This column has been canceled this week due to a myriad of problems we do not have space to write about.

We do want to send congratulations to Jan Henderson, who has accepted a position as editor of the Santa Anna News, a weekly newspaper in Santa Anna. Jan writes she is happy about her job, and it is keeping her busy. She is the only staff member, so she does it all and she says we wouldn't believe what the job requires.

Her letter took me back to the days after I first purchased the Stockman. I can remember waking up at 3 a.m. and going to the office. We were still doing job printing at that time, plus selling office supplies. There was only Bekie Diaz, the printer, and me. I was the editor, publisher, bookkeeper, ad layout person and general flunkey. It wasn't so hard then, because we had strike-on composition and all stories, columns etc. could be written for layout at one time. I can remember using a lot of liquid paper.

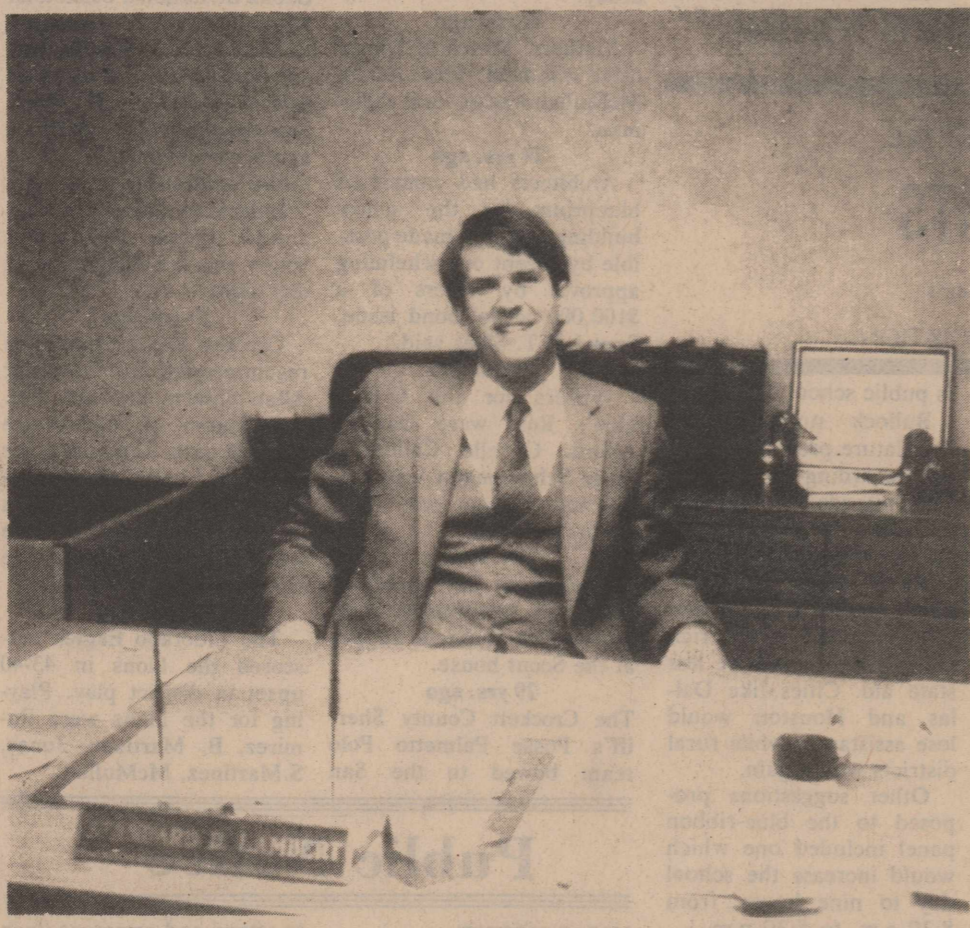
Bekie and I worked well together. He was a fine printer, using the linotype and the Hiedelberg press, he turned out tons of old-fashioned hot-type printing jobs, and still managed to help me with the newspaper. We put out on the average an 8-page paper weekly, and one of us took it to Del Rio every Thursday morning before daylight to have it printed.

Finally we decided to hire a typesetter. As well as I remember we hired Pat Willmon on a part-time basis which grew into full-time. She was conscientious and made a good hand. When she decided to quit and start her family, we were back as a two-man operation. The next type-setter we hired was a good typist, but not so good at spelling and proof-reading. Bekie and I worked late at night putting the paper to bed, due to the large number of mistakes which had to be corrected. One night was particularly hectic. I had told the typesetter write out 4th (fourth) when she encountered it. There had been a track meet that week, and practically every kid in school came in fourth. When Bekie brought the strip back to me at the front, I had to reset the story. Everytime there was a fourth place, it was spelled forth. I was pretty aggravated and told him to just get busy laying out the pages and ignore any further mistakes. I was trying to get my column written.

