Apartment complex underway

Crockett Apartments will be located on Highway 163 on the south side of Ozona. Construction on the 32 unit development will begin very soon. There will be 16 one-bedroom and 16 two-bedroom units. Each apartment will have carpet, drapes, central air and heat, refrigerator, range and plenty of closet space. The exteriors will be western in appearance, utilizing brick and rough sawn wood siding. These units will be energy efficient and very affordable. Calhoun Builders, Inc. of Mansfield, Louisiana is the developer of this complex. They have similar developments in Sonora, Eldorado, and Colorado City.

Five mile run is scheduled

The second annual 5-Mile Run sponsored by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce has been planned for Saturday, May 19. Last year's run had 76 runners and the Chamber hopes to have at least that many this year. A 1-mile run has been added to this year's events. The mile will be for boys and girls, 10 years old and younger. The age divisions for the 5-mile run are women: 11-15, 16-19, 20-29, 30-39, 40-49, 50 and over. Medals will be awarded to first, second, and third place finishers in each division. There will be a special award to the youngest and the oldest entry that finishes. Ribbons will be awarded to all runners in the mile run. There is no time limit to finish the race so all walkers-joggers are welcome. The entry fee is \$6 before the 19th of May. On race day the entry fee will be \$7. There will be a t-shirt for all entries and cold drinks after the race. Entry blanks may be picked up at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce. Great balloon race countdown

"Countdown to the Great Balloon Race begins at 1:00 p.m., March 23, 1984," says Bob Wallace, principal of Ozona Intermediate School in Ozona. Students at Ozona Intermediate will launch 300-helium-filled balloons as part of the nationwide Writing Pals Balloon Contest sponsored by Weekly Reader, the classroom newspaper.

A message attached to each balloon explains the project and asks that the finder return it to Ozona Intermediate School. Weekly Reader will present a \$500 prize to the school that gets back the message that has traveled the farthest distance. In addition, 100 runner-up prizes will be awarded. Since the annual balloon

launch began, Weekly Reader has furnished about 2½ million free balloons to schools participating in the Weekly Reader Writing Pals program, a pen pal program in which Weekly Reader pairs classes across the country.

The goal of the program is to motivate children to write to, and to become familiar with, students in other parts of the country. Last year students received a number of letters from people who found the balloons and some were from as far away as Missouri and Canada. "Ozona Intermediate School pupils will write to every person who sends back a message card from our balloons," Wallace said.

Local producers buy warehouse

For the first time in its history, Crockett County, one of the nation's largest sheep and goat raising counties, has a warehouse solely owned by a large group of local producers. The move was made Thursday, March 1, 1984 with the purchase of the interest of Vernon Jones and Bill Mansfield in Ozona Wool and Mohair Company by a group of over 30 local ranchers.

In addition to purchasing the local warehouse, the new group became a 25 percent stockholder in the newly formed Warehouse Capital Management Company, thus aligning Ozona with warehouses in Sonora and Mertzon in the management of the seven-member warehouse group.

During a meeting held on Wednesday, February 29, stockholders elected Joe Bean, president; Dan Davidson, vice-president; Wade Richardson, secretary-treasurer. Directors include Gary Mitchell, David Bean, Charles E. Davidson III and David Slaughter.

The newly elected board stated that Ozona Wool and Mohair Company's sole purpose was to provide customers with a wide range of supplies at low cost and to sell wool and mohair at the highest price obtainable in the market. The new corporation will not loan money or engage in any activity which might lead it astray from its goal of reducing prices for supplies and raising the price for wool and mohair. The newly formed corporation has a capitalization of \$450,000.

In an action unrelated to the purchase of Ozona Wool and Mohair Company, local producers in the Ozona area elected Pleas Childress III and Gary Buck Mitchell as directors of the American Wool and Mohair Association.

W & M producers organize Assn.

For over a year producers of wool and mohair have been implementing a plan designed to provide all wool and mohair producers with information about the wool and mohair markets. The plan, originally proposed by a group of producers who realized the need for improved marketing techniques, consists of an organization, the American Wool and Mohair Association, whose function is to provide a forum for the discussion of market strategies and dissemination of market information among its membership. The Association will also train graders and sorters allowing for these services to be made available to those members who wish to apply them to their products.

