LSD threat

District Attorney Bill Mason this week asked the Stockman to warn parents of a potential danger in tatoo transfers. He said to his knowledge the dangerous paper tabs had not shown up in Ozona, but he felt the public should be aware of the possibility.

According to police authorities, a form of tatoo transfer called "Blue Star" is readily available in some areas of the United States. This is a small sheet of white paper containing blue stars; the size of a pencil eraser. Each "star" is impregnated with L.S.D. and can be removed from the paper to be placed in the mouth. Absorption can also occur through the skin by simply handling the paper or tatoo.

There are also brightly colored paper tabs resembling postage stamps in size which have pictures of Superman, Mickey Mouse, (dressed as a sorcerer's apprentice), Dopey, and possibly other Disney characters. These stamps are packed in a red cardboard box with a picture of Mickey Mouse. They are wrapped in foil in a clear, lock-type bag. They have most often been found in five, one-inch square sheets of stamps.

New law gives counties

Crockett County officials have started an intensive campaign to clean up the county, and an act passed during the last legislative session, gives them the clout to do so. The Texas Litter Abatement Act was effective January 1, 1982, and gives counties the authority to regulate and control litter of every kind on county owned land and right-of-way and even allows the sheriff or

constable to control abandoned vehicles on public and private land.

One of the big problems in Crockett County is people dumping refuse in Johnson Draw as well as on and near county roads. Another big problem is abandoned vehi-

cles on Ozona streets. Individuals or companies who dispose of trash, junk, garbage, refuse, unsightly matter or solid waste on a public highway, right-of-way or other public or private property, are committing an offense which provides for a fine.

Section 2.04 of the act defines every manner of waste, and states "A person who commits an offense under this section is, on conviction, subject to a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$400, and each day of the offense is a separate

offense. A county or district attorney may bring suit for injunction to prevent or restrain a violation of this entitled to enjoin the violation.

Local officials feel a few convictions and stiff fines should make people think twice before dumping their garbage where they should not, and feel if people know the consequence, they will not want to take the chance. p.m. when the baby girl was found safe and unharmed. Little Elizabeth Hart, daughter of Sally Hart, apparently wandered from her home at 207 Ave. F sometime Tuesday morning. Her mother, who works nights, reported the child missing around 12:15. Officers talked to a neighbor who had seen the child near the residence at 11:00 a.m. but after that there was no accounting of the child. Mrs. Hart said she had gone to bed with the baby about 8 o'clock Tuesday morning and awoke to find her gone.

After officers searched the neighborhood in cars and found no trace of the child, a massive search was initiated and volunteers were called in to search the town on foot. A description of the baby was broadcast over Radio KRCT, and all schools and churches were alerted. Officers ran down all kinds of leads, but no trace was found of the blond baby girl clad in a pink

TIME RUNNING OUT FOR TAIWAN?


The man who for so many years was the conscience of conservatism in America, Arizona Senator Barry Goldwater, has upset more than a few of his former admirers in recent months with his unflagging (and at times unflattering) criticism of the so-called Religious Right.

The Arizona Republican, whose 1964 presidential race catapulted the governor of California, Ronald Reagan, into the national spotlight, is now being dismissed by some as an old warlord who has fought one too many fights.

The patronizing doesn't do the gentleman justice. Barry Goldwater is a tough-as-nails political gunslinger who has always spoken his mind. Now is no time for him to stop, even if it means a few faint-of-heart conservatives to feel the sting



America's barge lines are owned by some of the nation's wealthiest corporations including large oil, steel and inter-5 national grain marketing, firms- yet they are supported by American tax-: payers. The taxpayer doesn't even stand to benefit much from these waterway activities. The low barge transportation taxpayer subsidies are 2 passed on to foreign buyers of U.S. grain and



In the long run, no one really stands to benefit from this excessive subsidization of America's waterways. Though waterway transportation rates may be held artificially low, the costs do not decrease nor disappear; they merely are transferred to the taxpayer. Society's total transportation bill esca-

Take the matter of the Reagan administration's decision not to sell advanced fighter aircraft to the Republic of China on Taiwan — aircraft, incidentally, that are no more advanced than those we seem hell-bent on supplying to the oil-rich Arab sheiks in the Persian Gulf, and a lot less sophisticated than the Mig-23 jets the Soviets have supplied to Senor Castro to our south.