Here he came again, apologetically he said he had found a mistake he felt I would not like to see in the paper the next day. It was the report of a club meeting. At the end of the story, where all the members were listed it said "and one beast, Mrs. so and so." It should have been one guest. I don't know how that got transposed.

Anyway, in the years since we have been lucky to have competent help and the paper has grown from the eight-page average to 12 or 14 pages each week. Bekie quit some years ago to become an insurance executive. It scared me to death at the time, but I began sending the job work out, sold the press and linotype, remodeled the back of the shop where the printing had been done. It proved successful

## Board awards renovation bid

Excitement was the order of the evening last Wednesday when members of the Ozona Board of Trustees, contractors, and interested spectators gathered together for the opening of bids on the Ozona Junior High renovation project. Architect Ron Barbutti began opening the bids from seven construction firms at 6:00 p.m. and a hush fell over the group as the various bids were called out

and written down.

When the formal bid opening was completed, Stein Construction Company of Fredricksburg was certified as the low bidder for the project, with a bid of \$914,000. The second lowest bid was by J.W. Cooper Construction of Odessa, with a project cost of \$968,700. President Joe Couch then called the Board into executive session for the purpose

of board discussion of the bids, and he asked the representatives from the Stein and J.W. Cooper companies to remain until a decision was reached.

Following careful deliberation, the board members asked the Stein Construction representative, Doug Stein, to appear before them to answer questions concerning his firm's financial stability, employees, and experience in renovating historical buildings.

After additional discussions were held, board members voted to accept Stein's low bid of \$914,000, and a contract to the company was awarded.

After the meeting was adjourned, Superintendent Garland Davis stated that he was very pleased with the bid and excited about the beginning of the building improvement program. He also said that the project will have a completion time of 180 calendar days, and renovations will begin in approximately three weeks.

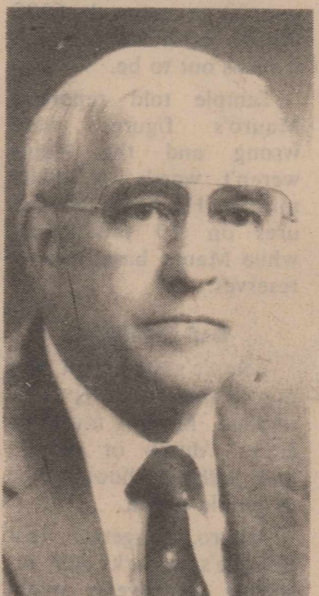
## 20th Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet

Bill Mason, District Attorney of the 112th Judicial District, has announced that he is a candidate for reelection for another term.

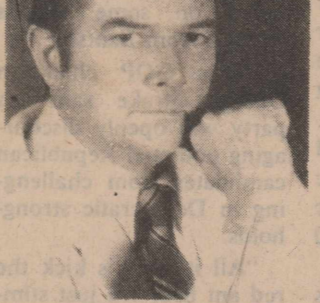

Mason co-authored a manual for statewide law enforcement officials entitled **Elements Manual-The Components of a Crime**, and is presently writing another law enforcement manual concerning the probation laws of the State of Texas and their application. He was instrumental in establishing the first Law Enforcement Workshop, a highly successful, state accredited seminar, which is now utilized on a statewide basis and which has been presented to more than 3,600 law enforcement officers throughout the State of Texas. ## Cold spell to have impact on pecan crop

The late December cold spell in Texas could have a major impact on the 1984 pecan crop.

Many rapidly growing young pecan trees (less than 7 years old) as well as pecan trees in nurseries took a severe beating from the prolonged cold weather.

"Mature trees that were stressed from a heavy crop in 1983 could also have suffered some freeze injury," adds McEachern. "This is especially true of Barton, Mahan and Wichita varieties."

Also, mature trees that were drought-stressed at the time of the severe cold weather likely suffered more severe freeze damage, notes the horticulturist.

Commercial pecan growers as well as homeowners interested in nursery pecan trees to plant this winter should inspect them closely for freeze injury before making a purchase. McEachern suggests slicing the buds, cambium (layer of growth just under the bark) and crown (base of plant) to check for brown tissue, which would indicate freeze damage.

The horticulturist also advises against pruning back existing trees until mid-May to determine the extent of any freeze injury. "Freeze injury can be deceiving," says McEachern. "Pecan trees that have been frozen often bud out and look healthy in April."

## Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Since our severe weather has lasted so long maybe you can enjoy springtime blooms. This winter-spring can come earlier this year with bulbs you grow especially for indoor blooms. Before they put up a single flower outdoors, you can be enjoying their burst of color if you plan ahead. With the right timing you could have a pot of Valentine's or a little later. Not every springtime bulb is suitable for forcing crocuses, daffodils, hyacinths, and paper white daffodils (Narcissus) are among the best, but you can also grow tulips, anemones and amaryllis as well. Early blooming types tend to be more desirable than those that flower later in the season. Double-flowered selections make a better show than single-flowered types.

Nurseries are offering pre-packaged forcing kits complete with bulbs, a potting medium and even the container. It isn't difficult to put together your own bulb-forcing kit. The materials are all available and you will be able to get the exact flower type and color you want because you pick the bulbs yourself. You will find complete instructions on how to plant the bulbs, what's required to bring them into bloom, and what to do with them after the flowers fade. Always buy top-quality (jumbo) bulbs.

Get gladiolus corms on hand now for February plant-

ing. To ensure high-quality corms, always buy from a reputable nursery or mail-order source. Glads are not heat-loving plants, so the early blooming selections like Coral Seas and white lilac generally perform best in south and central Texas. There are two new gladiolus selections you may want to try. Flash is an early bloomer with maroon-red flowers edged in silver. Golden Years unfolds its golden-yellow blossoms in mid-season.

If you are adding some fruit trees to your landscape this year, be sure to select ones adapted to our area. Obtain this information from our county agent.

## Cake mixes vary in cost and in calories

Not all cake mixes are created equal either in cost or calories, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Service foods and nutrition specialist.

Some packaged mixes can be economical and actually cost less than similar cakes baked from scratch, says Mary K. Sweeten. But "better quality" cake mixes can cost three times as much as simpler mixes and still require the addition of costly ingredients at home.

For example, a "butter" cake mix requires the addition of one-quarter pound of butter and three eggs, which would add about 75 cents to the cost of the cake. The shortening used in the cake mix is usually soy oil, so the only butter in the butter cake is added by the cook. Yet the butter cake may cost up to 50 percent more than a competitive yellow cake mix, notes the specialist.

Research conducted by Cornell University Extension home economists compared "pudding mix" cakes with their plainer counterparts in the same product line and found that the richer texture of these cakes was due primarily to the cook's additions, says Sweeten. They also found that nu-

tritive value of the dry mixes are identical for protein, calories and fat, with the pudding mixes providing two extra grams of carbohydrate. But the finished pudding cake has twice as much fat, and 25 percent more calories than the plain layer cake.

The addition of extra eggs and oil to the pudding mix increases the calories as well as the cost of the cake, she says.

Sweeten suggests that consumers make it a habit to read the labels on mixes, since nutritional differences among cakes are surprisingly large.

The fat content of various cake mixes ranges from four to fourteen grams for one twelfth of the cake; the calories from 180 to 300 per slice; and the sodium from 270 to 375 milligrams per slice.

In general, angel food cake and white cake mixes, made without egg yolks, are low in fat and calories, and cake mixes that require additional oil or shortening are high, says Sweeten.

The good news for chocolate lovers is that chocolate cake mixes are not significantly higher in fat or calories than other flavors, adds the specialist.

## Extension office news

Although it's said "You can't eat fringes," your employee benefits can make a real difference in how well you are eating. It pays to know what you're earning in addition to your salary.

Keeping up with the fringes-If the last time you thought about your fringe benefits was the day you put your benefits handout in the back of a drawer, you may be ignoring an important part of your total financial picture. As fringe benefits have expanded to cover a wide range of goods and services, their value to employees has also increased.

Employee benefits can be broadly defined as money, goods, or services your company gives you in addition to your wages. Any employee benefit you receive, from health insurance to free parking, represents dollars you don't have to spend-dollars that can add up to a healthy percentage of your income.

Some benefits may be provided at no cost to you; for others, you may have to pay something. However, because your employer usually subsidizes the cost, what you pay will probably be less than if you bought the same item on your own.

Some of your benefits can help you keep pace with inflation. You may be receiving free an item or service that's increasing in price. And, with a benefit like medical insurance the coverage is usually adjusted to keep up with rising costs.

Many of your benefits increase your purchasing power by coming to you tax-free. If your employer gives you an additional dollar in salary, you pay taxes on that dollar. But if your employer gives you a dollar in the form of a nontaxable employee benefit, you receive the dollar's full value.

Federal law specifically exempts from taxation employer-provided disability insurance, group term life insurance (up to \$50,000), educational assistance, child care, and through 1984-legal service plans. Health care benefits are also exempt, but federal legislation may limit the amount employees can receive tax-free.

