In other business, the board voted to ask for written documentation before sponsoring any out-of-town speaker or organization. This resolution, no doubt, came about due to the last minute cancellation of a speaker to inform Ozonans on the oil industry. The highly publicized event fell through when the chamber manager called for confirmation the very day of the meeting and discovered the speaker would not be available.

Sign renovation was discussed. Board members decided if maintenance or replacing the letters on the damage sign east of town was too expensive for the chamber budget, the remaining letters should be removed and the sign replaced with something more economical.

Bobby Aycock is working on a sign for north of Ozona on highway 163. He indicated the board might want to

replace the sign east of town along these lines, once the final figures are in.

Johnny Childress reported plans for the tennis tournament are right on schedule for June 8. Entry blanks are available at most businesses in Ozona and have been mailed to area towns. Also, news releases have been mailed to surrounding towns and cities. The tournament is to begin around 8:00 a.m. and will conclude that evening around 8 p.m.

In the area of new business, Beth Boyd reported work is underway on a new facts book for Ozona, and the books will be available around July 4.

Aycock reported on the West Texas Masters Track Meet, set for July 15. According to Aycock, it will be one of the biggest in the state with over 200 entries expected.

Wagoner-Perry Motor Co. is the new chamber member for the month. Ribbon cutting ceremonies for this new Ozona business will be held late in May or early June.

Thunderstorms abound all weekend here

Ozona weather in a word is "stormy." Thunderstorms with dazzling electrical displays plagued the town throughout the weekend with heavy rainfall early Monday. The storms came with howling winds that literally blew leaves from the trees.

A Monday midnight storm brought heavy hail to most of Ozona. The hail came during a thunderstorm which lasted the better part of two hours. Hail began to fall at 1:30 a.m. Tuesday and pounded the town for the better part of 15 minutes before it let up. Stones as large as golf balls were mixed with pea-size hailstones.

The official gauge at the Water District office amounted to .65 of an inch of moisture for the weekend, and only .20 of an inch from the latest storm. Heavier amounts of rainfall were reported in other parts of the county with up to 3 inches reported Monday at the Gene Perry Ranch.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR IN SITU BRINE MINING PERMIT

PERMIAN BRINE SALES, INC., Rt. 3, Box 3033, Odessa, Texas 79763 has applied to the Texas Department of Water Resources for a Class III brine permit (Proposed Permit No. BR50031) for the Ozona Brine Station which is currently operating under Department Rule 31 TAC Section 353.15. The proposed permit will authorize the production of 10 lb./gal. brine from a brine well located on a 5-acre permit area. Two freshwater wells drilled on the site supply fresh process water for the operation with one well also serving as a monitor well to detect any migration of brine solutions into overlying aquifers. Surface facilities consist of two freshwater storage tanks, one brine storage pond, two brine storage tanks, and an asphalt loading pad. The production zone is the Salado Salt Formation in the approximate subsurface interval between 855 and 1,060 feet. The surface injection pressure of the brine well is not to exceed a maximum of 400 psig. No surface discharge is authorized from any production or processing areas.

The Ozona Brine Station is on a 5-acre site approximately 0.4 mile west of the eastern junction of State Highway 137 and State Highway 190, approximately 22 miles northwest of Ozona. The brine well is located approximately 2,330 feet from the west line and 150 feet from the south line of Section 17, Block 51, of the University Lands Survey, Crockett County, Texas.

Legal Authority: Sections 26.028 and 270.18 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and Chapters 31 TAC 341 and 353 of the Rules of the Texas Department of Water Resources.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the permit decision, or that a public hearing would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application. Requests for a public hearing and/or requests for further information concerning any aspect of the application should be submitted in writing to the Chief Hearings Examiner, Texas Water Commission, P.O. 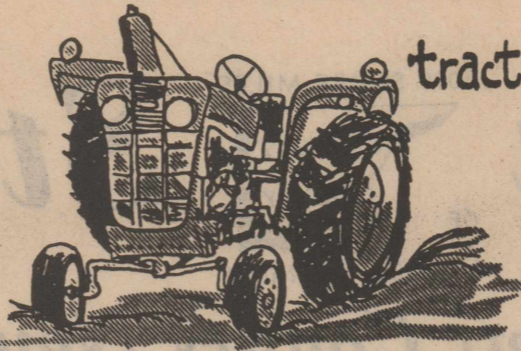
McBride named director of Loeffler committee