Senator Goldwater makes no bones about his respectful disagreement with those at the State Department who, he says, "want no part of Taiwan." Like most of both official and non-official Washington, Senator Goldwater is fully aware that pressure from the Communist Chinese forced the administration to put the kibosh to the Taiwan jet deal.

Beyond that, Senator Goldwater also wonders whether the 1979 Taiwan Relations Act (Public Law 96-8) is worth the paper it's written on. That law states that the United States will make available to Taiwan "such defense articles and defense services in such quantity as may be necessary" to defend the island nation. The rumor mill, in addition to confirming that the administration bowed to pressure from Peking, also has it that the administration has agreed to stop all arms sales after 1985 - which would mean that we are unilaterally abandoning, for the second time in a decade, our treaty commitments to our long time ally.


It could also mean the demise of one of the most democratic nations in that part of the globe.


As Senator Goldwater notes, the future of Taiwan will likely be decided not by the good will of Peking, but by Taiwan's ability to control the skies over the Taiwan Strait and Bashi Channel, which separate Taiwan and the mainland. Currently, the Red Chinese air force outnumbers the Taiwanese by a ratio of more than 11 to one. Moreover, of the nearly 3,600 jet fighters in the Red Chinese arsenal, approximately 3,000 are fairly recent vintage Mig-19s and Mig-21s, while many of Taiwan's fighters are "antiques," like the Korean War era F-100 Super Sabre.

"In order to counter the numerical superiority and growing high-performance capabilities of Red China's air forces, it is imperative that Taiwan be provided with fighters such as the FX," Senator Goldwater says.

'The balance of power across the Taiwan Strait in the mid 1980's is at stake now. We are really talking about the years 1986 to 1990. Unless we allow Taiwan to plan for the long lead time required for the manufacture of a squadron of FX fighters, I fear Taiwan's defense needs will not be met. If President Reagan does not act now to keep faith with his campaign promises, it will be too late.

Wildcat scheduled, producer finaled

A wildcat was scheduled and three extenders and another producer were finaled in Crockett County.

J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas. will drill the No. 1 University 29-34, a 9,500-foot wildcat, 5/8-mile southwest of the University 29 (Strawn detrital gas) field, 1 5/8 miles northwest of Canyon gas production in the Ozona multipay field and 21 miles west of Ozona.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and 1,200 feet from the west lines of 34-29-University Lands.

The University 29 field produces from 8,208 feet. Pennsylvanian gas production was extended one mile north in the Howards Creek (Pennsylvanian and Canyon gas) field with completion of Sabine Production Co., Midland, No. 1 University "32-14", 12 miles west and slightly south of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2,500,000 cubic feet of gas daily.

Production was through perforations at 8,644-918 feet, which had been acidized with 9,000 gallons.







Due to the prolific spawning ability of the crappie, stocking into small bodies of water is not recommended, Higginbotham says. In most situations, small ponds do not provide enough food for the abun-

dant young crappie.



color, are not always a good key to distinguish between the species. For positive identification, Higginbotham suggests counting the hard spines on the dorsal fin. Black crappie have seven or eight dorsal spines, while white crappie have six spines.

The black crappie prefers the clear, slightly acidic waters found in many East Texas lakes. However, the range of this species has been expanded to the west and south. The white crappie originally ranged in the central and western portions of the state, but widespread stocking programs have resulted in large populations in the eastern portions of Texas as well.

Black crappie spawn slightly before white crappie in the spring. When water



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
