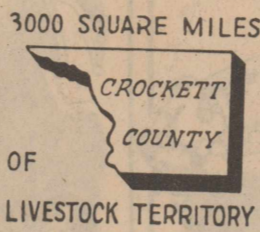

County draws wildcats

J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, will drill two 9,000-foot Ellenburger wildcats in Crockett County, 13 miles west of Ozona.

The No. 1 University 31-15, 5/8-mile east and very slightly south of a 7,705-foot failure and 1 1/8 miles east and slightly north of Strawn detrital gas production in the University 31 (Strawn and Queen gas) field, is 1,320 feet from the south and west lines of 15-31-University.

The failure, Humble Oil & Refining Co. (now Exxon Corp.) No. 1-V University, was abandoned Nov. 18, 1953.

The No. 1 University 31-14, 5/8-mile east of Strawn detrital gas production in the University 31 field and one mile southwest of an 8,554-foot failure, is 1,320 feet from the south and west lines of 14-31-University.

The failure, Southland Royalty Co. No. 1-E University, was abandoned Sept. 25, 1962.

4-H Livestock show a success

The 35th Annual Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show and Sale was held Saturday in the County Show Barn with a record number of 4-H exhibitors and livestock. Some 91 4-H members exhibited 353 lambs and 8 steers.

It was a beautiful sunshiney day with a large number of spectators, guests and buyers on hand for the show, noon barbecue and sale.

Rex Stultz, County Extension Agent from Del Rio judged the livestock and Pat Garver from Sheffield judged showmanship and first year feeder award.

Joe Bean, chairman of the sale committee, and members, Jack Bailey, Pon Seahorn, Bill Black, George Bunker, Jr., Jeffery Sutton and Bob Childress did a tremendous job on the sale. The champions averaged \$750, reserves \$350, and placing lambs averaged \$250.

Larry Bailey and Larry Williams were co-chairmen of the concession stand and noon barbecue. The proceeds from this went to the 4-H Parent and Leaders Assoc.

Jena Allen took top honors in the fine wool division of the show. Jena, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tony Allen, exhibited the champion and reserve champion fine wool lambs and the champion pair of finewool lambs. The lambs were bred by Tony Allen.

Miss Allen received silver buckles for the champion and reserve champion donated by Ozona Wool and Mohair Co. and Ranch Feed and Supply. She received a trophy from Nathans Jewelers for champion pair of lambs. Her champion lamb sold to L. C. McDonald, Sterling City for \$1000.

Commissioners Court in first meeting of year

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday in the first meeting of the new year, re-appointing various county board members, naming the grievance board and setting holidays for the year.

New hospital board members include Leandro Flores, Jody Sessom and Dan Pullen. They will serve two-year terms each. Elected officials serve on the grievance board along with three members of the grand jury. Names drawn from the jury list include Linda Falkner, Hector DeHoyos, Jr., Jeffrey Sutton, Mrs. Bill Black, Chona Vela and Napoleon Vitela, in that order. County Judge Johnny Jones will ask the first three selected to serve on the board and the others will be alternates.

Members of the Civic Center Board and the Parks Board were re-appointed. County Clerk David Weant asked for names of the board members in order they might be listed in the court minutes, but court members were unable to name the various members of the boards at that time.

County holidays were named as follows: Easter Sunday which falls on April 11, will be observed by county offices April 9. Memorial Day will be observed May 31; Independence Day, July 5; Labor Day, Sept. 6, Veteran's Day, Nov. 12; Thanksgiving and Christmas will be observed Wednesday through Sunday on both holidays, and the New Year will be observed the previous Friday as it falls on Saturday.

Glenn Rumley gave the hospital report and noted that 1981 was a better year financially, than 1980. He also told the court pay increases for hospital personnel were in effect and he would get a pay schedule to them at a later date. He also said room rates will be raised to \$100 per day for a semi-private and \$105 for a private, the first of March.

