
SOCIAL INSECURITY



The Social Security System, though its founders couldn't have foreseen the problem at the time, is a fiscal disaster. It is not fundamentally sound. It is running headlong into future shock.

The system operates on a pay-as-you-go basis, meaning and the trail led to Pope. He the taxes paid by today's wage-earners are used to supply benefits to those who are retired. This was fine in 1950, when there were 16.5 workers paying into the system for every pensioner. It may even have been okay in 1970 when the ratio was 3.6 to 1. But it courts total collapse by early in the next century (less than 20 years away) when the post-World II 'baby boom' generation reaches retirement age and there just won't be enough working people to support the retired population.

Since Congress seems reluctant to deal with Social Security, and the Administration had its high hopes dashed by the do-nothing commission, let me suggest we turn our attention to a plan offered by Peter Germanis, a young Washington economist.

It is based on the pioneering work of Peter J. Ferrara, or Teflon bullets that can who now toils in the White House, and Stanford University pierce armor plate. economist Michael Boskin.

The seven-point plan is premised on a recognition that Social Security, as it is presently constituted, serves a dual purpose: providing both retirement 'insurance' and 'welfare.' "True reform of Social Security cannot begin until people recognize the program for what it really is and separate those two functions," Germanis says.

Benefits for those already on the plan or nearing retirement cannot be cut, he says. "We should acknowledge these liabilities as a total write-off so that car door. we can move on with reforming the system." Hand in hand, the public must be educated about how the system works, the economic and demographic realities confronting the system, and any other factors necessary to make decisions about the system's future.

This is where the plan gets interesting. In a nutshell, the annuity and welfare aspects of the program will be separated. Those payments which qualify as welfare would be funded out of general revenues, like all other welfare programs. The retirement portion of the program would differ markedly from what we have today. It would remain mandatory — in that every wage-earner would be required to contribute a certain amount each year into a retirement plan. But it would also offer the worker a choice: he could spill all or part of his contribution down the Social Security drain, or he could put all or part into some sort of private sector Super-IRA (individual retirement account).

From Social Security, if the truth be known, the young man or woman entering the workforce today could probably expect a one-percent return on his money. In contrast, the Heritage Foundation's pension plan with a major insurance company, for example, is now paying more than 11 percent annually.

Social Security can be saved. It is not hopeless. What is needed is some creative thinking and political courage, neither of which seems in generous supply in Washington these days.



Today many people lead busy lives. Careers and activities in and away from home leave little time for meal preparation. For this reason, people are seeking time-saving methods to cut food preparation time, yet provide the same food quality as traditional techniques. Microwave cooking answers this need. Following are some basic preparation techniques that make life a little easier.

To soften cream cheese for recipe use, remove foil wrap. Microwave in bowl on High 15 seconds per 8-oz. package

To melt shredded or sliced cheese on casseroles, vegetables, or burgers, microwave on High 15 seconds or just until cheese begins to melt. Overcooking will toughen the cheese.

To melt ¹/₂ cup margarine, microwave in custard cup or bowl on High 45 to 60 seconds.

To add color and flavor to meat and poultry, brush with barbecue sauce.

To melt caramels or miniature marshmallows quickly, microwave in a bowl after tossing with the liquid specified in the recipe.

To melt unsweetened chocolate, microwave 1-oz. square in paper wrapper, seam side up, on High 3 to 4 minutes or until melted.

To dissolve softened gelatin, combine 1 envelope unflavored gelatin and ¹/₂ cup water; let stand 1 minute. Microwave on High 45 to 60 seconds, stirring every 15 seconds.

To make dry bread crumbs cut 6 bread slices into 1/2inch cubes. Microwave in 3-quart casserole on High 6 to 7 minutes or until dry, stirring after 3 minutes. Crush in blender.

To scald milk, microwave 1 cup milk on High 2 to $2^{1/2}$ minutes.







