effective purpose and that the purpose is worth the cost, and using resources wisely will help to make us more competitive in the international arena. When people buy foreign products either because they are cheaper or because they are superior to American products, American dollars go overseas and the purchasing power of the dollar here at home is weakened. In addition, jobs—the heart of the American economic system—are transported to other countries.

The need to revitalize American industry is clear. Let us move forward with confidence into a future we shape by intelligent choices, into a future with a revitalized American industrial base, a strong and healthy economy and a better standard of living for all.

**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS**

**AUSTIN** — As expected, Republican Ronald Reagan and Democrat Jimmy Carter captured the majority of delegates to their parties' state conventions this summer following a weekend of county and senatorial district caucusing. . . and Texas Gov. Bill Clements is still considered a possibility for vice president on the GOP slate.

Carter took an easy two-to-one delegate lead over his primary opponent, Sen. Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts, but Kennedy supporters have vowed to wage a hard convention fight.

The presidential contender with the hardest row to hoe in Texas is Illinois Sen. John Anderson who must gather over 40,000 signatures from registered voters here to gain an Independent slot on the ballot.

He is now awaiting a legal opinion from Attorney General Mark White to determine who is eligible to sign his petition.

Anderson has already received a go-ahead from Texas Secretary of State George Strake, a Republican, who last week ruled that Democratic primary voters and others, but not Republican primary voters, were eligible to sign for Anderson.

Strake's interpretation of the legal language prohibited voters in a binding primary from signing for Anderson. The Republican presidential primary was binding; the Democratic primary was not.

Since Strake's ruling will enhance Anderson's ability to siphon votes from the Democrats, and lessen his ability to "raid" Republican voters, Texas Democrats are not pleased.

An opinion on the same subject has been requested of Atty. Gen. White by State Rep. Susan McBee, D-Del Rio, chairman of the House Elections Committee. . . but Anderson supporters say they plan to go ahead with Strake's interpretation.

**Speaker's Race**  
The middle fell out of the race for Texas Speaker of the House last week, leaving the two ends stronger than ever but with no clearcut winner.

The three top moderate candidates pledged to either conservative Gib Lewis, D-Fort Worth, or liberal John Bryant, D-Dallas.

The rapid action was apparently kicked off by Rep. Wayne Peveto of Orange, who joined with Lewis.

Representative Bill Caraway, D-Houston, reading the cards, promptly pledged the other way to Bryant. He was followed three days later by Rep. Lynn Nabors of Brownwood.

Both Bryant and Lewis claimed to have over 80 votes (76 votes needed to win), but a media poll revealed Lewis ahead of Bryant by only 48 to 38, including representatives-elect.

**Off Again, On Again**  
The U.S. Justice Department is still considering State Rep. Matt Garcia, D-San Antonio, for commissioner of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, despite earlier word to the contrary.

The department issued a press release to that effect to head off discontent among Texas' Mexican-American leaders, who had heard Garcia was no longer in the running for the post.

**Texas Supreme Court**  
The state's high court ruled last Wednesday that a seller may exceed the 10 percent interest limit on real estate buys based on sales contracts. . . if finance charges are called a "time price differential."

In sales contract transactions, buyers do not acquire ownership until they pay their final installment, unlike a normal mortgage where a buyer builds equity with payments.

**you and the LAW**

**Q:** In the past, you have stated that joint tenancies with right of survivorship between spouses repeatedly have been found invalid in Texas. Would you please tell me the proper wording that should be used on stocks, bonds, and savings accounts so that the funds will pass directly to the survivor?

**A:** The Texas Constitution and Supreme Court holdings prevent spouses from changing the disposition of community property by attempting to create joint tenancy with rights of survivorship. Unless a partition of community property is made by the spouses, revising the registration will not affect the survivorship. Your attorney should be consulted for methods of partition and possible management and tax problems that may result.

**Q:** When can an autopsy be performed without permission of surviving spouse or next of kin?

**A:** A coroner who has reason to suspect foul play in connection with a death has authority to order an autopsy to determine the cause of death. However, any other interference with a deceased person's body, without first obtaining consent of the surviving spouse or next of kin, is prohibited by law. Any unauthorized interference with a deceased person's body may provide the basis for a suit for damages filed by the person entitled to its custody.

**Q:** A friend of mine in another state said that the company he works for has a legal insurance plan similar to the medical insurance plans that many companies have, where the company pays for legal insurance for their employees. Why doesn't anything like this exist in Texas?

