Making plans for a ski trip proved to be a lot more fun than actually doing it last week. At least for me it turned out that way. I am probably the only ski school dropout in Ozona. After about an hour and a half of instruction and a dozen falls, I decided it was much wiser to be a live coward than a dead hero, and I quit.

In the first place, I was over-dressed. Having never been on a pair of snow skis or on a mountain covered with snow, I had to depend on my experienced companions to tell me what to wear. They put me in men's long underwear (two-piece) the top came about to mid-thigh. The bottoms came considerably above the waist. Next came a turtle-neck sweater and wool knee socks. Then came the ski pants. I borrowed Janice Marley's ski suit and it would zip up when I first tried it. However, with all the extra innerwear, it took three of us to zip the pants up. Then came the heavy jacket with a fur collar yet. Heavy leather gloves, a wool cap and ski boots completed the outfit. I could hardly move. The boots were made out of some rigid material which didn't give at all and they came up to my knees. I was a walking zombie. Since I couldn'+ bend over, someone buckled my boots and snapped my skis onto same, and before I knew what was taking place, I was in the beginners ski school.

There were eleven students in my class. The instructor lined us up on the baby slope. The guy on one end fell down and it was just like a row of oes. I happened to be tenth in line, and I knew what was happening but there was little I could do about it. That was just the first of many falls. After about an hour of learning to balance, not to look at your ski tips and not to depend on your poles to hold you up, we were ready for our first slope. I got off to a flying start, but I couldn't stop and the first thing I knew, I was down in the snow again.

This time I could see the handwriting on the wall. I could hardly hold on commercial angora goats and 5 steers. When I got to the top, I took off my skis and parked them, and headed for the restaurant fools of themselves. A lot of them were being carried off on stretchers. I can't say I would ever call that fun.

We left Ozona at noon Thursday and were bouncing around in a Wagoneer for seven or eight hours. When we got to Ruidoso and found the group of condos where we had reservations, we found ours with beds stripped, the linens dirty, and the music on. We were sent to three others and found them in the same condition. In desperation, we checked in at the Ruidoso Inn. Nobody was happy with the rooms because they thought we should all be together. We finally arranged for another condo. I had turned the bedspread back and collapsed, but they got me up and I hastily made the bed. We got everything together before I discovered my glasses were missing. A thorough search turned them up under the pillow. We were off again and finally ended up in a really lovely condo.

Jerry Perry is well-known for never had hardly closed our eyes before we were awakened by the television ski report and Jerry pouring coffee. It was long before daylight, but he already had his ski suit on and was prodding

us to do likewise. It was the same thing the next morning, however, I had already declared my intention to stay behind. To my surprise I found Willa still in her bed when I finally dragged my bruised and aching body to the kitchen for coffee. David Marrs came by and took us to lunch. He is selling log homes, in Ruidoso, and after lunch he showed us every homesite in that Davee. county. It was up one mountain and down the other for hours in another 4-wheel drive vehicle. We were almost convinced we should buy some property and settle in that beautiful country. but everytime I seriously considered it, I would look up at that big white

Chemical truck

A tank truck carrying hazardous chemicals overturned between Ozona and Sonora early Saturday morning, and traffic on I-10 had to be rerouted for several hours.

The accident occured about 7 miles west of Sonora on I-10, causing some residents to be evacuated within six miles of the spill. The driver, 25-yearold John Keller of Houston was in critical condition with chemical burns and was flown to brooke Army Burn Center in San Antonio. Another Houston man who was a passenger in the truck was treated and released at the Sonora hospital.

BEYOND DETENTE

Though the Reagan administration's performance in the foreign policy arena has been somewhat inconsistent, President Reagan has left his indelible mark on international affairs in one important way: he has publicly ecognized the Soviet Union for what it is and has acted accordingly

Some of this has been in the area of rhetoric, which, though it may offend some of the delicate-of-heart, is an important part of foreign policy. And Ronald Reagan was absolutely correct when he stood before the world and called the Soviet Union "an evil empire.

Part of this also has been in terms of recognizing the weaknesses and vulnerabilities of the Soviet empire. While the freeing of tiny Grenada from a band of Soviet imitators is hardly in league with the liberation of Guadalcanal, it shows that the Reagan administration recognizes that Soviet expansionism is neither inevitable nor irreversible — and is prepared to take advantage of appropriate opportunities to accelerate the roll-back of communism.

That's the message too from a blue-ribbon study panel which met with President Reagan at the White House the week after the election.

Led by John Fisher of the American Security Council, one of the country's most knowledgeable and experienced national security specialists and someone who is often out-of-step with the flagellating detente-ists in the foreign service establishment — the high-level group said it was now time for the United States to move beyond detente, and mount a non-provocative campaign to turn the tide against world communism.

The study panel came armed with a plan, spelled out in detail in a 204-page report, A Strategy for Peace Through Strength.

"If the conflict between the Free World and communism is to be ended without war — then the Soviet leadership must be persuaded that it s more profitable for them to give up the goal of world domination than

to continue seeking it," the report says. "This we can persuade them of firstly by being so strong militarily that they dare not attack us, and secondly by going on the ideological offensive by developing democracy worldwide while exploiting Soviet vulnerabilities: in other words, a policy of military defense, political

The resources of the United States and its allies are superior to those the Soviet bloc, the study panel told the president. "What we have

acked so far is the understanding, will, and organization to use them.' The plan outlined by Fisher has four major elements: 1) rebuilding .S. defenses, with special emphasis on defending the U.S. population against Soviet missiles and bombers; 2) supporting anti-Communist freedom fighters in an effort to roll back communism "around its edges"; 3) a stepped-up program of "public diplomacy," aimed at carrying the message of freedom to people within the Soviet bloc; and 4) establishing an Office of Strategic Trade that would help see that the U.S. and its allies don't prop up the anemic Soviet economy with high-tech sales and giveaways

and cheap credit. The study panel also calls on the administration to reassert the Monroe Doctrine by declaring the Americas a "Communist-free peace zone," and to establish a National Strategy Advisory Board to coordinate the long-term effort.

If the Soviet Union decides to compete economically and in the market place of ideas with the West the world will be a safer place.

Until then — so long as the Kremlin continues its international adventurism and internal repression — the United States must continue to follow the advice of the Fisher panel, and follow a policy of military defense, political offense.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Lyndell Williams

AUSTIN-The New Year's holi- a renewed surge of party infighting. day combined with a brief snow storm to slow down government and political activity at the Capitol last

Three inches of snow fell onto the unprepared city and state employees were sent home to safety.

Meanwhile, falling oil prices on the world market continued to cause concern among the Legislature's leadership on the effect of the decline on dwindling state revenues.

Governor Mark White, along with governors of several other states, questioned whether President Reagan's budget and tax proposals would cause yet more loss of state government dollars.

White asked the 30-state Interstate Oil Compact Commission to form a task force to study the impact of the tax revision proposals to determine whether they will further depress oil and gas production in Texas.

Revenue Sharing

Two other federal budget proposals worry Texas officials: the elimination of the federal revenue-sharing program within three years and the repeal of itemized deductions for state and local taxes.

The revenue-sharing program allocates millions to cities for such basic services as schools, police protection and sanitation. The elimination's effect would be either a cutback in services at the local level or an increase of state and local taxes to pick up the burden.

eliminate the tax exemption for interest on bonds issued by state and local agencies, a method of raising money for housing and other loans.

Texas Unemployment

Unemployment figures for Texas were reported a little higher in November, and the Texas Employment Commission reported it was due to an increase in workers looking for temporary Christmas work.

Nearly half a million workers, or 435,100, were reported unemployed, a rate of 5.4 percent. The McAllen-Pharr-Edinburg area

suffered the highest jobless rate of 21.1 percent.

Other Rio Grande River towns showed rates in the high teens, while cities in the refinery areas of Beaumont-Port Arthur had a jobless rate over ten percent.

GOP Director Leaves

The executive director of the Texas Republican Party said last week he will leave his job in March to direct the political committee of New York Congressman Jack Kemp.

Presumably, the committee is a prelude to Kemp's candidacy for president in '88, and the addition of John Maxwell would increase Kemp's hopes of carrying Texas.

Maxwell is highly regarded for his work at Texas GOP headquarters over the past two years. In his statement, Maxwell warned against

State Sued

A state employees union last week filed a lawsuit against the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, alleging the Austin State Hospital harassed workers who reported poor condi-

The lawsuit claims the workers were disciplined after they became active in a Texas State Employees Union effort to prove the hospital violated a federal court agreement calling for improved patient care and higher staff-to-patient ratios.

The alleged harassment resulted in one employee being fired for absenteeism, two employees being put on six-months probation for engaging in union activities during work hours, and one employee budget,

being transferred involuntarily from night to day shift.

Prison Plan

A federal judge last week approved a plan to cut down on guard-against-inmate brutality in Texas prisons, but he warned prison officials against evading the plan's terms by claiming they don't have enough money.

U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice, who's court ordered prison reforms a few year's ago marked the beginning of a scandalridden scenario in the prison system, ordered the anti-brutality plan implemented immediately.

A prison spokesman said the Texas Department of Corrections is now caught in a squeeze between Judge Justice on one hand and the Texas Legislature which must approve the

Parents who consider safety when buying their children's toys, or who carefully keep small objects out of the reach of little hands, often forget to use the same caution in preparing children's food.

"Food asphyxiation accounts for as many childhood deaths annually as poisoning, says Dr. Mary Ann Heuss-Another article on seed basics, lets ner, a health education specialist

About 66 to 77 children die by choking on food each year, she reports. A recent study of childrn's food-related choking fatalities conducted by John Hopkins University found that more than 90 percent of the victims were under five, Heussner says. The risk was highest in one- and two-year olds and dropped substantially at age three.

The children choked most often on hot dogs. Other foods on the list were candy, peanuts, and other nuts, grapes, cookies, meat, carrots, apples, popcorn and peanut butter, she notes.

Foods such as peanuts or hard, round candies should not be given to children younger than four or five, she advises. Foods that must be chewed should not be given to children until they have developed a complete set of teeth around age two.







highest bidder. Because of consumer demand for housing, highways, golf courses, parks, and other elements of urban uses, the highest bidders are usually developers especially in the rural-

urban fringe. DAL has a long controversial history in the South. Florida was the first Southern state to enact a DAL program in 1959, while Georgia was the last in 1983.

Three basic types of DAL are employed in the South. The least restrictive is preferential assessment, followed by deferred taxation, and then restrictive agreements.

Preferential assessment is the simplest type of DAL found in the South, according to Stoll.

Under preferential assessment, eligible and participating tracts of land are valued for tax purposes according to current use instead of fair market value, determined by urban development prospects or other alternative uses. Participation in the program is generally voluntary.

Preferential assesment represents a permanent tax break equal to the taxes saved by assessing land according to use value rather than market value. Five Southern states authorize preferential assessment of eligible land: Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma, and West Virginia.

The information sheets should be filled in as completely as possible, Hickey stressed. Each soil sample should be marked with the producer's name and sample number, which should correspond to the number on the information sheet. People with persistent tinnitus often seek medical attention from an otolaryngologist, a physician who specializes in ear, nose and throat problems. Some medications may provide relief, but many times there is no simple

Some measures may be recommended to reduce the tension and anxiety caused by tinnitus, and biofeedback exercise may help a person live more comfortably with it.

Many patients find relief by playing background music to mask the unwanted sounds. "White noise," such as low-volume static between FM stations, also can provide considerable

Small electronic devices that produce white noise can be used on desk tops or miniaturized to fit into hearingaid shells (tinnitus maskers). Combined with a hearing aid, they are called tinnitus instruments.



Photographs preserve history

This project, "Images of Victorian Texas: 1860-1920," which has the support of many preservationist

groups throughout the state, aims to locate photographs of the interiors of Texas buildings, especially houses, taken before 1920. These interior views show what kinds of furniture, draperies, carpets and accessories were in use at a point in time in a specific place. They document characteristic room arrangements, seasonal changes, special efforts to accommodate the climate as well as ethnic and regional variations in interiors. Such a comprehensive survey as well comprehensive survey of photographs of Texas interiors will enrich preserva-
