## Mason warns of LSD threat

District Attorney Bill Mason this week asked the Stockman to warn parents of a potential danger in tattoo transfers. He said to his knowledge the dangerous paper tabs had not shown up in Ozona, but he felt the public should be aware of the possibility.

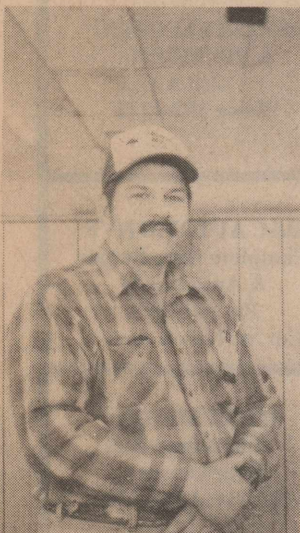
According to police authorities, a form of tattoo transfer called "Blue Star" is readily available in some areas of the United States. This is a small sheet of white paper containing blue stars; the size of a pencil eraser. Each "star" is impregnated with L.S.D. and can be removed from the paper to be placed in the mouth. Absorption can also occur through the skin by simply handling the paper or tattoo.

There are also brightly colored paper tabs resembling postage stamps in size which have pictures of Superman, Mickey Mouse, (dressed as a sorcerer's apprentice), Dopey, and possibly other Disney characters. These stamps are packed in a red cardboard box with a picture of Mickey Mouse. They are wrapped in foil in a clear, lock-type bag. They have most often been found in five, one-inch square sheets of stamps.

These are new ways of selling ACID-A young child could happen to come upon these and have a fatal "trip." It is also feared that little children could be given a free "tattoo" by older children who want to have some fun. It is important that all parents be alerted in case their child is involved, even innocently.

officials are in the process of enforcing the Texas Litter Abatement Act which calls for fines of up to \$400 for persons dumping trash in the draw. The law became effective January 1, 1982.

## New law gives counties authority to clean up

Crockett County officials have started an intensive campaign to clean up the county, and an act passed during the last legislative session, gives them the clout to do so. The Texas Litter Abatement Act was effective January 1, 1982, and gives counties the authority to regulate and control litter of every kind on county owned land and right-of-way and even allows the sheriff or constable to control abandoned vehicles on public and private land.

One of the big problems in Crockett County is people dumping refuse in Johnson Draw as well as on and near county roads. Another big problem is abandoned vehicles on Ozona streets.

Individuals or companies who dispose of trash, junk, garbage, refuse, unsightly matter or solid waste on a public highway, right-of-way or other public or private property, are committing an offense which provides for a fine.

Section 2.04 of the act defines every manner of waste, and states "A person who commits an offense under this section is, on conviction, subject to a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$400, and each day of the offense is a separate offense. A county or district attorney may bring suit for injunction to prevent or restrain a violation of this section. A person affected is entitled to enjoin the violation."

Local officials feel a few convictions and stiff fines should make people think twice before dumping their garbage where they should not, and feel if people know the consequence, they will not want to take the chance.

Another section of the act gives officials authority to control persons throwing glass bottles, glass, nails, tacks, wire, cans or other substances on a highway, or

public street. The trick will be catching these offenders.

A real "eye-sore" in almost any county in Texas is abandoned motor vehicles, and Ozona seems to have more than its share in every precinct. The new act addresses this problem in no uncertain terms.

County officials are given a wide range of authority in taking care of abandoned and junked vehicles after notifying owners of such vehicles. If junked vehicles are public nuisances, the act provides a way to take care of this problem.

## Missing child found unharmed

A massive search for a seventeen-month-old child Tuesday ended about 2:00 p.m. when the baby girl was found safe and unharmed. Little Elizabeth Hart, daughter of Sally Hart, apparently wandered from her home at 207 Ave. F sometime Tuesday morning. Her mother, who works nights, reported the child missing around 12:15. Officers talked to a neighbor who had seen the child near the residence at 11:00 a.m. but after that there was no accounting of the child. Mrs. Hart said she had gone to bed with the baby about 8 o'clock Tuesday morning and awoke to find her gone.