The court approved the salary schedule which went into effect the first of

January, a 10 percent, across the board raise for all county employees and elected officials, plus monthly car allowances of from \$50 to \$200.

Severe ice storm paralyzes Ozona

Ozonans woke up Tuesday morning to a winter wonderland of glistening ice which paralyzed commerce, stranded tourists, and wreaked havoc with motorists.

Traffic was impossible on the hills around town except for those with chains on tires. A rash of auto wrecks broke out as Ozonans attempted to get to work or to school.

Classes at all schools were canceled shortly after daylight, but neither students nor faculty were aware of this and many wound up sliding into curbs or into the nearest ditch in their unmanageable autos. Several lost their footing on the sheet of ice and found travel by foot almost as hazardous as by auto.

Stranded motorists filled the churches in town during the night as all motel rooms were full by sundown.

The freezing rain began to fall at 4:00 o'clock Monday afternoon and within thirty

Bids were also authorized for 2 dump trucks, 3 pickups and a rubber-tire loader for the Road Department. Jack Williams and Sostenes DeHoyos were appointed to confer with Paul Shacklette on specifications for the new equipment.

Shacklette, who appeared to give the Road Department report, said the department had some problem with obstructions being placed in county roads. Judge Johnny Jones said he had done some research on "county roads" since increased gas and oil activity had made it necessary. Judge Jones said his conclusion was "all roads maintained by the county are county roads and open to the public. The county is obligated to remove any obstruction placed in a county roadway." He said the increased activity in county fields is bound to cause problems, but as far as the county is concerned there is

no official problem. David Weant discussed computer-indexing of all instruments and explained the procedure. He said the process would take the place of an extra employee he would need if the office continues to index instruments at the rate it is going. The court turned the matter over to the judge and auditor for investigation.

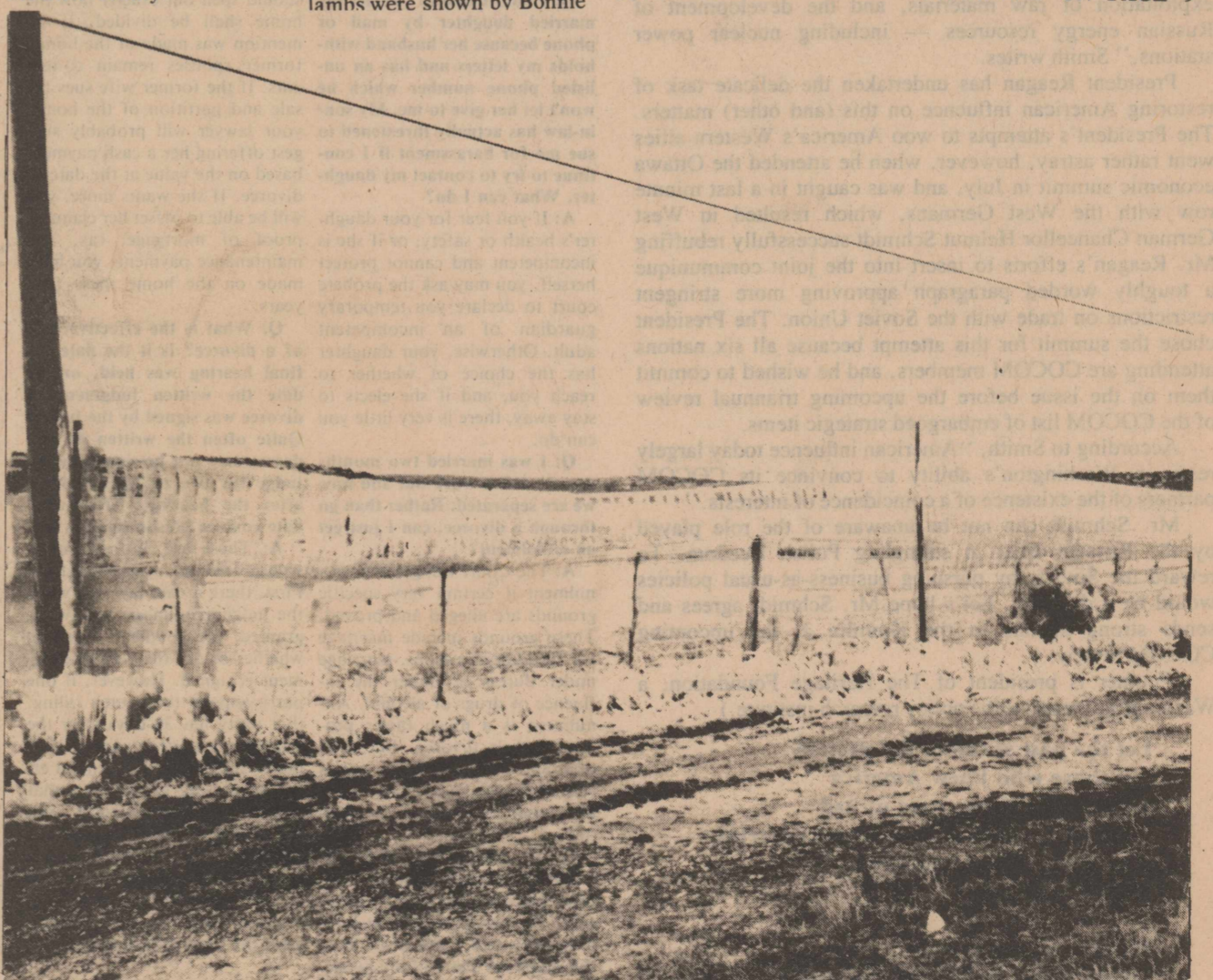
Tom Stokes, Tax Assessor-Collector, presented the delinquent tax roll which County Attorney Tom Cameron is preparing to file foreclosures on.