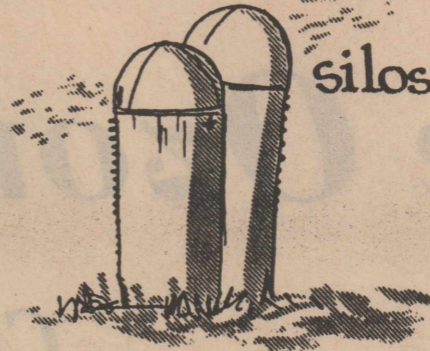

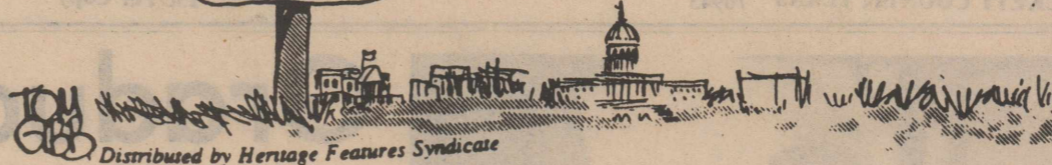

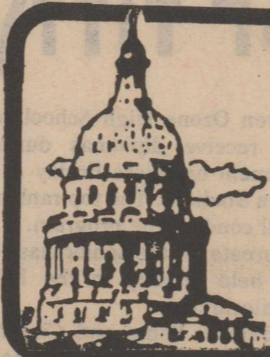

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STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Going into the final week, the business-like Texas Legislature showed all signs of avoiding a major tax increase, something that many said a few months ago could not be done.

All budget hopes rested in the conference committee which is trying to work out \$400 million worth of differences between the versions passed by the House and Senate.

The conferees once again are reviewing state agency budgets, searching for fat to trim, but one major issue is whether to give state employees a raise, and how much.

The House approved a three percent increase, the Senate provided none.

The governor has wisely avoided being drawn into the fray by groups wanting him to veto any budget without a built-in pay hike.

"I'm not promising any vetoes," he said. "We're trying to pass good legislation."

Blue Law Repeal

The Texas Blue Law moved closer to repeal when the Senate tacked on several amendments and sent it back to the House for concurrence.

The new law would allow Sunday sales for all products except automobiles. Present law bans the sale of 42 items on consecutive weekend days.

The measure, if it becomes law, is expected to add some \$24 million or more in sales tax revenues to state coffers strapped for cash.

Rural retailers fought the measure, and Biblical warnings of punishment for Sunday toilers were scattered throughout the debate. But the argument won out that new lifestyles, where both parents work in many families, make the old tradition burdensome.

Buckled Seats Belts

The House approved legislation which is sure to set many Texans to grumbling: a mandatory buckled seat belt law.

The good news for the grumblers is the new law would apply only to persons in the front seat. The bad news is a \$25 to \$50 fine if you're caught unbuckled.

A federal order has mandated that two-thirds of the U.S. population be protected through seat belt laws or installed air bags by 1989. Seat belts are cheaper.

Texas lawmakers, wary of the wrath of Texas pick-up truck drivers, tried to exempt certain types of trucks from the requirement with what came to be dubbed "the Bubba amendment."

"Bubba may think he's got a right to drive 75 mph and drink a six-pack of beer driving into the sunset. But Bubba doesn't have the right to injure you or himself on the highway. We outlawed suicide a long time ago," said Bill Messer, the sponsor.

Prison Lawsuit Settlement

State officials last week signed an agreement to end the costly prison system lawsuit and send it to the federal judge who rocked the legislature six years ago with court-ordered reforms.

The proposal calls for an 11.7 percent reduction in inmates now in prison, and costs \$173 million.

Prison board chairman Robert Gunn warned persons who might try to sabotage the pact that "the war is over and the side of reform has won."

Others said the settlement will be a landmark that will lead to a new direction in the state criminal justice system. "It's just crazy to try to build all the new prisons they will have to build just to keep even," one reformer said.

Wiretap Update

After a Houston senator filibustered for over 12 hours against it, the Senate amended the wiretapping law to allow covert entries to plant wiretaps.

The new law would extend wiretap use, but requires that court orders be necessary to install wiretaps and pen registers, a device recording only

phone numbers dialed out of a line.

