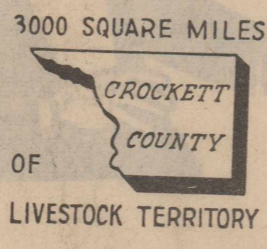

County draws ten wildcats

Ten wildcats were scheduled in Crockett County and one in Sutton; a confirmer was scheduled in Tom Green and an outpost in Reagan. Also, a discovery was finalized in Upton and confirmer in Tom Green.

ABCO Energy Corp., The Woodlands, will drill 10 6,000-foot gas wildcats in southeast Crockett County, ranging from 3/4-mile southeast to 3 1/8 miles west-southwest of production in the Adams-Baggett ranch (Canyon gas) field and from 1 7/8 miles north-northwest to 4 1/8 miles west and slightly

north of Canyon production in the Hudspeth (Canyon and Strawn gas) field and 24 miles southwest of Ozona.

The No. 1-81 Pie Pierce-Winchester "A" is 660 feet from the south and 1,865 feet from the west lines of 129-O-GH&SA.

The No. 9-81 Pie Pierce-Winchester "A" is 660 feet from the south and 1,300 feet from the east lines of 130-O-GH&SA.

The No. 10-81 Pie Pierce-Winchester "A" is 660 feet from the south and 1,300 feet from the west lines of the same section.

The No. 3-81 Pie Pierce-Winchester "A" is 2,310 feet from the southland 1,211 feet from the east lines of 111-O-GH&SA.

The No. 4-81 Pie Pierce-Winchester "A" is 2,287 feet from the south and 1,100 feet from the west lines of the same section.

The No. 2-81 Pie Pierce-Winchester "A" is 1,950 feet from the south and 1,400 feet from the west lines of 112-O-GH&SA.

The No. 6-81 Pie Pierce-Winchester "A" is 2,000 feet from the south and 1,300 feet from the west lines of the same section.

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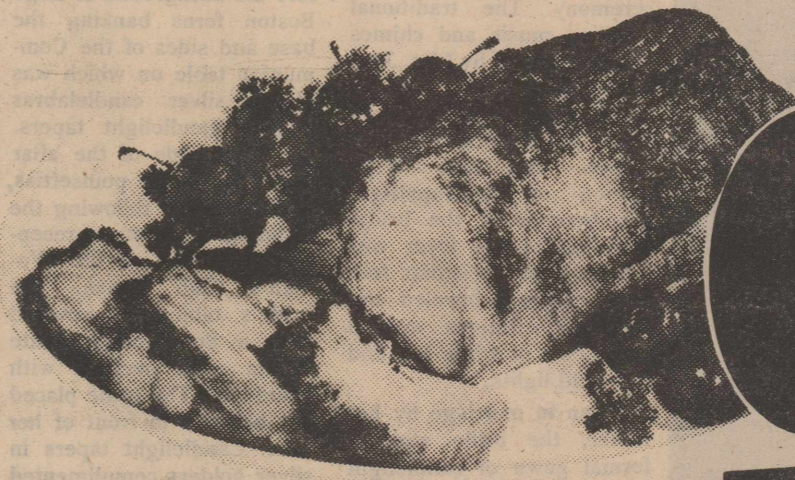

Debra Says

I hope all the families in Crockett County have a happy holiday season and prosperous new year. Christmas seems to be the traditional time for exchanging recipes. Jean North told me that buttermilk biscuits make a perfect dressing. She said it makes a big difference if you leave the biscuits out of your dressing. I have included her recipe if you want to give it a try. The recipe looks good for an ordinary breakfast, too.

Another breakfast idea is homemade pancakes. Pancakes can also be served at lunch or dinner, by using different toppings or fillings. Blueberries or pecans can also be added to pancake batter.

Most recipes and mixes make pancakes of medium thickness. If you prefer a thin pancake, add a little more milk. For a thicker pancake, add a little less milk.

Don't overmix the batter. Mix just enough to moisten the flour. Overmixing makes pancakes tough. Check pancake recipes for standing time. Some recipes recommend standing to thicken the batter.

