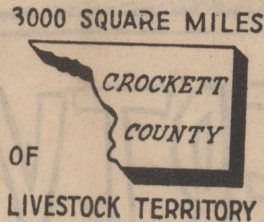

If there was any doubt courthouse and courthouse annex repairs are long past due, it was laid to rest Monday when an inspection of the premises revealed the law library flooded and the ceiling falling in the ladies restroom. The basement of the courthouse annex was also flooded Monday.

This deplorable situation was discussed briefly during the Crockett County Commissioners Court meeting Monday when County Clerk David Weant brought it to the attention of the court body.

Maintenance on the two county buildings is almost non-existent. The flooding in the courthouse was blamed on leaking toilets on the top floor and a corroded air-conditioning overflow pipe. One official, housed in the annex, said everytime a toilet was flushed on the second floor of the building, water poured onto museum exhibits below.

Although the leaky toilets and corroded pipe could be repaired by maintenance personnel, there is no easy solution to the crumbling mortar which is literally making a rock pile out of the two buildings.

Jesus Castro suggested a bond issue to build a new courthouse in the downtown park during the meeting Monday. This seems to be the most logical solution, even though bond issues are not being passed around the area like they have been in the past.

Crockett County is deriving great benefits from the abundant oil and gas in the area at the present time. If a new courthouse could be built and paid for with this tax money, the county would be well ahead in years to come when the natural resources are depleted and the tax monies have dried up.

To remodel the courthouse and the annex properly would without doubt cost more than building a new facility and even so would not relieve the cramped office spaces.

The situation in the law library seemed to me the most deplorable. One official commented it was a shame for the Department of Human Resources people to have to meet in such a mess, but I thought of the absolute fortune which could be lost if the books came in touch with the water or whatever it is. Water can be as hazardous as fire when it comes to paper.