Indictments Thrown Out

Felony indictments against state Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, were thrown out by a state district judge last week who ruled that a grand jury member was serving improperly.

Parker was accused of criminal drug and pornography offenses, but claimed innocence. Earlier this year, Parker was indicted on porno and prostitution charges, but a state judge threw out the charges on grounds of improper grand jury conduct.

Last week's ruling marked the end of a second attempt by the local district attorney's office to try Parker. The DA said he will not pursue it further.

People who are not hypoglycemic, but complain of the symptoms, may be helped by following a more healthful lifestyle. Skipping meals, not eating a variety of nutritious foods, poor sleep habits, lack of exercise or personal problems and stress may contribute to the problem.

The nutritionist recommends the following to alleviate nutrition-related symptoms: Eat nutritious meals and snacks. Eat more complex carbohydrate foods, such as whole grain breads and cereals, with fruits and vegetables replacing candy and other sweets. Eat several small meals a day. Eat more fiber-rich foods. Eat slowly. Carry a nutritious snack, such as a can of orange juice or crackers and cheese, to eat if symptoms arise when away from home.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Now that we have had more showers, plants should really get going this month. After all, getting ready and planting may be your most exciting part of gardening. Move around and observe all you have done and that you want to do in this and next month.

All flowers, fruits or shrubs, herbs, vegetables, and plants must be free of weeds or grass competition to do well and to look good. Cultivation helps plants grow by cracking the crust to allow moisture to soak in, and air to come into the soil.

Lawns should be given proper care to make them beautiful and attractive throughout the long growing season. To do this they must have adequate maintenance. This means regular feeding, watering, and mowing. With this care, your lawn should be healthy and little trouble with weeds, insects and diseases. It is a good practice to collect the clippings each time you mow to prevent thatch buildup, for this hampers the penetration of water and air into the soil and ultimately can cause the decline of large areas of lawn. Mow so that you remove only about a third of the leaf blade at any one clipping. Grass manufactures food in the leaf blades, so if too much of the blade is removed, the entire plant

suffers. Frequency of watering will depend on the amount of rainfall, soil type, age of lawn, root competition with other plants, and the efficiency of watering system. Deep irrigation once a week is far more beneficial than a light daily sprinkling. Most lawns should be fertilized in early spring and early fall at the rate of about 20 pounds of complete fertilizer per 1,000 sq. feet.

Ferns have become quite popular again for indoor and outdoor plants. The maidenhair ferns are among the most attractive for they have few problems. They do need a shaded location, moderately moist atmosphere, and cool growing temperature. Soil should be composed of equal parts rich loam and leaf mold and kept steadily moist. Feed ferns only lightly once or twice during the growing season. A specimen plant can be grown in the same container for several years. You may need to check the drainage hole to see that it isn't stopped up, to permit proper drainage.

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EXTENSION OFFICE NEWS

Karen Boothe and Joy Gibson, Energas Home Economists, were here last week with a "Spring Seasonings" cooking school. Many tasty dishes and recipes were available, as well as numerous tips for selecting various foods.

Larger grocery stores often offer a variety of fruits and vegetables that may not be available in smaller super markets. Some of these fruits and vegetables may include:

Kabocha Squash: A Japanese variety, green-grey shell, flattened full shape. Golden flesh, rich squash flavor. Bake halves or quarters at 400 degrees, cut-side down on baking sheet, for 40-60 minutes or until fork tender. Delicious glazed with melted butter, molasses, maple syrup, orange marmalade or apricot preserves.

Tofu: It is a soybean curd; a delicate-flavored white bean custard product. It absorbs other flavors readily. Drain and cube for stir-frys, vegetable or meat dishes. It may be eaten raw with soy sauce. It is very low in cholesterol and fat. It can be pureed for salad dressing and sauce recipes.

Taro Root: A root similar to the potato. Use cooked in stir-frys, salads, or buttered and seasoned. Or cook and mash with white or sweet potatoes as a side dish. An excellent infant food, because of its digestibility. Do not eat raw. Scrub well, cook in boiling water for 40 minutes or until tender. Peel if desired. Mash or dice.

Chayote: Pear-shaped squash with light green or white skin. Skin and seed are edible. Flavor is similar to apple and cucumber combined. Delicious raw with dips, deep fried or baked. Bake or boil as you would any squash.