BUTTER MILK BISCUITS

By Jean North
1 1/4 cup sifted flour
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/4 cup shortening
2/3 cup buttermilk
Bake at 450 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes. Makes 10 to 12 biscuits.

FAVORITE PANCAKES

1 egg
1 cup buttermilk
2 tablespoons shortening, melted, or salad oil
1 cup flour

1 tablespoon sugar
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
Beat egg; add remaining ingredients in order listed and beat with rotary beater until smooth. Grease heated griddle if necessary. To test griddle, sprinkle with few drops of water. If bubbles skitter around, heat is just right.

Pour batter from tip of large spoon or from pitcher onto hot griddle. Turn pancakes as soon as they are puffed and full of bubbles but before bubbles break. Bake other side until golden brown. Makes 10 4" pancakes.

Variations: Apple Pancakes; Decrease buttermilk to 1/2 cup and stir 1/2 cup applesauce into batter.

Blueberry Pancakes; Fold 1/2 cup fresh or well-drained frozen blueberries (thawed) into batter.

Buckwheat Pancakes; Decrease flour to 1/2 cup and add 1/2 cup buckwheat flour.

Cheese Pancakes; Omit sugar and stir 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese into batter.

Ham Pancakes; Omit sugar and stir 1/2 to 1/3 cup ground or chopped cooked ham into batter.

Tips For Gardeners
From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Wishing you a very Happy New Years Day!

After a most enjoyable and meaningful Christmas Day, I'm sure many of you are now looking forward to all the excitement over football games from east to west and north to south.

My enjoyment for Christmas began with an interesting and changing view on my trip from Midland to Houston in less than two hours flight with every seat taken.

Since arriving, I've been going, busy cutting and arranging beautiful evergreens and berries the same as you in Ozona were.

I'm still amazed in our weather changes when I left Midland the norther had blown through and was warm, but when we landed it was so windy and cold I could hardly believe it. Then by Sunday it started misting and poured heavy rain most of the way to Galveston and back, where we attended my late brothers' family dinner for 34.

If you received outdoor plants for Christmas gifts and plant them soon, be sure to protect them if a severe freeze is in the forecast. Also, do not let them dry out before they have established a good root system.

Someone asked for names of plants that will remain rather small, about 10 or 15 feet, to use for the center of a patio to give some shade but not so much that the flowers will be shaded out. A Cherry Laurel is an excellent choice. Also a Japanese Yew or Ligustrum and the Wax Ligustrum.

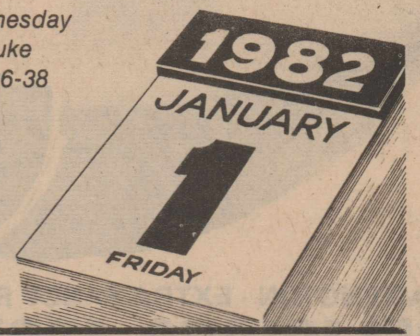

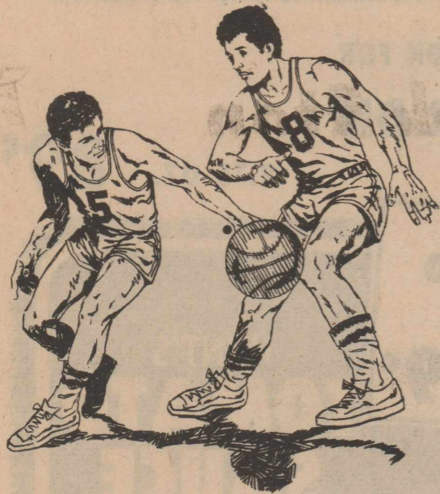

Ft. Worth Fat Stock Show sets opening

The Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show has scheduled its 1982 parade to begin at 2 p.m. Friday, Jan. 29, reports Chuck Shytles, parade chairman. The Stock Show begins Wednesday, Jan. 27 and continues through Sunday, Feb. 7.