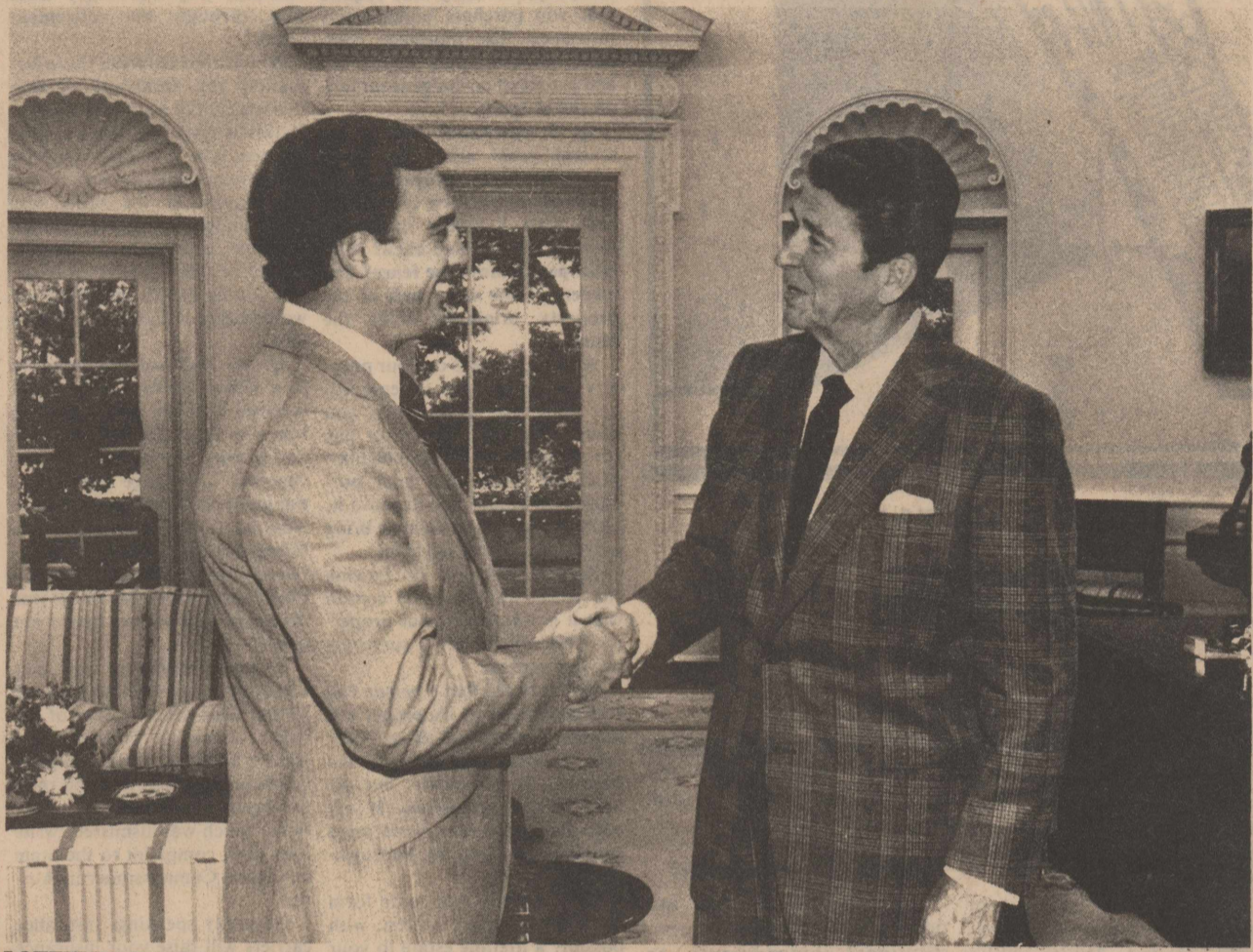

Commissioners Court hears airport group

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday and what had been rumored to be an important meeting on airport improvements turned out to be a repeat of meetings in the past on the subject with no firm solution reached.

Jim Hearne was spokesman for the airport group which consisted of Bobby Aycock, Beth Boyd, Dan Davidson, Bill Price, Paul Shacklette, and Jack Baggett.

Hearne began stating that the Ozona Airport was the best airport in the immediate area, but it is not equipped to handle heavy planes. He cited an instance of runway damage last week when a heavy plane landed, using up the entire runway space and tearing up the end of the runway.

A discussion of limits to plane weights to airplane fuels followed, with some input on runway improvement, such as striping the center and perhaps building up approaches with concrete. Also, the fact that the airport was running out of hangar space was discussed.

Hearne said where the airport had two or three local planes in 1953, the number had grown to 40 at the present time.

Jack Baggett asked that the discussion get back to airport improvements. He said the paving was going, the ramps were not serviceable and without maintenance, the airport was losing what improvements it had. He also mentioned the possibility of getting some navigational aids for out of town pilots.

This brought up moving the television tower on the east hill, which has been dubbed a hazard in the approach to the airport by both the Federal and State aviation commissions. The tower was built before there were any federal or state regulations on the height of such a facility, also before the airport became the county airport.

David Weant said he had been in conversation with Jimmy Thompson, who owns all the land surrounding the

airport, and it was his impression Thompson would not make anymore land available to the county without removal of the tower. Weant said Thompson contends the commissioners court gave him verbal assurance the tower would be moved some 14 years ago.

This subject was discussed at length about three years ago, in several meetings, but surfaced again recently when the county attempted to acquire land to enlarge the airport.

B. W. Stuart said he had been in contact with Thompson last week and he mentioned nothing about moving the tower, but did ask for

Tennis courts damaged

Superintendent of Schools Foy Moody has asked the county for help in keeping everybody but tennis players off the new courts which require a very expensive topping.

The courts, which cost around \$1,400 to re-cover have been extensively damaged by skates, skate-boards bicycles and motorcycles. Since the courts are for the use of the public as well as the school, officials are reluctant to lock them at any time, and the public is asked

to report any activity except tennis observed at the courts. Tennis players are especially urged to assist in this endeavor, for they will have the most to lose if the courts must be locked.

Apparently vandalism is taking a high toll on county and school property, since the commissioners court discussed the possibility of hiring a night-watchman just to patrol county and school property at the regular meeting Monday. They will look into the possibility and make a decision at the next meeting.

lanes, fences and maintenance of the road through his property to the airport in exchange for land to build more hangars and enlarge the facility.

Dan Davidson presented an estimate from Western Communications to tear down the tower, move it and reset it. The cost was estimated from \$20,000 to \$25,000.

Paul Shacklette said there was a possibility the tower could be treated with a material which was highly visible and removal might not be necessary.

Judge Johnny Jones told the group the court had no control over the tower, as it was private property. He also said they could take hours speculating and not come up with an answer. He suggested a meeting with Thompson would be the only way to see what could be worked out.

The group agreed to meet with Thompson at his earliest convenience and report back to the court, before adjourning for lunch.

Prior to the meeting with the airport group, the court approved bills for payment and received monthly reports from the various county department heads.