**A:** There is a group legal services plan very similar to group health insurance plans. It's called the Texas Legal Protection Plan and many companies do have the plan for their employees. **Q:** Can a person who is not a lawyer probate a will? I am the executor and the sole beneficiary

**of the estate. There are no other heirs. The estate consists of the home, cash, and stock and no debts or mortgages.**

**A:** Depending upon local practice, the court may allow probate of the will without an attorney. Probate provides a public and permanent disposition, so you will want to observe all the requirements. Without a lawyer to handle re-registration of stock and transfers of title, both you and the estate may be exposed to claims or controversy in the future.

**Tips For Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

After the most welcome rains of the last two weeks, your lawns should show great improvement, but during rainy spells. Watch for brown patch on St. Augustine and Bermuda lawns. This fungal disease is characterized by circular-shaped pattern of dead, brown grass and usually appears in the lowest areas of the lawn first. To prevent further infection, apply Maneb, Benomyl, or Terraclor as soon as the spots are noticed.

Maintaining a beautiful lawn in Texas can be troublesome, especially during drought-prone summers. Nothing can guarantee a problem-free lawn, but your chances of success, will be helped if you keep a few basic rules in mind, particularly when mowing.

The first rule is to mow frequently, once a week for most lawns, so that you never remove too great a portion of the leaves at any one time. When you let the lawn go for two weeks and then mow at the regular height, you are probably removing up to half of the grass blade when you cut. Such a radical pruning weakens the grass, particularly during hot, dry weather. If this has happened, raise the mower blade to its highest level. When you do mow again within 4 or 5 days, lowering the blade a notch. In another 4 or 5 days, mow again, lowering the blade a notch. Repeat the gradual lowering until the grass is back to the desired height. During the warmest months, raise the height of the mower blade to allow the grass to grow higher. The longer leaves shade the soil from the scorching sun, reducing heat stress on the lawn. Raise the cutting height of your mower to about 3 inches for St. Augustine. Dwarf St. Augustine 1 1/2 to 2 inches. Bermuda should be cut to about 1 inch. Other grasses, such as tall fescue require 1 1/2 to 3 inches mowing heights.

Be sure to choose a grass suited to our area, and buy seeds, sprigs, or sod from a reputable dealer.

## Discovery and extender finalized in Crockett Co.

A discovery and an extender were finalized in Crockett County and a wildcat/conformer, a re-entry and an outpost were scheduled.

Queen gas production was opened in the Noelke, Southeast field with completion of The Three B Oil Co., Monahans, No. 1 Shannon Dee, 8 1/2 miles east of Iraan, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 570,000 cubic feet of gas daily.

Production was natural from open hole at 850 feet where 7-inch casing was set, and 2,010 feet, the total depth. It topped the Queen at 1,700 feet, elevation unreported.

Location is 2,173 feet from the north and 1,020 feet from the east lines of Archer CSL No. 4.

MRJ Corp., Houston, will drill the No. 3 George L. Thompson, a 2,500-foot test as a wildcat and as a 5/8 mile

northeast outpost to the opener and lone producer of the Noelke, West (Felker) field, 2.7 miles southeast of Iraan.

Location is 467 feet from the south and 2,201 feet from the east lines of 71-1-I&GN. Ground elevation is 2,191 feet.

The same firm will re-enter and clean out to 840 feet for completion attempt as the second producer and a 3/4-mile east-northeast extension to the Noelke, West field at the former Coyle Oil Syndicate No. 1 Henry M. Halff, 1,382-foot failure, three miles southeast of Iraan.

It was abandoned April 21, 1928.

Location is 926.1 feet from the north and 3,124 feet from the east lines of 70-1-I&GN.

The discovery, Cedar Oil Co. No. 1 H.M. Halff Estate, was finalized Jan. 22, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 460,000 cubic feet of

gas daily, from open hole at 838-45 feet.

Canyon gas production was extended 2 3/4 miles northwest in the American multipay field with completion of Dameron Petroleum Corp., Midland, No. 1 Armond Hoover 17A, 31.8 miles southwest of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute

open flow of 2,612,200 cubic feet of gas daily.

Production was through perforations at 6,448-7,107 feet, which had been fractured with 34,000 gallons and 57,250 pounds of sand.

Scheduled as a wildcat and amended to the above field, it was drilled to 7,500 feet, with 4 1/2-inch casing set at 7,530 feet.

