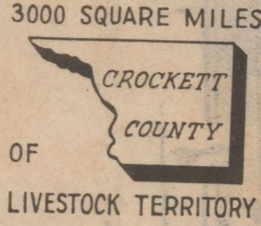

However, everybody around here knows summer arrived in Ozona Saturday when the mercury hit the 100-degree mark at mid-afternoon and then did a repeat performance Sunday. Monday was another scorcher and at 3 o'clock Tuesday the temperature had hit the 90-degree mark and was rising. From all indications, summer arrived a month early in Ozona.

Another Monday holiday has forced us to put out a daily again and we're just not geared for it. I think we were the only downtown business open except for the water district office here Monday. They are going to take the traditional holiday Friday like we always did before the government got into the Monday holiday business. We are going to try, but chances are pretty good we will be open for business as usual come Friday.

I heard some exciting news today on an ABC news brief. They are going to make the Watergate tapes available for the public to listen to. Can you imagine spending your time on something that dull and boring. Good grief!

Our electricity goes on the blink on the west side of town as often as the telephones. Tuesday morning the electricity went off at 4:28 and ours was off almost two hours. With the air conditioner off, it was too hot to sleep, so I spent from 4:28 till daylight wondering how to get a paper out without electricity to run the machines. It took me back in time. Can you imagine hand-setting each letter and space upside-down and backwards, and then printing it on an old hand press? No wonder the early newspapers were tabloid size with just a front and back page.

I remember the hot type method, and I can still read upside-down and backwards. But our method was modern compared to the early days. We set a whole line on one linotype slug, and although the press was hand-fed, we had electricity to run it. We even had a folder. It had to be hand-fed, sheet by sheet, but it sure beat folding with a string and a bone. Times have changed considerably in the past 100 years, and in the newspaper business, the past 10 years have seen the most dramatic change. What would Benjamin Franklin think of our computer-set type with viewing screens and automatic justification, to say nothing of our photo-composition in making up a newspaper.

It has come to my attention that we have run some highly questionable advertising lately, having to do with Jeeps for \$48 and trucks for \$78, etc. If the advertising was not fraud, it certainly bordered on it. Those who called the number given in the ad, got a C.O.D. package and were out over \$20 for two little booklets telling how to buy government surplus and government land. The same day we found out about the ad, we received a check and an order for more advertising. We returned both with a letter explaining why. I'm sorry about this. We try to screen advertising, but that just slipped by somehow. I must warn, however, in the marketplace it's "Let the buyer beware." Cable news network to premiere in Ozona Sun.

Oscar Kost, general manager of Ozona Television System announced that Ozona T-V will offer Cable News Network as an additional basic service to Ozona beginning June 1, on Channel 10 at 5:00 p.m.

For a preview, Friday, May 30, at 2:00 p.m. a press conference will be held live from CNN headquarters in Atlanta. CNN executives will respond to questions from the press.

Cable News Network promises to revolutionize the way in which Americans are informed about domestic and global events and issues. From the moment it is launched, CNN will present continuous news and possess an unprecedented capability to "go live" anywhere in the world where major news is breaking at any hour of the day or night. At its inception, the CNN staff will include more than three hundred electronic journalists, executives, and technical personnel.

Ozona Television System and other cable television systems representing a total of more than three million subscribing households are committed as of this date to carry CNN. Other cable systems continue to sign on in anticipation of the premiere

Sunday. With one hundred sixty-eight consecutive hours each week in which to present news, CNN will possess the unique capability of regularly covering major news stories with more immediacy and completeness than any broadcast news organization. On major stories, CNN will be able to provide frequent follow-up pieces, from new angles, throughout the day, the week, or for as long as the story is newsworthy; and in the event of a world crisis, CNN will be able to provide continuous coverage for as long as it takes to give Americans the complete story.

Bringing CNN's unprecedented news coverage to the American public will be a distinguished group of television news professionals, Washington political figures, national columnists, and popular authorities on a wide variety of subjects.

