ONE UP ON HITLER?

Even in their most desperate hours, Adolph Hitler's generals never resorted to chemical warfare against the Allies.

Whether by design, or because the Nazis' appetite for gruesome killing was otherwise being satisfied in the grizzly death camps at Dachau, Buchenwald, Treblinka, Belsen, and Majdanek, Allied troops and population centers never encountered this particular brand of terror.

Forty years later, however, evidence mounts that their successor regime - the Soviet Union - is actively engaged in a war of chemical terror against Third World insurgents who have dared to defy their military crusades in Afghanistan and Southeast Asia.

After an exhaustive review of available State Department and other public documents available in the West, veteran researcher James A. Phillips, a respected colleague of mine, has concluded that the evidence of Soviet chemical atrocities is "irrefutable."

Thousands, he says, already have been killed, and thousands more will likely die in this "brutal poison" holocaust.

An experienced analyst, educated at the prestigious Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at University, Phillips is known to be a careful and methodical researcher, not prone to exaggerated claims. (Phillips, for example, warned the West in the Fall of 1979 that a Soviet invasion of Afghanistan appeared imminent. A month later, Soviet troops were on the advance. Earlier, he had correctly predicted the Iranian oil cutoff which led to long gas lines here.)

Stricter laws regarding the misuse of Social Security numbers or cards are now in effect, according to Frank Upp, manager of the San Angelo Social Security office. A law signed by President Reagan in late December, 1981, provides criminal penalties for: (1) Using a Social Security card obtained with false information, (2) using someone else's Social Security number, (3) buying, selling, or counterfeiting Social Security cards, or (4) possessing a regular or counterfeit card with intent to sell or

alter it. An unlawful act affecting the Social Security card or number is now considered a felony, rather than a misdeameanor, added Upp.

Penalties for conviction can be a fine of up to \$5,000 or a prison term of up to 5 years or both.

Efforts to reduce tax

drain well underway By John A. Daeley

Efforts to reduce U.S. government interference in your life, and thus to reduce the tax drain on your pocketbook which that implies, is well under way as the Reagan administration completes its first year in office. A "New Federalism" budget for fiscal 1983 has been submitted to Congress and I would like to underscore early in this column a point that often is lost in the heated debate: The budget reductions are mostly in the rate of increase, although there are indeed some cuts in actual dollar amounts where reforms are needed or where the federal government should not be so heavily involved. The fact remains, however, that the new budget for the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS)-at \$274.2 billion-is \$56 billion larger than that proposed for the Defense Department. I think this is evidence of the administration's commitment to the needy. The long-range success of the Reagan administration's "New Federalism" depends on public support of policies being put into place, beginning with the reductions already made. This administration began its program in the belief that tax dollars could go farther to serve human needs if reforms were made in the way they are handed out. No one said the reforms would be entirely painless. But the idea is to achieve the reforms in ways that get results toward the objective of less government and still provide necessary help to those who truly need public assistance. One way to get an idea of just how big a job that will be is to consider the following comparisons: My department-HHS-proposes to spend more money than any nation on earth, except the U.S. as a whole and the Soviet Union; \$274.2 billion in fiscal 1983. That's about \$750 million per day, more than all 50 states combined. The further perspective on this is that it took decades to reach this spending level with ever-increasing steep deficits and a constant spiral of inflation. I believe our citizens now realize that government cannot go on living beyond its means. A big reform already started is the Block Grant approach to federally supported programs. Many such grants are under way and more are being proposed in the concerted effort to reduce the scope of the federal government. In HHS we have placed 25 programs into 7 Block Grants. The states had options about taking on these Block Grants, and I'm glad to say all five states in my southwest region decided to "take up the federal offer" on programs which gives them more local control over how the money is spent. The states, cities and counties should know better how to spend the money because they are closer to the problems of the people who receive the benefits. The 7 Block Grants cover health and social service programs which this year will amount to \$225.3 million in Texas. So a good beginning has been made. Other efforts include stronger roles for the Inspector General to control waste and fraud in HHS programs. For example, one project involves HHS and the departments of Agriculture, Labor and Housing and Urban Development working with state welfare agencies. These departments and agencies match wage reports and the incomes reported by beneficiaries to weed out those not eligible for benefits. HHS will continue to take reform initiatives in all areas of its responsibility-cutting down on regulations where possible, promoting new ways to reduce spiraling health costs, involving private companies and individuals in volunteer efforts to deliver efficient services to the needy in their local communities, and restoring financial stability to the Social Security System. I want to make an important point about Social Security in view of the fears some recipients have about losing benefits: No one on Social Security is losing any benefits, nor will anyone. The discussion in this administration has centered around restoring financial soundness to Social Security so those not yet retired can count on it. A bipartisan task force has been named to recommend long-term reforms to put the system on sound footing. Meanwhile, to address the shorter-term financing problems, the President recently signed legislation authorizing interfund borrowing to transfer funds temporarily from the Disability and Hospital Insurance Trust Funds to the basic Old Age and Survivors Trust Fund to meet current needs. This means that everyone on Social Security will continue to receive their entitlement.



