

CASTRO'S CUBA AT 25

Jesse Jackson, best actor in a supporting role at the Democratic National Convention, is just the latest figure from the American left to sojourn to Castro's Cuba and return wide-eyed with praise.

It's not surprising. The country probably has no criminals. They've all been sent here.

When dictator Fulgencio Batista fled Cuba on January 1, 1959, for the Dominican Republic, ahead of Fidel Castro's advancing forces, many expected a new enlightened era to begin on the island 90 miles off the South Florida coast.

They were right and wrong. It was the beginning of a new era alright - but hardly one characterized by enlightenment. For someone who looks only at statistics, the nearly 10-million Cuban people may be better off today than they were 25 years ago. The Soviet Union pumps up the Cuban economy - in exchange for young Cuban men, who the Soviets keep busy as cannon fodder in Africa and elsewhere. Cuba's hospitals have improved, and the literacy rate is up. But there's more to the picture than this, says New York author Lorrin Philipson in the current issue of Policy Review

Philipson examines many of the Cuban institutions that most impress

In a Time magazine article earlier this year, Castro boasted of Cuba's ratio of doctors to overall population (1 to 626 in 1980) as being one of the Third World's highest. Yet, Philipson says, Cuba's public health record includes several major failures. "Water pollution is such a problem, particularly in Havana — struck by an outbreak of typhoid fever in 1977 - that the Ministry of Health urges people to boil their water. In 1980, 304 cases of yellow fever were diagnosed - the first outbreak of the disease in Cuba since 1905."

The Cuban literacy rate, at 96 percent by 1976, is one of the highest in Latin America. Yet, Philipson asks "of what use is universal education without the freedom to read, write and speak? Admission to the university in Cuba depends more on revolutionary activity than expertise." In 1980, 411 students who passed the medical school admissions exam with high scores were not allowed to continue their education because of "bad political attitudes.

Claiming that Cuba is the second-best-fed country in Latin America, Castro's apologists fail to mention that Cuba has long food lines and strict rationing despite the fertile soil. "Annual per-capita consumption of rice - a basic staple in the Cuban diet - has fallen to 27 kilograms from 50 kilograms before the revolution," Philipson notes. "In 1980 Cubans were allotted two pounds of meat per month, one-and-a-half pounds of chicken per month, two ounces of coffee every 15 days...

While Castro bad-mouthed other Latin nations for their huge foreign debts, social calamities, unemployment, and inflation, and claimed in a Newsweek interview that "our economy has grown at an approximate rate of 4.7 percent over 25 years," he failed to mention that Cuba had to reschedule nearly half of its \$3.5-billion debt to Western banks and governments, Philipson continues. "The Cuban economy has been able to survive only because of massive aid from the Soviet Union, which purchases sugar from Cuba at above-world-market prices and sells it at below prevailing rates."

Cubans cannot obviously express their like or dislike of Castro's regime, but in 1981, the country had a suicide rate of 27.5 per 100,000 people - one of the world's highest. And Cuba's birth rate shows one of the most rapid declines in the world, from 35.1 in 1963 to 14.1 by 1980. Perhaps this is because many young Cubans are in Africa and elsewhere in Latin America helping 'the oppressed' of the world shoot their way to a better life

"There is no freedom of speech, no freedom to worship, no freedom of enterprise, no freedom to emigrate, no freedom to form trade unions or other voluntary organizations," says Philipson.

Do we wish the Castro regime a happy 25th? We'd be better off wishing Cuban citizens good luck in surviving the next 25 years.

Tips For Gardeners Woman's League meets with From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Hoover to begin new year = by Mrs. Bailey Post

Since in West Texas we usually very little rain, those trees and shrubs that require the least moisture will head the list.

Most gardeners long to try to grow the new and exotic plants described in co-hostesses. the catalogue, but after a few years and waste of dollars and care, they usually return to the planting of those that are known to thrive in our area. If you do want them and have the time to care for them properly, they will grow interesting foliage and blooms. Now near the house are no longer necessary for shade and cooling as they once were.

If you want the naturalistic setting, You may want to add nursery plants, but plan for them to look as if they just grew there with natives.

In preparation now for fall planting of a new or old landscape, several requirements should be considered. Visualize the lasting beauty you wish to achieve, the space you have, size of the plants, maintenance required and cost involved.

