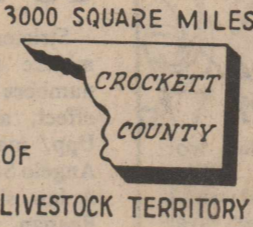

The main problem seems to be finding underprivileged children to donate tickets in order that they might see the show. Hardly any family will use the ten tickets purchased.

Anyway, after checking it out, we feel there is nothing shady about it. We had an opportunity to purchase blocks of tickets and even buy advertising on the program. However, we decided our money would best be spent by donating it to the Boy Scout House Fund at the bank, and that's what we are going to do. The fund was set up shortly after the Scout house was burned, but there had been very few donations when the Lions Club decided to sponsor the show. Perhaps we are at fault for not giving it more publicity, but we only had limited knowledge about it.

We feel sure everyone in town wants to help re-build the Scout house. Those who do, need to stop by the bank and deposit their donation. The fire extensively damaged the facility, so it will take several thousand dollars to make the repairs.

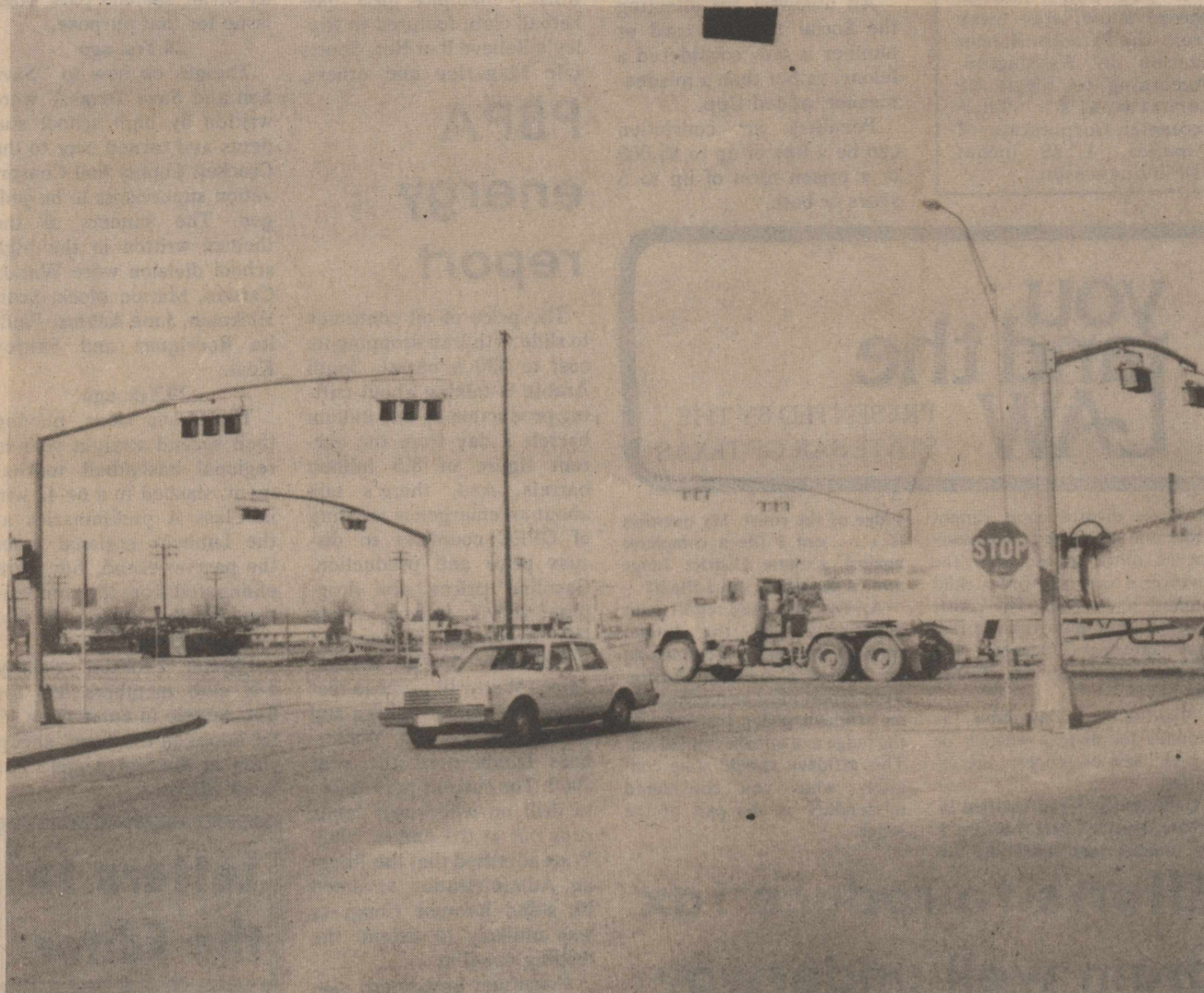
Also, when the various clubs make up budgets this year, members need to consider this project as worthy.

Lion tracksters take relay championship

The Ozona Lions, in their first outing of the young track season, set four records last weekend at the Comanche Relays in Fort Stockton and successfully defended their 1981 title. The Lions out-distanced their nearest opponent, Rankin, with 164½ points to 76. Stanton was third in the division, with Merkel, Van Horn and Reagan County following in that order.

The Lions dominated the running by winning eight of the ten running events. Three Lions had outstanding performances. Richard Garza had two first places and set two records. Larry Payne brought in two first place finishes and anchored the 1600 meter relay to first with a 49.6 lap for a team record. Mark Vallejo got two first places, a second and set a record in the 330 meter high hurdles.

