

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

Bates says the specialists, through studies and actual experience, have come to the conlusion that a good rental agreement should always be written. It should cover more than a single year or contain an automatic renewal clause. It should specify how the expenses, upkeep and labor as well as income are to be shared. It should encourage the tenant to produce livestock as well as crops whereever possible and profitable. Finally the lease should provide for permanent improvements on the land and in the home.

Bates believes the use of rentfarms are operated by tenants. above items will improve landlord-tenant relations and add stability to the agricultural economy in the areas where farms are operated by tenants.

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




