

Funeral services for Mendoza are pending at Sizemore Funeral Home. He was born May 6, 1963 in Alpine.



Commissioners Court in lengthy meeting

missioners Court met in regular meeting Monday, and gave their all-out support to a group of Hospital Board members, who appeared before the court to ask for help in bringing another physician to Ozona to practice.

Board members meeting with the court were Beth Boyd, Charles Huffman, and Dan Pullen. Hospital administrator Glen Rumley was spokesman for the group. Rumley told the court that both Ozona physicians, hospital board members and the administrative staff, had planned an intensive recruitment effort to secure another physician.

Judge Johnny Jones, speaking for the court, gave the group the unqualified support of the court in their

County Agent Billy Reagor came to give his report and received plaudits from the court on his 4-H livestock group's recent success at the Houston Livestock Show.

Garland Young gave the youth center report. He asked to bring silverware and china up to an inventory of 300 in each category. He also reported the Civic Center board agreed, in their last meeting, to award Young a \$100 per month vehicle allowance.

Court revokes probations

District Attorney Bill Mason told the Stockman today that numerous criminal hearings have been held within the last two weeks here in Danny Rivera of Ozona

was sentenced to five years in the Texas Department of Corrections for a 1977 burglary committed here in Ozona. Mr. Rivera's probation for that burglary was revoked on a motion by the District Attorney's office. Hector Ethridge, also of

Ozona, was sentenced to a period of three years for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon May 23, 1979 and his probation was also revoked on a motion from the District Attorney's office. Both Rivera and Etheridge will serve the full length of their original sentence confined in the TDC at Hunts-

WHEN VOTING RIGHTS **BECOME VOTING WRONGS**

Growing up in the Midwest, my exposure to the Old South was somewhat limited. It wasn't until I moved to Washington in 1965 that I learned firsthand about some of Dixie's peculiarities.

That was an historic year in its own right, the year the Voting Rights Act of 1965 became law.

Known as one of the major pieces of civil rights legislation, the act prohibits the use of literacy tests and poll taxes — considered barriers to full black participation in the voting process — and guarantees the 'one man-one vote' principle that modern legal scholars say was intended by the framers of the Constitution.

Since its enactment, minority (read that "black") voter security remains the exclusive gistration has indeed increased substantially; the legislation has been effective in that respect. (Never mind that minority voting, as a percentage of those registered, has decreased. That's another issue for another day.)

Unfortunately, this same law, intended to be the epitome of fairness, contains a "temporary" provision which is both unfair and threatens to become permanent. Because it is now scheduled to expire in August, the controversial provision has stirred much passion in Congress.

Under the so-called preclearance provision, nine states (eight from the South), and parts of 14 others, must submit any changes in their electoral process to the federal government for approval.

Upon first glance, the fact that preclearance is applied to only certain states seems a pretty radical move. Not only does this place troublesome federal burdens on certain states, it also reverses the basic principle of being innocent until proven guilty. It also assumes the South of the 1980s - with a better rate of success for black businesses than the North and a more than ten-fold increase in elected black officials over the past 15 years — is the same South as in 1954, the year of the landmark anti-segregation decision, Brown v. Board of Education.

What kind of burdens, you ask?

In Richmond, Virginia, a 1970 city council election was held up for five years because the Justice Department objected to an at-large election following the 1969 annexation of part of nearby Chesterfield County. Justice felt it would dilute minority representation and ordered the city to go to a ward system. Yet, at the same time, Justice did not object to Richmond's at-large election for the Virginia General Assembly.

According to the June 23, 1981, Congressional Record, the city of Suffolk, Virginia, also ran afoul of the feds when it asked to move a polling place a quarter of a mile to save costs. After Justice objected to the simple change, local officials had to travel to Washington to plead their case and finally win approval.

As of August 1981, only 2.3 percent of the 34,000-plus proposed voting changes had been blocked by the Justice Department in the 16 years since the Voting Rights Act became law

As it stands now, the preclearance provision of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 breeds inconsistency, wasted taxpayer dollars, and the all-too-often unnecessary government interference in strictly local matters. That it deserves close scrutiny by Congress during a time of fiscal responsibility is only fitting.

U.S. health care costs rose 12.5 percent last year, the largest yearly increase since 1935. While a variety of recommendations have been made to ease the problem on a national scale, many individuals want to know what they can do.

