### Jury finds Liveoak guilty

Leonard Liveoak, 32-yearold oil company consultant, was found guilty of voluntary manslaughter by a Sanderson jury Friday, in the shooting death of B. B. (Buddy) Ingham, Jr. September 23, 1981. The jury also set the sentence at four years in the Texas Department of Corrections. Liveoak remains free on bond at this time.

Liveoak was indicted for murder by a 63rd District grand jury following Ingham's death from gunshot wounds the night of September 23. The shooting occurred at Ingham's ranch home in Terrell county, but Ingham died in Crockett County Hospital later the same night.

Trial date was set for February 1, 1982. After two days of motions by the prosecution and defense, a jury was selected and the trial began Wednesday, Feb. 3, at 1:00 p.m.




### **MR. MEESE AND THE VIPERS**



If it doesn't hound them in their sleep, it certainly must haunt them during their waking hours. Thus, taking potshots at Meese has become a way of life.

This phenomenon can be better understood when one considers the relationship between the presidency and the press. To dismiss it as an "adversary" relationship, I think, does it injustice. In fact, it's a classic case of jealousy: one group makes its living chasing power, and another group makes its living exercising power. The crunch comes when you realize, as a recent Public Opinion magazine study showed, that the people chasing power, members of the Fourth Estate, feel they could do a better job of running the country than those who were elected or appointed - as in the case of Mr. Meese.

Hamilton Jordan, Mr. Meese's predecessor in the sensitive next-to-the-top White House slot, felt the same sting. Yet, Mr. Jordan, one might argue, often invited the attacks, working as he did for a holier-than-thou, bornagain moralist, yet exhibiting all of the maturity, at times, of a sailor in Singapore.

Mr. Meese's major sin, as near as I can tell, is that he does his job too darn well - especially for those in the press who get their jollies watching the big boys stumble badly, and fall on their ever-too-human tushes.

Clearly, Ed Meese isn't perfect. He's had his share of missteps, but much to the dismay of his detractors, he's managed to stay on his feet.

For all of their apparent sophistication, Mr. Meese and the Reagan White House handled the Richard Allen affair poorly. Their rebuke of the Polish and Soviet governments, following the imposition of martial law, was mushy. Their refusal to make good on their promises to the Republic of China (Taiwan), our long-time ally, was inexcusable (perhaps they have forgotten the 1980 Republican Party platform?). And their handling of several other policy decisions - Social Security, the AWACS sale, the decision on tax exemptions for allegedly segregated schools - was amateurish at best.

Yet, this administration has rolled up an incredible list of accomplishments, and in one year has managed to untangle much of the damaging mess that 45 years of liberal policymaking had created.

And Mr. Meese played a major role in the effort helping to keep together the budget and tax cut programs when political warfare threatened to split them asunder, keeping the factions within the White House reasonably in tune with the conservative trumpet . . . always by the President's side and ready to remind the rest of the troops what the Reagan Revolution is all about.

For this we owe Mr. Meese, the man next-to-the-top, a debt of thanks. The nation is well-served by his steady presence. We can only hope his sway over policy will continue, and that the boys and girls in the press corps will have more reason than ever to snipe between the sips. A: The adoption established a parent-child relationship just as if the child had been born to you. back. What can we do?

Since your adopted daughter is now an adult, you cannot terminate your parental relation ship. Also, there is no provision in Texas law to "force" an adult to change her name. A: Under the Rules Governing Attorneys in the State of Texas, vises. you might terminate the relationship between you and your lawver. One way to do this is to send a termination letter by certified mail, setting out that the attorney's services are no longer desired, and that you request an itemized statement for the services rendered to date. Further, if the attorney is holding any documents concerning your case, you are entitled to their return.

O: I am a federal employee. I was hired several months ago to supervise a particular division with the understanding that I would remain as supervisor as long as I staved with the division. This has not happened; a woman has been hired and made my direct supervisor. I feel I have been used and I wonder if I have any grounds for a lawsuit.

A: Assuming you have no written contract of employment that designates you as the only supervisor of a specific department, you have no absolute right to supervise that particular employee group. The structure of any department is subject to change as long as the jobs available are filled based upon neutral considerations, that is, regardless of race, sex, creed, or religion. The mere fact that a woman was hired as your supervisor does not give you grounds

to sue. Q: In a child custody order where the child lives with the mother, who has the right to decide on which weekends and in what summer month the father will have the child for visitation? In other words, does the parent who has custody decide everything regarding visitation?

A: You may bring a Motion to Modify in the Court where the divorce was granted. At the hearing, both parents can testify, and the Court will enter a new Order. to specify weekends, summers, and holiday visitation. Often filhave married the father of the child. 



### **Technology Can Aid** Hard-Pressed Cattle Industry

Rapid acceptance and use of much of the technology developed in recent decades can help to revitalize our cattle industry, according to Dr. Charles Long, animal scientist at Texas A&M University.

Cattle production is especially hard-pressed at present, Long says, because of high or rising prices for nearly everything bought, while selling prices for beef cattle are often relatively low.