"An invitation is open to anyone who desires to participate in our parade," the chairman said. "Being the world's largest all-western parade, we do not allow motorized vehicles in the lineup, only vehicles pulled by animals."

Parade applications are available at the Stock Show office, 3400 Crestline Road, or by writing P.O. Box 150, Fort Worth, 76101. Shytles asked that applications be returned by Jan. 15 to allow time for the parade marshals to establish the lineup.

Participants in the parade each year include school bands and marching units, riding clubs, and individual and merchant-sponsored horse-drawn vehicles. Last year's two-hour lineup was

formed by 1,100 horses, 60 riding clubs, 60 horse-drawn vehicles and floats, and 22 bands.

The parade is judged by a panel which awards plaques to the two most outstanding riding clubs and horse-drawn floats, the most colorful entry, and the individual or group traveling the greatest distance to participate. Also, a special Western Heritage award is given to the entry judged as displaying the most effective use of the heritage theme.

Special entertainment at the 22 performances of the World's Original Indoor Rodeo will be the famous Sons of the Pioneers, presenting a medley of songs of the Old West. Other special acts include the trick roping Loera Family from Monterrey, Mexico, and a quartet of the best trick and fancy riding artists in the business.

Tickets for the Fort Worth Rodeo are on sale from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. daily, including Sunday, at the box office in the Will Rogers Coliseum lobby.

Measles and Rubella are different diseases

Many people confuse measles and rubella—perhaps because a popular term for rubella is "German measles." This is misleading since rubella is not measles but a different virus, says the Texas Medical Association. Rubella was first identified by doctors in Germany and this is probably why the misleading name "German measles" took hold.

The confusion wouldn't matter if it were not for the fact that both diseases can produce serious complications. Because of these complications, medical authorities urge vaccination against both, ideally at age 15 months.

Before the vaccine became available, measles was an almost inevitable disease of childhood. It lasts about 10 days. At the onset the disease is characterized by a dry scratchy cough, running nose, inflamed eyes and an irregularly elevated temperature. At the end of the first three days the temperature may peak at 104 degrees, at which point a rash will appear. Although the measles rash usually covers the entire body, itching is seldom severe. After another three or four days the rash begins to fade.

Complicating pneumonia or ear infections may require antibiotics. The most serious complication of measles is encephalitis, which can be deadly or cause severe brain damage.

Rubella is often so mild a childhood disorder that many adults may either have forgotten their childhood illness or had an illness which was not recognized as rubella. Many adults, therefore, have naturally acquired immunity against rubella.

The disease usually lasts about three days. A rash often accompanies rubella but may be so faint that it goes unnoticed. It usually causes painful swelling in the glands at the back of the neck and behind the ears, along with slight fever.

Rubella is such a mild disease in both children and adults that there would be no cause for alarm were it not for a tragic exception—the danger of severe physical and mental damage to a pregnant woman's unborn child if she acquires the disease in the early months of pregnancy. Since boys and girls in early childhood are the most common carriers of the infection, most doctors

recommend that they be immunized to reduce exposure of mothers-to-be.

Women should be immunized before becoming pregnant, and they must avoid any possibility of pregnancy for two to three months afterwards. While the risk of

the vaccine to the unborn baby is not known, it should be avoided.

Young women can be tested for immunity to rubella at the time of their premarital exams or a test can be given during the prenatal examination.

Although fruit burritos can be served for delicious desserts or snacks, they are marvelous accompaniments to a brunch menu. Their textures and flavors especially complement ham and sausages.

APPLE BURRITOS

- 1 pkg. refrigerated 8-inch flour tortillas (NOT corn tortilla)
- 1 21-oz. can Comstock Apple Pie Filling
- butter
- 1/4 cups raisins
- 2 Tbsp. rum or water
- 1/4 cup chopped nuts
- 1/2 teaspoon fresh grated lemon peel

Soften tortillas: wrap in foil and heat in warm oven for 8-10 minutes OR put in plastic bag and microwave on medium power for 2 minutes. Spread butter on one surface of tortillas.