To help, the American Medical Association has listed some ways families can stretch their health care dollars. -- Have a family doctor who will keep a permanent record of your medical history. That will

time-consuming tests. -- Don't wait until you are seriously ill to see the doctor. This defeats the

purpose of preventive medicine and is more expensive in the long run. -- Consider regular checkups, particularly if you are past 41. Early

detection obviously offers a better chance to control -- Go to the doctor's office. Those rare house calls are far more expensive and less efficient than office visits. Avoid using hospital emergency rooms for problems that can be treated just as efficiently and more

economically in a doctor's office. -- Use the telephone. A family doctor who has examined you regularly is familiar with your health history. He often can advise you over the telephone about minor

health problems. -- Follow your doctor's orders. To not heed the expert advice you paid for is a waste of money.

-- Buy health insurance. It is a bargain considering the shattering effects that a prolonged illness can have on your family's financial situation.

-- Check your eligibility for Medicare. For persons past age 65, the Medicare program provides protection against the cost of illness. If you are approaching 65, check with your local Social Security Administration office for assistance in enrolling in the program.

Here are some other suggestions: When nonemergency surgery is recommended, seek a second opinion; you may avoid a costly, unnecessary operation. Request out-patient care (doctor's office) surgery for minor surgical procedures. Finally, review all doctor and hospital charges to ensure that you received the services indicated on your bill.

A: Ask your lawyer to give you an estimate of the number of hours she expects to spend on the case and whatever expenses would be involved. Most lawsuits for damages are handled on a contingent fee basis for two major reasons: most clients prefer to have the option of paying the lawyer nothing if the lawsuit is not successful and many clients do not have the financial resources to initiate a lawsuit. Explore these options fully with your lawyer before making a

Q: My home and other property lie directly in the path of a planned expressway. I am told that I must sell my home and move elsewhere. I've lived here for over twenty years. My parents are buried on the edge of my property. Can I be forced to

A: Under a procedure called "eminent domain", the State has a right to take property and force the occupants to move in order to build an expressway. However, under both the state and federal constitutions they must pay the owner of the land a fair price and moving expenses. If you cannot agree with the State agency on the fair price for your house and land, you may hire an attorney to go to court and ask a jury to give you more money.

O: Can I be put in jail because I cannot pay a debt I owe to the finance company?

A: The Texas Constitution protects you from imprisonment because you cannot pay your debts. However, if the finance company sues you, you must comply with Court orders during a lawsuit. The Court can jail you for contempt if you do not comply, regardless of whether the suit is based on a debt. This means you cannot ignore subpoenas and requests for depositions, and you must make a good faith effort to answer all questions approved by the Court.

O: I own a mobile home. Is it against the law for me to pull off to the side of the road at night or must I pay to rent space at a trailer park?

A: Texas law prohibits parking a vehicle on the paved portion of any highway. Because many shoulders of highways are paved, parking on the shoulder would probably be illegal.

Use label on tax return

Taxpayers can help speed up the processing of tax returns by using the preaddressed, peel-off labels and by double checking their arithmetic before mailing the returns. As simple as the items appear, they are the cause for thousands of errors every year, the IRS says. The label comes with the

tax package in the mail and lists the taxpayer's name, address, social security number and other bits of information which help the IRS in processing the return quick-

If any of the information on the label is incorrect, the correction can be made directly on the label. Taxpayers should also use the coded envelope included in the tax package. It's pre-addressed and helps the IRS sort returns.

Errors such as checking the wrong filing status, failing to sign the return, math mistakes, and the omission of necessary documents are common mistakes which can delay taxpayers' refunds. The IRS must correct the errors or obtain the documents before processing the

Most errors can be avoided if the return is double checked for accuracy and the label

Change in SS death payment

The Social Security lump

sum death payment has been changed as a result of the August 13, 1981 amendments. The amount payable will always be \$255, but only widows, widowers or children are potentially eligible to receive the payment. The \$255 lump sum is payable to the widow or widower of an insured person if they were living toether at the time of death. If there was no surviving spouse living with the deceased, it can be paid to a widow or widower who could receive monthly social security benefits based on the deceased's work. If there is ne widow or widower who can receive the lump sum, but there are children eligible to receive monthly benefits on the deceased person's account, the lump sum death payment will be

Although the amount of the social security lump sum death payment has not changed from \$255, it cannot be paid for deaths after 8/31/81 unless there is an eligible widow, widower or child to receive it.

Have Boat, Will Travel

Jim Dunnigan, 71, spends his summers boating and fishing around Mackinac in Western Lake Huron. He winters in Naples, Florida and occupies his time there in the same ways.

But Jim Dunnigan is not your typical retiree-with-aboat Nossir!