Judge Jones reported the dumpground had been accepted under state regulations after a private firm sent men and equipment out to rework it. Paul Shacklette, road department head, told the court he had set up a schedule for the county to work the sanitary fill every Monday, and hoped to keep it under control.

Weekend wrecks fatal in county

Three fatalities occurred in Crockett County over the weekend in two separate one-vehicle accidents.

The first, a one vehicle rollover 2 miles east of Ozona on I-10, occurred at 7:30 a.m. Saturday. Two Eldorado men were killed and another two injured in the wreck.

Joe A. Saldivar, 34, and Ernesto Martinez, 21, both roughnecks with a drilling company, were pronounced dead at the scene by Peace Justice A. O. Fields.

Demetrio Bellman, 20, was taken to Crockett County Hospital in Ozona where he was listed in good condition with back injuries and cuts. Driver of the vehicle, Thomas Martinez, 19, was also hospitalized here with cuts and abrasions.

According to a Department of Public Safety spokesman, the four men were traveling eastbound on I-10 when the vehicle swerved to the left, then careened back across the road, overturning on the right side.

A Sheffield man was killed in the second accident which occurred at 11:15 p.m. Sunday just inside Crockett County and ten miles south of Iraan on a county road.

Don Paul Martin, 25, was killed instantly when he lost control of the vehicle he was driving and it overturned several times, throwing him out of the vehicle and into a pasture. Judge Fields also pronounced Martin dead at the scene of the accident.

week in Parkland Hospital in Dallas of burns received when an LPG tank blew up on a location at a ranch south of Ozona, May 18.

Gamez, an employee of Grider Trucking Co. of Sonora, was burned over 80 percent of his body in the accident and was flown to the Dallas facility by ambulance plane from the Ozona airport the night after the accident occurred. Two other Sonora men were hospitalized in the same accident, but have since recovered and been released from the local facility.

Sponsors felt the large cheering section for Ozona, brought the honors in the rodeo. Junior All Around boy was won by Jody Everett, and Senior All Around boy was Ira Childress. Kim Bishop, another Ozonan, took all around Senior Girl honors.

Everett took second places in hair pulling and rescue race, plus calf roping and won a first in ribbon roping on the way to his all-around honor.

Childress won three first places to gain his win. He won the first place ribbon in hair pulling, ribbon roping and calf roping, to sweep the events.

Kim Bishop placed second in barrels and poles for her win. Bobbie Acton placed the first night also.

