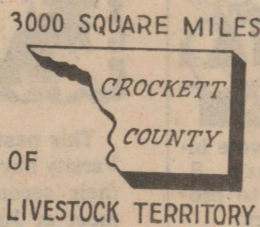

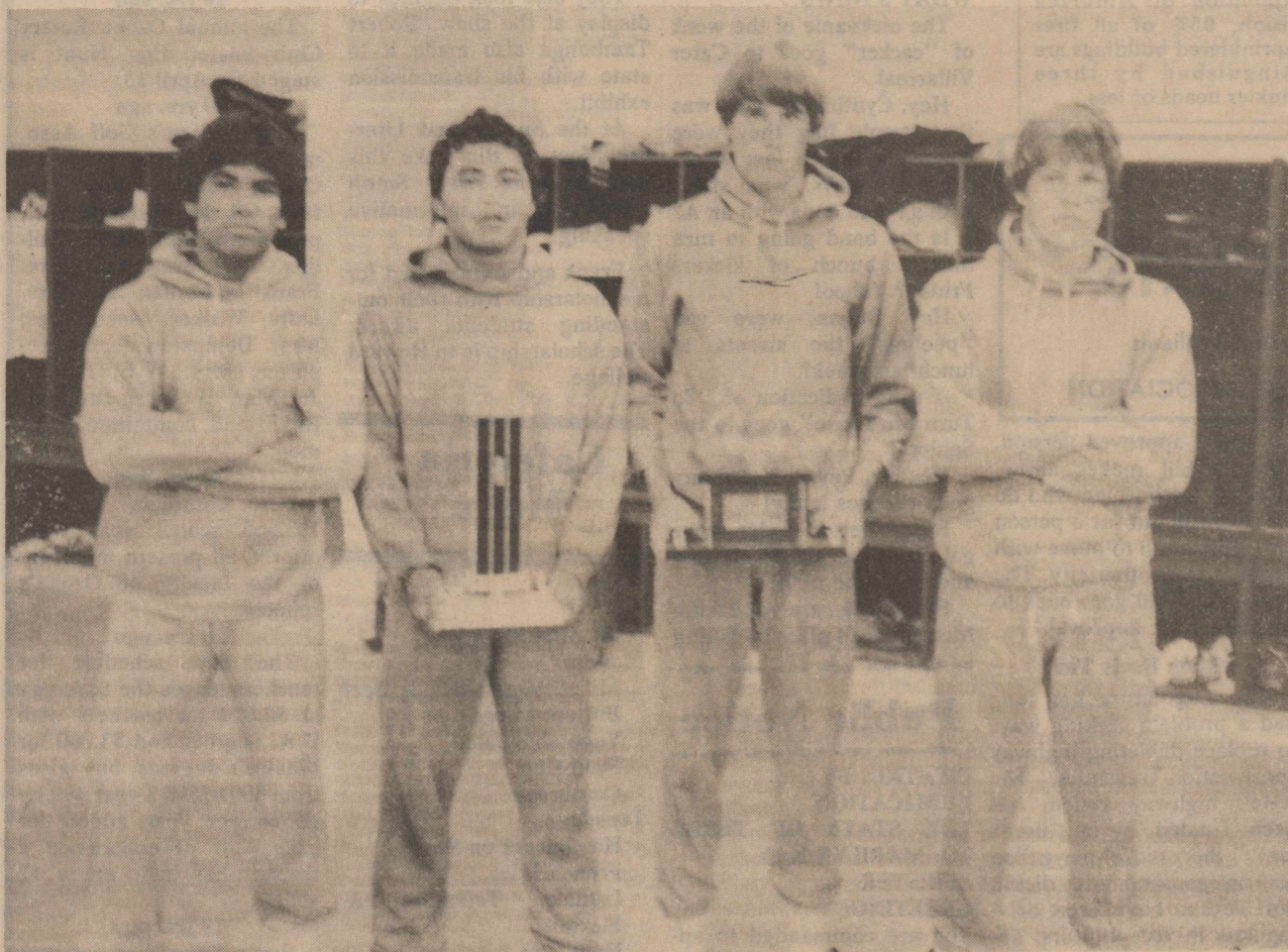

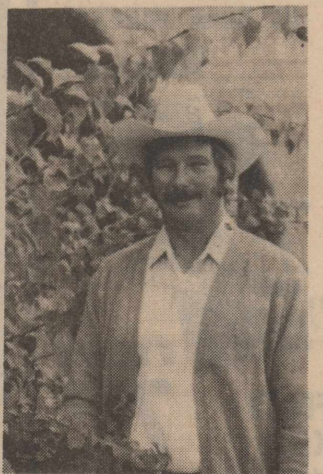
Lions win second meet in row at Junction

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Hospital almost breaks even-

Court hears good news for change

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday in a routine monthly meeting and got a pleasant surprise when the hospital report was given. For the first time in many years, receipts were almost equal to expenditures. During the month of February, receipts totaled \$95,069.39, while expenditures amounted to \$97,313.98. The court expressed appreciation and the hope that the heavy losses incurred in the past by the hospital might be turning around.

Hospital administrator Glen Rumley also reported the hospital board was short one member, Bekie's term had expired. A new director of nurses has been hired and Rumley is looking for housing. The court took no action.

The court did vote to purchase a new dishwasher for the Civic Center and appointed new members for the Civic Center board. Appointed to the board by the court were Doyle Lovell, Wanda Dews, Elizabeth Upham, Belinda Wilkins and Chesta Stuart.

The Road Department report was given by Onesimo Ortiz, who reported the west wall on the road department building was giving way and the bricks breaking loose. He also informed the court the department would work the dump ground once a month. The court took no action, but did agree to get bids on a new pull truck.

Bobby Aycock appeared before the court to ask for support in his crusade against teenage drinking in Ozona. Court members were in agreement with Aycock, but told him they could take no official action and referred him to local law enforcement agencies.

Fire Chief Dorris Haire's request for \$1,235 for electric doors at the fire station, was granted.

Mrs. R.A. Harrell and Lee Graves met with the court to report on the moving of the Emerald House to the planned museum complex site at the fair grounds. They

reported the house had been moved by experts in that field. They requested \$50,000 from the county for restoration, architect's fees, etc. The court took no action. The court voted to sit as a board of equalization Thursday, July 9, at 9:00 a.m. They also voted to re-invest \$1,548,500 in Certificates of Deposit at a 10% interest rate.