minutes streets were dangerous and slick. With an early morning low of 5 degrees above zero and a high of 28 at mid-afternoon Monday, there was no chance for precipitation to melt and it froze solid upon hitting the ground. Parked cars were iced over in a matter of minutes.

There was no safe method of getting around by automobile as the ice formed a solid sheet over the streets and until road employees began to sand them they were impossible and impassable. Even pickups with snow chains were hard to control and many found themselves slipping sideways and out of control on even the slightest incline.

The ice melted by mid-morning Tuesday and the mercury rose to 63 degrees by 3:30 Tuesday afternoon. However, at 4 o'clock it began to drop and another front was on its way with ice and snow in the forecast.

POLISH CRISIS CALLS FOR "COCOM" ACTION

"COCOM" sounds like a subcommittee of the Soviet Politburo. In fact, it is a tool of their adversaries.

COCOM is a highly confidential, if not secret body, otherwise known as the Coordinating Committee (for Export Controls). Since 1950, it has provided the informal organizational framework through which the major Western powers, under American leadership, have operated highly effective and well-structured strategic trade controls aimed against the Eastern bloc.

Unhappily for the West, COCOM has not exercised sufficiently tight controls on the sale of Western technology to the Soviet Union. Notes British journalist Dexter Jerome Smith, "Washington estimates that direct and indirect sales, plus KGB espionage and Soviet reverse-engineering, have in recent years saved the U.S.S.R. \$100 billion, and cut the technological gap between the U.S. and the U.S.S.R. in many key areas, from ten down to three years."

The main problem, to put it delicately, is the decline of American military, political and economic supremacy. "Even in the absence of the disgrace that was Vietnam, the decline of the classic Cold War was bound to challenge this supremacy by eroding the cohesiveness of the American-led Alliance system," Smith says. "No longer perceiving the threat to their security they had once perceived, America's major allies are no longer willing to accept American leadership in the manner they once did."

