"That's all the test hole does," explained one driller. "You can't have an irrigation well unless the water sand is present. But even if it is, you still have to drill a well before you know if it will produce."

Bailey Has 600 Wells To find these water-bearing sands, scores of farmers have had from one to a halz-dozen or more test holes drilled on their iand. One man arbitrarily determined to put down one test hole every 30 steps on his farm. He struck water on the third try. County Agent J. K. Adams of Muleshoe said Bailey County now has "in the neighborhood" of 600 irrigation wells in production. "From 150 to 200 more are

in sight," he added. One reason for this stepped up activity lies in the creation of a water district to govern the drilling and spacing of wells. cently "put off" drilling of wells have decided to "get the jump" on others and get permits for drilling immediately. When there were no regulations, they knew they could drill when and where they pleased, so were in no hurry. Last year's drouth conditions also served to spur 'the farmers into action.







The Draft Law

regulations.) The draft law requires every man registered with a local board to report any change in personal status to his board.

"Young men have asked us just what changes they should report," Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director, says. "Generally, anything which has a bearing on classification should be reported."

The state director pointed to the following things which should be regarded as change of

personal status: 1. Current change of mail address should always be sent to the board.

2. Marriage should be reported

3. If a wife becomes pregnant with a couple's first child, a physician's certificate must be sent to the board immediately after the fact is known.


4. All additions to the fami ly must be reported.

5. Any and all deaths in a man's family should be reported. 6. If a man and wife are divorsed or they no longer live together, this must be reported. 7. Permanent change of job should be reported.

8. Serious injury or physical defect should be reported. 9. If a man becomes a student in a college or university, this

fact should be reported. 10. If a man enters the Reserves or National Guard, he should ask his commanding officer to notify his board. He should assure himself that it is done.

11. If a man has attempted to volunteer for armed forces and has been rejected, he should advise his local board.