The court gave approval for a new public address system to be installed in the District Court Room by Oscar Kost.

Paul Shacklette asked to build an additional hangar at the airport. The court gave approval, provided space is available.

No further business was pending and the court adjourned by noon.

Sellers bids for school board post

Henry (Hank) Sellers filed for a place on the Crockett County School Board ballot before the deadline last week.

In making his announcement, he said, "The greater part of my adult life has been devoted to public education. I feel that my educational and professional background--two degrees and sixteen years of teaching experience at the high school and university levels--qualifies me to serve effectively as a school board trustee. Most of my teaching experience has been in West Texas school districts with resources and needs similar to those of Ozona, and my connection with Ozona and knowledge of the county date from 1966."

"Public education in this country is facing some unusually severe challenges. It seems to me that the decisions of local school boards are now as difficult and important as they have ever

been. I would like very much to serve as a trustee of the Crockett County School Board, and I believe that my strong interest in quality education as well as my experience in public school affairs would enable me to make a valid contribution to the Ozona schools. If elected, I will serve with enthusiasm, energy, fairness, and sensitivity to the needs of the school system and the citizens," Sellers added.

Sellers is forty-six years of age, has resided in Ozona for four years, and is engaged in ranching in Crockett County, assisting in the operation of the Ralph Watson Ranch. A graduate of George W. Brackenridge High School, San Antonio, Texas, he holds the Bachelor of Music degree in voice and music education from Trinity University and the Master of Music degree in music history from Texas Christian University. He is a military veteran, having served in the U.S. Army as a personnel management specialist from 1954-1957.