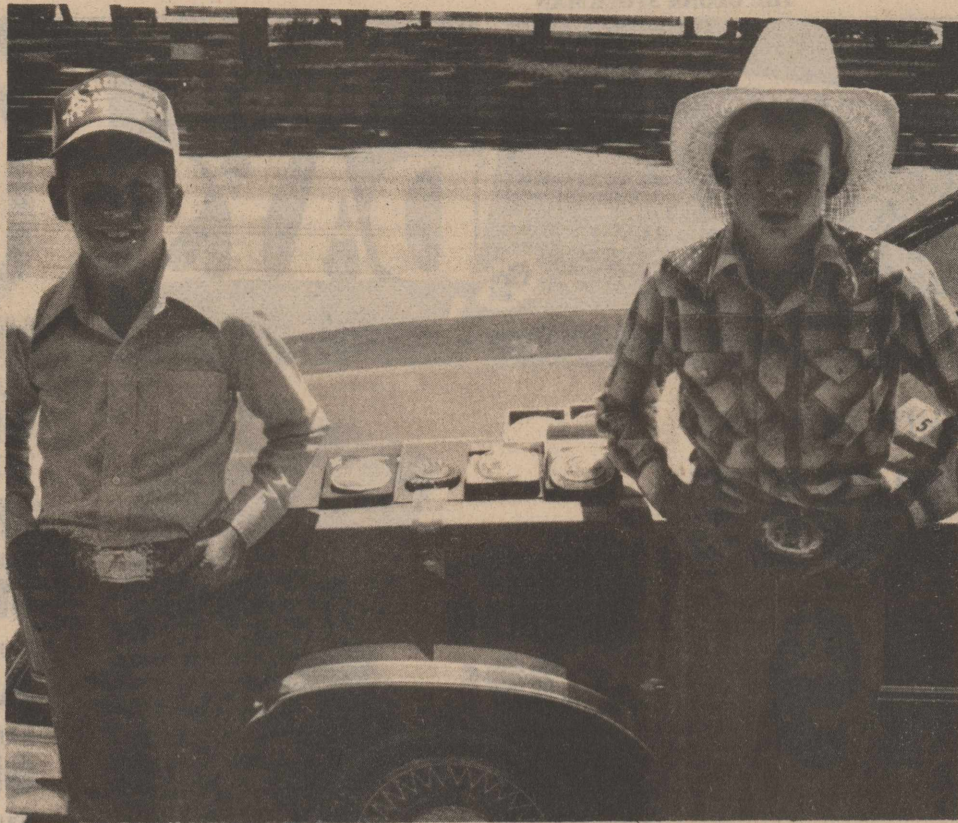

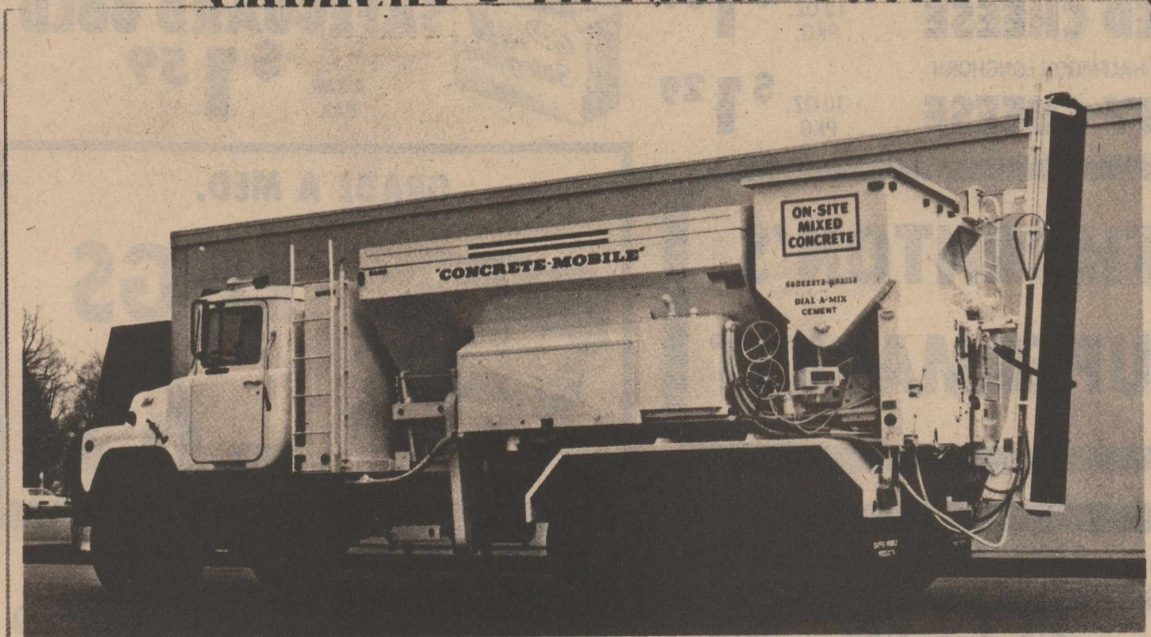
Speakers for this portion of

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Brain tumors yielding to chemical treatment

Brain tumors beyond the scope of surgery are yielding to experimental chemical treatment methods devised at the University of Texas Health Science Center in Dallas.

A means of disarming the blood-brain barrier, which normally prevents admission of tumor-damaging substances, has been devised to permit use of anti-cancer drugs.

A system known as "Reversible Osmotic Blood-Brain Barrier Disruption" (BBB-D) was developed in animal studies and is being used for the first time in clinical trials by neurosurgeon Dr. Edward A. Neuwelt and a team of medical scientists at the Health Science Center here. The research was supported in part by an American Cancer Society grant.

The blood-brain barrier prevents all but the smallest molecules from entering the tiny blood vessels that supply the brain. Guarding the circulatory route are "tight junctions" which serve as glue between cells lining the brain blood ves-

sels. The researchers ease these strictures by injecting mannitol, a sugar substance that pulls the "glue" apart by "draining" fluid out of capillary cells by osmotic pressure—the same system that draws sap up a tree. Mannitol is infused into the brain's arteries through a tiny catheter inserted in the groin and running to the carotid artery.

With the blood-brain barrier disrupted temporarily, chemotherapy is used to destroy cancer tissue that surgeons were unable to remove or cells which escaped the scalpel. So far methotrexate, an anti-cancer drug, has been administered to brain-tumor patients with this method during the approximate half hour that the brain barrier stays open. Other chemotherapeutic drugs will be used after safe dose levels have been ascertained.

