When it comes to justice, I am not sure where our nation's priorities lie. I am also concerned about civil rights or human rights. You would think when a person carelessly takes another person's life, he thereby forfeits any rights he might have. How-ever, the U.S. Supreme Court seems to think otherwise. I am speaking of the execution stay for James David Autry.

The death penalty is supposed to be a law to protect society, and it should be society's right to enforce that law, the American Civil Liberties Union notwithstanding.

What really prompts this outburst is an interview granted the killer to the Houston Chronicle, wherein he complained about being prepared to die "an hour before his time." He has had many more chances to live than he gave his victim. At taxpayers' expense he has been tried, given an attorney, used up all his appeals, and fed and clothed since his crime in 1980. We know all about James David Autry, and the fact that he had a bad childhood in no way alters the public's opinion, indeed nor would it have altered the opinion of the jury who tried him.

What do we know about Shirley Drouet, his victim? Only that she was 43 years

Autry is back on death row, thanks to the intervention of Supreme Court Justice Byron White. Shirley Drouet is still dead. There was no Supreme Court Justice to stand between Autry's bullet and her head. There has been no appeal by attornies from the ACLU that her civil rights were violated.

The taking of life is murder, the ultimate theft. For all we don't know about the life of Shirley Drouet, surely her life was worth something. Every life has its worth and anything less than capital punishment for a murderer is an admission by society that life is something less than worthy.

It is not cruel and unusual punishment to execute killers. It is not simply to deter others from committing the same crime, only that no other punishment will suffice. How many other killers have been rehabilitated and turned loose on society only to kill again and again. Take the Lucas case which has been in the news the last few weeks. After serving 16 years for killing his mother, he was released to kill again, and he did. They do not yet know how many, but he has confessed to killing over a hundred women. This is why I favor capital punishment. It is protection for society against murder, and it's just as simple as that.

Those who oppose the death penalty obviously regard the lives of themselves and their loved ones as pieces of property, no more valuable than money or an automobile. It's just sick. The Civil Liberties Union and the Supreme Court have no right to deny society the protection of the death penalty.



RISING RED TIDE ENDANGERS THE WEST

The importance of seapower to Western security can't be over-estimated. A look at not-so-distant history tells us that Nazi Germany nearly won the battle of the Atlanticand with it World War II-for Adolf Hitler. And Hitler entered the war with fewer than 50 submarines.

Some chilling statistics are contained in The Almanac of Seapower, 1983, an authoritative volume recently published by the Navy League. In his introduction to the fact-filled book, editor-in-chief James D. Hessman notes that sinking a 5,000-ton tanker was considered a good day's work by one of Hitler's U-Boat captains. But today's tankers and merchant ships are measured in the hundreds of thousands of tons, he says, and "it would not be overly difficult for one well-positioned submarine-stationed just south of the exit of the Persian Gulf, for example-to sink a million or more tons of shipping a day." In his overview of the naval situation of the two superpowers, Hessman writes: "There are in the Soviet Northern Fleet some 600 ships, in the Baltic Fleet about 550 or so, and in the Pacific Fleet over 750. The 350-plus submarines, over 1,300 surface combatants, and 770 auxiliaries in the U.S.S.R.'s active inventory are backed by almost 1,600 aircraft, including a growing number of supersonic Backfire bombers equipped with anti-ship cruise missiles." And, he points out, the Soviets are busy implementing an ambitious naval construction program aimed at further bolstering their seapower. While these figures include many ships with purely defensive capabilities, the U.S. Fleet, which currently consists of fewer than 600 ships, carriers, and submarines, pales by comparison. Lest anyone attribute the massive Soviet naval buildup to the Kremlin's desire to defend the Soviet heartland, Hessman reveals that Soviet naval vessels spent 57,000 days in 1980 beyond coastal defensive positions. In contrast, U.S. Navy ships spent only 47,000 days on such patrols In the 1930's, notes Hessman, Winston Churchill was a voice crying in the wilderness warning of the growing threat posed by Nazi Germany's arms buildup. In the U.S., President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Senator Carl Vinson were among the few who saw the need for a strong navyand the steps they took in the mid-1930's led to the construction of virtually all the major combat ships available to the U.S. throughout World War II.



Sadly, Hessman declares, "Today there are no Churchills or Vinsons on the horizon.

The picture is not totally bleak, however, says Hessman. "British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, President Reagan and the other leaders of the Free World may not be of Churchillian stature, but they are no Chamberlains either.'

Hessman notes that the U.S./NATO response to the Soviet naval buildup "has not been commensurate to the threat." In constant 1972 dollars, he points out, U.S. defense spending has grown from \$75.4 billion in 1963 to only \$88.8 billion for Fiscal Year 1983, while nondefense spending has mushroomed from \$87.4 billion to \$267.8 billion.

Hessman says that while the Reagan administration's defense buildup is "in truth, much more modest in scope than either its critics or apologists like to admit . . . the trend is in the right direction.

As the budget battles continue to rage here in Washington, I hope some of our senators and congressmen take note of the growing Soviet threat. Otherwise, the rising Red tide of Soviet military might threatens to sink us all.

Tax Hike Forecast

The oil and peso problems, together with the national recession, have created what Bullock calls "a Texas recession-unique to Texas.'