Among those who will report and interpret the news on CNN are former CBS News correspondent Daniel Schorr; former Secretary of the Treasury William Simon; former ABC News Vice-President and Washington Bureau Chief George Watson; U.S. Senator Barry Goldwater, and former Congress-

woman Bella Abzug. Other CNN commentators are the political columnists Rowland Evans and Robert Novak; political columnist and author Richard Reeves; financial commentator Dan Dorfman; psychologist Dr. Joyce Brothers; and author and commentator Phyllis Schlafly.

A two-hour news broadcast from 8:00 to 10:00 p.m., Eastern Time, will be the centerpiece of CNN's twenty-four-hour day. In addition,

there will be a total of sixty minutes each night of business and financial news, including detailed reports and analyses of the stock market. There will be periodic updates during the day. There also will be a total of forty-five minutes each night of detailed sports coverage, including extensive taped highlights of professional and college games across the country, and reports on special sporting events around the world not usually covered by network sportscasts.

Total payments to Crockett County producers were \$536,220.41 for the Wool Incentive Program this year. Wool incentive drafts were mailed April 11.

The current Emergency Feed Program period will end May 31. Producers are reminded to turn in feed tickets as soon as possible, and within 30 days of the ending of the feed period.

Producers are also reminded during late May and June, Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and midyear livestock numbers for the State of Texas and for each county.

Prompt and accurate completion of the survey provides for more reliable estimates and helps to reduce survey costs. All individual information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

Also, producers in Crockett County are eligible for Disaster Loans from the Small Business Administration. To qualify, a producer must have suffered a production loss due to drought.

The Ozona, East field produces from 8,340 feet; the Davidson Ranch field produces from the 6200 Canyon, 7890 Pennsylvanian and 8606 gas pays.

Mason polled the most votes in the three-way race in the first primary, but failed to get more votes than the other two candidates.

The race for commissioner, Precinct 1, will be between incumbent Sostenes DeHoyos and Frank (Pancho) McMullan, Jr. This also was the outcome of a three-way race in the first primary.

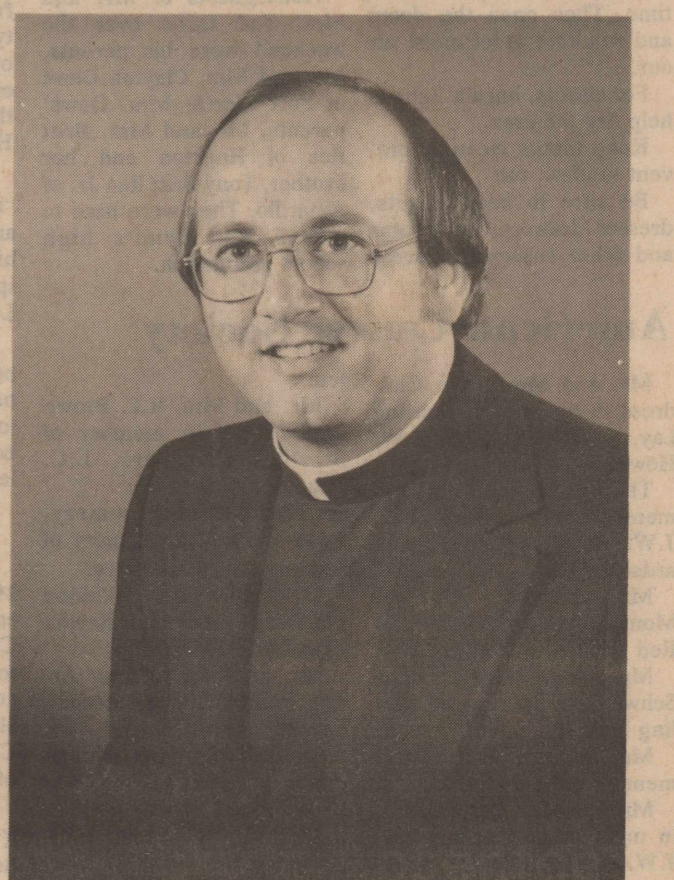
County 4-H Horse Show is Saturday

Grand jury indicts four men Tuesday

Assistant District Attorney Bill Mason asked for and received four indictments at a called meeting of the 112th District Grand Jury here Tuesday morning.

