Commissioners concerned about health insurance

Although no action was taken on the agenda item, Bailey County Commissioner's Court briefly discussed the possibility of changing from it's current system of partial self insurance to a fully insured health insurance system during Monday's regular meeting.

According to County Judge Sherri Harrison, there have been numerous problems that have arisen during the past year with the county's third party administrator, and while she believes the commissioners court should look at proposals from other administrators, she said Monday that action should probably be postponed until some existing claims are cleared up.

"The insurance has been a nightmare this year," Harrison told the commissioners attendance

At one point a minute later when Chavez continued his address to the council, Elza suggested that Chavez could be held criminally liable if he didn't restrict his presentation to a request for the reimbursement to be reconsidered — effectively chilling Chavez's discussion of the agenda item.