Sellers is married to the former Wanda Carden, member of a pioneer Crockett County ranch family and a graduate of Ozona High School. Mrs. Sellers holds degrees from Trinity University and the University of Texas at Austin. The couple has two children, Mark, a sixth grade student at Ozona Junior High School, and Catherine, a first grade student at Ozona Primary School. **PD. POL. ADV.**

Rabies found in Crockett Co.

Rabies is as rampant in Crockett County as in other parts of the area. According to Dr. Gary Vannoy, there have been 20 confirmed cases the past 12 months. Dr. Vannoy said he did not want to be an alarmist, but the community needs to be advised to have all pets vaccinated for the dread disease, horses, cats and dogs, and most household pets. With 20 cases confirmed, it is impossible to venture a guess as to the actual number of cases.

rabies. A pet housecat was a confirmed rabies case, and as a result, three young people are taking the shots. The other two taking shots are also the victim of cat bite, although the cat or cats in question has not been found. In separate incidents a young girl was attacked by a cat near the high school campus, and a boy was attacked by a cat near town. Unable to confirm rabies, the shots were administered as a precautionary measure.

Most of the cases Dr. Vannoy has confirmed as rabies have been varmint or livestock. When pets are vaccinated, it takes seven days for the animal to develop immunity to rabies. Besides having pets vaccinated, youngsters and adults should stay away from stray animals.

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FORMALDEHYDE IN A PICKLE

The plywood, textile, furniture and paper industries of America may soon find themselves in a deep pickle — all because the un-Reaganized Consumer Product Safety Commission wants to ban formaldehyde.

Despite convincing evidence to the contrary, and although it has been in commercial use since 1889, the CPSC has decided that formaldehyde may be harmful to your health, and could result in American workers ending up just like those fat frogs we used to dissect in high school biology class.

The flap started in early January, as outgoing Carter Administration regulators were taking their last swipes at U.S. industry, and the CPSC issued a proposal to ban formaldehyde foam insulation. The ban would kill the foam insulation industry, if allowed to stand.

CPSC also is considering regulatory action affecting the plywood and textile industries, both of which are heavily dependent on the use of formaldehyde, and both of which already are under heavy competition from overseas.

Comes now the Environmental Protection Agency, which doesn't want to be left out of the act, and already has put formaldehyde on its blacklist of "suspected" carcinogens (chemicals which are thought to induce cancer; all sorts of scary things like black pepper are on the list).

All this activity presumably is on hold, of course, under the Reagan Administration's regulatory freeze. But the professional bureaucrats are anxious to move ahead.

This would, of course, seem prudent if some sort of relationship could be shown to exist between exposure to formaldehyde and cancer in humans. That's not the case. A number of epidemiological studies involving exposure of morticians and workers in formaldehyde-producing plants to formaldehyde fumes have all given the chemical a clean bill of health.

While there is some tentative evidence that animals exposed to formaldehyde may not fare as well, a lifetime (18-month) inhalation study on hamsters, conducted by the Oak Ridge National Laboratory for the National Cancer Institute, produced no evidence of cancer, and a long-term study by the University of Cincinnati also produced no evidence of tumor formation.

The human epidemiological studies are, of course, the most important because they reflect real-life situations.

Because of its funny name and foul smell, formaldehyde may not seem like something we should care much about.

Yet, as the Formaldehyde Institute in Scarsdale, N.Y., points out, if the chemicals found in nature or synthesized by man were rated in their order of importance in everyday life, formaldehyde would rank near the top.

It is formaldehyde, for example, that helps keep the "press" in permanent press. The bonding properties of formaldehyde polymers makes them essential for the economical production of plywood, particle board, and furniture. Formaldehyde-containing materials and binding agents are employed in the casting of aluminum, iron and steel parts for autos, home appliances, and industrial machinery. Formaldehyde also is used for insulation, helps paint bond to surfaces, and is used in the manufacture of floor coverings and as a carpet backing.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — State agriculture officials last week closed the Texas border to California trucks carrying citrus fruit. . . and California wants the U.S. Supreme Court to re-open the Texas gates.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown imposed the quarantine to halt California produce unless it has been fumigated or placed in cold storage to kill adult Medflies (Mediterranean fruit flies) and their maggots.