Consequently, some of the major Western powers have taken steps that the U.S. perceives as damaging to Western strategic interests. For example, France and West Germany failed to cooperate with President Carter's ban on the export of high technology to the U.S.S.R. after the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. "During the early months of 1980 the French won lucrative orders for the supply of oil rigs in the Caspian Sea, and the West German government signed an economic pact with the Soviet Union aimed at encouraging the modernization of Russian industry, the exploitation of raw materials, and the development of Russian energy resources — including nuclear power stations," Smith writes.

President Reagan has undertaken the delicate task of restoring American influence on this (and other) matters. The President's attempts to woo America's Western allies went rather astray, however, when he attended the Ottawa economic summit in July, and was caught in a last minute row with the West Germans, which resulted in West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt successfully rebuffing Mr. Reagan's efforts to insert into the joint communique a toughly worded paragraph approving more stringent restrictions on trade with the Soviet Union. The President chose the summit for this attempt because all six nations attending are COCOM members, and he wished to commit them on the issue before the upcoming triannual review of the COCOM list of embargoed strategic items.

According to Smith, "American influence today largely rests on Washington's ability to convince its COCOM partners of the existence of a coincidence of interests."

Mr. Schmidt can not be unaware of the role played by the Russian Bear in strangling Polish freedom. To reward the Soviets by pursuing business-as-usual policies would be a disgrace. Let's hope Mr. Schmidt agrees and sends strong signals to the Kremlin at the upcoming COCOM review.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — The Texas Senate redistricting plan has survived its first major challenge with State District Judge Herman Jones rejecting arguments by a group of leading Republicans that the reapportionment plan was drafted on the wrong basis.

Jones upheld the plan, drawn by the Legislative Redistricting Board, stating he wasn't convinced it violated either the state or federal constitutions.

State GOP Chairman Chester R. Upham and six other Republicans challenged the Senate map on grounds the state constitution required that districts be drawn on the basis of "qualified electors" rather than a strict population count, as used by the LRB.

Attorneys for the state, however, argued that the LRB couldn't ignore a 1965 federal court ruling they felt invalidated the Texas constitutional provision.

But the Senate plan isn't in the clear yet. The Republicans still can appeal Jones' decision, and the plan still faces a federal court challenge—along with the House plan—before a three-judge panel in Dallas.

Liability Insurance Law
The state's new mandatory liability insurance law went into effect at the first

of the year, and the automobile insurance business reportedly is booming as uninsured drivers scramble to get coverage before being slapped with a \$200 fine.

Under the law, drivers can be ticketed if they don't carry proof of liability coverage in their cars.

More than a million Texas motorists are uninsured, and the required coverage could cost each of them up to several hundred dollars annually, depending on where they live and past driving records.

Those who don't have insurance yet, or haven't received a document showing proof of insurance from their insurance companies, shouldn't panic yet. The Department of Public Safety says its officers won't start ticketing drivers without that proof for another couple of months.

Police in some cities, however, are enforcing the law strictly, with some 300 drivers ticketed in Dallas during the first week of the year.

Drivers caught without insurance more than once may face fines up to \$1,000 and jail terms.

Q: I am unable to contact my married daughter by mail or phone because her husband withholds my letters and has an unlisted phone number which he won't let her give to me. My son-in-law has actually threatened to sue me for harassment if I continue to try to contact my daughter. What can I do?

A: If you fear for your daughter's health or safety, or if she is incompetent and cannot protect herself, you may ask the probate court to declare you temporary guardian of an incompetent adult. Otherwise, your daughter has the choice of whether to reach you, and if she elects to stay away, there is very little you can do.

Q: I was married two months ago. It didn't work out and now we are separated. Rather than go through a divorce, can I just get an annulment?

A: The Court will grant an annulment if certain very specific grounds are alleged and proved. These grounds include marriage for fraudulent reasons, marriage under duress or under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Annulment is a much faster procedure than divorce, but it is generally not available unless you apply for this remedy soon after your marriage and separation.