Increased productivity and efficiency are frequently the determining factors for a difference between profit and loss, according to Long, whose research specialty is animal breeding and production systems.

Higher output at lower cost at every step between conception and the consumer's plate is vital, Long contends, for economic recovery of the cattle industry.

Beef cattle production divides naturally into two phases, the cow-calf phase, in which reproduction or increasing numbers is of primary importance, and the growth and fattening phase. in which weight production or increase in the goal. Decisions in one production phase have implications in the other and should consider overall production goals and markets.

Several technological developments in reproductive physiology, nutrition, breeding and genetics, meat science and other areas of animal science, when more fully implemented, will improve efficiency in beef cattle herds.

While a broad array of technological advances are available, decisions concerning which to use depends on the producer's individual situation with respect to available resources (land, labor, capital, etc.), as well as production objectives and limitations

Research in reproductive physiology has yielded several useful procedures.

Pregnancy diagnosis by rectal palpation has provided producers with a method of clude considerations such as testing level of libido or breeding interest.

Artificial insemination, while used to a large degree in purebred herds, has not caught on in commercial beef production as quickly as expected, probably because of increased labor and training requirements.

Estrous synchronization, which causes all or most cows in a herd to exhibit breeding receptivity in a short period of time, is fast becoming routine, provided cows are receiving adequate nutrition.

Labor reduction and other considerations make estrous synchronization an integral part of successful artificial insemination and embryo transfer programs. This technique has had wide application in purebred herds but only slight use in commercial production to date.

Embryo transfer refers to the technique of collecting fertilized eggs from a superovulated donor cow and placing these embryos into recipient cows for gestation, parturition and rearing.

Freezing and storage of embryos for subsequent placement in a recipient cow is presently possible; conception rates must be improved in order for frozen embryos to be routinely used in commercial herds, Long says. These and other techniques, including sex determination and induced calving, are being fine-tuned and impro-

ved by scientists. The various reproductionrelated techniques are somewhat, but not completely, interdependent with respect to successful utilization. Long says improvements in one may enhance the utility

of another. The technological developments in nutrition over the past several decades have been important.

Recent and ongoing developments include growth regulators and modifiers of nutrient metabolism, including anabolic agents, ionophores, growth hormone and other compounds which enhance efficiency of nutrient use in cattle and offer promise of improvement in pro-

consuming only forage will not likely make up a large portion of U.S. beef supplies in the near future, falling cattle/grain price ratios will probably cause increased use of forage and by-product roughages, with cattle subsequently fed grain for shorter fattening periods.

"If land resources allocated to beef cattle production are not increased, a production system based on decreased use of grain will yield less meat per cow and per acre," Long says.

"Available technology related to reproduction and nutrition, applied in conjunction with advancements in other areas of animal science, may significantly improve productivity."

'Good management, fitting decisions to the indiviresource base, is a dual primary consideration in properly utilizing the technology," Long concludes.

## Americans consume too much sodium

suming too much sodium in the form of table salt, says Mary K. Sweeten, a food and nutrition specialist.

Studies show that Americans get anywhere from five to 20 times more sodium than we need, the specialist adds. Some sodium is necessary

for proper body functioning, of course. It helps maintain blood volume and the osmotic pressure, which is necessary for proper cell functioning. Sodium also has a part in transmitting nerve

impulses.

On the other hand, too much sodium contributes to high blood pressure or hypertension in susceptible

people, Sweeten says. Why so much salt? We like the taste, for one thing, the specialist says.

However, more research is needed to determine the reason for that, she adds. Sodium is, of course, in table salt which has 40 percent sodium and 60 percent chloride. One teaspoon of salt contains about 2.000 milligrams of sodium.

In addition, sodium is present in many foods, beverages and processed foods.

These include pickled products, condiments, sauces, salty snack-type foods, luncheon meats and canned soups.

Some household staples contain sodium, too--baking powder and baking soda, along with flavoring agents such as catsup, olives, pickles, garlic and onion products.

Also, processed meats and fish that are salted or brined have more sodium than uncured ones, of course. And canned vegetables may have additional salt for flavor-

At frozen food counters, most vegetables don't have extra salt, but starchy ones applications from outstand- sex, or national origin.

Most Americans are con- such as peas and corn may be salted in a brine before freezing. Frozen foods with sauces, mushrooms or nuts may have extra salt.

Most processed fruits don't have additional sodium, but some processed apples and tomatoes are treated with sodium hydroxide for easier peeling. Bottled citrus drinks may

have sodium citrate added to buffer the solution. Even wine making "rubs shoulders" with sodium--a sodium exchange process is sometimes used in wine making to reduce the cloudy

sediment and achieve a clear product. Food additives contain sodium in some cases--sodium saccharine is used as a sweetener in some diet soft drinks, monosodium glutamate (MSG) is used as a





Avoid using extra salt at the table, eat smaller amounts of foods containing large amounts of sodium, buy "plain" varieties of foods--so you can control the amount of sodium added or not added, read food labels and check the "nutrition information" part for sodium listed in milligrams and check the "ingredient list" to see if sodium is listed near the beginning--items listed first on a label are present in the largest amounts.