Recently Dunnigan completed a rugged 3,000-mile trip by outboard boat from his summer place in Mackinac to his home in

Why?

Dunnigan purchased the boat from Ken Godley, a marine dealer in Indian River, Michigan. He was anxious to get his new boat to Florida. So, with Godley as first mate, he ran it over to the East Coast and all the way down the Intracoastal

Jim Dunnigan's boat is no ordinary boat. It's a 25foot Boston Whaler, a Frontier model with an enclosed pilothouse, and it's powered by two Evinrude 150-horsepower outboards. It has so much electronic gear onboard the customs officers at one Canadian crossing thought Dunnigan was engaged in espionage.

He's got Loran satellite navigational gear, "auto-pilot", radar (and radar reflector), two sonar depth recorders, VHF-FM marine radio, radio direction finder, citizens band radio, and (of course) AM-FM tape deck.

One item on his boat that Dunnigan said he appreciated the most was a new oil injection system for his twocycle Evinrudes. Dunnigan doesn't bother mixing oil with the gas anymore, the OMC Economixer™ takes care of that. It even varies the rate of oil flow depending on the speed of the engine.

"It saved a lot of money, and a lot of trouble," said Dunnigan.

The former Michigan businessman cruised at 25 miles per hour on the trip but his 7,000-lb boat, with the two powerful V-6s, is capable of

almost 55 miles per hour. Dunnigan's route took

him eastward from Mackinac island across Lake Huron and Georgian Bay to Port Severn. There they maneuvered through the Trent-Severn Waterway across Ontario into Lake Ontario. They motored easterly down the St. Lawrence River, past Montreal, then picked up the Richelieu River south to Lake Champlain. From Lake Champlain they entered the Hudson River, which they took to the Atlantic Ocean. The Intracoastal Waterway was their home as far as Stuart, Florida where they cut across Florida on the Okeechobee Waterway to Naples.

"The boat was quite a head-turner all the way down." 'There's nothing beautiful about it but it does have character.

Now that he's "home", Dunnigan has already started plotting his next trip. "I'm toying with the idea of taking it up the Mississippi. That would be quite a trip, too."



Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Again when the strong and unwelcome March winds hit us full blast, they discourage gardening, but let a beautiful calm day arrive and the windy days are forgotten.

Soon the flowering fruit trees, shrubs, and redbuds will be ready to put on their spring show, so we are hoping no freeze will prevent that this year.

After dust storms, if you will wash shrub foliage with a strong spray of water, you may prevent the appearance red spider and other insects. Avoid insect spray as long as possible.

Continue to water shrubs, trees and grass if the dry weather continues, especially if a freeze is forecast. Most established lawns get their initial spring mowing this month. Cut the grass as short as possible and rake up the clippings. Also, rake out any dead grass killed over the winter. This will allow easier movement of air, fertilizer, and water into the root zone. After mowing, apply a complete fertilizer such as 8-8-8 at the rate of 25 pounds per 1000 square feet of lawn area. In addition make an application of iron sulfate (copperas) or chelated iron if grass looks yellow. Keep grass well watered if

no rain comes our way. Wisterias will be starting to bloom soon and are one of the early favorites. This graceful vine has only a few cultural requirements if you are planting new one's. They need sunny or partially shaded location, a very light feeding each spring with a complete fertilizer. Since Wisteria needs strong support, it does best trained on an arbor where it can spread out without endangering other plants. Or you might have an old tree trunk to

With spring's arrival, houseplants should be ready fertilizer that contains iron and manganuse (check the label) and apply at the rate recommended on the con-



PBPA energy report

President Reagan has decided not to propose the decontrolling of natural gas prices during this politically volatile election year. After much discussion with allies and opposition from opponents the President announced Tuesday that his longawaited decontrol bill would not be the best thing to do right now, citing a number of other bills that should be considered first. Higher gas prices and a windfall tax were other reasons, according to industry sources.

The world oil glut continues to drive down prices. Saudi Arabia says it will not reduce it's production to 7.5 million barrels a day from the current 8.5 million. Analysts say the Saudis won't cut production because other countries might step in to fill the void and lose part of their market share. Some people think the Saudis would cut production in exchange for a lowering of the \$34 benchmark price. A special emergency OPEC meeting may be called in mid-March.

Liberals politicians and environmentalists have jumped on Interior Secretary James Watt's plan to ban drilling and mining on 80 million Federal Wilderson Area acres, but allow drilling on 40 million acres that are proposed as wilderness area. Watt says his department should have sole control over the 40 million acres.