He has called upon the United Nations, which started and then abruptly terminated an investigation of the reported atrocities, to conduct a full and rigorous inquiry. In the meantime, however, time doesn't wait for the unfortunate victims.

Chemical warfare, of course, is universally condemned, outlawed by both the 1925 Geneva Protocol - to which the Soviets are signatories - and the 1972 Biological Warfare Convention - which the Soviets also signed. This apparently hasn't stopped them.

In 1979, an explosion took place at a top secret Soviet defense laboratory near the city of Sverdlovsk, releasing a cloud of poisonous anthrax spores which killed a reported 1,000 civilians, according to Western intelligence sources. The Soviets blamed the deaths on bad meat.

Phillips says the new poison, which is referred to as "Yellow Rain" by fleeing refugees, appears to be a mycotoxin derived from grain fungus.

Says Phillips: "... the cold-blooded poisoning of thousands of defenseless civilian noncombatants is a telling indictment of the values, methods and morality of the Soviet leadership itself. The Soviets have crossed a line that even Adolph Hitler, in the darkest days of World War II, refused to cross.

"The ongoing use of chemical weapons against helpless villages in remote Asian regions is an unjustifiable act that should trigger international outrage on legal and humanitarian grounds. Should these weapons continue to be used without such vociferous international protest they will become enshrouded with a de facto legitimacy that will erode civilized barriers to their use. This portends appalling consequences for all mankind."



law. According to postal regulations, mail service should be continued if the blockage is only temporary, but if it is continual, mail service may be interrupted. If cars park there only occasionally, about the only thing you can do is put a note on the windshield.

Q: Would you please explain once and for all just what a lottery is and why it is illegal in Texas?

A: For an event to be classified a lottery, it must include three elements: (1) an award of a prize; (2) distribution of the prize by chance; and (3) payment either directly or indirectly by the participants for the right or privilege of participating.

Any game in that form is a lottery, and the promoter, whether a person, a business, or a charity, may be charged under our criminal code for a violation of the

Q: While I was driving on an interstate highway, a deer dashed in front of me. I couldn't avoid hitting it. After I stopped and determined the animal was dead, I moved it to the side of the road and left it. Was that the proper thing to do, or should I have notified someone?

A: The game warden of the county where you hit the deer is to be notified immediately. It is his responsibility to retrieve the dead animal. Incidentally, no animal killed in this way can be kept by the traveller or any passerby. O: I am a newly arrived resi-

dent of Texas. I would like someone to explain the term "Community property" to me.

A: Community property is all that belongs to either or both spouses during a marriage except that which is clearly separate. The Constitution limits the definition of separate to that which is owned before marriage or received during marriage by gift or inheritance. Income from separate property is community in Texas. The appreciation or growth of separate property, however, remains separate. The distinction becomes particularly important at divorce or upon the death of either spouse when the family's wealth and liabilities must be identified.