Soak raisins in rum for 15 minutes (or in microwave for 1 minute). Combine raisins and remaining ingredients. Place about 3 tablespoons filling on each tortilla and roll up. Place seam down on buttered baking dish. Brush rolls with some melted butter. Bake at 400°F for 20 minutes. If not golden brown, brush again with butter and broil 6-inches from element for a few minutes. Watch carefully!

Set out grated sharp Cheddar cheese, sour cream, or yogurt for optional toppings. Great with ham or sausages for brunch.

Tex-Pack expands service

TEX-PACK package express carriers began carrying up to 200 pound shipments from each consignor—double the current allowable—on Monday, December 21.

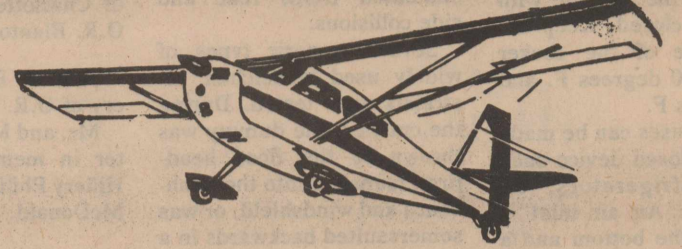

How to smoke sausage

There are many ways to smoke meat. One way of smoking is to build a small fire out of hardwood (pecan, hickory or oak) at one end of a backyard, closed-type cooker. Burn it until live coals are obtained; then put a few hardwood chips on the coals. Place the sausage or cured meat cuts on the rack on the opposite end from the coals. Use enough water on the chips so they do not blaze and smoke the sausage with the cooker closed. Keep the temperature of the cooker between 130 degrees F. and 150 degrees F. Smokehouses can be made from any closed device such as old refrigerators, oil drums, etc. An air inlet is needed at the bottom and a damper at the top. Some method for keeping the interior hot is needed. The whole smoking and drying procedure can be accomplished in one of these devices, but requires close watching. Try a small quantity at first until you perfect your own special method.

Wheel chair restraints have been proven unsafe

Crash tests conducted at Texas A&M University reveal that handicapped persons riding in wheelchairs inside automobiles face serious injury, even during collisions of less than 30 mph, because of inadequate restraints.

The tests, performed by the Texas Engineering Experiment Station and the Texas Transportation Institute, were conducted on an instrumented dummy seated in a typical wheelchair. The dummy was subjected to simulated front, rear and side collisions.

Several generic types of widely used wheelchair restraints were tested. During the crashes, the dummy was thrown to the floor head-first, launched into the dashboard and windshield, or was somersaulted backwards in a backbreaking movement.

"On the basis of our tests, our opinion is that none of the devices as currently configured offer acceptable protection in a crash at 20-25 mph," says the researchers' report.

Most manufactures of adaptive equipment for the

handicapped have small businesses, the researchers said, and do not have facilities for testing crashworthiness. Many manufacturers, as well as the public, are not aware of the safety problems, they said.