The action touched off a legal war between the states.

Allied with major growers there, the State of California sued directly in the Supreme Court, and won the Justice Department's help in seeking a restraint on the quarantine.

The Justice Department officials argued that Texas "speculative concern" about the potential damage from the fruit flies was far outweighed by the real damage the quarantine is inflicting to the California economy.

In response, Brown said that Texas growers are going to sue for damages if the Medflies are allowed into the Lone Star State.

He quipped that if he had not ordered the quarantine, those same growers would have tarred and feathered him.

The federal government's support of California came as no surprise to Texas officials. The U.S. Dept. of Agriculture had supervised the California program to get rid of the flies and may not want to admit the program failed, said one official.

And, too, the home state of President Ronald Reagan has political clout all the way to the White House.

Motor Fuels Tax
The Legislature has long had a problem seeking ways to replace depleting highway construction revenues. The state's highway system has been funded by a "user's tax", the nickel-per-gallon tax on gasoline and diesel, but Texans have been driving less in recent years, apparently because of the rising cost of fuel.

Governor Bill Clements and House Speaker Bill Clayton have dusted off the plan to raise the state's motor fuels tax, currently lowest in the nation.

Clayton said last week that Clements had predicted gasoline prices may be going down in four to six months because of a glut in supply, and that a 2-cents-per-gallon increase was supported by the pair.

The state would receive about \$100 million per year for every penny it raises the tax and Clayton estimated that inflated highway construction costs would probably drain \$900 million from the general revenue fund in 1982-83.

Clements Lore
For his part, Clements made political friends in some areas and enemies in others in two non-related incidents last week which add more color to the already-rich "Clements lore."

The Governor, archenemy to organized labor, refused to see (and barred from his office) a group of Texas Farm Workers Union members.

The Governor also endeared himself with opponents of state spending when he apparently coldly rejected a black legislator's plea for \$20,000 in state aid to help find the killer of 19 black children in Atlanta.

Clements reportedly told Rep. Lanell Cofer that he "doesn't believe in charity", but his office later issued a statement saying he would cooperate if he got a formal request for aid.

Unemployment Aid Cutback
The Texas House last week approved a bill making it harder for persons who voluntarily quit working or who are fired to collect unemployment benefits.

If the bill becomes law, a person cannot receive unemployment compensation until he or she has worked for at least six weeks in another job.

The version by Rep. Bill Messer, D-Belton, was only a bit more moderate than

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

That strong and unwelcome March wind that hit us last week after having that wonderful rain to settle that dust wasn't so bad, but I'm sure there will be more before March is over.

Do drive over our city to see the beautiful blooming fruit trees though it may be a warning that we will be minus a fruit crop.

The pruning of the trees in Ozona has really improved the appearance of the parks and home landscapes.

Next month will be cleanup time so start grooming your home grounds and nearby unsightly areas. If everyone will enter into this project with 100% participation, our city will sparkle for the spring season.

Most all of the hills over town are covered with blooming native colorful spring and summer flowers.

You can put your garden's best-looking plants to work in the most practical ways. They can fill jobs like bug control, be bird havens, replace fences, and produce food and support other plants.

Choose some plants that encourage birds to linger in your area. Our winged friends make rapid work of bugs and at the same time will cheer you with their color song and action. A few plants which encourage birds are honeysuckle, dogwood, chokeberry, elderberry, russian olive, holly, hawthorne, native yaupon and sun flowers.

All dead leaves should be removed from iris and fed if you haven't fertilized earlier.

If your cydonia japonica have finished blooming, they should be pruned now. Blooms next year will be on the new growth.

Also, don't forget to prune crepe myrtle as severely as you need to before new growth begins this spring. Remove some of the less sturdy stems at ground level and top back the remaining branches in a staggered shape, taller in the middle. You can buy them as a tree now to be used single or in a group.