After officers searched the neighborhood in cars and found no trace of the child, a massive search was initiated and volunteers were called in to search the town on foot. A description of the baby was broadcast over Radio KRCT, and all schools and churches were alerted. Officers ran down all kinds of leads, but no trace was found of the blond baby girl clad in a pink

A junked vehicle which creates a public nuisance, is defined as one that is located in a place where it is visible from a public place or public right-of-way and detrimental to the safety and welfare of the general public, tends to reduce the value of private property, invites vandalism, creates fire hazards, constitutes an attractive nuisance creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors, and produces urban blight. The law further states that a person commits an offense if that person maintains a public nuisance as

determined under this section. The person committing a public nuisance as determined under this section. The person committing the offense is subject to fine not to exceed \$200 and on conviction, the court shall order removal and abatement of the nuisance, following certain procedures.

The act also provides that a person or persons authorized by the county may enter private property for the purposes of examining a vehicle, identification of the vehicle, or removal of a vehicle that constitutes a nuisance. The Commissioners Court in Crockett County may issue the orders necessary to enforce the procedures.

## Lions win four meets in row

The Ozona Lions continued their winning ways Friday at the Sonora Relays and romped to their fourth straight victory while smashing four more records in their endeavor.

They have their eyes on the San Angelo Relays Friday and Saturday, where they will compete against 30 teams from North and West Texas. It will be by far the most severe test the Lions will face this season in non-league contest. Events begin at 2:30 Friday and at noon Saturday.

For the first time this season, the Lions scored in all 15 events and qualified every team member in the finals at the Sonora meet.

The 440 relay team of Felix Flores, Larry Payne, David Badillo and Willie Payne won the top spot and set a new record with a time of 43.7. Richard Garza won the 3200 meter run and set a new record with 10:17.4. Arnold Rios came in third in the event with 10:50.9. Garza also won the 1600 meter run with a time of 4:46.4.

The 1600 relay team also set a new record, winning first with 3:26.4. Team members are Larry Payne, Mark Vallejo, Marcelo Hernandez and Greg Fierro.

The other record was set by Larry Payne in the 400 meter with a time of 49.39. Kelly Buckner came in first in the 110 hurdles with 15.01 and Mark Vallejo was second with 15.02. Vallejo also won the 300 hurdles with 40.3.

Marcelo Hernandez and Gino Tambunga came in first and second in the 800 meter run with times of 2:01.9 and 2:06.1, respectively. Willie Payne got two second places in the 100 meter dash and the 200 meter dash, with times of 11.14 and 23.2. David Badillo was sixth in the 200.

Terry Crawford got a second place in the 1600 meter run with 4:48.1, while Jack Thompson came in fourth. Ernie Borrego and Greg Fierro came in third and fourth in the 300-meter hurdles. Carlos Borrego got a fifth place in the 100 and 200 meter dash events, and Robert Flores placed fifth in the 400.

David Delgado placed sixth in the 400.

The Lions also added some points in the field events. Larry Payne placed second in the long jump with a leap of 20'6", and Harvey Huereca placed second in the discus with a throw of 138'10". Huereca picked up two sixth places in the pole vault and the high jump.

Santiago Lopez came in third in the shot put with 43'11", and David Badillo

placed fourth in the pole vault with 11'6".

Ernie Borrego and David Tijerina got fifth places in the long jump and the shot.

Hernandez tied for sixth in the high jump, and Cat Villarreal placed sixth in both the shot and discus.

The Lions won the meet with 201½ points while Sonora was second with 108½. Junction was third, Coleman fourth, Eldorado, fifth, and Ballinger sixth.

1971, and received his degree in Law from the University of Texas in Austin in 1974.

He practiced Civil Law in Odessa prior to receiving his Brokerage License, then became a member of the New York Stock Exchange and was employed with a Midland brokerage firm, where he resided until the on-set of his illness.

Michael is survived by his parents, Doctor and Mrs. Robert Owensby of Ozona, a brother, Mark Owensby of San Diego, California, a sister, Sue Owensby of Austin. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Pamona, California, and attended the First Baptist Church in Midland.

