



Energy: A Perspective

By this time, Americans are aware that this country faces a massive energy problem. We see the evidence in higher prices at the gas pumps, rising utility costs and, at times, scattered shortages both of gasoline and heating oil. But not many people have a real understanding of how we got where we are and what we can do to improve America's energy outlook for the future. Clearly, however, our energy problem will not wait for tomorrow. Our intelligent thought and concentrated efforts will be required to develop workable solutions.

At the heart of America's energy problems are: an excessive dependence on foreign oil; inadequate incentives for production of domestic fuels; and unrealistically low, government-controlled prices for oil and gas. Government policies that have maintained artificially low prices for oil and gas encouraged consumption and discouraged conservation, exploration and the development of alternative energy sources. A host of federal regulatory policies also affected the availability of energy supplies. The trade-off between environmental and energy needs has often been made in favor of the environment. Less energy is thus available to power the factories, homes and automobiles of America.

As recently as the 1930s, natural gas was considered only a waste product. Demand was not sufficient to finance development. After World War II, however, an increased need for energy and a desire for cleaner air turned natural gas into a glamour fuel. Natural gas prices were first regulated in 1954. In 1961, a ceiling was placed on interstate gas shipping prices. This ceiling held natural gas cost to perhaps half of its real value, making it profitable to produce from existing gas fields only. Thus, the country increasingly turned to other energy sources, chiefly oil. In this way, price controls helped to keep the supply of natural gas below the demand by keeping prices lower than market value.

After the 1973 October War in the Middle East and the resulting embargo of oil supplies to the United States, the price of imported oil tripled almost immediately. Since that time, oil prices have increased substantially, now standing at about 10 times what they were in 1973. The price of coal rose also as energy users turned their attention to that domestically abundant source of

Americans have come to understand that the fossil fuels supply is ultimately finite. However, in general, we do not understand that we are facing a time shortage and a technology shortage more than a shortage of raw


America has sufficient coal reserves, for example, to supply the nation's total energy needs for 120 years while sustaining a 3 per cent annual growth rate. Used in combination with other fuels, proven and estimated coal reserves could extend this to 500-600 years. But policy makers must move quickly in the right direction if we are to be able to work our way through this transitional period without massive dislocations of people, jobs and economic resources. As to solutions. development of domestic energy resources is America's best hope to reduce our dependence on imported oil. Coal is the most abundant of those resources.

It is clear that America must place a very high priority on the establishment of a comprehensive national energy policy which favors economic growth. This is so because economic growth means a higher standard of life for Americans. It means that more people can have an increasing share of a growing amount of income.

Our energy policy must develop a climate conducive to increased exploration, development and more efficient use of all domestic energy resources. We must look also to our secondary sources of support such as the railroads, ensuring that they are able to transport the massive quantities of coal our nation will need. Environmental regulations, too, must be scrutinized to ensure that they do not place costly, restrictive and even environmentally unsound constraints on the mining and use of coal.

America needs private sector programs to develop alternative energy sources and technologies and facilitate and enhance the recovery and use of traditional resources, as well as to develop new sources such as coal gas and liquids, oil shale, winds, hydrogen, solar and geothermal and biomass fuels. Government policies should not impair the ability of energy-producing and energy-consuming segments of society to obtain adequate funding for energy-related projects because of price controls, limitations on diversified industrial activity, or by requiring divestitures on the part of energy producers.

As Americans, each of us will have to learn a new perspective on energy. The fine old days of cheap energy are gone, at least for the foreseeable future. However, with the proper federal policies supporting energy production and with nationwide support for voluntary conservation, this country can take a giant step forward into a productive, energy-wise future.

AUSTIN — When State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced a few weeks ago that he would allow his department employees to have their union dues deducted from their state paychecks, he created a swirl that has since generated into a windstorm

Individuals who are dead set against unionization of state employees have been trying to find ways to prevent his dues check-off, and last week a suit was filed to stop Bullock.

Two state employees and the Texas Right to Work Committee have won a June 9 trial to determine if Bullock has the right to deduct union dues from state employees paychecks. Bullock had planned to start the check-off system last Sunday, having obtained a goahead from Atty. Gen. Mark

In filing the suit, the plaintiffs argue that the Texas Constitution gives Bullock no express or implied right to allow the check-off, and that such a check-off would violate the Right to Work law by becoming a political tool of department heads.

Bullock's attorneys argue there is nothing in state law to prohibit the check-off.

Clements Wants Ban State law will ban the check-off next year, if Gov. Bill Clements has his way.

The Governor, who has warned other department heads not to follow Bullock's lead, said last week he will present "as a major item of business" a plan to ban union dues check-off for state employees.

Clements also wants a plan to store low and high level nuclear wastes. Although not in a crisis situation at present, Texas is approaching a crisis in storing such wastes, he said.

