Radio and television while being listened to by as much as 73 percent of Texas consumers and seen by at least that many people, nevertheless, must divide those numbers by dozens of stations and channels. And the most watched cable television channels of all don't even accept advertising.





Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Though we have had only light showers here in Ozona they have

given us the courage and urge to

continue gardening chores. In the fall well cared for roses have: more perfect form, more free of windl and cold damage and deeper and richer in color. Trees put on their best: show with the display of so many different varieties and colors in leaves before they fall.

Summer-growing bulbs that rest in winter that have not already died down naturally, should be encouraged to do so by gradually reducing the water supply and finally with holding it. Amaryillis, caladiums, tuberous begonias etc. Sweet peas planted in September may be expected to bloom from Christmas on.

Young plants of snapdragons, pansies, stock and calendulas may be planted now if not very hot and shave them lightly for several days.

If you want to fill in vacant spaces You may move well-budded naums: into pots. Do this in cloudy weather if possible, and soak plants the day before transplanting and again for several days. Stake if needed.

For best results, hedges of al'l kinds should receive their final trimming this month and next-never shear a plant unless you are planning a formal hedge.

If you are interested in growing dahlias there is an interesting article in the September Southern Living that will help you in cleansing the colors and kinds you may want for mext year. They bloom their best in the Autumn. Before nighttime temperatures fall below 55 degrees and its time to bring in houseplants, give thern a good evaluation. Often, ragged-looking plants need to be thrown away. Other plants may need spraying for insects and still others need repotting. Give them time to recover from repotting or age. While half of all users take only spraying before being brought in-

Soak sweet peas in water 24 to 48 hours, prior to planting in wellprepared, well drained beds in full sun. They seem to thrive in our soil.

> If you take vitamins and minerals without consulting a physician, be cautious. The FDA has only limited authority to regulate supplements, except for those intended for children under 12 or for pregnant or lactating women. The FDA is not allowed to limit the combination or number of vitamins, minerals or other ingredients in a supplement product.

> Most supplement products are safe, since they contain modest amounts of vitamins and minerals which approximate the U.S. Recommended Daily Allowance (RDA). However, higher potency products can be a cause for concern, she says.

For example, extremely high potency selenium products were recalled by member of society. the FDA this spring because they advertising and promotions as well as resulted in the loss of hair and other experience: professional expertise of adverse effects.

Even when supplements are safe. they may not be everything they claim to be. Small, high-priced tablets of dried vegetables were sold last year with the claim that they were a substitute for vegetables for those interested in a healthful diet to prevent cancer. With an increasing amount of nutrition material in the media and health claims in advertisements, distinguishing sound from unsound information is difficult, says Marilyn

Learning something about nutrition is worthwhile, she says, since misinformation can aggravate or create health problems. Diseases like diabetes or cancer can worsen if you ignore medical diagnosis and treatment in favor of a "miracle victim cure."

Taking large amounts of vitamins in the mistaken notion that this will improve your health can also affect medical tests, says the nutritionist. In the case of diabetes, too much vitamin C can give a false positive or a false negative on some urine tests for diagnosis and management of the

Fad weight-loss diets can even lead to disease, notes Haggard. For example, it's possible to starve to death on macrobiotic brown rice diet.

Even if misinformation doesn't directly affect your health, it may cause you to waste money on unnecessary food, gadgets and vitamins. Or you may trade good food habits for poor ones and a balanced diet for an





About 75 percent of the water used in the home is used in the bathroom. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce lists the following ways that water use can be decreased and your water bill reduced without any great

Repairing leaky faucets can result in large water savings. A slow drip can waste as much as 170 gallons each day, or 5,000 gallons per month. Repairing a faucet which leaks a small drop can save you \$10.00 or more per month on your water bill.

Your toilets may be leaking and need repairs and you may not know it. Add a few drops of food coloring in the storage reservoir. If the

And with football season upon us, special television presentations of networks could boost the cost of check your water meter. If it continwatching the games on your television

colored water moves into the toilet bowl between flushings, you will know you have a leak. Repairing a leaking toilet can result in a decrease in water use and a savings of several dollars a month on your water bill.

Using the toilet as a trash disposal for facial tissue and other trash results in many unnecessary flushes. Each time you dispose of trash in a trash basket instead of flusing the commode, you save 5 gallons or more of water. Three or four unnecessary flushes per day would result in a waste of 400 to 500 gallons of water per month.

Bathing in the shower instead of the bathtub will reduce water use by 5 to 10 gallons.

Shampooing your hair while taking a shower will require only a little more water than a normal shower and save the 10 to 20 gallons of water normally used in a separate sham-

Ponding water in the basin for handwashing or shaving instead of letting the faucet run will reduce water use for these activities by

When brushing your teeth, turn need to rinse your toothbrush, rinse your mouth or clean the sink rather thirds for most folks.

Ten to twelve percent of in-home water use takes place in the kitchen.

Running water from the tap until it is cool enough to drink is probably the easiest waste habit to break. This can be done by storing water for drinking in the refrigerator. If you have problems remembering, tie a With such an added local sales colored ribbon on the faucet to remind you of the nice cool water in the refrigerator.

Wait until you have a full load of dishes before using your automatic dishwasher. Not only will you save water, but you will save expensive detergent and energy.