Seven men are running for the two places being vacated by Joe Bean and Sam Perner, neither of whom filed for another term. The opponents will appear on the ballot in this order: Terry Lee, Gary B. Mitchell, Reid Holmsley, Rudy R. Martinez, Jr., Robert G. Flores, Jim House and Bob Childress.

All eligible voters will cast ballots at the courthouse April 3. Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.



### GRANDMA'S CORNMEAL COOKIES

- 3/4 C. butter
- 3/4 C. sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 1/2 C. unbleached white or pastry flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 C. stoneground cornmeal
- 1/2 C. raisins
- 3/4 C. chopped pecans

Mix butter and sugar in a large bowl. Add rest of ingredients; mix well. Drop by teaspoonsful on a greased cookie pan. Bake at 350 degrees F. for about 12 minutes. Makes about 3 dozen.

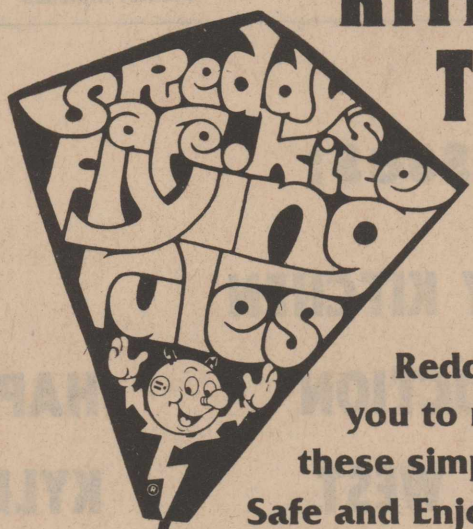

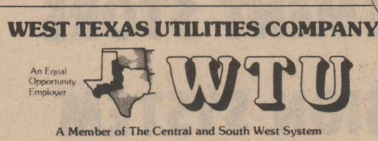

## Wildcat scheduled, producer finalized

A wildcat was scheduled and three extenders and another producer were finalized in Crockett County.

J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, will drill the No. 1 University 29-34, a 9,500-foot wildcat, 5/8-mile southwest of the University 29 (Strawn detrital gas) field, 1 5/8 miles northwest of Canyon gas production in the Ozona multipay field and 21 miles west of Ozona.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and 1,200 feet from the west lines of 34-29-University Lands.

The University 29 field produces from 8,208 feet.

Pennsylvanian gas production was extended one mile north in the Howards Creek (Pennsylvanian and Canyon gas) field with completion of Sabine Production Co., Midland, No. 1 University "32-14", 12 miles west and slightly south of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2,500,000 cubic feet of gas daily.

Production was through perforations at 8,644-918 feet, which had been acidized with 9,000 gallons.

Location is 1,368 feet from the north and 810 feet from the west lines of 14-32-University Lands.

The Adams-Baggett Ranch (Canyon sand gas) field gained two extenders with completion of two projects, 22 miles south of Ozona, by Blue Ridge Oil & Gas Exploration Inc., Detroit, Mich.

The No. 1 Ward A, 5/8 mile north and slightly west, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,400,000 cubic feet of gas daily, through perforations at 5,553-628 feet, which had been fractured with 120,000 gallons and 312,000 pounds of sand.

Location is 467 feet from the south and 3,368 feet from the east lines of 22-TG-

GC&SF.

The No. 3 Ward A, 5/8 mile west, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 810,000 cubic feet of gas daily, through perforations at 5,512-66 feet, which had been fractured with 110,000 gallons and 225,000 pounds of sand.

Location is 1,580 feet from the south and 675 feet from the west lines of 23-TG-GC&SF.

J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, completed as a Strawn detrital producer in the University 31 (Strawn detrital and Queen gas) field its No. 1 University 31-15, 13 miles west of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2,550,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 234.812-1. Gravity of the condensate was 49.6 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 8,441-603 feet, which had been acidized with 7,500 gallons.

