

Mr. Murphy was walking on Highway 163 with his dog around 8:30 Monday night when he was hit by a car driven by Santa Fierro. Miss Fierro was driving a 1979 Buick and traveling south when the accident occurred. She was meeting a car at the time and did not see Mr. Murphy until the car hit him.

He suffered broken bones, bruises and abrasions and was treated after being rushed to the hospital by ambulance.

The market value of agriaccompanying increase in totaled 1,871,569 acres in number of sheep changed production costs, according to a preliminary report of the 1978 Census of Agriculture released today by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce.

Clarence E. Rushing, 53, prominent California attorney, and his wife, Lois, 56, both of Modesto, California, were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace A.O. Fields. What could be recovered of the bodies were taken to Sizemore Funeral Home here.

The plane hit with such impact the engines were buried in the ground and the plane was completely demolished. Officials think the small Beechcraft, piloted by Rushing, exploded when it hit the ground. There was no fire, but the only identification came when the couples' billfolds were found



To keep abrest of spring work is necessary to plan carefully and, above all, to take advantage of every favorable opportunity the weather affords.

Bulbs for summer blooming that may be planted in March are calla lilies, floriosas, crinums, cannas, tube roses, gladioli, oxalis, tigreddias, hymenocallis (spider lily), tigribias.