The washing machine constitutes from 12 to 14 percent of in-home water use. Automatic washing machines use 30 to 60 gallons per load, so it is important to wash full loads to obtain maximum benefits from your water, energy and detergent.

If you implement a good water conservation program in your home but still find your water consumption is high, you might have a water leak between your meter and the house. It is easy to check. Turn off all faucets, indoors and out, and then ues to run, you have a leak and need

Policy change announced by V.A. head

A recent policy change announced by VA Administrator, Harry N. Walters, will cap premium rates of National Service Life Insurance term policy holders at the age 70 rate.

As of September 1, 1984, any veteran renewing an active NSLI term insurance policy after age 70 will have the monthly premium permanently capped at \$6.18 per \$1000 of insurance. For those veterans who renewed their policies at age 71 or beyond, premiums will be rolled back to the age 70 rate effective September 1, 1984. The VA has over a million term policies now in effect and expects that 50,000 veterans will benefit from the premium cap in 1984.

Approximately one out of every three veterans who still carry their insurance initially chose the term plan in lieu of a permanent plan because it offers lower rates for younger veterans. However, the term insurance increases at each five-year renewal and, by the time a veteran policyholder is 70 and beyond, the costs are quite burdensome.

The VA is able to take this action, which involves no cost to the taxpayer, because of several factors:

Veterans are living longer and are paying premiums for a longer period of time than was expected when the rates were set in the 1940's, earnings from the reserves in the trust fund have been higher than expected, and dividends normally paid to policyholders whose premiums will now be capped can be used to cover additional costs which may result from freezing



"It wasn't always this way; the growing interest and use in horses has occurred in the last two decades. The first half of this century saw horses and mules go into a real decline with mechanization of the state's agricul-

"In 1920, the horse and mule population in Texas was 1,837,294 head. By 1959, when census of equines by USDA was discontinued, the population had declined to 237,615

"The horse census was discontinued at that time 'due to the obsolescence of horses for farming

them interlocked or overlapping. "Poor nutrition, in itself, can cause low-fertility and it can increase susceptibility to a variety of diseases which lower fertility. Diseases horses are susceptible to, and they are many, even include venereal disease.

'Our research on reproduction in mares includes a variety of studies to determine what level of nutrition is best for the brood mare, before and after foaling; both artificial insemination and embryo transfer problems; and what factors affect rappid settling of a filly or mare, as well as speedy rebreeding after foaling.

'Factors affecting stallion reproductive performance, both natural and organizatin in every county in Texas. artificial inseminatin, are being researched in several different ways, including, for example the influence of blood protein on the motility and viability of equine spermatozoa.



IRS suggests guidelines for tax shelter investments

Careful tax planners are thinking about next April's tax bill right now. It pays to be wise to the strict new penalties dealing with abusive tax shelters and avoid the promise of tremendous tax write-off ratios as the sole reason to invest.

The Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982 (TEFRA) makes participation in abusive tax shelters more hazardous than ever, with penalties and interest approaching 50% when IRS disallows the

IRS defines abusive tax shelters as marketing schemes that involve artificial transactions with little or no economic reality, frequently making use of unrealistic allocations, inflated appraisals, or losses in connection with nonrecourse loans.

Investing in an abusive tax shelter may be an expensive proposition when all of the consequences are considered, IRS noted. For example, the promoter generally charges a substantial fee. If the return is examined by the IRS and a tax deficiency is determined, the taxpayer will then be faced with pay-

Cowboy tickets taxed

However, one should ask the following questions, which might provide a clue to the abusive nature of the plan:

Do the promised tax benefits far outweigh the economic benefits?

Is this a transaction you would seriously consider, apart from the tax benefits, if you hoped to make a

Do shelter assets really exist and are they insured for less than their purchase price?

Is there a nontax justification for the way profits and losses are allocated to partners?

Do the facts and supporting documents make economic sense? In that connection, are there sales and resales of the tax shelter property at ever increasing prices?

Does the investment plan involve a gimmick, device, or sham to hide the economic reality of the transac-

Does the promoter offer to backdate documents after the close of the year and are you instructed to backdate checks covering your invest-

Is your debt a real debt or are you assured by the promoter that you will never have to pay it?

The watchword when evaluating investment prospectuses is that, if something sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

Survivor benefits payable

Social Security benefits can be paid to many survivors of workers who die after working long enough in work covered by Social Security, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently.

These survivors include the worker's unmarried children under 18, under 19 if a full-time high school student or over 18 if disabled before reaching 22; a parent caring for a child under 16 or disabled; who gets benefits; a widow or widower 60 or older, or 50 or over if severely disabled; and dependent parents 62 or older.

In addition, a surviving divorced wife or husband can generally get the same benefits as widow or widower if the marriage to the worker lasted 10 years or more.

A lump-sum payment of \$255 can be made to the worker's eligible widow or widower, or, if none, to the worker's child entitled to benefits.

It is important for survivors to apply for benefits as soon as possible after the worker's death. This is especially important for widows and widowers under 65 because benefits cannot generally be paid before the month of application.

When applying, survivors should have their own and the worker's Social Security cards or a record of the numbers, birth certificates for any eligible children, marriage certificate, proof of the worker's death, proof of age for the widow or widower, and Forms W-2 or self-employment tax returns for the past 2 years. Parents 62 or older will need to show they were dependent on the worker for their support.