Indicted for aggravated assault with intent to do bodily harm were Albert Borrego, Reynaldo Borrego, and Antonio Borrego. Complaining witnesses were Abel Salazar and Andres DeLa Garza. The charges grew out of a fight in the early hours of May 17, in front of the Catholic Church. As a result Abel Salazar was hospitalized in serious condition and

De La Garza was treated and released at Crockett County Hospital.

The Borregos, all brothers, are being held for trial in Crockett County Jail under \$5,000 cash bonds or \$15,000 surety bonds.

The other indictment was returned against Henry T. Hall of Upton County. He is charged with indecency with a child. The charges grew out of an incident which happened in Crockett County just across the Pecos bridge. Trial dates have not been set.

Use "search 'n prevent" tactics to avoid mildew damage.

You can prevent mildew growth-if you know how. Mildew is a problem in areas with high humidity--or damaging floods.

Mildew needs moisture to grow, although mildew molds are always in the air. When it does grow, mildew leaves a musty odor, it discolors fabrics and sometimes it causes them to rot.

Molds usually develop on cotton, linen, rayon, silk, wool, leather, wood and paper. Its favorite hiding places are damp, dark, warm and poorly aired cellars, crawl spaces, and clothes closets.

Its favorite victims are draperies and rugs in basements, shower curtains, and clothes stored when damp or dirty. To prevent mildew, control the causes of dampness--keep things dry.

Replace cracked or defective mortar around a house. Be sure drainage is adequate. Consider waterproofing concrete and other masonry walls above ground.

Seal absorbent brick and other surfaces. Prevent moisture from entering crawl spaces by spreading a layer of moisture-barrier material over the soil under the building.

Good ventilation also helps remove moisture. When outside air is drier than inside air, it absorbs excess moisture, and you can help it do an even more efficient job--use an electric fan to circulate the air if natural breezes are not sufficient.

In addition, air conditioners take warm, moist air out of a room. Then they cool it, dry it and circulate the cool, dry air back into the room. Also, a dehumidifier helps control humidity.

When using an air conditioner or dehumidifier, keep the windows and doors closed. If your house is very damp, turn the heat on for a short time. Then open the doors and windows to let moist air out.

For closets, burn a light to help dry the area. Keep things clean to prevent mildew, too. Be sure to keep closets, dresser drawers, bathrooms and other susceptible areas

as clean as possible. The best method depends on the surface you're cleaning. Some may require regular care with detergent or soap suds, while others may need special cleaners.

Contact your County Extension Office if you need guidance.

In addition, make sure home furnishings and clothing are clean and dry.

Store garments and furnishings only when clean and dry.

Even many man-made fibers which resist mildew must be kept clean--since soil on them--under the right conditions--can start mildew growth on other fabrics.

Chemicals are available to help prevent mildew, too.

Water-repellent sprays, mildew inhibitors, fungicides and chemicals to absorb moisture can help keep fabrics and surfaces dry and mold-free.

They're available in department, drug or building-supply stores, and they're sold under various trade names.

Be careful, though--always use them according to label directions, and keep them out of children's and pets' reach.