Q: My former wife and I divorced four years ago, agreeing to an equitable division of property. The house was left in joint ownership and I live in it. Now she wants her share of the house. Is she entitled to half of what the house was worth at the time of the divorce or is she entitled to half of the present value of the house?

A: The Decree of Divorce

should spell out exactly how the home shall be divided. If no mention was made of the home, former spouses remain co-tenants. If the former wife sues for sale and partition of the home, your lawyer will probably suggest offering her a cash payment based on the value at the date of divorce. If she wants more, you will be able to offset her claim by proof of mortgage, tax, and maintenance payments you have made on the home these four years.

Q: What is the effective date of a divorce? Is it the date the final hearing was held, or the date the written judgment of divorce was signed by the judge? Quite often the written divorce decree may not be signed by the judge for two or three months after the hearing. After what date could a person remarry?

A: There are, unfortunately, several answers to your question. First, there is case law that when the judge announces the divorce granted, the couple is divorced whether or not the written judgment is signed. However, if one party appeals the court's ruling, that party has 30 days after the judgment is signed to appeal. Filing an appeal has the general effect of staying the divorce; that is, continuing the marriage, until the appellate court disposes of the case. The absolutely safest course is not to remarry until the written judgment of the court becomes final, which is 30 days after the judgment is signed.

Statement of Nondiscrimination

HEALTHY ADVICE

Insomnia

Having difficulty going to sleep or finding yourself wide awake in the middle of the night are symptoms of a problem experienced by many people. The Texas Medical Association estimates that nearly 50 million Americans are occasionally plagued by insomnia.

Worrying about sleeplessness compounds the dilemma. The more you are concerned, the more tense you become and the less likely you are to fall asleep.

Insomnia usually is a temporary condition. The loss of a loved one, concern about your job or other personal problems can disrupt your sleeping habits for a short period of time. However, your body can temporarily adjust to a shorter sleeping schedule. When you finally become really tired and the problems are less pressing, you will likely revert to your previous sleeping habits.

There are ways, however, to deal with temporary insomnia without using sleeping pills. You can establish certain habits so that you will more easily fall asleep. For example, you should try to go to bed at the same time each night. Establish a nightly routine that may include reading a chapter of a book or working on a relaxing hobby.

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Now that we are having our changeable weather, warm one day and blizzard the next, it's a good time to look at catalogues and order your flower and garden seeds and plants when you can't be outside. Then when the weather permits there are many chores to be attended to this and next month.

This is the last time to make hardwood cuttings from trees and shrubs you may wish to propagate, such as pyracantha, poplar, pussy willow, deutzia, weigela, forsythia and others. Make cuttings about 4 inches long, and root them in a cold frame or pot in a mixture of equal parts perlite and peat moss.

To promote larger, longer lasting blooms on your crepe myrtle trees next summer remove seed capsules from the end of the branches while the plants are dormant. It is also a good time to prune off dead or weak wood, to pull weedy vines out of the plants and prune to keep as a shrub rather than a tree.

Cut back pampas grass to within 6 inches of the ground now that winter cold has killed last year's foliage. If you wait until spring you must be careful not to damage new growth. Left unpruned, your pampas grass will look ragged next year because of the dead

foliage left on the plant. Finish pruning grape vines if this has not already been done and attend to the pruning of other fruit trees well in advance of new growth beginning. Also those shrubs that bloomed in late summer should be pruned now or by the end of February.

Pruning now will encourage thicker and prettier specimens and will result in better summer flowering of the abelia, althea, butterfly bush, crepe myrtle, vitex, elaeagnus, flowering willow, salt cedar, mallow hibiscus and oleanders.

For your annuals turn the soil in annual beds in preparation for spring planting along with destroying weed seeds, this also brings insects to the soil surface where birds can eat them or winter temperature kills them. Cold-hardy annuals such as larkspur, calendula and poppies can be planted earlier than other annuals.

