

Funeral services for Wayne William West, 84, were held Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock in First Baptist Church, with burial in

Cedar Hill Cemetery. Mr. West, former president of Ozona National Bank, died at Angelo Community Hospital in San Angelo, Sunday afternoon at 2:25.

He was a lifelong resident of Ozona, born here Dec. 18, 1897. He graduated from Ozona High School in 1915. and attended the University of Texas. In 1919 he married Mary Frances (Mae) North. Mrs. West died in 1971.

West was president of Ozona National Bank from 1938 to 1975, when he was named Chairman of the Board. He was a rancher, a charter member of the Crockett County Fair Association and the Ozona Country Club. He was a member of the Rotary Club and a 50-year member of the Ozona Ma-

PROFIT IN SCIENCE

Laser beams, audio animatrons, holograms and fiber optics are part of the new space age technology that is propelling the industrialized West into what author Alvin Toffler called "future shock."

Society is evolving at lightning speed and our future ability to adapt to a rapidly changing world largely depends on what's going on in today's scientific laboratories. Unfortunately . . . not enouth.

Despite the current sci-fi craze and all the hype about new technological gimmicks and gadgets, much of the scientific community is suffering from innovative arthritis. Inflation and excessive government regulation have taken their toll. And outdated patent laws and a Freedom of Information Act that might better be called the "Trade Secrets Giveaway Act" have had a paralytic effect.

According to David P. Sheetz, vice president for research and development at Dow Chemical Company, innovation is at a near standstill. "The risks have increased and the benefits have shrunk," he says explaining that it simply costs too much and takes too long to bring a scientific invention from the laboratory to the marketplace. Too often, it just isn't worth the effort.

For example, industry-wide data supplied by the National Agricultural Chemicals Association a year ago showed that it takes an average of eight to nine years and an investment of \$15-20 million for a company to do the testing and retesting of a new product needed to satisfy government watchdogs.

Assuming a company is willing to make such an investment, and the feds give the product their stamp of approval, decisions affecting the confidentiality of trade secrets are left to the discretion of individual government agencies under present law. Thus, the Freedom of Information Act often plays into the hands of those who may be engaged in industrial espionage.

Obviously, something needs to be done to both minimize the risks and maximize the potential benefits of committing huge sums of money to scientific research.

Vice President George Bush's anti-regulatory task force is attempting to wipe out some of the needless government red tape and unnecessary rules and regulations. And movement is afoot to reform the Freedom of Information Act.

But more is needed to give the innovative sector a shot in the arm, and Sheetz has come up with a simple proposal. The government, he suggests, should give an inventor "a monopoly on his or her invention" for the 17-year life of the invention's patent, and exempt the invention from taxes during that period. (This tax relief would apply only to profits from U.S. sales of a product.)

Sheetz says the proposal would not be retroactive. Therefore it would not cost the government a cent of the taxes it is now collecting. Indeed, by stimulating innovation and thereby employment, the proposal would likely increase government revenues.

While Sheetz' proposal certainly needs to be fleshed out in greater detail, it is a refreshing change from the bellyaching one hears elsewhere in the scientific community, which feels it should be immune from federal budget cuts.

A: Your son must pay the ticket, and if he does not pay on time, he may face an increased fine. For example, in Dallas, if the ticket is not paid on or before the court date, the fine will automatically be increased by ten dollars. After that, a warrant will be issued for your son's arrest. A maximum fine of about \$200 is possible for non-payment.

O: Several years ago when my husband and I were married, I took his name. Now I want to return to my maiden name. Can I just take my name back without going to court?

A: Although Texas law permits a person to use any name she chooses, in this situation I recommend a formal action to change your last name. You will need a certified court

order to claim certain property and benefits awarded in your married name, and you will need proof when you correct credit and other records.

The Court will grant a name change as long as it is satisfied you are not thereby attempting to escape creditors.

Q: I am considering filing a malpractice suit against my doctor. What is the statute of limitations for bringing suits of this

A: The suit must be filed within two years from the date of the treatment or within two years from the time you left the hospital. If the treatment was given to a person under 12 years of age, the law allows the suit to be filed anytime until the 14th birthday.

There are recent cases on this subject, however, that suggest the patient has two years from when he learned of the malpractice - or should have learned before limitations expire.

Q: How soon after my divorce can I remarry? Is the law regarding this a state law or is it the same anywhere in the United States?

A: The Texas Family Code provides that neither party to a divorce may marry anyone else for thirty days. They may, however, remarry each other at any time. After the 30 days, both parties are free to marry anyone.