Drilled as a wildcat to 8,774 feet, 4 1/4 inch casing was set at 8,746 feet. Plugged back depth is 8,765 feet.

## Locations and wells set for Crockett Co.

J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, will drill one deep and two shallow wildcats in Crockett County.

The No. 1 University 33-8, a 9,500-foot wildcat, is 5/8-mile east and slightly north of the Strawn gas opener and lone producer from that pay in the Perner Ranch field, 3/4-mile southwest of Pennsylvanian gas production in the Howards Creek multipay field and 18 1/2 miles west-southwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and east lines of 8-33-University Lands.

The Strawn opener, Harrison Interests Ltd. No. 26 University Lands 8-33, drilled to 9,230 feet, was finalized Dec. 24, 1981 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.1 million cubic feet of gas daily, through perforations at 8,433-523 feet. It topped the Siluro-Devonian at 8,635 feet and Simpson, 8,980 feet.

He will drill two 2,000-foot wildcats, 17 1/2 miles west of Ozona.

The No. 2 University 30-22E, one location southwest of Canyon gas production in the Ozona multipay field and two miles southwest of the Howard Draw (Shallow oil and gas and Grayburg-San Andres gas) field, is 2,009 feet from the north and 467 feet from the west lines of 22-30-University Lands.

The No. 1 University 30-23 one location east-southeast of an abandoned location, one mile west-southwest of the Howard Draw field, is 560 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 23-30-University Lands.

Shallow production in the Howard Draw field is at 1,286 feet and Grayburg-San Andres, at 1,165 feet.

The abandoned location, Thompson's No. 1 University 23-30-University is 660 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the west lines of the same section.

Suburban Propane Exploration Co. Inc., San Antonio, will drill the No. 1 Helen Wilkins "20" as a 1/2-mile east outpost to 7890 Pennsylvanian gas production in the Davidson Ranch multipay field and as a five-mile north and slightly east outpost to the opener and lone producer of the Live Oak Draw, North (Strawn gas) field,

eight miles east-southeast of Ozona.

Location is 1,500 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of 20-LJ-GC & SF. Contract depth is 9,200 feet.

The Live Oak Draw, North opener, Harrison Interests Ltd. No. 6 Joe Wiley McMullan "A", was finalized Sept. 30, 1981 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2,100,000 cubic feet of gas daily, through perforations at 9,064-92 1/2 feet.

Vinson Exploration, Midland, has completed two extensions to Queen production in the Ingham multipay gas field of Crockett County, 22 miles west of Ozona.

The No. 1 University 33-B, one mile east extension, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 470,000 cubic feet of gas daily through perforations at 1,358-67 feet which were acidized with 600 gallons and fractured with 30,000 gallons and 50,000 pounds of sand.

Location is 467 feet from the north and 2,173 feet from the east lines of 7-33-University Lands.

The No. 1 University 33-C, 5/8-mile northeast extension was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,200,000 cubic feet of gas daily, through perforations at 1,303-74 feet which were acidized with 100 gallons and fractured with 50,000 gallons.

## Crappie—a favorite with Texas anglers

The crappie is one of the all-time favorites of Texas anglers. Depending on the area of the state, this panfish is also called calico bass, white perch or sac-a-lait. Regardless of the name, the immense popularity of the crappie is widespread among young and old alike. One reason for the well deserved status is the simplicity of equipment needed to catch this fish. More crappie fall victim to the cane pole and minnow than all other angling methods combined, says Billy Higginbotham, fisheries specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Additionally, the schooling tendency of crappie provides the angler with almost non-stop action once a school is located. Perhaps the best explanation for the crappie's large following comes with its eating qualities. Many Texans proclaim that no other fish comes close.

Crappie are members of the sunfish family, and therefore, are first cousins to the largemouth bass and bluegill. Two distinct species of crappie exist and both of these, the black and white, are found in Texas. Their common names, indicating color, are not always a good key to distinguish between the species. For positive identification, Higginbotham suggests counting the hard spines on the dorsal fin. Black crappie have seven or eight dorsal spines, while white crappie have six spines.