Location is 565 feet from the south and 11,000 feet from the east lines of 17-1-I&GN.

William Perlman, Houston, will drill the No. 2 General Crude, et al, 100 as a 2 1/4-mile southwest outpost to Canyon gas production in the Ozona multipay field, 27 miles southwest of Ozona.

# Blister beetle poisoning cattle

An old, familiar problem has been recently recognized in commercial horse feed. Billy Reagor, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, said the problem is not a crisis and, "we do not want people to panic."

Dr. John Reagor, Toxicologist in the Texas Veterinary Medicine Diagnostic Lab at Texas A&M University recently diagnosed cantharidin in a commercial horse feed. Cantharidin is a toxic substance produced in the glands of blister beetles.

Blister beetle poisoning in livestock has been a widespread problem in the south-west for years, but frequency of toxic poisoning is low.

Livestock poisoning occurs when animals eat fresh-cut forages or hay which was harvested while blister beetles were feeding. Beetles feed in swarms in small areas of a field so generally only a small fraction of the forage is contaminated. Adults should not occur in significant numbers until late July.

Dr. Reagor said cantharidin is highly toxic to horses and they may develop colic by eating only two to five beetles. Blister beetles can be found in any type of forage if weeds or other blooming plants are located in the fields. However, beetles are more attracted to alfalfa because of flowering at harvest. Alfalfa is an excellent horse feed, and the agent does not discourage its use as a livestock feed.

The blister beetle problem is not unique to Texas, and purchasing hay from other states will not solve the problem. The level of toxic cantharidin will vary between individual insects of the same species, and animal reaction depends on the number of beetles consumed.

The agent said a good understanding of the beetle's life cycle and feeding habits

will help plan management strategies to reduce financial losses.

Blister beetles suspected of causing most cantharidin poisoning are the three-striped blister beetle, *Epicauta temexa* and *E. occidentalis*. The critical problem develops when large swarms of adult beetles are physically incorporated in feed during the harvesting process.

Adult beetles range in size from about 1/2 to 3/4 inch long. General body color is black with longitudinal yellow stripes on the elytra. The bodies are cylindrical.

Inspection of baled hay for

beetles is impractical, according to the agent. Detection of infested feed is difficult because the pest is small and may be found in only a few portions of a given lot of feed. Previous specimen collections and field observations indicate that hay cut before June 1 should be relatively free from adult blister beetles.

Beetle-infested areas should be left unharvested or sprayed with an insecticide. This approach will not guarantee absence of beetles, but will reduce higher populations in harvested hay. Low-level populations

are not as important as abundant adult populations which are suspected of causing the serious problems.

# New CAT scanner now being developed

New cancer diagnostic equipment, even more sophisticated than the kind that attracted the Shah of Iran to the United States for treatment, is being designed at the Texas A&M University Physics Department.

Dr. John A. McIntyre, Professor of Physics at A&M, is heading a research team building the prototype of a gamma ray CAT scanner that will produce a sharper picture at less cost than models now available. His research is supported by an American Cancer Society grant.

The CAT, as it is popularly known, stands for "Computerized Assisted Tomography." It is a half-million-dollar instrument that uses x-rays gamma rays to produce a picture of the "insides" of a solid object or a human body and can disclose malfunctioning organs or the beginning growths of cancer.

The original models used revolving x-ray machines shooting beams through the body. Electronic receptors, opposite the x-ray source, transmitted the rays to a computer which "drew" a picture of the interior being viewed. Each view was that of a vertical "slice" of the subject pictured.

The gamma ray CAT creates its computer image from impulses received by electronic receptors encircling

the body. The gamma rays are emitted by radioactive elements injected into the patient's system. The chemicals shortly lose their radioactivity and are eliminated by natural body processes.

The gamma CAT's advantages over its x-ray predecessor is its ability to pinpoint a specific object in the body and even trace physiological processes and record changes in body fluids and structures and in body chemistry. Normal as well as diseased organs in living creatures can be studied in detail for the first time. Yet the present gamma instrument's picture is less sharp than that of the x-ray machine.

Now Dr. McIntyre has found an economical way of improving the gamma CAT's picture. The problem would normally call for a vast increase in number of gamma ray detector and expensive photo-multipliers. To match x-ray clarity as many as 16,000 of both devices would be required with the price tag of photo-multipliers at \$100 each.

The improved CAT is expected to maintain the United States' position as the leader among a score of nations now employing this device in research and for cancer treatment.





