

Jacob Denver Greeson, 57, of Hereford, was pronounced dead at the scene by Peace Justice Raymond Davee. His body was taken to Sizemore Funeral Home.

Florise Glisson Resmondo, 45, of Cortez, Colo., was listed in fair condition with head lacerations and broken ribs at Crockett County Hospital.

According to a Department of Public Safety spokeswoman, Ms. Resmondo was driving east in the right lane of I-10 while towing another car. Greeson was eastbound in a pickup in the left lane of I-10, approaching the two cars from the rear. Ms. Resmondo's car crossed the white stripe partially into the

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


JOHNNY, THEY HARDLY KNOW YE

Twenty years after his death, John F. Kennedy presents a sticky problem to liberals hoping to bask in the fading glow of Camelot.



Recognizing that JFK's White House record is one they would be embarrassed to call their own, today's liberals have set out to separate the image of JFK from the reality. They want to play up the image of the bold young leader struck down in the prime of life. But they want to disavow Kennedy's pledge to "bear any burden" in the fight against communism. They want to remember Kennedy's commitment to civil rights, while ignoring JFK's effort to protect the civil rights movement from Communist infiltration. And they certainly want to forget that JFK was willing to wiretap Martin Luther King, Jr., to do it.

Today's liberals also want to forget that JFK authorized the Bay of Pigs invasion of Castro's Cuba by Cuban exiles. It might sound too much like Ronald Reagan aiding the Contras in their fight against the Marxist government of Nicaragua. And the no-nukes crowd pushing for the nuclear freeze certainly wants to forget the Cuban missile crisis. After all, JFK was willing to go to war with the Soviets unless the Kremlin removed the missiles it sought to install in Cuba. JFK would never have winked at the degree of Soviet penetration of our hemisphere we see today.

Liberals want to forget that JFK was the first supplysider, cutting taxes across-the-board in a period of deficit spending. They want to forget that his secretary of the treasury was a Wall Street Republican. It might make JFK's administration look like a government "of, by and for the rich." After all, JFK was no poor boy either.

And the liberal discomfort increases tenfold with the mention of Vietnam. As the producer of the recent PBS series "Vietnam: A Television History," proclaims, Vietnam "was the place JFK had chosen to make his stand against communism.

No, Kennedy was not the kind of man today's Democratic party would consider nominating for the presidency. He wasn't a feminist. He never spoke out for gay rights. As America's first Roman Catholic in the White House, he could never have endorsed abortion on demand.

In some ways it's amusing to see what the liberals have done to the Kennedy legend. These folks, who seek to find excuses for (or worse, ignore) every vile act by the Kremlin, would look at the Berlin wall today and say "Ich bin nicht ein Berliner." (I am not a Berliner.)

Conservatives are missing a bet if they let the leftwingers drape themselves in the mantle of JFK. After all, JFK is closer to the Right ideologically than, say, some of the Republican presidents who came after him.

But that's the one thing the myth-makers never want to talk about. How about it, Mary McGrory?

The first sign of complication reportedly arose when Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox, who is under indictment on a commercial bribery charge stemming from his earlier actions related to the law-

suit, refused to accept the settlement unless Mobil dropped its efforts to have District Judge Ruben Garcia of Laredo disqualified from the case.

Mobil claimed the judge was too close personally to Mattox and Manges to be unbiased. In fact, the indictment against Mattox subsequently rose out of Mobil's efforts to remove the judge.

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


Tips for Gardeners From the **Ozona Garden Club** Mrs. Bailey Post

The Azaleas are in full bloom along with many other blooming shrubs for everyone to enjoy. To protect your lace fern, properly asparagus plumosus, is not a fern, but is given the common name. It is root-hardy but will freeze back. In order to retain the top cover it from freezes and frost. It is a beautiful vine and well worth having.

If you are having trouble with spider mite or red spider on your beautiful crotons, one thing that helps is to thoroughly spray them with water out-of-doors of course. Follow with several thorough spravings using Kethane. This should do the trick.