The black crappie prefers the clear, slightly acidic waters found in many East Texas lakes. However, the range of this species has been expanded to the west and south. The white crappie originally ranged in the central and western portions of the state, but widespread stocking programs have resulted in large populations in the eastern portions of Texas as well.

Black crappie spawn slightly before white crappie in the spring. When water temperatures warm to about 60 degrees, the black crappie begins spawning activities. White crappie do not

begin spawning until water temperatures reach 65 to 70 degrees. Although natural hybridization between the species has been documented, the difference in peak spawning periods probably serves to reduce the incidence of hybridization.

When the water temperatures warm in the spring, the spawning migration toward shallow water begins. Both species build nests in water from one to eight feet deep, usually in gravel or on hard bottom. If these types of bottoms are not readily available, tree roots and submerged vegetation may serve as spawning sites.

Fry normally hatch in about five days and after the yolk sac is absorbed, fry feed actively on microscopic animals called zooplankton. As growth continues, insects and small fish make up the bulk of the diet. During the summer, fall and winter months, crappie tend to

school in the deeper, more open areas of lakes.

Growth rates of crappie vary due to water conditions and available food, but generally lengths of three to five inches are normal at one year of age and seven to eight inches the second year. The normal life expectancy for crappie is about six years, but individuals eight years old have been reported.

Crappie are most vulnerable to fishing during the spawning season. A feathered jig, tiny spinner or a well-placed minnow hooked lightly through the back are all successful angling methods in the spring. During other times of the year, look for crappie concentrated and suspended over deep water structure. A depth finder can become a real asset in locating crappie under these conditions. Once crappie are located, spinners, jigs and minnows, fished in the day or by lantern at night, are all

proven fishing methods. The current state record for white crappie is four pounds, nine ounces. The category for black crappie is open, with a four pounder or larger needed for entry.

Large female crappie of both species have been known to contain 100,000 eggs or more prior to spawning. Due to the prolific spawning ability of the crappie, stocking into small bodies of water is not recommended. Higginbotham says. In most situations, small ponds do not provide enough food for the abundant young crappie.

## County gets gas discovery

An unidentified gas discovery apparently has been assured in Crockett County with the flowing of gas at the rate of 358,000 cubic feet daily, along with one barrel of oil and four barrels of water, at Southland Royalty Co., Midland, No. 1 University "14", in 14-30-University Lands, ½-mile south a recent upper Canyon oil discovery, 7/8-mile north and slightly west of Canyon gas production in the Ozona multipay field, 2 ¼ miles north of the Howards Creek field, three miles east and slightly north of Strawn detrital gas production in the University 29 field and 20 miles west of Ozona.

The upper Canyon discovery, Southland Royalty's No. 1 University "13", drilled to 7,965 feet, was finished Feb. 11 to pump 30 barrels of 36 gravity oil, plus 14 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 5,167-1, through perforations at 6,611-7,314 feet.

## Ozonan makes honor roll

Dean Dardus J. Elrod announced the names of 52 students who made the Dean's Honor Roll in the fall semester of 1981-82. In order to make the honor roll, a student must be enrolled in at least 15 semester hours and achieve a grade point average of 3.6 or higher. Southwest Texas Junior College uses the four-point system (an A is 4 points).

Among those making the honor roll was Twila G. Burns, Ozona, Texas.