Membership is open to all producers of wool and mohair. Current membership consists of producers in the

following Texas and New Mexico counties: Chaves, Concho, Crockett, Eddy, Irion, Kinney, Lea, Mills, Pecos, Reagan, San Saba, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, Terrell, Tom Green, Upton, Uvalde, and Val Verde. By having a wide membership base, the Association will be in a position to provide up-to-date reports of market activity throughout Texas and New Mexico, allowing the producer a better opportunity to adequately evaluate offers and market options for his product.

In keeping with its primary function as a discussion forum, members are not obligated to follow any marketing strategies discussed by the Association's membership. However, while strictly voluntary, all decisions reached by the Association will be motivated by economic incentives and thus should have wide support.

This concept is designed to help an industry which has seen very little change since its introduction into the Southwest over 100 years ago and consequently, an industry that has oftentimes received a price for its products well below that offered to producers of similar fibers in foreign countries. It is hoped that by being nonbinding and having no membership dues, many more producers will join in the effort to protect an otherwise diminishing industry which at one time helped buy and pay for many of the ranches which today no longer run sheep or goats.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—State Sen. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, picked up a little momentum for his U.S. Senate campaign this week by gaining the endorsement of the Texas AFL-CIO.

Meeting in Austin, delegates to the two-day labor convention gave Doggett their endorsement despite an attempt by supporters of former Congressman Bob Krueger to block the endorsement.

Doggett picked up 73 percent of the vote in a straight up-or-down roll call on whether to support the Austin Democrat or make no endorsement.

Doggett needed only a two thirds margin to win the group's approval. Despite strong opposition to Doggett by electrical workers and other labor factions, the Krueger people could only muster 26 percent of the vote, far below the 33 percent needed to block the Doggett victory.

The endorsement is expected to be a major boost to Doggett's campaign, which was given little chance of success when he began last year.

Doggett supporters also expect to see a considerable sum of labor dollars rolling into their candidate's war chest as well.

Krueger has generally been acknowledged as the front-runner in the race for the Democratic Senate nomination, but Doggett has been gaining ground. Last month, Doggett succeeded in blocking a Krueger endorsement by the Mexican-American Democrats.

After the roll call vote, Krueger released a statement chastising rank-and-file labor people for "blindly" following the positions of state AFL-CIO leaders.

Education Reform

While labor was in Austin trying to ignite the Doggett campaign, education officials were meeting in Dallas, where the real fireworks were expected.

The Select Committee on Education, chaired by outspoken Dallas billionaire Ross Perot, proposed dramatic education reforms that include requiring public school teachers to pass a basic skills test and replacing the elected State Board of Education with an appointed board.

The proposal to abolish the 27-member, elected board in favor of a seven-member, appointed panel has caused friction among members of the education community.

Members of the board, including board chairman Joe Kelly Butler of Houston—the patriarch of Texas public education—blasted Perot for trying to grease the skids for his

committee's recommendations.

Board member Wayne Winkle of El Paso told reporters that Perot wants the elected panel scrapped because no group of elected officials "who are responsive to the needs and desires of the people" would go along with some of Perot's recommendations.

Those recommendations have included fining parents whose children failed to achieve in school, de-emphasizing high school athletics and extending the school day to nine hours.

Perot claims the smaller, appointed board is needed because the present panel is too unwieldy to be effective.

Under the plan to make teachers take basic skills tests, those teachers who fail the test would not have their contracts renewed when they expire.

Even if only 10 percent of the state's teachers are incompetent, they could be harming thousands of students, Perot said.

U.S. INDUSTRY ALIVE AND WELL

While everybody and his brother knew beforehand that the administration's 1985 budget would be in the red by \$180-to-200 billion, the mavens of Wall Street—who had been chalking up hefty gains on the Big Board all winter long—reacted by acting surprised and sending the stock market into a tailspin.

I felt like calling my broker to ask him the classic question: "If you're so smart, why aren't you rich?" With minor variations, that's exactly the kind of question we should ask many of our policy-makers: "How can you be so smug when you're so consistently wrong?"

In early February, for example, members of a House Banking subcommittee, on a straight party-line vote, approved legislation designed to heal the hemorrhage in the U.S. industrial base. The two-pronged proposal would establish a federal advisory council to target federal aid to ailing industries and a new "Bank for Industrial Competitiveness" to provide loans to U.S. businesses. The legislation is part of a bigger National Industrial Policy (NIP) program designed to revive the moribund manufacturing sector of the U.S. economy.