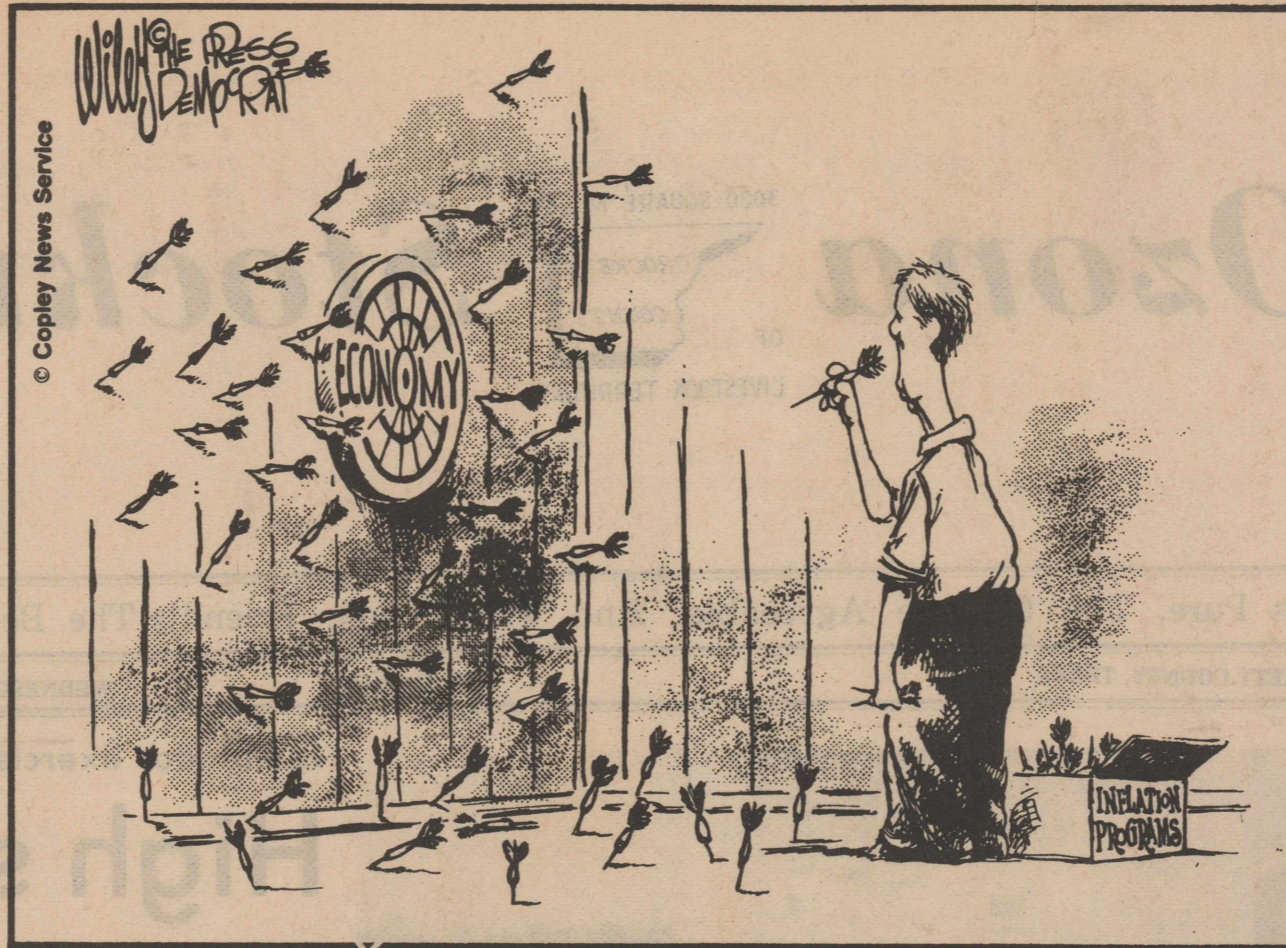

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — Former Texas Attorney General John Hill, who lost the 1978 gubernatorial race to Republican Bill Clements, was back in the headlines last week after winning a multi-million dollar damages lawsuit against the nation of Iran.

A Dallas federal court ruled Electronic Data Systems Corporation (EDS) was entitled to collect \$19.2 million in damages from the government of Iran for a breach of a computer services contract.

Ironically, EDS is owned by H. Ross Perot, who heads up Gov. Clements' task force against narcotics trafficking. Perot, by the way, is the hero-organizer of last year's commando raid into Iran to free Americans (his employees) held in Tehran prisons.

Hill apparently has been building more than his private law practice since his '78 political defeat. A recent Texas Monthly magazine poll showed that 52 percent of Texans now prefer him over Clements (48 percent) in a governor's race.