If your job is covered by Social Security-and most are-you and your employer both

pay a tax on your earnings (to a maximum "wage base"). In 1983, the tax is 6.7% of the first \$35,700 you earn. Social Security pays benefits if you can't work because you're disabled. It also provides retirement income and pays benefits to your spouse and minor children if you die. Check with your local Social Security office to make sure you understand the eligibility requirements.

Because of the complicated way Social Security retirement benefits are calculated, you can't know the exact amount of your benefits until you actually apply. However, your employer may be able to give you a rough estimate. Or, if you're 60 or older, you can obtain an estimate from the Social Security Administration.

You should check Social Security's records every three years to make sure your payments are being properly credited to your account. You can do this by submitting Form SSA-7004, "Request for Statement of Earnings," available from a local Social Security office or from the Social Security Administration, Baltimore, Md. 21235.

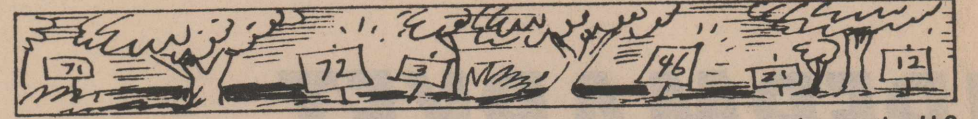
financially, but it was the end of an era. For years I have missed the clatter of the linotype, the rhythm of the press and the smell of hot lead.

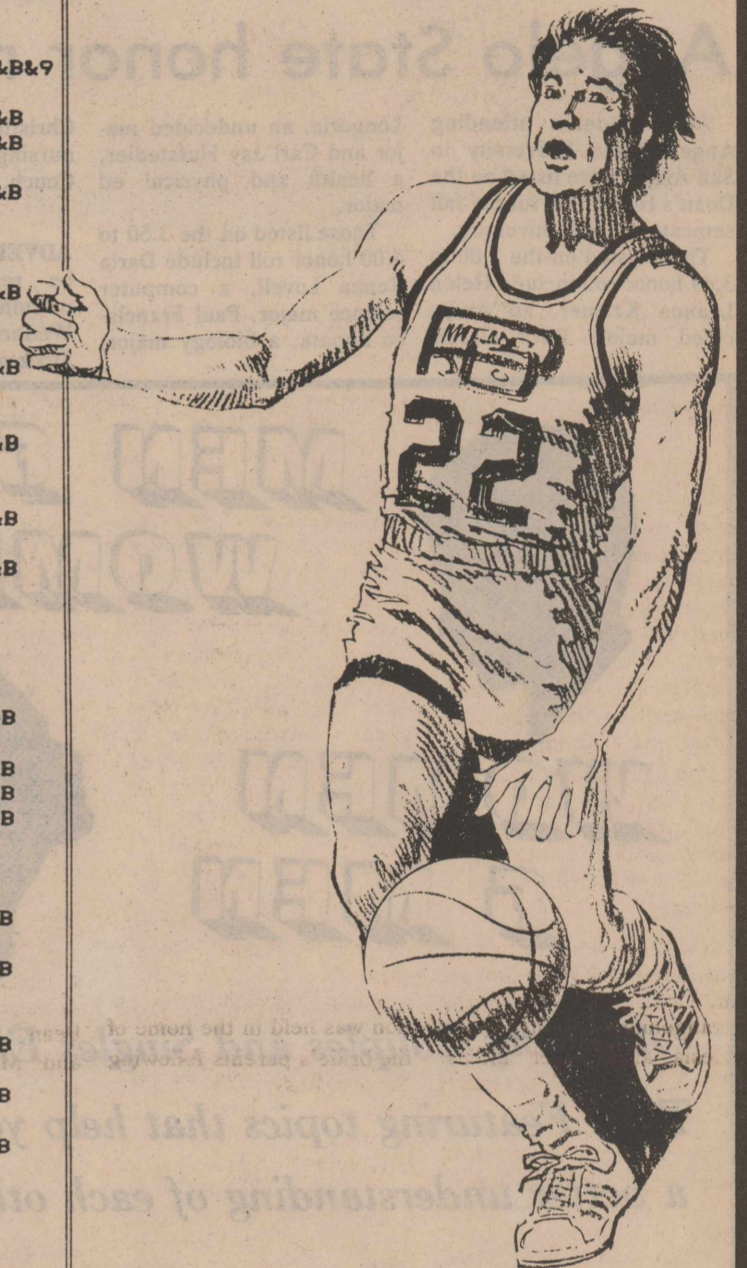