New income reporting laws effective 1984


If you don't report all your taxable income this year, the new income reporting laws for businesses make it likely that you'll hear from the IRS. Most people know that

banks report to the IRS the amount of interest paid to each customer during the vear and that corporations report the amount of dividends paid to each stockholder

Now the law also requires reporting on transactions such sales of stock, tax refunds from state and local governments, and transactions through bartering clubs. In fact, most transactions which affect a person's income must now be reported to the IRS.

With the help of computers, the IRS can compare the information it receives to what you report on your tax return. If the information doesn't match, you can expect a letter from the IRS asking you to explain the differences.

As stock heats, a heavy scum rises to the surface which can be skimmed off taste. Add just before servbefore the first half hour of cooking to keep clear stock. fresh basil or 3/4 teaspoon Add whatever seasoning vegetables are called for and whipped cream. simmer stock partially covered to extract all goodness from ingredients--at least two hours, and as long as 12 if raw bones are used. To keep the stock clear, drain it by ladling. Drain through two layers of cheesecloth that have been wrung out in water. Cool uncovered and store tightly covered in refrigerator. Stocks keep 3-4 days refrigerated and longer if frozen.

Soups or stocks may be thickened by adding pasta or precooked cereal (rice); adding egg yolks just prior to serving-allow 1 egg yolk and 1 tablespoon cream per cup soup; adding 2 riced hardcooked egg yolks per cup soup a few minutes prior to serving; adding 3 tablespoons of raw grated potatoes per cup of soup, 15 minutes prior to serving.



The Scientists Tell Me...

Improved Quality of Sorghum Grain Aids Sales for Food and Feed

Steady improvement of quality of sorghum grain for the last three decades plus intelligent, aggressive market promotion has resulted in growing acceptance of U.S. grain sorghum in world-wide markets, according to Dr. L.W. Rooney, Professor of Food Science and Agronomy at Texas A&M University.

"The image of U.S. sorghum around the world has been improved, and is continuing to be improved, thanks to the efforts of a large number of key industry personnel, scientists, and promotion groups," says Rooney, a noted researcher in cereal chemistry for the, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and an international authority on sorghum quality.

"The successful development of markets has been accomplished by aggressive promotion and because U.S. sorghum is a good quality, high-energy feed that is of better quality than most other sorghums being exported," according to Rooney.

"This has occurred by the combination of research, led by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, to develop new sorghum hybrids with built-in improved quality, while developing the best methods to process and feed the grain.'

The collection of expertise, developed over the last half century, can be used to provide factual information to answer the questions of potential sorghum buyers. Scientists of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station have participated in numerous sorghum marketing and promotion efforts which have been sponsored by the U.S. Feed Grains Council and the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

For example, Rooney recently presented a seminar in E. Berlin to members of the German Democratic Republic's National Academy of Agriculture, in response to a request by the U.S. Feed

Grains Council after GDR grain in Asia and Africa, officials had spent time in West Texas as guests of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association. Rooney's seminar com-

pared the composition structure, nutritional value and processing properties of sorghum with corn. Special emphasis was given to discussing modern methods of processing sorghum, such as since insufficient maize steam flaking, popping, micronizing and reconstitution. Methods to distinguish high-tannin, brown sorghums from yellow sorghum were clearly shown. Potential reasons for the significantly depressed feeding value of brown sorghums were dis-

Non-profit workers to

Employees who work for nonprofit tax exempt organizations may find that some extra money has been withheld from wages they earn after January 1.

The Social Security Amendment Act of 1983 requires all employees of organizations exempt from taxes under section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code to join the Social Security system on or before January 1, 1984.

This means that tax exempt religious, educational, and charitable organizations ial Security taxes from em-

ployees' wages and paying them into the Social Security system along with a matching employer contribution

Under the new law, organizations previously exempt from Social Security, will begin reporting withholding taxes on Form 941 instead of Form 941E.

Under the old law, 501 (c) (3) organizations had the option of not joining the Social Security system or of withdrawing once they had pends those options and

joined. The new law susmakes Social Security covermust begin withholding Soc- age mandatory for all exempt organization employees.