State law controls marital and family matters, and this 30-day provision applies only to Texas. The law in other states will vary as to remarriage following di-

Q: Can I be forced to submit to a polygraph or lie detector test as a condition for employment? I don't have anything to hide, but I think it is unfair to make me agree to take the test in order to get a job!

A: No federal or Texas laws prohibit an employer from requiring a job applicant to submit to a polygraph test as a part of the application process. Legislation has been pending in the United States Congress on this subject for a number of years. but to date no statute has been enacted. Therefore, it is still the prerogative of the employer to impose this condition. It is up to you to decide if you dislike the requirement enough to refuse to be tested.

O: When I moved into my apartment complex. I signed a long lease. I didn't take time to read the lease, and even if I had, I would not have understood the effect of all the clauses. Now a dispute has arisen. It doesn't seem fair that I am bound by a contract I didn't read and can't

understand. Am I bound? A: The answer is usually "yes" The law charges a person to read and understand any contract before he signs it. While this rule can sometimes be harsh, it is often necessary. Otherwise, any party to a contract could always avoid reading it and claim that since he didn't understand, he shouldn't be bound. However, there is one very important exception to this rule. If someone deceives you into signing a contract without giving it careful attention, you may not have to observe its terms. For example, if purchased a mobile home, not a car top carrier.

Q: I've been living with a man for three years, and we consider ourselves married although we never got a marriage license or had a wedding. marriage is just as valid as a traditional marriage, a divorce is necessary to dissolve the relationship. Accordingly, any property or children from either type of marriage must be divided between husband and wife. Furthermore, neither party is free to remarry until the common law marriage is dissolved. The law defines a common law marriage as one where the partners agree to marry, hold themselves out as being married, and live together. Contrary to popular belief, there is no minimum number of months or years a couple must live together to establish a legal common law marriage

Avoid insurance claim problems

Don't hassle with problems when filing insurance claims. Follow some simple guidelines when filing to help everything go smoothly, suggests Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist.

Find out exactly what information is needed, what forms should be filled out and how and where to obtain estimates of damage, she

Your insurance company or its literature will give you this information, the specialist adds. When you talk with some-

one from the insurance company, write down their name for future reference in case of problems or delays. Most delays in settling

claims occur because policyholders don't include the claim numbers when they write to the company, the specialist points out. Other delays are the result

of failure to send in damage repair bills promptly, McCormack says.

If a policyholder is not satisfied with the company's handling of his case, he should take further steps to make sure his complaint is heard, the specialist advises. Check your reference list and contact the person you talked with first. Calmly

If this doesn't help, go one step further and contact that representative's manager.

If you're still unsuccessful, put your complaint in writing and send it to the company's corporate or regional consumer-affairs department, McCormack says.

Use these suggestions when writing a letter to resolve a problem: write the letter neatly and legibly, keep it short and to the point stating problems, listing policy and claim numbers and pertienet dates. State specifically what you would like done. Include your name, address, work and home telephone numbers on all letters, keep a copy of the

letter for your files, and allow at least five days for a

I continue to get lots of guestions on how to discipline children. The Family Life Specialists tell parents to be consistent when they discipline their children. Parents sometimes wonder if they are doing the "right thing" when they discipline their children.

Children are not born good or bad. A child learns to do things that make him feel good. He also learns that bad things get him attention. No two children are alike. One child may need for you to be firm and another child may feel punished by a few words.

Guiding children takes time and patience. Words like don't stop, and quit are often used in correcting chil-

dren. Telling a child what not to do does not tell him what to do. For example, instead of saying "Don't throw the ball" say "Roll the ball on the floor.

Children act like the people he loves and respects. Sometimes parents or children have a bad day. Never punish your children in anger. You may get rid of your anger, but at your child's expense.

If punishment is necessary punish when the wrong is done. Don't wait. If parents want children to change their behavior, they must correct the wrong every time, not just once in a while.

School age children need some extra activities like 4-H, Scouts, or church groups so they can make good use of their extra time. Active, busy children usually

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Beauty in a garden can be yours if you plan now. Fulfill vour dream with spring and summer beauty and celebrate the glory of the fall

Each spring, fall-planted bulbs come into bloom to make a spectacular show which they are beginning

Also, plans now will bring a more colorful spring for many years if you plant peonies next September or October. To send in your order soon will assure you of a better selection and grade of peony roots. These lovely garden perennials are known to have lived many years without being moved or almost forever they say. Don't expect blooms the first year, but once established, you can expect beautiful blooms each year, if properly planted and cared for. For this area, select the early varieties that will bloom before summer heat begins. Flower types are double. Japanese, the enchanting singles, and tree peonies. The single peonies are not as popular in American gardens as they deserve to be. They withstand the stormiest weather, are lovely in the garden and wonderful for cutting when buds are just opening.

