
The first presidential proclamation of a day of Thanksgiving in the United States was issued by George Washington on November 26, 1789. It was declared as a day set aside for prayers and thanks for the new Federal Constitution. Several states continued the practice, each designating its own day.

Then, on October 3, 1863, Abraham Lincoln became the first chief executive to proclaim an official Thanksgiving Day to be celebrated annually. The celebration was to be held on the last Thursday in November. Lincoln apparently wasn't one for Monday holidays.

Since Lincoln issued that proclamation, the entire nation has joined in prayer on the same day each year in solemn remembrance of the small band of religious fugitives who landed-accidentally-at Plymouth Rock.

Perhaps if the Pilgrims had continued on to the Virginia shores for which they had been targeted they could have prevented the controversy between Massachusetts and the Old Dominion, which claims the honor of having been the site of the 'First' Thanksgiving in the Colonies by virtue of an earlier celebration in 1619 at Berkeley Plantation near Williamsburg.

While the fact of the Virginia celebration is often overlooked, there is another point concerning the early Pilgrim Fathers which is rarely, if ever, mentioned. It is their attempt at, and abandonment of, a system of mutual ownership and communal labor at the Plymouth Plantation. A primary cause for their initial hardships in the New World

was this early effort to survive within a socialist society

At first the young community seemed to be flourishing, but following the Plymouth colony's 'First Thanksgiving' in 1621 the settlement went into a tailspin. Many found that under the socialist system all shared equally whether or not they contributed in fair proportion. So not a few began to excuse themselves from work in the fields and workshops of the community. Naturally, the feigned illness, and the number of absentees increased.

Then, disaster struck. The crops failed, the 'starving time' soon followed, and, because of the lowered production, there was nothing to fall back on in the way of stores. Things were so bad that by 1623, just three years after the landing at Plymouth Rock, the best that the Pilgrims could provide new arrivals from Mother England was a lobster, a freshly caught fish, and a cup of water. Ill fare compared to the bountiful feast of 1621, when they had hosted Chief Massasoit and ninety of his braves.

So in that same year-1623-Governor William Bradford, at the urging of the Governing Council, established what we have come to know and take for granted: a freeenterprise system. And the Plymouth Plantation began to grow and prosper. The freeloaders now had to work for their bounty.

The Pilgrims had learned their lesson the hard way. There were still hardships to overcome, but, from the agony of the 'starving time' came the wealthiest, most-productive civilization the world has known to date.

This byproduct of the early lessons of Plymouth, Jamestown, and all the other lesser-known, but so important, early New World settlements, has been shared with other nations throughout the Free World.

Thanksgiving is truly a Capitalist Holiday. And whether the first one was in Virginia or Massachusetts is really immaterial. The main thing is that we celebrate it as a tribute to the system which has taken us this far, and pray that it continues to serve us as well in future generations, as it has for the last three-plus centuries.

Home Health Care Week is observed

The week of November 28 through December 4 has been designated by Congress as National Home Health Care Week. Under the Medicare program, Home Health Care Agencies provide health related services to patients in their homes. During the past few years Congress, through legislation, has liberalized home health care benefits, making it a practical alternative to long hospital stays. Home Health may even prevent or postpone admission to a nursing home.

It is believed that most older Americans would prefer to receive health care in the comfort of their own homes whenevery feasible. Nurses work under the order of the patient's own physician to provide continuity of care on discharge from the hospital, or simply to reinforce instructions and skilled observation for a condition treated in the doctors office. Ila Fay Dunnam R.N., and Ruth Ann Dickenson, L.V.N. of Hill Country Home Health Agency provide skilled nursing services to homebound patients in the Ozona area. Fay Dunnam has been with the agency for seven years.





Let me remind you of the county pecan show and 4-H food show on November 29, at the Civic Center.

I hope you and your family will have a happy, safe, and jovful Thanksgiving. If you are cooking your own turkey this year, you will be glad to know turkey is an excellent meat buy. Follow the label instructions for roasting your turkey.

Follow your favorite dressing recipe for stuffing the turkey or bake the stuffing on the side. A turkey should be loosely stuffed. Allow 3/4 cup stuffing per pound of turkey.

Unstuffed turkeys require about 1/2 hour less roasting time. If not stuffed, rub salt generously in cavity. A few pieces of celery, carrots, onion, and parsley can be added for extra flavor.

If a roast-meat thermometer is used, insert it into the thick part of the inside thigh muscle or thickest part of the breast muscle. Roast the turkey at 325 degrees following the time chart on the label. A "tent" of foil placed loosely over the bird will eliminate the basting process. Remove the foil the last half hour for the final browning.

The stuffing should be removed from the turkey immediately after cooking and kept in the refrigerator. Leftover dressing should be used within 3 days and always kept in the refrigerator.

Turkey ranks higher in protein than any other cooked meat. Because of its high protein, low fat, and low cholesterol content it is used for many special diets.

The recipes below may be helpful in utilizing your leftover turkey.

Since a cold chimney will not draw as well as a warm one, hold a lighted, rolledup newspaper toward the top and rear of the fireplace to warm the chimney and help prevent smoke from backing up into the room when the

fire is started. Allow ashes to accumulate to at least an inch deep on the hearth since they act as insulation and will help the fire burn more efficiently. Add new logs to the rear of cracks in the floors of even the fire where they will reflect light and heat into the

room. Use screens or glass doors your heating system, says in front of the fire to prevent sparks from falling onto Despite the inefficiency of the carpet or floor. 



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