## Prime time for tornados this month and next

April, May and June are prime time for twisters. May seems to be the worst month of all and the hours between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. are the most dangerous time because that is when it is easiest for thunderstorms to form and create tornadoes, according to weather experts.

North Central Texas in the area ranging roughly from Lubbock to Dallas seems to be the heart of the Texas tornado zone, the U.S. Weather Service (USWS) says. But few areas are safe from tornadoes. A killer tornado struck north of Austin in April and many other areas are vulnerable because they have spring storms. For instance, warm, moist air coming up from the Gulf of Mexico can collide with concentrations of cool, dry air coming across North Texas from the Rocky Mountains and the northern U.S. This collision creates thunderstorms that may spawn tornadoes and hailstorms.

Scientists have studied tornadoes for years and the one thing they are sure of is their unpredictability. Twisters may appear anytime, anywhere there is a storm. People need to be alert and prepared to deal with them at all times but especially during prime tornado time, the Texas Medical Association says.

Tornadoes usually occur in hot, sticky weather with southerly winds and threatening sky with thunderclouds bulging down. In most cases the tornado moves from the west or southwest toward the northeast. Rain and hail often precede the tornado.

Another good signal to watch for is the USWS bulletin. The USWS issues three types of weather bulletins. The severe weather watch bulletin indicates where and when probabilities are highest. The severe thunderstorm or tornado warning bulletin means a severe thunderstorm or tornado actually has been sighted in the area or indicated by radar. It is advisable to take cover immediately if the warning is issued in your area. The all-clear bulletin indicates the storm or the threat of a storm has ended in the area previously included in a severe thunderstorm or tornado bulletin.


When a tornado warning is issued, the TMA urges people to get inside as quickly as possible. Most people killed in the Wichita Falls tornado last year were in vehicles trying to outrun the storm. If you are inside, open windows on the side of the house away from the storm's approach if there is time to do so. If the house has a basement, take refuge there near the wall in the most sheltered and deepest part. If there is no basement, take

cover in the smallest room with stout walls. Even a heavy piece of furniture against inside walls near the center of the house. Seek shelter away from windows and upper floors of buildings. Keep listening to a battery-powered radio for emergency bulletins.

If away from home, take shelter in a steel-framed or reinforced concrete building. In open country, move away

from the tornado's path at a right angle if you know you can outrun the tornado which can move up to 70 mph. If unable to escape its path, lie down flat in a ditch or ravine. It is reasonably safe to take cover in a ditch or ravine. In floods, shield your head and cover your face with clothing to prevent suffocation from dust. Do not stay in a car, trailer or mobile home. Stay out of buildings with wide-open roofs, such as theaters and gymnasiums.





# Texas treasury has healthy balance

Although the single most impelling problem facing our country today is inflation, the Texas treasury retains a healthy balance, the state treasurer said here recently.

State spending has increased greatly in the past nine years, but a phenomenal growth in existing tax revenues has kept pace with the growing budget, said Warren Harding at the annual County Treasurers Seminar sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"The people of Texas have been fortunate in the past several years as far as increased taxes are concerned," Harding said. "Not since 1971 have state taxes been an important item on the legislative agenda."

The federal revenue sharing program and the adult welfare programs have also been a big help in relieving some of the burden on the state budget, he said. These two federal programs have added more than a billion dollars to the state's spending capacity over the past eight years.

"Thanks to the greatly increased revenues from our state taxes, plus a little help from Washington, the state ended fiscal year 1975 with an unexpected and unheard-of billion dollar surplus. However, four years later, the surplus was down to \$677 million," said the state treasurer.

"The budget for the state of Texas for 1980 amounts to more than \$10 billion. In the vault in the state treasurer's office, we hold more

than \$13.5 billion in securities," he said.

Harding said about \$300 million is received each year from the state tax on cigarettes alone.

But the healthy treasury may soon have to ward off a few menacing problems. Recently, the U.S. Senate passed the federal budget which called for the end of revenue sharing for states and a reduction in aid to welfare programs, Harding reported. This precludes the introduc-

tion of three major fiscal issues to the next regular session of the state legislature:

The issue of how to adjust to a more modest growth rate in state revenues.

The issue of highway financing and especially the question of an increased gasoline tax.

The entire issue of financing government services.

Yet, Harding predicted much optimism for the Lone Star State.