Proposed severance tax attacked by TIPRO

Leaders of the Texas In- Louisiana. If you're going to dependent Producers and **Royalty Owners Association** warned Tuesday that proposals to raise Texas oil and gas severance taxes could seriously damage the state's economy.

Harrold E. "Gene" Wright, Gilmer, President of the 5400-member Austinbased trade association, declared that proposed increases in severance taxes "could saddle Texas consumers and oil and gas producers with a burden they and the state can ill afford. Higher taxes will raise consumer energy prices in Texas," Wright declared, "and will prevent producers from drilling the very wells that fuel the economy and fund a large portion of the state's tax base."

Wright was responding to a proposed tax increase advocated by the Texas Federation of Teachers. AFL-CIO. He said that Texas education certainly needs to be adequately financed, but suggested that oil and gas already provides a disproportionate share of tax revenues.

"I hope that other teacher organizations are able to discern the problems with the

compare Texas with other states you have to look at the total tax burden," Hansen said. "On that basis Texans already pay more energy taxes than people in most other states.

Industry representatives say they are particularly sensitive to the severance tax issue at the current time because "the general business and political climate is a

cause for concern." Julian Martin, TIPRO's Executive Vice President, explained. "Our people are not the only citizens worried by declining oil revenues. Difficulties in marketing natural gas, the proposed federal oil tax of \$5 per barrel, and other tax proposals aimed at independents and royalty owners, are also a source of

worry for banks, individual investors, and industrial users of oil and gas." Martin stated further that "adding higher severance taxes to this mix could greatly reduce the capital required for petroleum exploration, leading to serious problems for the entire economy of the State.



Current cattle problems for small grain pastures

Nitrate poisoning, grass magnesium levels. tetany and bloat are three major problems in cattle grazing on small grain pastures this time of the year, says a beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Nitrate poisoning occurs from high levels of nitrate in plants and is mainly a problem with cloudy, overcast conditions, points out Dr. Dennis Herd. Under these conditions, common during the winter season, nitrates accumulate in plants instead of being converted into protein. Nitrate levels are higher in stems of plants than leaves, so nitrate poisoning sium, says Herd. The mineris more of a problem on heavily grazed pastures, notes the specialist.

To protect animals, remove calves from pastures until plants resume normal growth, recommends Herd. Cattle on hay or grain supplements can tolerate higher levels of nitrate than those on pasture only.

The specialist also sugto nitrogen fertilization to avoid producing forage with explains the beef cattle specexcessive nitrogen content. Splitting nitrogen fertilizer applications may be helpful in preventing nitrate poisoning problems on small grain pastures.



Penalties higher for incorrect returns

Farmers, ranchers and others who made payments last year in excess of \$600 for services to individuals (other than employees) and partnerships (but not corporations) must file certain information forms. Failure to do so will result in increased penalties under the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibil-ity aCt (TEFRA) of 1982.

Several different information forms in the 1099 series are used in filing these returns, says Dr. Ashley Lovell of Stephenville, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Interest payments of \$600

or more are reported on Form 1099-INT.

Payments of \$600 or more made for rents, royalties, prizes, awards and other payments that are not for services should be made on

Form 1099-MISC Form 1099-NEC is for reporting payments of \$600 or more for fees, commissions, prizes, awards or any other compensation for services paid to persons who are non-

Taxpayers who were fortunate enough to earn awards or bonuses this year are being reminded by IRS that these amounts should be included as income on their 1982 federal income tax returns

The IRS says rewards and bonuses include prizes such as a paid vacation trip awarded for attaining sales goals. If the prize or award is in the form of goods or services, its fair market value is the amount the taxpayer must include as income. If the employer pays the

bonus or award at a future time, it is not taxable until it is received by the employee, the IRS says.

If an employer distributes holiday remembrances such as turkeys, hams, or other items of nominal worth, the value of these gifts is not taxable

However, if cash, gift certificates or similar items that may be easily exchanged for cash are given, the value of the gifts is taxable.