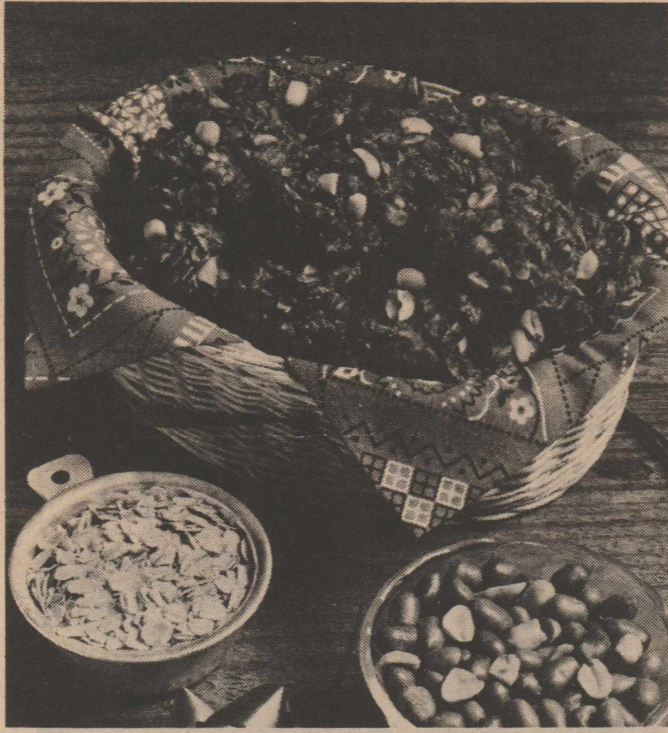

Mix sugar and cocoa in a saucepan. Stir in milk and butter. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Simmer for 2 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in peanut butter, vanilla and oats. Drop by teaspoonsful onto wax paper; let cool until firm.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announces a proposed national conservation program to deal with the serious resource conservation problems ahead for American agriculture.

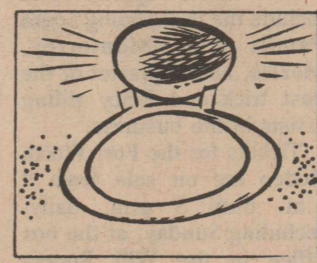
Four points highlight the program, according to Clitis Sinclair, district conservationist, Crockett district are: Setting soil and water conservation priorities

HORTICULTURISTS DEVELOPING NEW LEAF FERTILIZER

Horticulturists at Texas A&M University are developing a plant fertilizer that is sprayed on leaves.





Texas may escape flu epidemic this year

Texas may escape a major flu epidemic this year, researchers at Baylor College of Medicine said today.

While there is still a chance for a surprise epidemic, it almost certainly won't come until January, after students return to school from the holiday break, say the researchers at Baylor's Influenza Research Center.

They caution, however, that influenza vaccinations are still advised for people with heart or lung disease and the elderly, since forecasting outbreaks is difficult and annual vaccinations are necessary to maintain immunity.

So far this year, the flu season has been relatively mild and the number of respiratory illnesses in Houston were below last year's level until a few weeks ago.

For the 1981-82 season there are several things the Baylor flu researchers can say with certainty.

Because schools provide the close contacts that can result in flu epidemics, the current holiday break provides a "buffer" on top of an already mild year for the illness-delaying any possible epidemic this winter.

Influenza B virus, which already has caused sporadic infections this fall, may cause a mild outbreak later this winter.

A variant of the Russian flu (A/England) virus may surface, because more young people have less immunity to this virus type.

People below the age of 30, particularly school children, will be more susceptible to the variant.

Although predictions for a particular season are partly based on who is most likely to become ill, all people exposed to flu viruses can become ill.

"The virus you meet this year will be a little different from the one you met last year and you may get sick. You don't develop absolute immunity to the flu," said William P. Glezen, M.D., of the Baylor center's staff.

For this reason, he recommends that high risk persons and the elderly get vaccinated.

He also cautions that forecasting flu outbreaks remains difficult because so little is known about the viruses and how they circulate.

"So much of the dogma we were taught 10 years ago has been destroyed by what's happened in recent years," Glezen said.

"Two distinct virus types (A/England and A/Bangkok) were circulating last winter, and the Russian flu reappeared in 1977 after its first appearance in 1946-57."

Realizations like these though, have made flu researchers' work less of a guessing game in the last few years.

Predictions for a flu season are based on three different factors.

"First we need to know what viruses have circulated, then we need to know if any new variant appears to be spreading anywhere in the world. Third, we try to determine what population will be susceptible to illness caused by these viruses," Glezen said.

To determine what viruses are circulating, the Baylor researchers look at what viruses caused illness the previous year. Experience in the past has shown that a cluster of late-season viruses they produce what is called a herald wave often reappear the following season.

There was no definite herald wave in 1980-81. However, a variant of one of the viruses that circulated last

season, A/England, is expected this season.

The center also relies on virus reports from the World Health Organization and laboratories in Australia and New Zealand, because these countries experience their flu season during our summer.