Another approach to the treatment of brain tumors is immunotherapy. Normally, the body's protective system, the immune reaction, functions by summoning a particular type of blood cell, the

lymphocyte, to the site of the cancer. These lymphocytes, which attack and destroy cancer cells are too large to be admitted to the brain because of the blood brain barrier. They can, however, be obtained from the patient's own blood, be purified and concentrated and then can be infused into the cerebrospinal fluid by injection into the spinal column, thereby "by-passing" the blood brain barrier.

If you're trying your hand at making your own fashions at home, consider a tunic—most are easy and fast to sew.

Also, outdated dresses are ideal for recycling into tunics. Just change the sleeves, collars, waistlines and hems for a "brand new" tunic.

For a really quick-and-easy makeover, use a dress with straight lines for your new tunic. Just shorten the hemline and add a slit at each side.

Stretch and update your wardrobe with a fitting tunic.

The second installment of estimated Federal tax payments on 1981 individual income is due by June 15, the Internal Revenue Service says.

This installment should be paid using declaration voucher No. 2 found in the Form 1040-ES package, "Declaration of Estimated Tax for Individuals."

Taxpayers whose anticipated income changed during 1981 may have to file an amended declaration. Space is provided in the estimated tax package to compute an amended estimate.

Carelessness, chief cause of lawn mower accidents

"Carelessness" is the main factor in the more than 50,000 people injured each year in accidents involving power lawn mowers.

Proper mower servicing, observing standard operating precautions, and picking up rocks and other objects from the lawn prior to mowing will eliminate most accidents.

"The lawn mower should be routinely serviced each time before taking it out of the garage to mow the lawn," says Dr. Richard Duple, turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "A properly operating mower is safer to use and cuts grass better than one in poor shape.

Routine service includes checking the blade for nicks or cracks, checking the blade to be sure it is securely attached to the shaft, checking the crankcase oil level in 4-cycle engines, and filling the fuel tank with fresh regular gasoline.

"Always disconnect the spark plug wire before examining the blade," cautions Duple. "The condition of the blade is critical to the mower's operation and safety. Remove, sharpen and balance the blade several times during the mowing season. Replace damaged blades.

Service the carburetor air cleaner and change the crankcase oil after every 25 hours of operation, or at the manufacturer's recommen-

Communication key to community action

"What are they trying to do to me?"

That's a typical question asked by many people today. It's a question that also signals a problem plaguing many community leaders in today's changing society.

"The problem is a lack of good communication that builds community support and cooperation," says John Henry, area community development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The problem is identified when community development projects and proposals are being considered and funding is being sought for improvements in streets, water, sewage, solid waste, transportation, medical facilities, industrial development, parks and recreation, and related areas. It becomes intense when people must make a decision that will determine the outcome in an election.

"At this point, good communications become the key to community improvements because studies show that people have a natural tendency to vote against what they don't know about," says Henry.

Community leaders and communicators struggle with this communication problem on every community project and realize that other communities may have a better record of project completion.

Community development studies show that people support those things that they help plan and that communities with successful community projects have a record of detailed planning and good two-way communications with citizens and community leaders. On the other hand, communities with few successful projects

have a record of poor communication and misunderstandings that lead to breakdowns in relationships between individuals and groups, notes the specialist.

"Effective community communicators continually try to eliminate barriers and to establish a 'commonness' with individuals and groups," emphasizes Henry.

Through good interpersonal communications, leaders exchange ideas, gain knowledge, increase understanding of others, test thoughts, reduce tension, resolve conflicts, make friends, help solve problems, and do jobs more effectively. They also express all kinds of feelings such as joy, anger, fear, love, hostility and contentment.

The effectiveness of any community leader depends on his ability to communicate with others and requires skills in three major areas—selecting the time, place and circumstances under which the communication takes place, determining the roles that he will assume, and internalizing nonverbal cues that are essential to effective communication.

"The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is committed to 'helping people help themselves' by conducting educational programs to train local leaders to solve community problems," contends Henry. "More than 2,000 such leaders have attended community development leadership training workshops during the past year where methods of improving communication have been emphasized."


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

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

Australian exchange program offered

A colorful year of international living "down under" is available to American high school students this winter. Registration for this year's Australian exchange program was announced this week by Youth for Understanding, a nonprofit educational organization with headquarters in Washington, D.C.

Students chosen for the program will start classes in January when the Australian school year begins and will return to the U.S. in time for Christmas. They will live as members of Australian families, attend school, and experience Australia's richly varied culture first hand.