Strake and White

Texas Secretary of State George Strake and Atty. Gen. Mark White have bumped heads on the issue of which voters may sign a petition to put Republicanturned-Independent John Anderson on the Texas presidential ballot. At stake are the number of voters Anderson will siphon off from

Strake, a Republican, said two weeks ago only Democrat primary voters could Anderson's petition. Last week, at the request of the House Elections Committee, the Democrat White ruled that both Democrats and Republicans who voted in last month's primary were

ineligible to sign the petition. Strake followed White's legal opinion by saying it was incorrect and does not matter, since he, Strake, is the state's "chief election officer" and makes him solely responsible for interpreting the state election laws.

Betty Ford Visits Texas

Two former first ladies got together last week when Betty Ford visited Lady Bird Johnson at LBJ ranch. Ford attended a Republican luncheon in her honor in Austin and endorsed Ronald Reagan for president.

When asked if she would consider voting for Reagan, Mrs. Johnson, the former Democratic first lady escorting Mrs. Ford, said "No!"

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

an an an an an an an an Its time to plan your fall garden, so brighten it with colorful and long lasting Chrysanthemums. If you haven't already set out transplants, now is the time to do so. Planting mums in June produces busy, compact plants that do not need much staking. Grow mums in sunny site in well-drained, fertile soil. Prepare the bed by applying a complete fertilizer at the rate of 2 to 3 pounds per 100 square feet. Work the fertilizer into the top 6 inches of soil, and water thoroughly. Six weeks after planting, apply a side-dressing of ammonium sulfate fertilizer at the rate of ½ pound per 50 feet of row. Apply another side-dressing in mid-August, and be sure to water well after each application.

To produce compact plants with large numbers of flowers, pinch off the tips of new shoots after they reach 3 inches in length. Shoots may need to be repinched as they continue to produce new growth; however, no pinching should be done after July. Apply an organic mulch around the plants to help conserve moisture and reduce weed growth. Good mulching materials include wood chips, peat moss and

bark. Fertilize flowering annuals every six to eight weeks to ensure continued bloom. Use 5-10-10 or 6-12-12 at the rate of 2 pounds per 100 square feet of bed area. Avoid applying dry fertilizer closer than 6 inches to plants; otherwise, burning may re-

Plant bearded iris now to produce stronger plants and more attractive flowers next like to try. spring. They should be grown in a sunny site in wellsoil. Plant the rhizomes just below the soil surface.

Then launder the items in hot water, detergent or soapand chlorine bleach if the fabric is bleachable.

If the stain remains, sponge it with hydrogen peroxide. Rinse and launder

If the fabric is not bleachoxygen bleach, according to directions. Then wash.

Take non-washables to the dry cleaner, and tell them the stain is mildew.

For upholstered pieces, mattresses, rugs or carpets, treatment is different than above, since mildew penetrates these items deeply. When possible, start by

taking the mildewed item outside and brush the mold away with a broom. Next, use the upholstery

attachment of a vacuum cleaner to take away even more mold. Run it over the surface to draw out more of the mildew.

Remember, mold spores are going into the vacuum, so throw the bag away outside to avoid scattering mold spores inside the house.

Ex-GI's denied treatment while Cubans occupy beds

which authorizes Cuban refugees to occupy beds at the Veterans Administration tors Call Some VA Policies (VA) medical center in Tampa, Fla., while sick and disabled ex-GI's are being denied treatment, has drawn outraged criticism from the 670-000-member Disabled American Veterans (DAV).

The Carter Administration has ordered the Tampa VA medical center to reserve 40 hospital beds for ailing Cuban refugees. The VA medical center in Gainesville, aliens at a time when men Fla., has been told to reserve 50 medical and surgical beds for this purpose. On Monday, while 13 Cuban refugees were occupying beds on the Tampa VA facility's psychiatric wards, two American veterans applying for psychiatric care were denied admission due to lack of beds in the hospital's psychiatric care sec-

The Tampa VA hospital has been hit particularly hard by Carter Administration budget policies in recent years. Underfunding and understaffing at the hospital were causing denial of treatment to many eligible Tampa veterans long before the massive influx of Cuban refugees into Florida began.

While this situation has its parallels at VA health care facilities across the United States, the problem in Tampa became so severe a year tention to it.

"I'm astonished by the crass insensitivity of giving priority medical care in VA facilities to undocumented and women who fought in our nation's wars are being turned away at the door,' said DAV National Commander Paul L. Thompson.

He noted that the situation could only become worse as more Cubans enter VA hospitals, filling the beds allotted the them. The DAV has learned that Carter Administration officials have contracted other VA medical centers in Florida, searching for hospital beds in which to place Cuban refugees requiring medical attention.

'This is a clear indication of how the Carter Administration really feels about the nation's commitment to its war veterans--how its policies have become the complete opposite of what they should be," said Thompson.