If you mounded your peonies in the fall for winter protection, remove excess before growth starts. These buds are very brittle and easily damaged. After buds are several inches high, make a circle 6 inches away from the crown and apply an annual top dressing (about a cup of low-nitrogen, high phosphate and potassium fertilizer (5-10-10) to each plant. Dig it in lightly and give a thorough soaking if needed. Their fleshy tubers

grow deep. Should your old peonies fail to bloom, they may be planted too deep. Only 2 inches or less of soil should be directly above the eyes or buds of the tubers.

If you are planning to buy new roses and don't have room for bush roses try the beautiful climbers. Some of the best of the new and the old-blaze, don juan, tempo, america, pinata and royal

Prune hybrid teas by March 15. First remove all dead or cold-damaged wood, cutting 1 inch below darkcolored area. Retain 4 to 6 healthy canes per plant, cutting them back to 18 to 20 inches above ground level; remove other canes at ground level. Do not prune climbing roses until after

these hints this week: If the legs of tables and chairs have caused 'crush spots' on your carpet from pressing down on it, you can raise the pile by placing a hot iron over the spot, about a half-inch above it, for about one minute. But be careful not to touch the carpet itself with the iron. Hold the iron above

the spot. To get away from changes in color-tone of carpet, or shading caused by tufts being pressed in different directions by footsteps or furniture, vacuum in the direction of the pile. If you're not sure the direction the pile goes, run your finger over the carpet and the smooth feeling will show

When vacuuming any carpet, use long slow strokes.

If the ends of your carpet tend to curl up, or if you have a ridge in the middle of your carpet, a little hot water will level it out.

If you have a problem of "sprouting", that is, rising of the tufts above the pile level, never pull the tufts out. You can correct the problem by snipping off the loose tufts. Remember, rising tufts should be clipped, not pulled.

The program works like this: Each family member completes a one page medical form. Information on allergic reactions, medications being taken, blood type, etc. are recorded on the form. After each member

PBPA Energy report

President Reagan would like to turn over some 40-odd federal programs to the states and use the oil windfall profits tax to pay for more than fifty percent of the cost during the transition period.

PBPA feels this is wrong for many reasons. To start with, we believe the tax is unconstitutional. Second, the tax money was supposed to be used to help the poor with their energy bills and to cut taxes. Third, the tax has a definite expiration date, under certain conditions. By designating the tax for a certain program that benefits all fifty states, there would be strong opposition to cutting the purse strings in

Last, but far from least, its estimated that Texas would pay for 22 percent of the entire program.

In other news, technology is moving ahead. There's a camera three inches in diameter and 12 feet long that's taking pictures underground showing layer after layer of rock formations. And, at Plano, they've developed an experimental drilling rig that can drill holes around rightangle bends. More testing will be done in Oklahoma.

And, oil refinery output last week was down to 63 percent of capacity according to A.P.I. Oil imports were only 3.4 million barrels a day, down from 5.1 million a year ago.

In the Permian Basin our rig count for last week was 467. One year ago it was 389.

The Quantos opener, H.L. Brown Jr. No. 1 Ruth Schlinke, drilled to 11,420 feet, was finaled Sept. 3, 1968 for 204 barrels of 44.5 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 451-1, through a 24-64-inch choke and perforations at 11,368-386 feet. It became depleted May 1,

J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, will drill the No. 1 University 30-2, a 9,500-foot wildcat, 3/4-mile south-southeast and the same distance northeast of the University 29 (Strawn detrital gas) field and 20 miles west of Ozona.

Location is 1,115 feet from the north and 832 feet from the west lines of 2-30-University lands. Ground elevation is 2,494 feet.

J. Cleo Thompson will drill the No. 4 University 34 as a 1 1/8-mile south-southwest southpost to the four-well Queen gas area of the University 31 (Strawn detrital and Queen gas) field, 15 miles west of Ozona.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 34-31-University Lands. Contract depth is 1,500 feet.

Strawn detrital gas production was extended 5/8mile west in the University 31 field with completion of J. Cleo Thompson No. 2 University 31-21W, 12 miles west of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,620,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 1,300,000-1. 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

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
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
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