Coach Sewell was impressed by the fact that on Friday every Lion on the team qualified for the finals Saturday, a feat that is rare.

Ozona will be in Junction next Saturday, and will face a difficult task in defending

their 1981 victory in that meet. Besides a very tough meet, eight of the Lions will be absent due to other school functions. The State VICA contest for the auto mechanics students, and the Houston Stock Show will take priority this week.

The team will run at full strength in the Eldorado meet March 13. Most basketball players who did not compete at Fort Stockton, and are in other contests this week, will be in the Eldorado meet.

Dr. Carlisle returns to practice here

Dr. Don Carlisle returned to his office Monday and resumed regular office hours after recuperating from some repair work done in a San Angelo hospital.

Dr. Carlisle is fully recovered after being out of his practice for 51 days. He had repair surgery on a hip which had hampered his ability to get around. The successful surgery has greatly improved his mobility.

Area weather marked by inconsistency daily

The only thing consistent about West Texas weather is it's consistently inconsistent. After a high of 89 degrees here last Wednesday, the temperature plunged during the day Thursday and residents woke up shivering Friday. One benefit was rainfall Thursday and during the night which amounted to .67 of an inch of moisture.

During the heaviest rain Thursday afternoon, light hail or sleet fell. Since the temperature at the time was 45 degrees, most called it small hail.

The temperature at mid-afternoon Tuesday was 84 degrees with a slight overcast. More wet, cold weather was forecast, but March came in like a lamb and the first day of the month was marked with most pleasant

weather.

The official rainfall total for 1981 was 26.37 inches, far above normal for this area. A bitter cold January only managed .43 of an inch of moisture, mostly in the form of freezing drizzle, sleet or light snow. February came to an end with a respectable 1.33 inches of moisture for Ozona proper, with up to two inches reported on rangelands to the south of Ozona.

Bad weather is forecast for this area in March, but has yet to manifest itself. However, it is early in the month and a late Easter makes the forecast likely.

Most of the 1981 rainfall came before the months of November and December. The end of October 26.27 inches of rainfall had been recorded and only .10 of an

inch fell in November with zero recorded in December, which began and ended with beautiful weather.

Winter descended in force in January, and the entire month had below average temperatures. February fared little better but the cold let up in the latter part of the month.

Last week's rainfall, which was the first real rain for the year, caught many by surprise. Water poured through the ceiling of the bank where workmen are constructing another story. Water was still seeping down the granite walls and buckets were placed in strategic places even Friday.

A glaze of ice during the early hours Friday also posed a hazard, but soon vanished with sunup.

History society in annual meet

The Crockett County Historical Society held its annual meeting in the Civic Center Monday evening, March 1, with thirty-five members and guests present. Ted M. White, president, presided.

Mrs. Violene Stanton, museum hostess, reported a total of 1472 museum visitors in 1981, 35 from foreign countries, 324 from out-of-state, 557 from Texas and 556 from Ozona.

Mrs. P. L. Childress, museum director, reported 70 separate collections had been given to the museum in 1981. She also reported on the Texas Association of Museums meeting held in Am-

arillo last week. She stressed again the need for a modern museum for the citizens of Crockett County.

Mrs. Fred Hagelstein, chairman of the nominating committee, presented the following slate of officers and directors for 1982, John Stokes, president; Mrs. Jeffery Sutton, vice-president; Mrs. R. A. Harrell, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. P. L. Childress, Mrs. W. E. Friend, Judge Johnny Jones, W. R. Baggett, Jr., Mrs. Joe Clayton, Mr. and Mrs. W. D.

Cooper, Nat Read and Ted M. White, directors.

All were elected by acclamation.

The group gave a standing vote of thanks to Ted M. White for his service as president of the society.

Following the business session, Mr. Alvin Davis, representing the Texas Heritage Ranching Center at Texas Tech University, Lubbock, presented a most interesting film on the History of Ranching in Texas. Mrs. Davis was also a guest.

Local pair victim of freak accident

Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Kunkel were the victims of a freak accident two miles north of town about 4 o'clock Friday morning when they were on their way to San Angelo for Mrs. Kunkel's dialysis treatment at a San Angelo hospital.

Herbert was driving and stopped the car to check on the tires. As he got out of the car his feet slipped on the unexpected glaze of ice. Seeing his feet pass the window, Mrs. Kunkel jumped out on her side of the car, was hit and knocked down by the door and the car ran over her

leg and arm, coming to rest in a ditch.

Both managed to get back in the car and get it back on the road. Badly shaken, Mrs. Kunkel called for help on the citizen's band radio and an oil company employee came to their rescue and followed them on into San Angelo. The Kunkels do not know the name of their benefactor.

Mrs. Kunkel, who must have dialysis three days a week, is in St. Johns Hospital, Room 235, in San Angelo, in fairly poor condition. She suffered no broken bones, but physicians have been unable to repair the arm where the flesh was torn from it by the car, and her foot and leg are terribly swollen. A visitor reported to the Stockman today that Ardena was alright from the neck up, but black and blue everywhere else. Doctors have not indicated when she might be able to leave the hospital.

National Nutrition Month

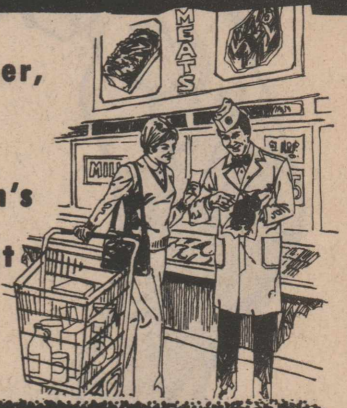