"According to U.S. Census Bureau projections, the 1980 census should show a decrease in the number of 'Snowbelt' seats in the House of Representatives by eight or nine while 'Sun-

belt' seats will increase by the same amount," he said. "A shift of eight seats will increase by the same amount," he said. "A shift of eight seats would give the Sunbelt a one-vote majority in the House for the first time in history."

A new study by the labor department showed the Sunbelt and western states took two out of every three new jobs created in the U.S. from 1968 to 1978, Harding reported. The main reason for such a high employment rate was stated as "the South and West appear to have a better business climate," he said.

Texas was the most favorably rated state in the survey.







# Debra Says

## HOMEMADE BREADS

Homemade yeast breads come alive before your eyes. The action of the yeast and the rising of the dough make breads seem alive-and indeed they are alive.

Thousands of minute organisms feed on the ingredients and produce fermentation to produce a light texture of the final products.

All-purpose flour is used in most home bread making. It

is a combination of hard and soft wheat containing sufficient gluten to produce a light framework.

Bread flour is also available for home use. It gives a larger loaf but requires more kneading than regular flour.

Milk, tap water and potato water are the commonly used liquids in breads.

Milk adds to the nutritional value and may delay stalling. Potato water may speed action of the yeast but tends to darken breads.

Active dry yeast and compressed yeast are commonly used. Compressed yeast is perishable and must be kept in the refrigerator.

Sour dough starters are gaining in popularity and do require more experience to use than commercially obtained yeast.

Yeast develops best at 80-85 degrees F. The "sponge" method of mixing may recommend higher temperatures, but excessive temperatures will kill the yeast.

Too little heat slows the yeast action.

Beginners may wish to use a kitchen thermometer until they can judge the correct temperature.

If a drop of liquid placed on the inside of the wrist feels neither warm or cool, it is probably 80-85 degrees F.

Sugar works with the yeast to from carbon dioxide gas causing the dough to rise and gives the crust a golden brown color.

If sugar is increased in a recipe, also increase the amount of yeast, because large amounts of sugar act as a preservative delaying action of the yeast.

Salt flavors the bread and helps control the rate of rise. Too much salt delays action of the yeast.

Salt can be omitted in breads if salt is restricted in the diet.

Fat is not essential in breads, but it does improve flavor, volume and contributes to a tender crust and an attractive sheen.

Other ingredients can be added to improve breads.

Eggs increase food value, flavor and richness of the bread. They help produce a fine, delicate texture and a golden brown crust.

For an open grain and thick crust, egg white and water are used.

Fruits, nuts, spices and cheeses add flavor and variety.



# Plants for shady areas in garden

You may have some dark, shady spots in your garden, but you don't have to be in the dark about what to plant there.

Coleus, impatiens and fibrous-rooted begonias offer a wide selection of textures, forms and colors from which gardeners can choose to brighten those dark, shady areas, says Dr. William Welch, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

If you like coleus, choose

varieties having long, saber-like leaves or broad, almost heart-shaped leaves. There also are varieties with fringed leaf edges or deeply-lobed oaklike leaves.

The newest in coleus types, a cascading coleus, is bred especially for hanging baskets. "Scarlet Poncho" is the first of this series. It has large, heart-shaped leaves of deep scarlet with a narrow serrated edge of chartreuse, explains Welch.

All coleus types come in an array of colors that include rose, pink, scarlet, bronze,

yellow and gold. They can be grown in shady corners, on your patio in tubs or hanging baskets, or on your kitchen window sill.

Dwarf impatiens are now available with larger flowers, up to two inches across. Some are Compact (8 to 10 inches), with basal branching.

Fibrous begonias give you another choice for shady areas. They have the added advantage of thriving in both partial sun and shade. Three new varieties introduced this year include "Pink Avalanche," "Gladiator" and "Frilly Red."

"Pink Avalanche" was bred for hanging baskets. It boasts one-inch, soft pink flowers on plants with a spectacular, pendulous habit, making great hanging baskets. "Pink Avalanche" does not produce seed but keeps trying anyway, blooming profusely in an effort to reproduce itself.

"Gladiator" is another F1 hybrid that produces brilliant red blooms two to three inches across on 8 to 10 inch plants. Plants have a compact, base-branching habit. "Gladiator" has been recognized as a novelty by Fleuroselect, Europe's equivalent to our All-American Selections.

"Frilly Red" has huge,

bright red blooms, three-fourths to one inch wide and about two inches deep, enhanced by ruffled edges and offset by deep green foliage.