Guava: The egg-shaped lemon yellow fruit is 2 to 3 inches long. The flesh is bright pink to salmon-colored and is very sweet and aromatic. It is served cut in half and eaten with a spoon or sliced in chunks and added to fruit salad.

MEXICAN STUFFED SQUASH

- 4 lg. zucchini squash
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen whole kernel corn, thawed
- 1 1/2 cups shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 1 c. fresh bread crumbs

- 1 can (4 oz.) chopped green chilies, drained
- 1/2 cup red or green pepper, chopped
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/8 tsp cumin

In large saucepan, bring 4 quarts water to a boil. Add squash, cover and cook 5 minutes. Remove squash from water. When cool, cut in half lengthwise and scoop out seeds. Place on paper towels cut side down; set aside. Meanwhile, heat oil in skillet. Add onion and garlic and cook 5 minutes. Remove from heat. In large bowl combine remaining ingredients. Add onion mixture and stir well. Butter a baking dish large enough to hold squash halves in a single layer. Fill squash generously with corn mixture and place in baking dish. Cover with foil and bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Uncover and bake 20 more minutes. Makes 8 servings (180 calories per serving)

Ten years from now Anel Wagoner will have a grand opening for his weight room and spa for all persons weighing under 90 pounds.

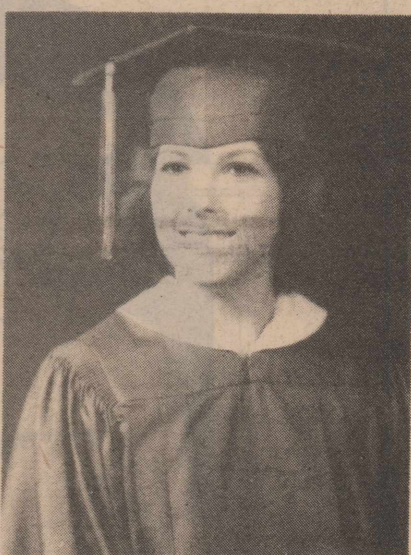

Lightning safety should be practiced

When it comes to a brilliant display of lightning in Texas skies, "better safe than sorry," is a good motto.

Deaths from lightning may be rare, but it's shortsighted for anyone to ignore the simple precautions and slight inconvenience of safety measures, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service health education specialist Dr. Mary Ann Heussner.

She says the first rule of lightning safety is to get away quickly from any open space—a field, golf course, hill-top, beach or pool. Get away before the rain starts, since lethal bolts sometimes strike during the muggy lull before a storm.

"If you're caught outside, the best kinds of shelter are buildings equipped with a lightning protection system, steel-framed buildings, and cars, buses or tractors with metal tops and closed windows," advises the specialist. "But don't trust a flimsy shelter on a golf course."

When you can't take cover, you can better your chances by taking refuge in a ravine, culvert or ditch—keeping away from pipes and staying alert for flash floods, Heussner says.

When none of this is practical, crouch as low as possible with no part of your body except knees and toes

touching the ground. Also remember to avoid tall isolated objects, like a lone tree, staying twice as far away as the tree is high.

Just being indoors doesn't entirely protect you from lightning, Heussner points out.

Stay away from open doors and windows, fireplaces, radiators, stoves, metal pipes, sinks, bathtubs, shower stalls and plugged-in electrical appliances. Electricity of lethal strength can enter a home not only by a direct strike, but also by a side flash from another object like a tree, and through pipe lines and wiring.

"Unfortunately, when someone is struck by lightning, bystanders often don't know what to do," remarks the specialist. "Others won't touch the victim for fear he is still electrically charged."

But a lightning victim can be safely touched, and often revived by mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, Heussner says.

Adults who work outdoors or enjoy outdoor sports may have a healthy respect for lightning, but children are often unaware of its danger. The specialist recommends that parents review lightning safety precautions with their youngsters along with safe bicycling and swimming rules for the summer.

The AT&T Emergency Medical Alert System is an Emergency Response System designed to allow the elderly, disabled or medically infirm to maintain an independent life style in their own home, and still maintain a constant and reliable contact with qualified medical help in the event of

an emergency. The simplicity of the system, and its built-in self-monitoring capacity, helps provide a feeling of self-reliance and well being to the subscriber.