When is the last time you hammered a thumb while trying to hammer a small nail or brad? On your next hammering job try this:

Hold your nail with a bobbie pin. The bobbie pin holds the nail at the open end and the fingers are at the other end. After the nail has started pull the bobbie pin off the nail.

Most tool boxes contain a screwdriver with a magnetized blade. When its time to drive in brads or tacks, the screwdriver tip will hold the brad so you can hammer it.

The teeth of a pocket comb can also be used to hold nails. A pencil eraser will hold a nail for hammering.

With larger nails, its best to hold the nail up close to the head for starting. This way, if you miss, you'll still hit your hand, but it's not against the surface.

INDIVIDUAL MEXICAN MEATLOAVES

1/2 cup chopped green peppers
1/2 cup onion
1 pound lean ground beef
1 pkg. (1-1/4 oz.) taco seasoning mix
1/2 cup chopped tomato
1 egg
1/2 cup finely crumbled Nacho cheese chips
1 can (15 oz.) kidney beans, drained, optional
4 corn tortillas
1/4 cup grated Cheddar cheese, divided
Chopped lettuce
Chopped tomato

In medium mixing bowl combine green pepper and onion. Cover loosely with plastic wrap. Microwave at high 1 to 1 1/2 minutes or until tender-crisp. Add ground beef, taco seasoning mix, 1/2 cup chopped tomato, egg, crumbled cheese chips and

kidney beans. Set mixture aside. To fit tortillas in casseroles, cut four 2" slashes, 3/4" apart in edge of each tortilla. Shape tortillas by overlapping cut edges; place in 4 individual 12-oz. casseroles. Press 1/4 of meat mixture into each. Cover with wax paper. Microwave at high 7-10 minutes, or until filling is firm to touch.

Top each casserole with 1 tablespoon grated Cheddar cheese. Let stand covered 3 minutes, or until cheese melts. Garnish with chopped lettuce and tomato.

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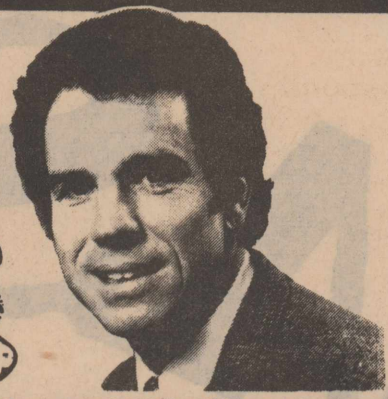
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