Approximately 125 students will be selected for the program on the basis of academic achievement and personal interviews. Applicants must have birthdates between October 1, 1963 and December 31, 1967, and a grade point average of 3.0.

To apply, students should call the YFU Regional Office at (713)932-0066. The program fee of \$3965 includes round trip air fare from San Francisco. Students will pay their own way to and from the departure point. A limited number of partial scholarships are available, with awards ranging from \$250-\$1,000.

Learning through international living is the main goal of all our programs," explained Susan Greene, YFU's Director of U.S. Programs. Youngsters chosen for the Australia experience will be far more than tourists, Greene explicated. "They will be active participants in everyday Australian life, especially family life."

YFU's extensive support services will make the transition to Australian culture easier for participants. Students will receive four carefully designed orientations: one before departure, one right after arrival, another three months later, and a fourth before coming home.

"Orientation" may sound a little dull," commented Michael Mercil, head of YFU's Orientation Department, "but we've planned some exciting group activities that make the students feel right at home." Previous orientations have been combined with field trips to the Outback and tours of cities like Sydney and Canberra.

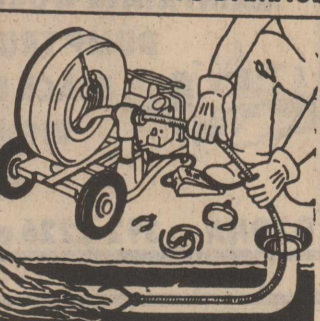

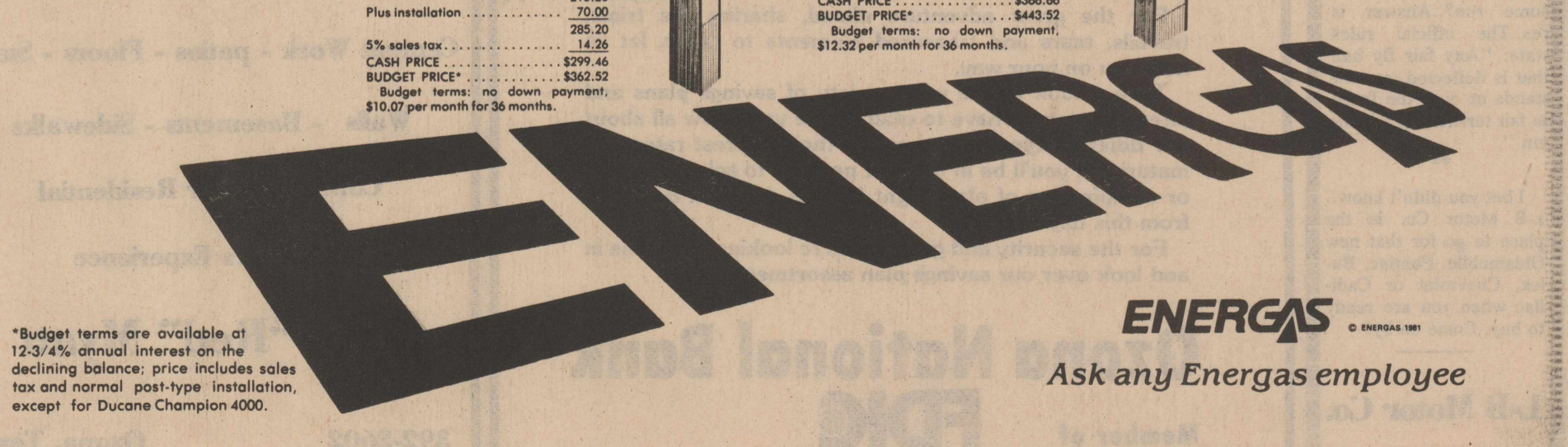

I BET YOU DIDN'T KNOW

Of all the records in sports, there's none where the runnerup is as far away from the record-holder as in Lou Gehrig's record of playing in 2,130 consecutive major league baseball games. The closest anyone has ever come to Gehrig is Everett Scott who played in 1,307 consecutive games and that's 823 games--or about 5 years playing time--away from Gehrig's mark. That makes Gehrig's achievement one of the greatest feats--and perhaps one of the most unbeatable records--in sports history.

Here's a question that is tough to answer--even for real good baseball fans. If a fly ball hits an outfielder on the head, and then the ball bounces over the fence, is it a home run?..Answer is yes..The official rules state: "Any fair fly ball that is deflected into the stands or over the fence in fair territory is a home run."

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