The Scientists Tell Me...

Prescribed Burning of Rangelands Can Benefit Livestock and Wildlife

Prescribed burning of rangeland is one of the methods being used to improve grazing and increase food supply for our livestock and wildlife, according to Dr. Charles Scifres, range scientist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

"Prescribed burning", Scifres explains, "is the systematically planned application of burning to meet specific management objectives."

"Careful consideration is given to the influences of weather, vegetation, topography, and an array of other factors in implementing specific burning techniques to meet explicit resource management objectives."

"The planning process for installing prescribed burns must include careful matching of purpose, firing techniques, safety considerations and timing of burns with management objectives."

"The increasing costs of chemical and mechanical range improvement have stimulated interest in prescribed burning as a safe, effective, relatively inexpensive way to reduce brush cover (at least temporarily), initiate earlier spring green-up of forages, improve livestock distribution, and accomplish various other range improvements."

"It can be a cost-effective practice used as a part of an Integrated Brush Management System."

"An estimated 80 percent of the State's 90 million acres of rangeland has brush problems ranging from light to severe. "Brush" is a term used to describe the collection of trees, shrubs, vines and cacti that rob

our forbs and grasses of food, water, and sunlight.

"If we regain control of this land, we could get a big increase in livestock production each year as well as greatly increase our supply of water available for our towns and cities."

"It's estimated that effective control of mesquite, alone, would increase annual beef production in the State by 68 to 136 million pounds. Of course, control of other brush types such as the oaks and mixed brush could result in an even greater increase of livestock and range-related products."

"In many cases, prescribed burning can be applied to suppress the woody plants and cacti and lend competitive advantage to grasses and other herbs, which are the year long staple food for livestock and wildlife."

"Many established woody plants possess the capability of regenerating vegetatively so that burning may kill few of the plants. However, suppression of brush topgrowth releases the desirable herbaceous plants, usually for two or three growing seasons, depending largely on density of the brush plants, intensity of the burn, postburn rainfall, and susceptibility of the species to fire."

"In addition to suppressing woody plants on grasslands, prescribed burning results in a number of additional range management benefits which cannot be obtained with other methods."

"For example, burning stimulates a cover of fresh, nutritious forages for all grazing animals, domestic and wild, which depend on rangeland for habitat."

"Grass plants which would otherwise become coarse and unpalatable may be relished by cattle during the spring following burning. Abundance of native broadleaved plants (collectively referred to as forbs), especially perennial native legumes which are used by domestic livestock and wildlife, may be increased by burning. Tick infestations have been found to be suppressed after burning, a benefit to both livestock and wildlife."

"Prescribed burning may be applied specifically to improve habitat for many species of wildlife."

"For example, brush stands on rangelands may become so dense and decadent that quality of whitetailed deer habitat is reduced. Burning forces replacement of the old woody plant tops with a flush of new growth which usually contains more crude protein and phosphorus and is readily available to the deer."

"By applying the burns in a pattern that leaves patches of undisturbed woody stands, the whitetailed deer are provided ample resting and escape cover while the interspersed burned areas furnish a quality food supply, the attributes of 'prime habitat'."

"Game birds, such as bobwhite quail which prefer open grassy areas with scattered clumps of woody plants, may also benefit from properly planned burns."

"Prescribed burning not only promotes this type of vegetation mosaic but also stimulates herbaceous plants which produce food as tender young shoots and seeds."

"Prescribed burning is usually most effective when used in conjunction with chemical or mechanical brush control methods."

"The chemical or mechanical method kills some of the woody plants which reduces competition and allows the herbaceous plants to form a more continuous cover."

"The increased grass production provides fuel for installation of a uniform, intense prescribed burn. Periodic prescribed burning, then, is subsequently applied to suppress the brush regrowth."

"This systematic application of burning extends the 'treatment life' of the more costly initial brush control method. Use of prescribed burning in this context has given rise to a relatively new approach to brush management. Integrated Brush Management Systems, (IBMS)."

"This relatively new concept incorporates use of prescribed burning with other brush management techniques to improve the economic framework for vegetation improvement, meet multiple land-use goals (such as simultaneously improving wildlife habitat and increasing livestock production), and to increase the efficacy of brush management over a relatively long planning horizon of 10 or 20 years."