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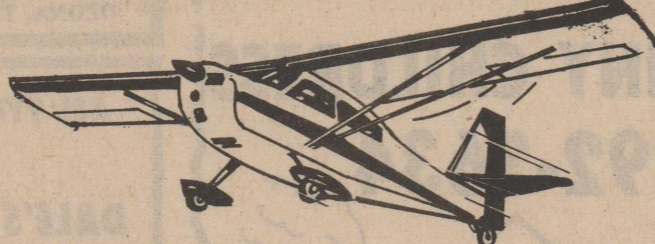
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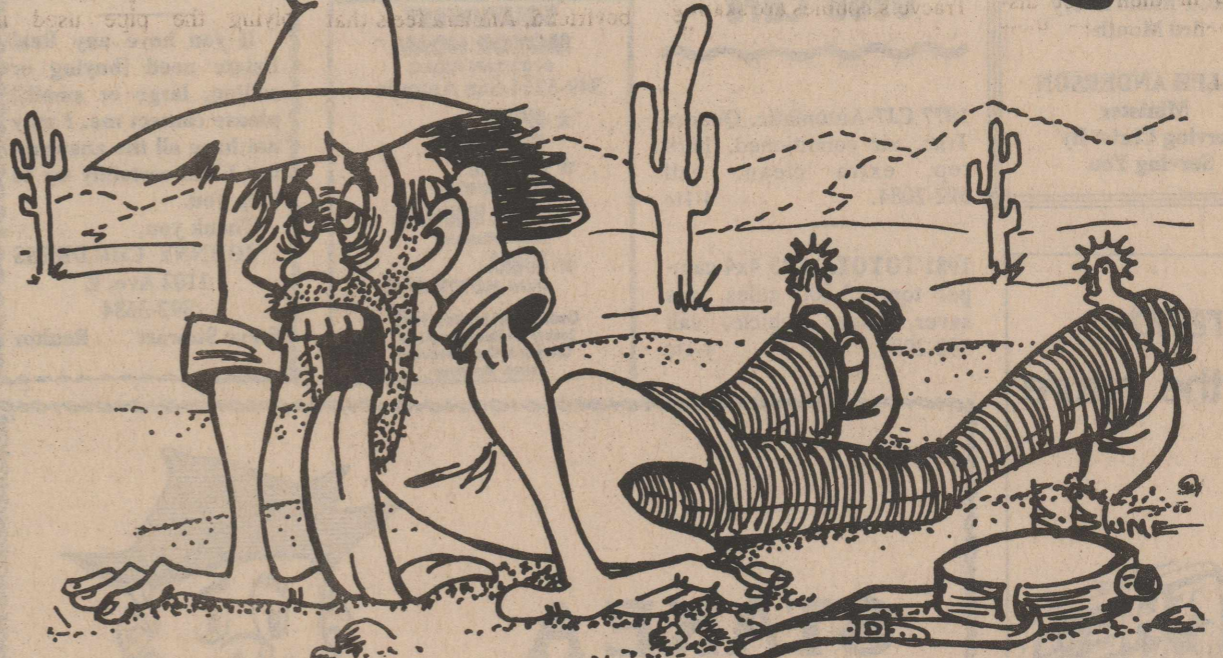


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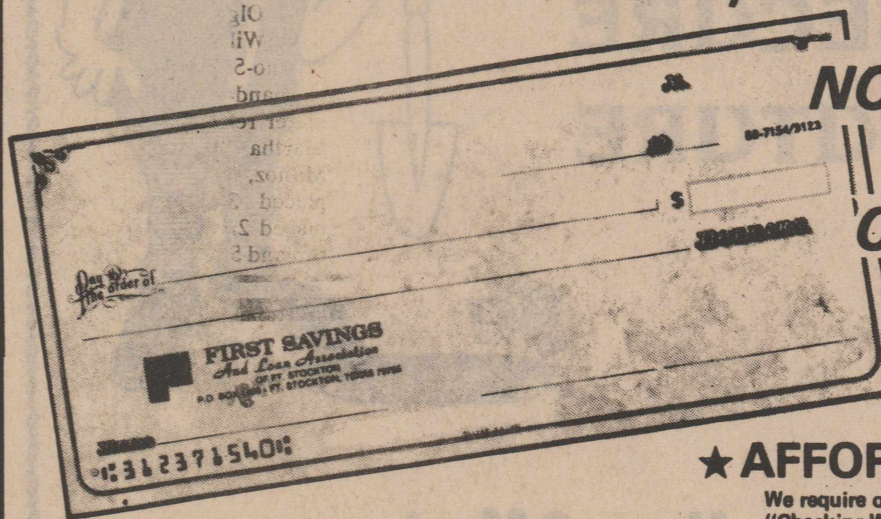
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