To determine susceptibility, the researchers conduct

blood tests among about 80 Houston families and other young people to see what antibodies are present in their blood. This year's tests showed that antibodies against the A/England virus type were low, especially in persons under 30 years of age.

Earaches can be serious

As winter approaches with its cold air and drafts, the susceptibility to earaches naturally increases, says the Texas Medical Association.

There are various ways in which an earache can develop, but the most common causes are:

An infection of the middle ear—the middle ear becomes inflamed, pus accumulates and the ear drum bulges, causing pain.

An inflammation in the ear canal—better known as "swimmer's ear"—occurs when water accumulates in the ear, flushing out the protective layer of wax. This leaves a dark warm place for bacteria to grow, and if an infection takes hold, the tissues in the ear swell, resulting in an intense earache.

Wax impactions or foreign bodies—if wax in the ear becomes hard and presses against the ear drum, a particularly irritating ache can occur.

It is easy to recognize an earache because the pain is so intense, but other symptoms such as bleeding, inflammation, swelling, or drainage from the ear indicate that the ear is infected.

PBPA energy report

Because of the recession, the federal government needs more money to reduce its red ink. One idea being proposed would include an increase in the federal gasoline tax. Some members in the Reagan Administration want the tax raised five cents a gallon. The current federal tax is four cents a gallon. Congress will probably look at the proposal after the holidays.

The President surprised many people when he decided that many of the functions of the Department of Energy should be transferred to the Department of Commerce. In announcing what he hopes is the beginning of the end for D.O.E., nuclear weapons development, information collection systems and basic energy research would be under Commerce while the Department of Interior would oversee the strategic petroleum reserve. Several members of Congress, both Democrats and Republicans have said they will oppose the plan and, if that's the case, D.O.E. will be with us for a while. And, Congress is expected to give the President authority to allocate petroleum supplies in case of an emergency. The House version would also provide for price controls as well.

Proper plantings cut energy cost

Fall and winter months are the time for tree planting, and common-sense landscaping can help keep homes cooler in the summer and warmer in the winter.

This natural solution is simple and takes only minimal knowledge of wind and weather possibilities in the immediate area.

In the summer, homes get

hottest in late afternoon because the sun has heated the exterior of the house and the ground around it.

Planting deciduous shade trees (those that shed their leaves in the fall) to the west of the house will shade that side of the home and ground. This can lower the temperature around the house by as much as 15 degrees F. on a hot day. And during the winter the bare trees let the sun shine through to warm the home.

Most cooling summer breezes in Texas come from

the southeast, so don't block the southeast and northeast corners of property with dense plantings. Instead, plant low shrubs close to the house on the southern side to keep it cool.

Since chilling winds and storms come from the north and northwest during winter, use thick plantings of evergreens to provide a buffer.

Also, large window areas facing south can gain solar heat during the winter so you don't want to block these with evergreen plants.

are still talking about what a good time they had.