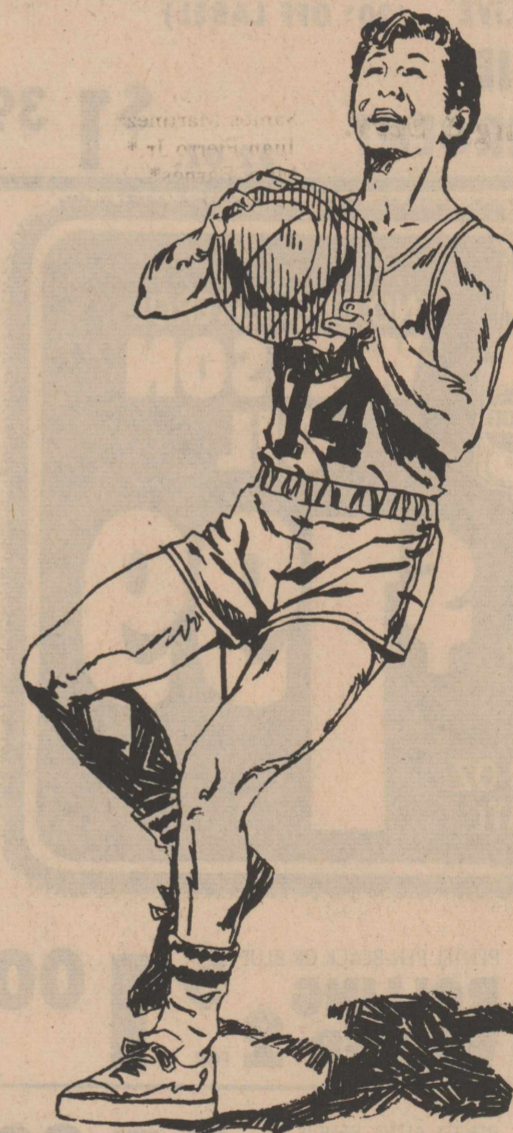

Wildcats and outposts set for county fields

Two wildcats and ten outposts were scheduled in Crockett County.

C. F. Lawrence & Associates Inc., Midland, will drill the No. 1 University "N", a 2,200-foot wildcat in Crockett County, 1 1/8 miles north of shallow production in the Midway Lane field, separated by depleted producers and failures, and 20 miles north of Ozona.

Location is 990 feet from the north and 467 feet from the west lines of 25-45-University Lands.

C. F. Lawrence & Associates Inc. will drill the No. 1 Troy "B", a 1,500-foot wildcat, 990 feet south-southeast of a 1,456-foot failure, 1 1/4

miles west and slightly north of 1000 oil production in the Holt Ranch field, 1 5/8 miles east-northeast of the Ecklaw multipay field and 14 miles north of Ozona.

Location is 467 feet from the north and 2,173 feet from the east lines of 35-OP-GC&SF. Ground elevation is 2,583 feet.

The failure, Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. (now Atlantic Richfield Co.) No. 1 Nettie Holt, was abandoned March 9, 1951. The Eckaw field has one Queen well producing at 872 feet; one Grayburg at 1,228 feet; and seven San Andres wells at 1,412 feet.

Southland Royalty Co., Midland, No. 1 University

"13", in 13-30-University, rescheduled 8,500-foot wildcat, 3/4-mile west and slightly south of the shallow Howards Draw oil and gas field, three miles north of the Howards Creek, North (Pennsylvanian gas) field and the same distance from Pennsylvanian gas production in the Howards Creek multipay field and 20 miles west of Ozona, pumped 18 barrels of oil, along with 15 barrels of water, in 24 hours.

Recovery was through perforations at 7,157-314 feet. Testing continued.

Earlier it tested through perforations at 6,611-64 feet. Blue Ridge Oil & Gas Exploration Inc., Ozona, will

drill 10 outposts to the Adams-Baggett Ranch (Canyon sand gas) field, 28 miles south of Ozona.

All of the projects are scheduled at 5,500 feet.

The No. 31 Adams, 1 1/8 miles east-northeast of a 2 1/4-mile west extension area, is 660 feet from the north and east lines of 129-O-GH&A.

The No. 30 Adams, 1 3/8 miles southeast of a 2 1/4-mile west extension area, is 660 feet from the south and east lines of the same section.

The No. 29 Adams, 1 5/8 miles southeast and the same distance northwest of a 2 1/4-mile west extension area, is 660 feet from the north and

The No. 27 Adams, 1 1/4-mile west and northwest outpost, is 660 feet from the north and west lines of the projects are in 153-O-GH&SA.