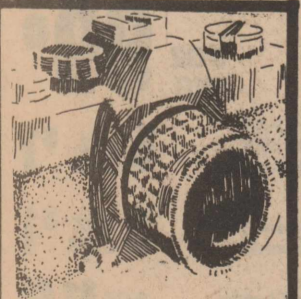
Wisterias will be starting to bloom soon and one of the early favorites. As lawns green up and new growth begins on trees and shrubs, make the spring application of fertilizer on nearly everything in the garden flowerbeds, out door potted plants, shrubs, small fruits & established strawberries.

Several factors have been linked to heart disease. Among them are high levels of blood cholesterol, high blood pressure, diabetes, a history of heart disease in the family, and obesity. Many scientists believe that certain habits and characteristics raise the risk of heart disease. These traits include smoking, reaction to stress, physical inactivity, and immoderate consumption of fats, saturated fat, cholesterol, and sodium.

Higher levels of blood cholesterol are generally associated with a greater risk of heart disease, lower levels with a lower risk. High levels of blood cholesterol can lead to atherosclerosis (hardening of the arteries), the underlying problem causing most heart and blood vessel diseases. Although levels of blood cholesterol vary among individuals, populations with high consumption rates for saturated fat and cholesterol generally tend to have high levels of blood cholesterol. Differences in heredity explain why some people can follow diets that are high in fat and cholesterol and still maintain relatively low levels of blood cholesterol. Others, consuming less fat and cholesterol, have relatively high levels of blood cholesterol. Your physician can evaluate your blood cholesterol status.

There is debate about whether it is sound to make a general recommendation that people should reduce their dietary fat and cholesterol. Many scientists, including the Surgeon General of the United States, believe it is sensible to consume only moderate amounts of fat and cholesterol. They also believe that this moderation poses no known health risk, and may reduce your risk of heart attack. No diet, however, will insure against heart disease.

Most of the fat and cholesterol in our diets comes from fats and oils, meat, poultry, egg yolks, and dairy products. The menus lower the amount of fat and cholesterol by:

Selecting lean hamburger and lean-roasts, chops, and steaks-trimmed of visible fat; limiting the amount of margarine or other fats used on bread and vegetables; emphasizing lowfat and skim milk and reducing the amount of fat in other foods when whole milk or cheese is used; cutting down the amount of fat used in recipes, added to foods in cooking, or added at the table; limiting the number of fried foods, especially breaded or batter-fried foods; moderating the amounts of organ meats and egg yolks, using fewer creamed foods and rich desserts, and watching the amount of salad dressing used.

CALLING ALL HOMEMAKERS

Brought To You By Brown Furniture

You might want to clip this column out, and keep it around for handy reference when you're arranging furniture.

It's usually wise to allow at least 3 feet for traffic lanes in a room. In other words, in those areas of a room where people generally walk within a room, or from one room to another, don't put any two pieces of furniture closer than 3 feet to each other.

On the other hand, where you want to make a conversation grouping, try to keep the farthest reaches of that grouping no more than 8 feet away. If seating pieces are farther away from each other than 8 feet, people have a hard time communicating easily.

For a coffee table in front of a sofa, try to leave about 16 inches between them. Any further, and it's too long a reach while any closer and it's too hard to get in and out of the sofa.

In dining rooms, the rule of thumb is to leave about 54 inches between a chair and wall so there's room for seating and serving.

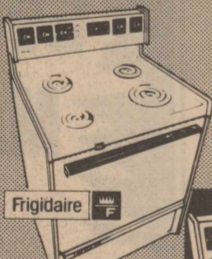
In a bedroom, most experts recommend putting the bed, if at all possible, on the wall away from the door so you don't have to walk around the bed everytime you enter the bedroom.

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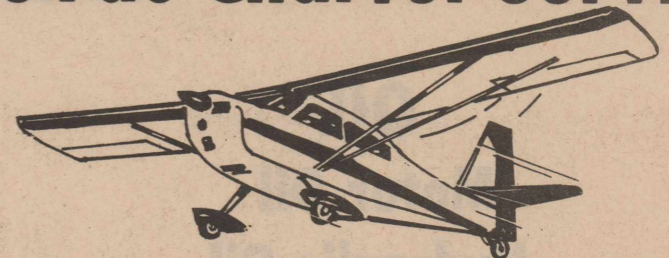
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Garden Club sets flower show date