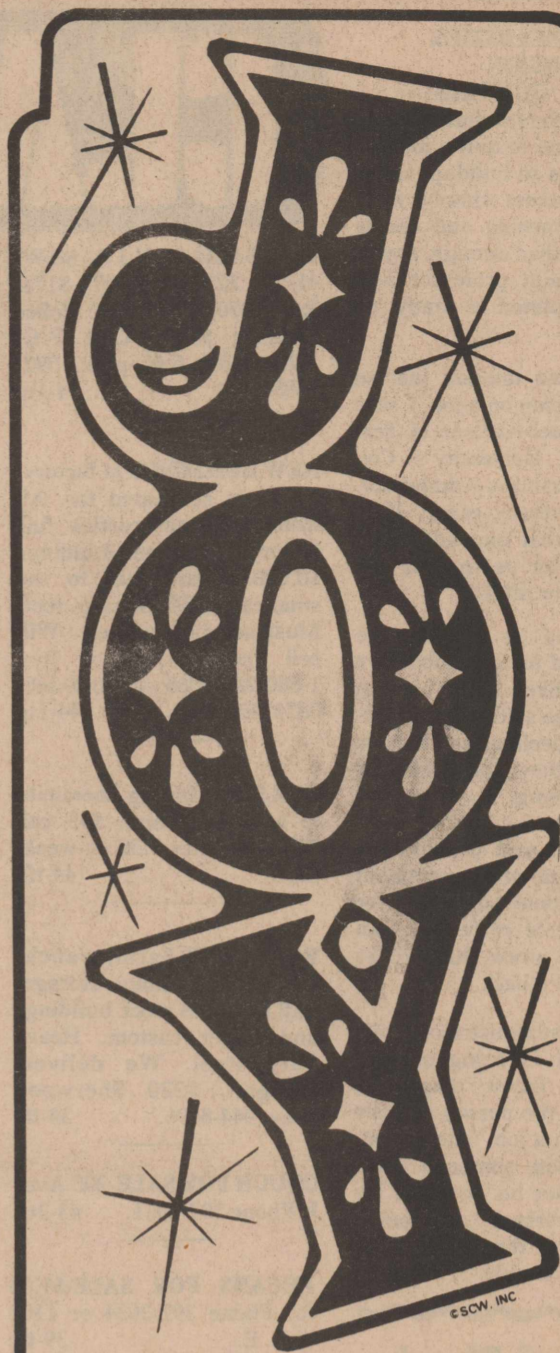
We really appreciate our volunteers who fixed hair on Wednesday and our bingo volunteers. It took special effort to come during such a busy week.

County gets strike

Strawn gas production was opened in the Perner Ranch (Devonian, Simpson, Canyon and Ellenburger gas) field of Crockett County with completion of Harrison Interests, Ltd., Houston, No. 26 University Lands 8-33, 21 miles west of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.1 million cubic feet of dry gas daily.

Completion was through perforations at 8,433-523 feet which were acidized with 7,500 gallons.

Drilled to 9,320 feet with 4 1/2-inch casing set at 8,813 feet, it is plugged back to 8,788 feet.

Operator picked the following tops: Canyon, 5,982 feet; Strawn, 8,430 feet; Siluro-Devonian, 8,635 feet, and Simpson 8,980 feet, on ground elevation of 2,351 feet.

Operator suggested field designation of Perner. Location is 660 feet from south and west lines of 8-33-University.

Samson Resources Co., Tulsa, Okla. will drill its No. 1 Shannon Trust Estate, a 9,500-foot wildcat, 1 1/4 miles southwest of depleted production in the World, West (Strawn) field, 1 5/8 miles southeast of the Escondido multipay field, separated by a 9,900-foot failure, and 30 1/2 miles northwest of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 13-Q-J.H. Gibson.

The Escondido field produces from the Fusselman at 8,560 feet; lower Pennsylvanian, 8,306 feet; and upper Strawn, 7,734 feet and formerly produced from the Ellenburger at 9,043 feet.

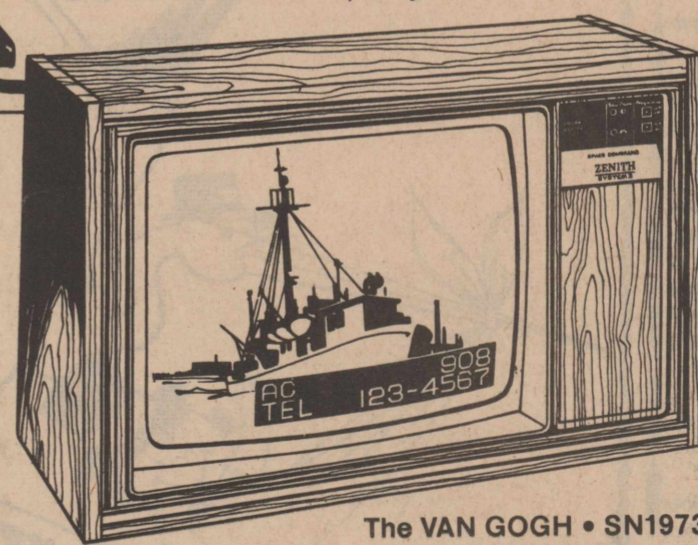