But there's at least one major flaw with the program: its proponents are dead wrong when they claim U.S. industry is seriously ill and in need of heroic life-support measures.

To the contrary, a new study shows U.S. industry is actually quite healthy and "continuing to evolve along its historical path," according to the study's author Thomas DiLorenzo, professor of economics at George Mason University in Virginia.

"The national industrial capacity is not declining, it is growing and changing," Dr. DiLorenzo says, noting a three-fold increase in industrial output from 1950 to 1981.

Dr. DiLorenzo's important research shows that manufacturing employment has actually risen from 16.5-million jobs in 1960 to 21.8-million in 1981. Even in such "basic" industries as auto, steel and textiles, any decline has been modest.

Unfounded claims that U.S. manufacturing is on its deathbed have, of course, fueled support for national industrial policy. Instead of rescuing U.S. industry, however, DiLorenzo feels more government intervention would only prop up less efficient businesses at the expense of the rest of the economy.

You'd think, by now, that the pundits and politicians would have learned enough about economic history to know that every economy goes through high and low cycles as technology advances and industries change.

Let the would-be government planners cry. Let them pout. Then, take a look at countries where the governments do the planning. A free-enterprise America will continue to succeed and maintain its position as the leading industrial nation of the world. Those who claim otherwise will be wrong again.

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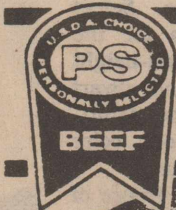

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

After our most welcome rain of last week our countryside should really green up soon. If we can miss that late freeze we sometimes have before Easter, we should have a most colorful array of blooms to enjoy.

A springtime spectacular for your garden is the native yellow Jassamine which is available at nurseries in our area.

Sow Bermuda grass this month and feed lawn bare spots, also established trees and shrubs.

Start planting gladiolus bulbs every 10 days to have continuous blooming for sometime.

Divide and reset chrysanthemums.

Buy seeds of marigold, zinnias, coxcomb, ageratum,

nasturtiums, morning glory and moonvine.

For a garden you will enjoy, plan on paper before buying seeds and bedding plants. You will want to consider the size of the plants at time of bloom and the amount of sun your plants will receive. Select tall-growing plants for the back buds, medium-height for the middle and dwarf selections for the front. Large masses of one color give the most impact.

Since our severe freeze of the winter pruning will be more of a chore this year. Prune over grown and misshapen spring-flowering shrubs as soon as possible after the blooms have faded. Early pruning allows plants to produce new shoots before midsummer, when the next year's flower buds will set. Lightly prune azaleas, camellias, and Indian hawthorn to keep the plants a desired size. Cut so the shrubs do not look sheared and each cut should be flush with a remaining limb. To prune shrubs of flowering quince, bridal wreath, forsythia and jasmine, cut one-third of the oldest, tallest shoots to within 6 inches of the ground.

The two new rose winners for 1984 are: Grand Masterpiece—a vibrant glowing, true red; perfect in form and substance and wonderfully long-stemmed.

Sunbright-Bronze medal is a radiant, golden beauty that is free blooming and simply brilliant. Honor-1980 rose of the year has turned out to be the best white roses grown.

Who Needs A Will? Everyone does. Without a will, your estate and personal property will be distributed according to the "will" the state has written for you, which may not be the way you intended to have your property distributed.

Good legal advice is one of the best assurances that you have in meeting the legal requirements of a will. Before you see an attorney, make sure that you have a list of the following:

List your assets (everything you own that has cash value). Include the present value of each, the date and place you acquired it and your marital status at the time, its value when you acquired it, and the form of ownership in which you hold it. Property in another state is subject to tax laws and probate of that state.

The names of your intended beneficiaries, relationship to you, amount of money, percentage or estate, specific assets you want each to receive should be listed.

If you are married, make provisions for simultaneous death of you and your spouse or death of about the same time.

Select an alternative distribution, in case any of your chief beneficiaries die before you.

Specify guardian and special powers of guardian for children under 18.

Specify the name of your executor (the person or financial institution you want to carry out terms of your will), an alternate in case the first choice can't serve, and any special powers of executor.