To have the public or entrance area attractive the year around, evergreens give the most satisfaction. If you want some color for the summer months. make the flower beds wide enough for bulbs and annuals in front of the shrubs. Potted plants may be used too, for they can be changed with the season

Select shrubs and trees that will be in scale with your house and area to be planted, without having to be constantly pruning.

Contrast in color and foliage gives more interest and pleasure to the public and you.

Also, a variety of greenery will furnish plant material anytime you want it for long lasting arrangements in your home.

Simplicity and unity in placing of the plants will provide easy maintenance and a pleasing appearance. There are many attractive shrubs that do well in Ozona.

If you live where the soil is shallow and near caliche, this will need to be removed and good soil added to replace it.

> More infants and toddlers drown in bathtubs each year than in the ocean. In 1983, 10 Texas children under the age of four drowned in bathtubs--five of those infants were less than one month old.

> These statistics make water safety as important at home as it is in pools and lakes. Children can drown in very small amounts of water in just a few unsupervised minutes. The smaller a child is, the quicker he will drown or suffer brain damage.

> Bathrooms are one of the most dangerous places for toddlers to explore. Baylor College of Medicine pediatricians offer these safety tips: Never leave children, even togeth-

er, alone in the bathtub, keep toilet seat covers down to prevent toddlers from playing with the water; they may fall in and injure themselves, set the hot water heater temperature between 105 and 120 degrees to decrease the chance of scalding, and watch toddlers carefully on slick floors or other surfaces because it is easy for them to fall and suffer a head injury.

More than 500 Texans died last year during recreational water activities. Half of them were adults, many of whom did not know how to swim.

Recreational water accidents, like home accidents, can be prevented by following suggestions such as these:

Take swimming lessons offered by community organizations or at least learn how to "dog paddle" or float, equip home pools with a first-aid kit, a life preserver, a long pole and a list of emergency phone numbers, secure home pools with a four-foothigh fence and a locking gate, avoid diving into shallow water which can result in a broken neck and permanent paralysis, never swim or dive under the influence of alcohol, and stock all boats with life jackets designed specifically for passengers' weight and height.

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the legislature to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of officers, employees and agents of the state or its political subdivisions, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units authorized to make arrests, who die in the course of performing hazardous official duties. Payments to surviving spouses and dependent children of

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of these counties would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties the Lieutenant Governor until of the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. The amendment would permit mutual insurance companies to bid for those policies.

to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 prooses a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the

maximum deduction is now \$75. proposed constitutional The amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."

Treatment for drugs involves entire family

Effective treatment of drug and alcohol abuse involves the patient's entire family and deals simultaneously with all substances being taken, according to an article in Texas Medicine.

"The basic assumption is that the entire family is affected by the chronic drug abuse of one or more of its members," wrote Dr. Stuart S. Nemir, a psychiatrist, and Dr. Charles McDonald a psychologist, both of Austin

Family members can learn how they may be contributing to the patient's problem and how they can change this, the doctors said.

They also noted that treatment programs no longer focus on alcohol as the primary drug of abuse. A wide range of abused drugs--both prescription and illegal, often combined with alcohol--are now dealt with in the same program, the doctors said.

Their article appeared in the June issue of Texas Medicine, the journal of the Texas Medical Association.

Nemir and McDonald said the primary goal of chemical-abuse treatment is to get the person off drugs without triggering withdrawal symptoms. 'The process is complete when the patient is mentally clear, is off all medications used for detoxification, and has been restored to physical health.

Restoring physical health involves an exercise program, balanced meals, vitamin supplements, and sufficient

Another goal of treatment is to break through the isolation and loneliness that keep the patient separate from others and make him unable to accept the help needed to begin recovery.

"To do this," the doctors said, "the patient must explore changes in the lifestyle and personal associations which might lead to a return to drug taking." And, they added, new ways of having fun must be learned. Group and individual therapy may be involved.

"There is also a grieving process over the loss of the drug and the lifestyle associated with it," the doctors said, explaining that this is similar to losing a significant person in one's life.

The treatment also teaches the patient how to manage stress and crisis more effectively, the doctors said. Finally, the patient learns the signs of a possible return to drug abuse and its consequences.


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



