State education commissioner visits **Muleshoe Independent School District**

The Muleshoe Independent School District welcomed Texas State Commissioner of Education Dr. Shirley Neeley during a luncheon that followed a meeting with MISD faculty and administrators Thursday.

The event, which was triggered a month ago by a visit to Texas School Board member Bob Craig of Lubbock to discuss education and TAKS preparation concerns, allowed educators to voice their concerns faceto-face with the education commissioner.

While talking about the Texas Education Agency, Dr. Neeley said she was trying to make it a "kinder, gentler agency," and said the TEA needed to be service oriented.

"The kind of dialogue to day is what's needed across the state," Neeley

Neeley praised MISD and it's employees, saying she would carry a report about successes here to others. noting there was a "real sense of family" in the school district.

Burn ban in place for 90 days

Whereas, the Bailey County Commissioner's Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning;

It is hereby ordered by the Commissioners' Court of Bailey County that all outdoor burning, including fireworks, is prohibited in the unincorporated area of the county for 90 days from the date of adoption of this order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code ss. 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for: (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Natural Resources Code ss. 153.048, and meet the standards of Natural Resources Code ss. 153.047.

In accordance with Local Government Code ss. 352.081(h), a violation of this order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500. Adopted this 9th day of January, 2006.

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
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Higher credit card rates not a figment of imagination

Wildfires may injure cattle

Analyzing injuries to cattle following a wildfire is important to minimize losses, said a Texas Cooperative Extension specialist.

"It might look like they've made it and there was no visible physical damage," said Dr. Floron "Buddy" Faries, Extension program leader for veterinary medicine. "However, it's important to have them looked at by a veterinarian as soon as possible because there could be secondary problems that lead to infections and further problems."

Wildfires have ripped across thousands of acres of ranchland, trapping cattle and causing injuries, and in some cases death, said Ron Gill, Extension livestock specialist in Stephenville.

In one case, the producer lost about 50 head of cattle. Other producers reporting secondary problems, such as scorched or burned cattle.

"One of the problems we've run into in the past is with the feet," Gill said. "It may take 10 days to two weeks for the damage to start showing. The cattle will start sloughing the hoof wall and become cripple."





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
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Christ's Sacrifice Is Indeed All-sufficient

A friend e-mailed me a few days ago for help in finding the source of a quotation from C. S Lewis.

Whatever the source, it's vintage Lewis: "When a man is getting better, he understands more and more clearly the evil that is still left in him. When a man is getting worse, he understands his own badness less and less. A moderately bad man knows he is not very good; a thoroughly bad man thinks he is alright."

Another Lewis quotation stands well alongside the one above: "Of all bad men, religious bad men are the worst." Jesus was speaking to this latter class of bad person when he

said, "You travel over land and sea to win a single convert, and when he becomes one, you make him twice as much a son of hell as you are" (Matthew 23:15).

You see, the aim of religion is to make us like the God we serve, and if our God, Jehovahthe God of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, Paul, and all of our forefathers in the faith—is the one true God, then our religion is all about how we can be made like Jehovah.

Okay. But what's God like? According to the Scriptures, our God is absolutely holy, absolutely loving, absolutely just, absolutely gracious, absolutely—well, absolutely perfect. That sounds absolutely wonderful, until we realize that no human can reach that standard. We have an absolutely perfect God. But imperfect as we are, we can in no way stand before

that kind of holy perfection.

We were in a pickle, and no way out-until God did for us what we could never do for ourselves. "When the time had fully come," God sent his perfect Son, to live with us, to die for us as the perfect sacrifice for sin, to literally take away all of our sin and guilt on the cross, and to be raised to new life by the Spirit of God. Because he died, we live. Because he was raised to new life, we live new lives filled with his Spirit and we become heirs of life eternal. Note clearly: God does this all. We can neither add to nor take away from what Jesus has already done for us on the cross in his once-for-all sacrifice.

And now, back to those quotations. If our religion is, at heart, all about us-all about rules, all about rituals, and very little at all about relationship with Godour religion becomes that which we use to keep God away. Sadly, it will work. Convert someone to that kind of religion, and you've not blessed him.

But if our religion is about the relationship the Father longs to have with his children, the relationship he gave his own Son to make a reality, then the wonderful news of the gospel is that we can indeed have that relationship. And so can everyone else.

The more like Christ you and I become, the more clearly we'll see how very far we have to go to be completely "transformed" into his likeness. It's a far longer trip than we'd imagined. But it's also far more joyful because God is the one holding our hand as he leads and empowers us to take one step at a time.

We could never "get there" on our own. But God's people are never on their own. Those who make Christianity just one more self-help program understand neither the power of the cross, the love of Christ, nor the depth of their own need.

Eligibility — Any boy or girl who is a member of the 4-H, or FFA, whose projects are supervised by the county extension agent or vocational agricultoral teachers of Bailey County and attend school in Bailey County and academically qualified as passing, is eligible to show in the Bailey County Junior Livestock Show. An exhibitor not passing academically is ineligible to participate; however, the animal will be allowed to show by a qualified exhibitor approved by the department superintendent. An exhibitor must be nine years of age by Sept. 1, or in the 3rd grade, to be able to participate in the show. Hardship cases will be considered on a case-by-case basis. Hardship cases must be approved on or before the December board meeting after entry dead1ine. If for any reason an exhibitor cannot show his/her animal, the exhibitor must submit a substitute exhibitor to the department superintendent for approval. Superintendent's decision will be final. For any exhibitor not meeting these requirements, the animal will be disqualified from competition.

Ownership of animals — Exhibitors must have owned their steers, pigs, lambs, goats, and heifers and have had them in their care no later than the validation deadline for each specie. Exhibitors must be bonafide members of a Bailey County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter. Exhibitors must have continuously, personally, fed and cared for their animals under the direct non-refundable. supervision of the CEA or an AST. Steer: June 30, 2005, Heifers:
