Benjamin Franklin said, in a letter to a French official in the year of 1789, .nothing in this world is certain but death and taxes.

I think he should have added "and higher utility bills." I guess in his time this was not a concern, but the past ten years have seen a dramatic increase in gas, electricity and telephone. The past two years have been the most expensive to the consumer in Texas. We have a governor who was elected on the false promise of holding the line where utilities was concerned but during his tenure in office utilities costs have increased, indeed doubled. This is a mystery to most people in this part of the state, as gas wells are shut in and oil prices are down.

Nobody seems to be able to explain this mystery. With a glut of oil on the world market you would think the consumer would get some relief. However, when you complain about vour electric bill, you are told the company needs the money to complete the building of its coal-fired plant in Oklaunion (wherever that is). They have removed the fuel adjustment factor (which I never understood) from the bills consumers receive, but the total cost continues to rise. Of course, with the cost increase the tax increas-

The gas bill at the Stockman last month was almost \$80 and the month before it was \$15. We have had some really cold weather since that time and I shudder to think what it will be this month. When I questioned it. I was told the cost of gas fluctuates and that the cost of Texas gas in the east was much less than the cost of gas paid by Texans. Not wanting to sound uninformed, I went away scratching my head and saying "oh I see, I see,"

when I really don't see at all. The bill for electricity at my home last month was a fairly decent amount, considering the high cost of living, but this month was a different story. I got it today and it had doubled to just under a C-bill. I can't understand this since I'm never at home to speak of. I don't cook on my electric range, I keep my thermostat at 60 degrees and off at night, I only use my hot water for a bath a day and seldom use but one light. I do watch television, but could that account for such an increase? Also, I've been using my fireplace for heat. I fail to see how that could affect my utility bills in any way but lowering the cost. So far, it's had little effect. This coming month I am going to use candelight and heat my bath water by the fireplace.

Speaking of taxes, the outlook looks bleak at the state and federal level. After passing the largest tax bill in the history of the state, lawmakers in Austin are trying to rake up more money. Almost every agency has submitted an excessive budget, with the exception of the Comptroller. In a news release, Bob Bullock announced he is closing eight offices and reducing his workforce by 104 people in an effort to help the state meet its budget crisis. It's too bad more department heads don't follow suit.

We are already feeling tax reform at the federal level, having to keep mileage logs on our business vehicles. However, it's rather educational. It's exactly a mile from my house to the office. It's 4 tenths of a mile to the post office and just under 200 miles to take the paper to be printed, pick it up and return to Ozona. You learn something new everyday as the old saying goes. Crockett County collected \$6,379.71 in tax revenue from the sale of mixed alcoholic drinks for the fourth quarter of 1984. Of that amount, 15% or \$1,256.96 was remitted by the state to the county.

This is an oddity, since Crockett County is a dry county. The surrounding counties, which are in the "wet" column, all collected less with the exception of Sutton County where a little over \$1,000 more was collected.

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#### **UNDERSTANDING POVERTY**

Undoubtedly, we will be hearing much in the months ahead about the social "safety net" as Congress and the administration consider a variety of measures to bring government spending under control

Some of the programs reportedly targeted for cutbacks or extinction date back to the 1960s when the architects of Lyndon Johnson's "Great Society" decided the U.S. could effectively fight poverty by throwing money at the poor

As a considerable body of literature now shows, however, the hundreds of billions of dollars that went into the war on poverty have not dramatically reduced the size of the poverty population

Many reasons have been suggested. One theory, brilliantly argued by Charles Murray in his new book, Losing Ground American Social Policy 1950-1980 is that the welfare system as it exists today leads to dependency. Another view, detailed by former California welfare official Charles Hobbs. holds that much of the money intended to fight poverty never reaches the streets, but is consumed instead by what he calls the "welfare industry

Washington analyst Anna Kondratas offers another theory. Kondratas posits that the United States appears to be on a poverty treadmill because benefits are targeted according to statistical models that "disregard the dynamics of poverty

In 1983. Kondratas notes in a recent study, federal, state and local governments spent \$107.5 billion on the major means-tested welfare

programs In fact, she notes, one in five Americans approximately 42-million people received at least one form of welfare that year

Had the money been given outright to the 35.3 million people in the official Census Bureau poverty population, each person would have received approximately \$3,048. And a family of four would have received \$12.192 well above the official poverty threshold for a family of four.

which stood at \$10,178 in 1983 Kondratas notes that there is actually a large turnover in the "poverty" population from year to year. According to researchers at the University of Michigan, as many as one-half of the poor in a given year are not poor the next. As others replace them, usually temporarily, the official


numbers create an illusion of persistent poverty The Michigan data suggest, Kondratas says, that the persistently poor an "underclass" that stays poor from year to year, and perhaps generation to generation - may number less than 3 percent of the U.S. population, far less than the 15.2 percent currently cited as the official mark.


"But the welfare system keeps growing, as the official poverty figures are taken as a barometer of the need for spending," she notes.

Kondratas says, "The system already serves one in five Americans, yet liberals insist we are not spending enough. We are spending enough, but we are targeting poorly

'In fact, because the poverty statistics disregard the dynamics of poverty, we do not even know just what it is we are trying to solve. If we continue along the present path, we will probably make the war on poverty unwinnable," she says.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN**—Texas Comptroller Bob Bullock rocked the Capitol complex on its heels last week with his own unique method of trimming fat from govern-

Bullock, before anyone could recover from the shock, cut 127 employees from his payroll and closed 12 regional offices, including some in Dallas, San Antonio, Fort Worth and Houston.
While Bullock says that he's

now "down to the hare essentials of tax collecting; he still rules over a mighty force of 2,550 workers. Stories about Bullock's whims, crazylike-a-fox-tactics, and eccentricities are now legends among the Capitol crowd.

One favorite myth concerns former Bullock employee Bob Jordan, now the Deputy Commissioner for Budget and Plan-ning under Land Commissioner Gary Mauro, and a highly regarded figure at the Capitol. Jordan walked by a table one night where Bullock and his top aides were holding court, and Bullock, who harbored some anger then towards Jordan, told one to fire Jordan when he came to work the next

Hire and Fire "We can't do that. You fired

him last week," he was told. Well then, hire him back,

and fire him again," Bullock said, as the story goes. Several folks swear it's true to a reasonable degree. And if Bullock has fired his fair share of employees in his long tenure, he has also trained a majority of the Capitol work force. Many of former employees like



Q: My insurance company refuses to pay for damages incurred in an accident because it was not reported to the police within 24 hours. A friend had the identical situation and got paid by her company. Can my company refuse to pay?

A: The policy must be read to see what notice the company requires before it is liable to the insured. The company may insist that since you did not report the accident in time, they were not able to investigate

The courts hold fairly strictly against insurance companies in this sort of disagreement. Your company will have to pay unless they can prove they were harmed in some way by your failure to report immediately to the police.

Q: When can an individual under normal conditions and circumstances carry a firearm? Can I carry a firearm from one county to another?

A: A rifle with a barrel length greater than 16 inches or a shotgun with a barrel length greater than 18 inches may be generally carried except at a school. polling place, or court. A handgun may not be carried on or about your person unless you are:
1. Working in the armed forces or

for a prison;

2. On your own property: 3. Traveling (generally from your

residence to another county); 4. Hunting, fishing or target

shooting: 5. A peace officer:

6. A licensed security officer in uniform at work.

A convicted felon may not possess a firearm except at home. No one may possess explosives, machine guns, sawed-off firearms, silencers, switchblades, brass knuckles, armor piercing ammunition or tear gas.

Hiring Lid

Bullock's meat cleaver tactics combined with the warnings of the Legislature have caused several state agencies to impose a hiring freeze. Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower's office was the latest to join the freeze movement last week.

Two legislators, a Republican and a Democrat, have authored a bipartisan bill to eliminate about 20,000 state jobs through attrition. Eventually, no state agency could hire more than 100 employees per 10,000 Tex-

Two state employees groups, one a union, have asked for a stop to the massacre by calling for a task force to study ways

to cut staff. Bullock took a big political chance, some say, because the public is bound to ask: "What's he doing with all those extra employees in the first place." But Bullock also stands to make a good deal of political the man who wasn't afraid to admit and solve the problem. Texas Democrats probably owe him a big favor.

The Legislature

The Democratic Caucus in the Texas House of Representatives elected Rep. Gene Green of Houston as new majority leader. Green said he will try to persuade conservative Democrats from bolting to become Republicans, but that may not be necessary. Only one legislator, Rep. Gary Thompson of Abilene, is showing any signs of changing parties. The others are sticking to their guns, come what may, apparently.

House Speaker Gib Lewis predicted last week that Texas will have to impose both corporate and personal income taxes before the turn of the century, because tax revenues from oil and gas are running out. He also foresees substantial hikes in the sales tax, but still vows that no tax bill will be passed this session.

Split-Primary Bill

The notion of a Texas split primary election, that is, holding presidential and party pricome full circle.

Six years ago the "Killer Bees" of the Senate hid out to keep Republicans from profiting from a split primary. Then last week the titular head of the Texas GOP, Phil Gramm, strongly opposed the plan which was adopted recently by the Democrats.

Right now no one knows which party would be hurt and which would benefit. Certainly in the long run it would probably even out and the real winners would be independent conservative voters.

Incidentally, two former "Killer Bees" were defeated in November: Lloyd Dogget of Austin and Bill Patman of Ganado.

Mattox v. Mauro

Texas Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox issued an opinion last week that a Canadian citizen who served in the U.S. military has the right to participate in the Texas Veterans Land Program. But Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, who administers the program, disagrees, saying the exas Constitution specifically requires that participants be 'a citizen of the United States." The vet's application is on hold until the problem is worked

Mattox, meanwhile, told the Legislature that if it will give him \$500,000, he will track down some \$240,000 million owed the state in court judgments and penalties.

Hightower, Africans

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower has dubbed "Project Texas" his plan to seek \$3 million in donations from Texas farmers and ranchers to buy grain for starving Africans.

The money, about \$25 per producer, would buy a boatload, or about one million bushels, of Texas-grown grains to ship to Africa.

Also last week, Hightower urged farmers to "take up their pitchforks" and wage a "firstclass, full-scale rebellion" to save the embattled family farm system.

His anti-Reagan, anti-Washington tirade came during his Houston annual convention of the Texas Farmers Union.

#### WARRANG BARRANG BARRAN

Since the weatherman forecast the severe cold in early January for our area, it seems he has been very close again in his predictions for nearly all month. I'm ready for warmer weather. Someone asked the meaning of the

expression "suitable bulbs for naturalizing". These bulbs will adapt well to outside growing conditions and do not need dividing so often, every 4 or 5

If your pampas grass did not grow as it should, mulch around the plant to prevent roots from freezing, and use 1/2 cup of complete fertilizer to supply the necessary nutrients. It will need a few years to become well established. Divide old clumps before they become too congested and large.

Should your crepe myrtle be healthy and well cared for, but fails to bloom, perhaps they do not get enough sunlight. They should have at least six hours of full sun to bloom normally. Too much nitrogen fertilizer, and heavy pruning can also produce abundant vegetative growth and no

Another summer flowering shrub, the Tamarisk (salt cedar) may need the old growth pruned to the ground in late winter to increase blooms. This is a fast growing plant with tiny palepink flowers on the current season's growth.