O: What are the usual terms for a divorce in Texas when minor children are involved? Does the husband have to pay alimony and child support? What about debts? Also, is a "no-fault" divorce possible since we have children and property?

A: All property and all debts accumulated during marriage must be divided at divorce. The court generally begins with a 50-50 split and adjusts for factors such as disparity in income.





Schlachter to drill wildcat

David A. Schlachter, Midland, will drill the No. 1 Cox, a 9,800-foot wildcat in Crockett County, 1 5/8 miles southeast of a long extension to the Cox, North (Strawn detrital gas) field, 2 3/8 miles southeast of dual Devonian and Ellenburger production in the Perner Ranch field and 18 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 497 feet from the north and 467 feet from the west lines of 39-ST-TCRR. Ground elevation is 2,275 feet.

Location is scheduled to be abandoned for Tejas Resources Inc., Midland, No. 1 Cox, scheduled 9,800-foot wildcat. 784 feet from the north and 1.143 feet from the west lines of the same section.

The Cox, North field produces at an average depth of 8,470 feet; the Ellenburger opener of the Perner Ranch field, which also produces from the Simpson and Canyon, produces from the Ellenburger at 9,395 feet and Devonian, 8,628 feet.



Working couples to get tax relief in '82

Beginning in 1982, new to those individuals who provisions in the federal tax were not active participants law will bring some tax relief to many two-earner families. Working couples generally pay higher taxes on their joint income than they would pay if they were single. This is called the "marriage tax penalty.'

Under the new law, working couples filing jointly may be able to deduct up to \$1,500 in 1982 and \$3,000 in 1983. They will not have to itemize deductions on Schedule A of Form 1040 to claim this deduction.

The new tax law will allow working couples filing a joint return to deduct from gross income either five percent of the earned income of the spouse with the lower qualified earned income, or \$1,500, whichever is less, in 1982. In 1983 and thereafter, the deduction increases to 10 percent, but cannot exceed \$3,000.

Also increased in 1982 is the Child and Dependent Care Credit. A taxpayer with an income of \$10,000 or less and one qualifying child or dependent will get a maxi-mum credit of \$720, while those who make more than \$28,000 get a \$480 maximum credit. For two or more qualifying individuals, the maximum credit will range from \$1,440 to \$960. Under prior law the maximum credit was \$400 for one qualifying dependent and \$800 for two or more.



SCHOLARSHIP **AVAILABLE AT ASU**

Students pursuing a major in journalism at Angelo State University may begin applying for the Millard Cope Memorial Scholarship, according to Dr. Harry Youngren, head of the ASU journalism department. The scholarships are awarded to students who have a bona fide_intention of making newspaper work their life's vocation.

Application deadline is March 31, and forms may be obtained by writing to the office of Financial Aids, Angelo State University, San Angelo, Texas 76909.

The scholarship is awarded each year to a freshman journalism student entering ASU: A freshman recipient is eligible to apply for renewal each year providing the student maintains good academic standing and makes significant contributions to the ASU journalism program.

Last spring seven \$500 scholarships were awarded to entering freshmen and sophomore, junior and senior students who were renewing their awards.

Financed through the proceeds of a \$25,000 trust fund, the scholarships were established by the late Houston and Isabel Harte as a memorial to Millard Cope, publisher of the San Angelo Standard-Times at the time of his death in January 1964. The late Mr. Harte also was publisher of the Standard-Times and co-founder of the Harte-Hanks newspaper chain.


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



northwest of Ozona. Originally drilled to 9,300 feet and plugged back to 8,878 feet, it was finaled July 28, 1981 to pump 12 barrels of oil, plus five barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 4,167-1, through perforations at 8,379-92 feet. Location is 467 feet from the north and 1,923 feet from the west lines of 3-2-GC&SF. Strawn production in the Econtrado field is at 8,419-47 feet; upper Strawn production in the Escondido



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
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