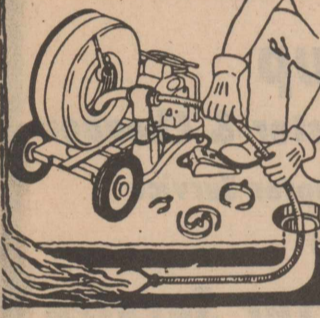

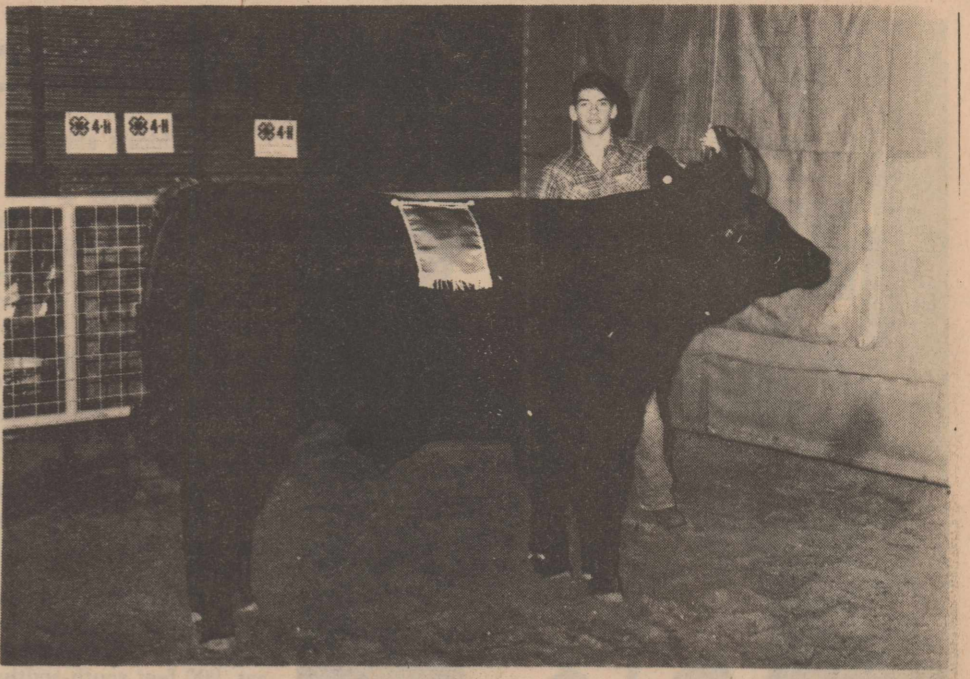

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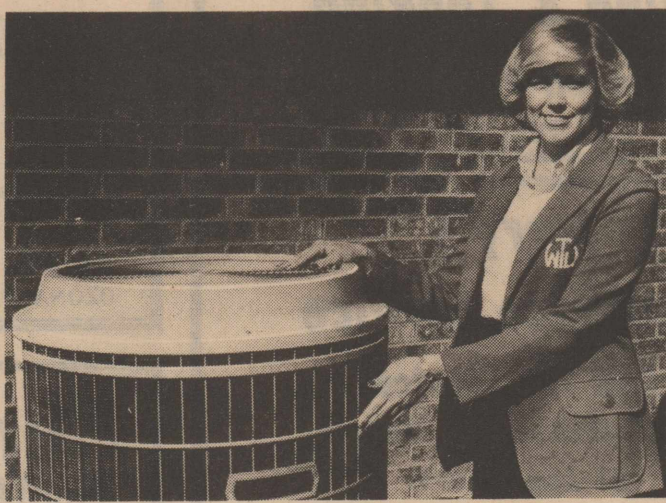

Did you know that when Notre Dame finished under .500 in the 1981 football season, it amazingly was only the 5th time in 93 years that the Irish lost more games than they won. The only other seasons when Notre Dame was under .500 since 1889, were in 1933 (3-5-1)-1956(2-8-0)-1960 (2-8-0)- and 1963 (2-7-0).

Here's a tough question for you. What team has won more college football games than any other school in history and yet has never played in a post-season bowl game? Answer is Yale, which has won the NCAA record of 718 football victories over the years. No other school is close to that total. But Yale has never played in a post-season bowl game in any year.

Oddly enough, it's now been 10 years since a quarterback has won the Heisman Trophy as the outstanding college football player in the nation. Last time a quarterback won the Heisman was 1971 when the winner was Pat Sullivan of Auburn.