He predicted the Legislature will raise taxes to boost support for the more than half of Texas school systems "which are substandard."

Which taxes will be raised? Bullock said he thinks changing some exemptions in the sales tax, increasing "sin" taxes (alcohol, tobacco) and gasoline taxes will temporarily raise "a considerable sum.

"I don't see any increases in oil and gas taxes because that industry has been hit so poignant and painful emotions hard."

King Ranch Audit

If Texas government finds extra revenues anywhere. some quiet predictions are they will come out of General Land Office efforts.





Tips For Gardeners From The Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

After the most welcome rain in this area, our country side is already greening up, and what a difference it makes in our feelings and with smiles on many faces.

Some of you may want to grow flowering perennial seeds to be planted at this time. Those that do well here that receive full or partial sunlight include candy-tuft, yarrow, foxglove, hollyhock, four o'clocks, canterberry bells and Sweet William.

Start bringing house plants indoors before nighttime temperatures drop below 40 degrees. But before you do, check under the leaves and in leaf junctions for such pests as spider mites, whiteflies and aphids. Control any present by applying malathion according to label directions. Be sure to spray outdoors. Snails can be evacuated by soaking the pots in a tub of water for 10 or 15 minutes. Let the pots drain and dry before bringing the plants indoors.

If you want to preserve foliage for fall arrangements, look to such evergreens as Southern mag-

Prepare a solution of 1 part glycerin and 3 parts water in a glass or ceramic container. Insert the stems to a depth of 4 to 6 inches. Let the branches stay in the solution until the leaves take on a brown leathery appearance. Someone wanted to

know how often their dracaena should be fertilized. Like most large houseplants they need to be fed twice a month during the summer and monthly during the rest of the year. Use a water-soluble houseplant fertilizer, such as 20-20-20 or 18-18-18, applying at the rate recommended on the label. Remember that on the week you fertilize your plant, this will replace the regular watering.

If you have an old oleander that has grown too large and looks rather scraggly and the flowering is over this fall, cut back to desired size. Cut stems at varying heights to encourage a full and graceful appearance. To keep growth within bounds, also root-prune the plant at this time. Do this by driving a spade deep into the soil 2 to 3 feet from the trunk, continuing until the plant is completely encircled. Prune spring-flowering shrubs after blooming-

Antibiotic Use Can Impair Development of Immune System Menu

A growing array of antibiotics has been used for more than three decades to treat, and sometimes prevent, disease in animals and humans. But in recent years there has been increasing recognition that continued use of these potent drugs can create problems, according to Dr. Syed A. Naqi, microbiologist at Texas A&M University.

"Antibiotics have been shown to affect various immune functions in animals and humans," Naqi says, "but widespread therapeutic and subtherapeutic use is made of antibiotics in foodanimal production, particularly commercial poultry.

"Also, humans having chronic bacterial and fungal infections and those receiving immuno-suppressive regimens also receive antibiotics for prolonged periods.

'While the beneficial effects of antibiotics under such situations have been widely acclaimed in the past, their effects on the immune system were largely ignored.'

Therefore, scientists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, in the department of veterinary microbiology and parasitology, College of Veterinary Medicine, Texas A&M University, made a study of the effect of antibiotics on the development of the immune system in chickens and turkeys.

This antibiotic regimen included preincubation dipping of fertile eggs in gentamicin solution (500 parts per million), injection of chicks with the same antibiotic (0.2 mg/ chick, subcutaneously) and inclusion of chlortetracycline in the diet (200 ppm)."

Antibiotic-treated chickens generally carried lower densities of immunoglobulin (Ig) bearing cells, than the respective controls, Nagi says. However, statistically significant differences were apparent only with respect to Ig cell populations in the cecal tonsils and the large intestine. The treated chickens also had significantly lower serum IgM levels at 28 days of age.

How antibiotics effected suppression of the Ig bearing cells in the tissues and the Ig levels in the serum is unknown. A plausible mechanism is through suppression of the intestinal microflora by the antibiotics and resulting lack of stimulation

of the gut associated lymphoid (immune) tissues. Another question that logically arises is whether or not the immunodeficiency seen in the antibiotic-treated birds is likely to compromise their ability to counter infectious diseases.

Additional studies with

turkey poults essentially confirmed the findings made with chickens, Naqi says.

"In food animals, antibiotics are used to reduce risk of infection and improve growth rate. If antibiotics are reducing infection risk on one hand and compromising host defenses on the other, the risk versus benefit situation should be carefully evaluated. This study is a step towards bringing about this awareness," Naqi concluded.

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

The sodium content of many meals ran from 1,000 to 2,515 milligrams. A safe and adequate daily range is from 1,100 to 3,000 milligrams. Two slices of one chain's medium-size pizza

would provide 800 to 1,500 milligrams of sodium, depending on the toppings ordered and crust thickness. One chain's popular sevenounce hamburger contained about 1,000 milligrams of Several Ozonans indicated sodium, while another chain's burger had 800 milli-

ture, and reuse of cooking Fast-food meals contribute 50 to 100 percent of the protein and 30 to 60 percent of the iron and calcium needed by young adults. However, vitamins A and C were very low in most meals. These findings show the

need for consumers to eat balanced meals frequently and to supplement their diets with required nutrients if they often eat fast foods.