In the Iranian lawsuit, Hill lead a team of four lawyers who first secured an attachment on Iranian funds in New York banks.

He told one reporter last week he believes the Mexican government is liable for damages to Texas beaches from the Ixtoc I oil spill under provisions in the Sovereign Immunities Act.

Clements Blasts Carter

Clements predicted President Jimmy Carter will lose Texas votes because of a U.S. Justice Department decision to seek integration of city and suburban school districts in Houston.

The motion to seek inter-district integration "will be a catastrophe" in Clements' opinion, and will work against Carter and for his projected Republican opponent, Ronald Reagan, at the polls in November.

Goldberg Blasts Clements

The Governor himself drew political fire last week from Texas Democratic Party Chairman Billy Goldberg of Houston, who said Clements was trying to hand-pick the new Speaker of the House.

Goldberg said Clements "has been using every amount of force available to his high office" to support speaker candidate Rep. Gib Lewis of Fort Worth.

Clements retorted Goldberg was "babbling utter nonsense," but a lobbyist told reporters Clements had boosted Lewis at a lunch for legislators.

New Speaker Candidate

A new candidate for the 1981 House Speaker race emerged last week: Rep. Craig Washington, D-Houston, who claims he can become the first black ever elected to that chair if Bill Clayton steps down because of Brilab woes.

According to Washington, if the speaker election were held today, front-runners

Lewis and Rep. John Bryant, D-Dallas, would only receive about 50 votes each (short of the necessary 76 votes majority) . . . and Washington would win on the second ballot.

Washington said he entered the race because of the lack of a moderate candidate, but other theories are floating about the Capitol halls. One guess is that Washington is holding the black legislative bloc until it can throw the race decisively to Lewis or Bryant (receiving a few committee chairmanships in return). A second scenario paints Washington as a spoiler, stalling both Bryant and Lewis candidacies until Clayton can clear himself of Brilab and solidify his chair.

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Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

After the last few weeks of rain in our area, one can hardly believe its the same place of a month ago. It seems that everyone is now trying to get caught up with mowing and grooming their fast growing grass and flowers, trees and shrubs.

I notice the confederate jasmine is now in bloom. Also known as star jasmine, its rapid rate of growth is easier to control than most cultivated vines because it twines and does not attack itself to the structure it climbs on. For this reason, it combines the evergreen qualities of honeysuckle, the fragrance of Wisteria, and the usefulness of English ivy. This jasmine can be used for screening or as an arbor or trellis plant. Grown over a wall or on a bank it cascades gracefully. It can also be grown on a fence or wall if support is provided until the plants become well established. Unlike other vines, honeysuckle and Wisteria, this vine can be grown on trees without the risk of girdling and strangulation.

Confederate jasmine, prefers shade, rate of growth and flowering capabilities are hampered when plants are exposed to full sun. Used as a ground cover, it reaches a height of 12 to 18 inches. Occasional trimming to keep plants compact is the only routine maintenance required. The fragrant, white star-shaped flowers appear in profusion in the late spring. I feel sure you can find these plants in buckets at most any nursery.

If the freeze didn't ruin your fruit crop, it is best to thin the crop to increase the quality. Your fruit will be large, well shaped peaches, pears or apples. Too, if your trees are young too many on a limb may cause young branches to break off under the weight. Thin stone fruits to 4 to 6-inch intervals along the branch and thin apples and pears to 6 to 8 inches intervals. While fruits are developing, regular watering is crucial. If rainfall is sparse, water fruit trees at least once a week, allowing water to soak into soil for an hour. Young trees will benefit from a mulch.

If you have new Japanese pittosporum plants you can control its rapid rate of growth without pruning. In early spring it puts on new shoots that are light green, fleshy, and fragile. You can easily break these off by brushing over the plant with a broom. These that don't brush off can be snapped off with your fingers. This method of pruning is superior to using pruning shears, as it allows you to keep the size of the plant under control without hampering its form. Although tolerant of light to medium shade, Japanese pittosporum may become leggy when it is grown under shady conditions.
