

wool, mohair or unshorn lambs and have not filed for incentive payments are urged to do so. The deadline for turning in sales for 1983 is January 31, 1984.

Ranchers who have a record of their wool and mohair sales are eligible for incentive payments only if the sales are reported to the ASCS office. Sales slips should contain the month of shearing, month of sale, number of head shorn, pounds of wool or mohair sold and net proceeds. Sales slips for lambs must show the liveweight and state that the lambs were unshorn.

The federal support price for 1983 shorn wool marketings is \$1.53 per pound and \$4.63 per pound for mohair. Pulled wool will continue to be supported at a level comparable to the support price for shorn wool through payments on unshorn lambs.

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HAPPY NEW YEAR. **GEORGE ORWELL**

At last, 1984 is finally upon us. It is a date of peculiar search for a new firm to significance, because it has come to mean something entirely different from a mere point in time. As a result of George Orwell's classic novel 1984, it has come to signify the ultimate triumph of totalitarianism.

So, even though it's 1984, a lot of people are asking the Capitol included: if we have reached The 1984. And there, the verdict is still out


Writing in the current issue of READER'S DIGEST, author Norman Podhoretz argues that those who seek comparisons between the America of today and Orwell's hypothetical Oceania are themselves practicing the twisted logic of Big Brother.

"In Orwell's Oceania, not even strict obedience to Big Brother is enough; everyone is also required to love him,' Podhoretz writes. "In the America of 1984, by contrast, there seems to be no limit to the opposition that can be mounted against the President or the government."

But, Podhoretz notes, the way in which Orwell's novel is interpreted by today's left-wing intellectuals, abetted by the news media, could foster the growth of Big Brotherism.

He cites a television documentary hosted by CBS' Walter Cronkite, which compared the constant re-writing of history in the Soviet Union with the periodic revision of textbooks in the United States. How ridiculous, Podhoretz says, to compare the Soviet Union's practice of distorting the facts to fit the current party line with Western scholarship, which seeks to bring us closer to the truth

Indeed, the inability to recognize totalitarianism in today's world seems to be the most ominous indicator of our times.

It seems odd that the world community often regards our nation, still the most consistent defender of freedom in the world, as the villain in a global morality play between good and evil. Communist insurgencies, which seek to kill and enslave, are enshrined at the United Nations as "national liberation movements." The Soviet Union, which economically and socially has fallen far behind the Russia of 1914, is credited as "progressive."

And, as Podhoretz reminds us, Western intellectuals so often are the purveyors of this "newspeak."


Clearly, we in the West are headed for the fate of Big Brotherism if we allow ourselves to be deluded into believing that the distinction between our society and Marxist totalitarianism is only a fine one.

That's why it's so frightening to hear the teacher of an adult education class enthusiastically reporting that few students to whom he assigns 1984 give "the kind of fullblown anti-Communist reading that was so common in the 1950s and 1960s."

"George Orwell was prophetic about many things," Podhoretz says, "but he neither anticipated nor could have imagined this use of his own work to blur the essential distinction between the democratic and Communist worlds.

The alleged failure of Mobil Oil to fulfill drilling requirements on the state lease resulted in the state taking back the leases and searching for a new operator

Last week Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, who led the negotiations, told reporters that a systematic audit by his office has uncovered more than 25 additional leases which may be invalid.

Settlements in those cases would lead to the recovery of hundreds of millions of dollars for the state, he said. The revenues are dedicated to the public schools of Texas.

Meanwhile, Texas Railroad Commissioner Bud-Temple questioned Mauro's predictions that the 53 oil wells would generate an additional \$100 million for the state, indicating his calculation came to about half that figure. Temple based his estimate on 1983 production, Mauro based his on reserves.

New Taxes?

Gov. Mark White has promised new taxes to raise teachers salaries, and new statements from House Speaker Gib Lewis and the tax committee chairman Rep. Stan Schlueter, D-Killen, indicates he might get his way. Schlueter, whose committee stopped the tax bill from reaching the House floor for debate, said last week that unless the economy turns around and fills state coffers, taxpayers probably see a tax will hike by spring.

Later, Lewis said any new taxes for teachers salaries should be temporary and should "selfdestruct" when the economy improves.

Since January is the middle winter month, there are many chores to be attended to if the weather permits.

Bare root planting is this month's big opportunity because bare root plants become better established than those planted from a nurserv can.

Only certain kinds of plants are sold this way, but hare root is the best way to plant apples, apricots, eaches, plums, figs, flowering fruit trees, roses, grapes and berries.

Follow these guidelines: Plant as soon as its possible to keep roots from drying dut. Just to be sure, soak roots in water overnight. Dig an ample hole and add

amendments and slow acting fertilizer, such as bone meal. Form a cone of soil in the bottom of the hole and spread the roots over it, making sure the plant ends up at the right depth. Fill the hole and tamp the soil down to compress any air pockets. Fruit trees need pruning prior to planting to reduce the top growth and compensate for the amount of roots lost when the plant was dug

Pruning is winter's next most important garden job. Any leafless plant can be pruned now, but since the Hallie Black.

Improved Warm-Season Grasses Expand Rangeland Capacity

By Robert L. Haney TAES Science Writer

Warm-season grasses, always a mainstay of the livestock industry in Texas, have been improved more in the last 40 years than in any other similar length of time in our history, according to summer. Dr. Ethan Holt, forage research leader at Texas A&M University

In addition to the vast acreages of native grasslands Improved quality is reflectin Texas which are made up ed, in turn, in increased predominately of warm-season grasses, there are now

some 20 million acres of improved warm-season grass pastures that greatly expand our forage production capacity, Holt says.

Bermudagrass is the most important tame pasture grass in Texas, according to Holt, who is forage research leader for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and Coastal is by far the most important improved cultivar,





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
